LIGHTS AND SIRENS BEHIND YOU? WHAT SHOULD YOU DO....

⚠️ Do not panic

- ⚠️ Slow down (but do not brake rapidly)
- ⚠️ Use your indicators
- ⚠️ Be aware of other motorists; drivers should not play music at such a volume they cannot hear outside noises
- ⚠️ Do not move suddenly or move into the path of the emergency vehicle
- ⚠️ Move as far to the left of the road as you can and come to a stop
- ⚠️ If you cannot move out of the path safely, keep moving forward until it's safe to move over
- ⚠️ Remember, you are required to abide by road rules at all times

Always remember that seconds count in an emergency. If an emergency vehicle is approaching and is sounding an alarm or showing flashing lights, you must move to the left and out of the path of the vehicle as soon as you can do so safely.

Police have launched a high-visibility operation for this year's Tamworth Country Music Festival to ensure country-music fans enjoy the event safely.

Operation Sherbrook will be in place for the duration of the event which starts tomorrow (Friday 19 January 2018) and runs until Sunday 28 January 2018.

Now in its 46th year, this is the largest music festival in the southern hemisphere, with a program featuring 700 performers, 2800 shows and 120 venues.

General duties officers from Oxley Local Area Command and across Western Region will be assisted by specialist police from the Operations Support Group (OSG), Dog Unit, Licensing Police, Bicycle Unit, and Traffic and Highway Patrol Command throughout the operation.

“Local officers and specialist police will be out in force focusing on road safety and crowd behaviour,” Operation Sherbrook Commander, Acting Superintendent Jeff Budd, said.

“Thousands of people make the annual journey to be involved in the festival, and while the vast majority of people are well-behaved, police will act swiftly if you choose to do the wrong thing.”

Police will be targeting alcohol-related crime and anti-social behaviour.

18 January, from the Hills LAC - NSW Police Force: Nuisance or Barking Dogs

Please note that this is not a police matter. Dangerous dogs may require a police response.

What should I do if my neighbour's dog is barking?

If you feel as though a neighbour's dog is barking as a result of neglect or abuse, you should contact the RSPCA or an animal welfare organisation.

If your neighbour's dog is barking and causing a nuisance, your first step should be to approach your neighbours or leave them something in writing advising them of the problem if you think they are unapproachable or not home often.

Alternatively, you could use the services of a Community Justice Centre (CJC). This is government funded centre who provide free mediation sessions for residents having problems with issues such as barking dogs, fences etc. Your local CJC is located at Level 1 & 5, Parramatta Justice Precinct, 160 Marsden Street, Parramatta NSW 2150. PH: 1800 990 777.

If all else fails, you can lodge a formal complaint with Council. Once lodged, Council will notify the owner of your complaint and will provide them with an educational pack on barking dogs and the law. To lodge a complaint, please use the link on The Hills Shire Council's website.

THE community of St Ives has been left shocked by what has been called an act of “racially-motivated vandalism”.

During the evening of January 6, several vehicles in St Ives were defaced with spray-painted symbols of swastikas and abusive words. Given the large Jewish population in St Ives, the crime is being interpreted as having racial undertones.

NSW Jewish Board of Deputies chief executive Vic Alhadeff strongly condemned the incident.

“Racially-motivated vandalism has no place in civil society,” Mr Alhadeff told the North Shore Times.


“Nazi swastikas represent the ultimate in racial hatred, and all well-meaning people should condemn these attacks and those who engage in such despicable behaviour. We hope that the authorities catch the thugs responsible.”

The NRMA ANSWER: The correct answer is no. You cannot overtake a long vehicle signalling to turn unless it's safe to do so.



Remember—when you're making a U-turn you have to give way to ALL vehicles


and pedestrians.

C, A, B then D. Even though C is making a 90 degree turn it is effectively continuing straight, note the line markings. A is second because it is on the main road and is making a right turn. B goes next once C and A are clear and then D.

18 January, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Police investigate puppy scam



Cardinia Crime Investigation Unit detectives are investigating after a number of victims have come forward regarding a puppy scam.

Investigators believe that victims have been asked to make cash deposits into a bank account for a puppy, interstate transport of the puppy, insurance and registration fees.

At the end of the payments the victims don't receive a dog or their money back.

It's believed there may be victims across Australia, dating back to the start of 2017.

Investigators have released images of the dogs falsely advertised.

18 January, from the Office of the eSafety Commissioner: Social Engineering

The person or group behind the act will commonly use social pressure, deception or threats to influence a person into doing something against their interests.

Social engineering is not hacking. Hacking involves the use of computer technologies to gain unauthorised access to systems and networks. Students sometimes use the term 'hacking' when in fact they have shared their password.

Why is social engineering an issue?

Social engineering can be used to steal identities, violate people's privacy and to obtain 'high-value' information, such as intimate images. This type of cyber-threat can be subtle, and may appear as a simple request to help a friend. Spotting social engineering attempts can be challenging.

Strike plan to halt trains

Train drivers to walk out over pay dispute

RAIL workers have voted to stop work for 24 hours on Monday, January 29, as part of a pay dispute with the state government.

The timing coincides with the return of workers and school students from holidays, and follows the recent week of rail chaos when driver shortages crippled the network.

The Rail, Tram and Bus Union NSW secretary Alex Claassens said workers wanted to give commuters as much notice as possible.

“There’s never an ideal time to take this kind of action, but the reality is, we have to,” he said.

HORNSBY

1 It's not easy to move a sixmetre shipping container but if you are a thief with a crane the job is certainly easier. Police believe a crane was used to steal a container being used as an office on a building site at the corner of Burdett St and Sherbrook Rd between 5.15pm on Friday and 6.50am on Monday. Police are searching for a truck and a crane and are going through CCTV footage on nearby roads to track the criminals down.

DURAL

2 A horse float and the vehicle to tow it were stolen during a break and enter at a property on Old Northern Rd between Sunday January 7 and Thursday January 11. The thieves forced open a ground floor rear door between 5pm on Sunday and 11pm on Thursday. From the house they stole a laptop, horse saddle, iPod dock, iPad, handbag and the car keys to a gold-coloured Nissan Patrol. The value of the property taken from the house is \$3000, while the vehicle and float are worth tens of thousands of dollars. Police are urging anyone who is offered a good deal on a vehicle and horse float to come forward.

ST IVES

3 A 38-year-old woman returned to her car parked outside her home overnight to

find the rear window had been smashed and her wallet missing. A credit card was used at seven different service stations for purchases each below \$100 and totalling \$380. Police are investigating and collating CCTV footage from the service stations and nearby roads.

HORNSBY HEIGHTS

4 A 17-year-old boy on green P-plates will front court this month after being stopped for a police random breath test on Saturday. The teen from Mooney Mooney was driving his Holden on Somerville Rd at 12.10am when police pulled him over. He gave a positive breath test and was arrested and taken to Hornsby police station where he allegedly returned a mid-range drink drive blood alcohol level. He will appear at Hornsby Court on January 25.

ASQUITH

5 Two mountain bikes and a helmet worth \$5000 were stolen in a break and enter inside a block of apartments on Amor St between mid-December and last Thursday. Thieves stole the bikes from inside the locked storage cage in the building's basement. Given the long period of time during which the theft took place, a Ku-ringgai police spokesman said residents of all apartment buildings should become familiar with their surroundings so if they notice anything unusual or suspicious it would ring warning bells.

SURGE IN CAR PLATE THEFTS

KU-RING-GAI police are warning of a spike in thefts of numberplates from vehicles and are reminding residents they have anti-tamper screws available. There have been as many as 10 reported incidents in the area during the past month. When there is a rise on petrol prices the thefts incidents climbs because plates are often stolen for cars used to steal fuel at petrol stations where CCTV is fitted. Police have devices to remove tamper-proof screws if required such as when selling a vehicle or when putting personalised plates on.

Many Airbnb hosts ignoring council rules

WILLOUGHBY Council rules regarding short-term holiday renting are being routinely flouted.

While having no specific policy for short-term rentals, such as Airbnb, the council's

Local Environmental Plan 2012 prohibits tourist and visitor accommodation, except for bed and breakfasts, in low-density residential zones.

Other residential zones, such as medium and high density, do not permit any form of tourist accommodation.

Yet a quick look at available Airbnb properties in the Chatswood CBD shows numerous rentals available in apartment blocks located in medium and high-density zones around the city's shopping centres.

A council spokeswoman said as Airbnb provides a wide range of short-term accommodation privately, not all of their listed properties conform to the definition of bed and breakfast.

15 January, from Sydney Criminal Lawyers: Defamation Law: Naming and Shaming Suspected Thieves.

Shopkeepers are engaged in an ongoing battle with shoplifters, who pilfered a whopping \$2.4 billion from retailers in 2013, despite cutting-edge technologies such as CCTV cameras, advanced security tags and alarm systems.

Frustrated with shoplifters, some store owners are creating in-store 'walls of shame' depicting photos of people label as thieves or, in other cases, sharing photos of suspects on social media.

The NSW Police Force has warned that such actions could land store owners in hot water, potentially exposing them to lawsuits for defamation or even criminal charges. Police say that the job of punishing thieves should be left to law enforcement through criminal infringement notices (for amounts of less than \$300), or to the courts.
