8 September, Hornsby Police News 7/9/17: Hornsby police called to theft of a stethoscope from an ambulance and an alleged sex assault

Hornsby police were called to several thefts this week including of a stethoscope from an ambulance and \$5000 cash as well as an alleged sex assault at Hornsby Westfield.

Hornsby: An elderly man allegedly stroked a teenage girl's hair, tried to kiss her then followed her to a toilet where he sexually assaulted her at Westfield Hornsby on Tuesday. The 14-year-old girl was shopping at the complex about 11am when an 81-year-old man allegedly approached her. She left the shop and went to a

nearby toilet where the man followed her and allegedly sexually assaulted her. The girl told security guards who alerted police. They arrested the man at his home in Waitara shortly after. He was taken to Hornsby police station where he was charged with aggravated indecent assault and two counts of aggravated sexual assault of a victim under the age of 16. He is due to front Hornsby Court today.

Galston: Galston Gorge was closed in both directions on Monday afternoon after an oversized vehicle became stuck on Galston Rd. NSW Police and the Roads and Maritime Services were called in at 1.15pm after reports a truck had become stuck. Transport for NSW advised motorists that oversized vehicles should avoid using Galston Gorge.

Hornsby: A 20 year old man was allegedly caught stealing a stethoscope from an ambulance about 10.55am on Tuesday September 5 at Hornsby railway station. The ambulance was at the station to treat an elderly man. When the paramedics arrived a male approached them and allegedly abused a male paramedic. A few minutes later while unloading a stretcher from the ambulance the paramedic allegedly saw the same male place an item in his blue hooded jacket. There was a verbal confrontation before the male allegedly removed a stethoscope from his jacket and threw it back into the vehicle. Two minutes later police spoke to ambulance officers and a witness who had recorded the incident on his mobile phone. About 30 minutes later police found the male in William St, where he was arrested and charged with steal from motor vehicle. The male from a Horningsea Park address, is well known to Hornsby police.

Hornsby: \$5000 cash was stolen from a woman in the carpark of Hornsby Westfield on Monday September 4. About 12.30pm a 64-year-old female withdrew \$5000 cash from a bank in Hornsby and put it in an envelope in her handbag. When she went to her car and put the handbag on the front passenger's seat, a male tapped her on the shoulder and said 'you dropped some money'. At the rear of the car she saw a couple of \$5 notes and some coins. The male walked away and she picked up the money but when she checked her bag it was missing the

\$5000. Police attended and are reviewing CCTV footage to see if she was followed in the centre.

Thornleigh: A 22 year old male from a Guildford address was allegedly found with more than 25 different peoples' mail as well as drugs in his car at the Caltex service station in Thornleigh on Pennant Hills Rd about 12.30am on Sunday, July 30. Police had stopped a car on Pennant Hills Rd for a random breath test when they noticed a Toyota Camry at the petrol station that had an expired registration and had not cleared a defect notice. Due to this intelligence they searched the car and allegedly located a resealable container with three buds of plant matter police allege is cannabis as well as other property such as credit cards and about 25 separate peoples' mail from the north western Sydney area. The man allegedly failed a roadside drug test and was given a cannabis caution. Police will wait for the result of a drug test and expect the man will be charged with other offences.

Hornsby: A mountain bike worth \$675 was stolen from Hornsby station between 7am and 4.50pm on Monday September 4, the bike's lock was cut.

Asquith: Vandals flooded the Asquith community centre after breaking in between 3pm on Friday, September 1 and 3pm on Sunday, September 3. The vandals broke in by removing the hinges from the door and while inside damaged property and turned on the fire hydrant, which filled the centre with water. Toilet paper was thrown around the centre too. Forensics officers and police processed the scene and are investigating the matter for which they have a number of lines of inquiry.

The NSW Police Force today reminded the public the Commercial Explosives Amnesty will finish next Thursday 14 September.

The amnesty commenced on 15 March 2017 and was established so members of

the public could legally and safely surrender explosives.

Acting Commander of the Counter Terrorism and Special Tactics Command, Acting Assistant Commissioner Mick Willing said the Commercial Explosive Amnesty has provided a safe avenue for members of the community to hand in explosives and related hazardous materials to police, and we have seen an encouraging response.

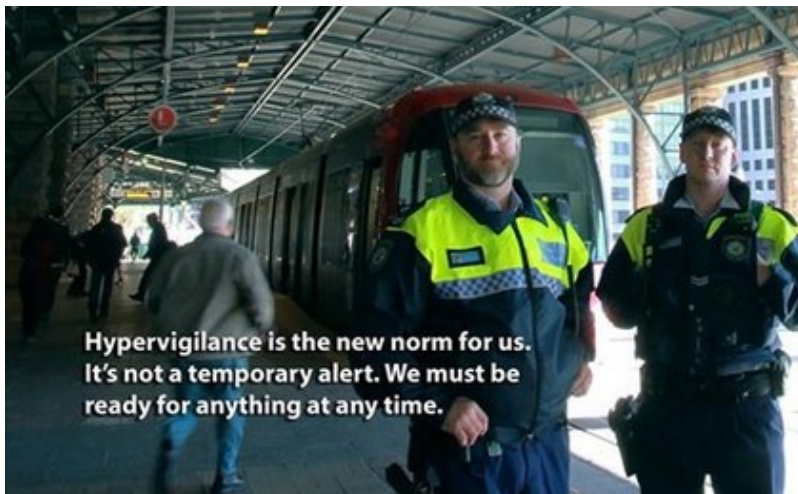

Page 8 [edited]: POSSESSION of cannabis topped the list of crimes for local offenders in more than 410 NSW suburbs including 16 Hornsby suburbs between 2011 and March 2017

Exclusive data released to NewsLocal by the NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics (BOCSAR) reveals where alleged offenders or 'Persons of Interest' (POIs) — who had legal action taken against them by NSW Police — reside. POIs may not be convicted in court, but were proceeded against in some way by police.

In 2016 police found one cocaine dealing POI living in the suburbs of Thornleigh, Hornsby, Cherrybrook and West Pennant Hills.

Australian Drug Law Reform Foundation president Dr Alex Wodak said cocaine was used mostly by people in the east and north of Sydney on high incomes while people in the west "are more at the wholesale end".

There were more amphetamine dealing offenders living in the Hornsby area, than any other drug between 2011 and March 2017. The top suburbs of residence for them were: Waitara (7), Hornsby Heights (7), Thornleigh (3) and Hornsby (3).

Fixing Old Northern

CHANGED traffic conditions will be in place from next Tuesday on Old Northern Rd at Dural for essential maintenance work.

Work will involve replacing large sections of asphalt and repainting road markings between Wayfield Rd and Stonelea Circuit.

Work is expected to be completed on Monday, October 16 and will be carried out between 8pm and 5am from Sunday to Thursday. A speed limit of 40 km/h will be in place during work hours.

Page 13 [edited] BACKYARD POOL SAFETY DAMNED IN LATEST REPORT:

ROYAL Life Saving Australia is sending a chilling warning to families about the importance of backyard pool safety — as Hornsby Council reveal no fines have been issued to residents over pool safety standards.

“Visit the Royal Life Saving website and download the home pool safety checklist to make sure your pool fence, pool gate and latch is in working order. A Hornsby Council spokesman said there were about 7800 private pools across the shire.

“Council inspects more than 500 of those each year,” the spokesman said.

Page 14 [edited] RESIDENTS are in uproar after their sleepy rural street was transformed into what they claim is a dumping ground in Arcadia.

Arcadia resident Shanna Staples and owners of neighbouring properties of Geelans Rd met Hornsby Council and Hornsby state Liberal MP Matt Kean last month after issuing complaints about a “dumping ground”. “We believe an illegal tip is operating at the site,” Ms Staples said.

"The EPA is satisfied that while the material may not strictly meet the Resource Recovery Exemption Order, it does not present an immediate risk to the local environment or human health," he said.

Bearing attack

The Pacific Highway business owner left the business about 7.45pm to deliver a new vehicle to a customer and returned about 8.55pm to see the damage. Nine metal ball bearings were found near the front of the dealership and police said it was suspected a slingshot was used.

Police are still investigating and are calling for information.

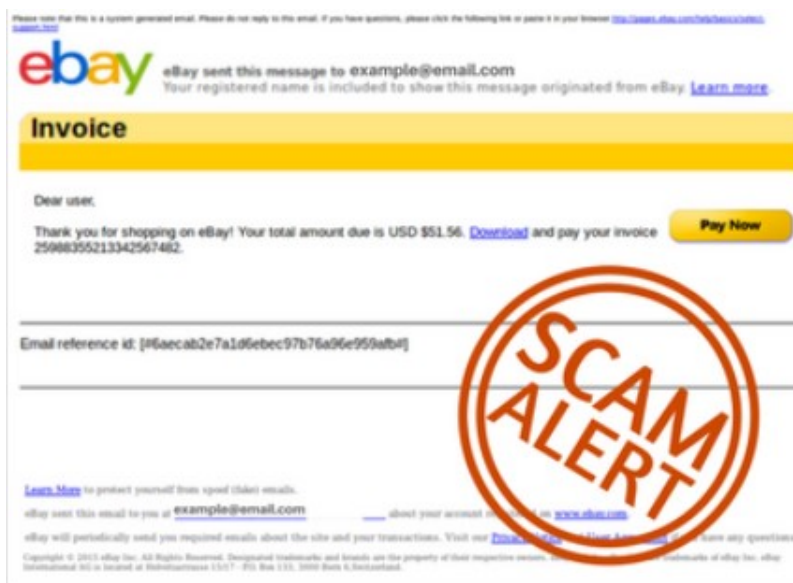

8 September, from the government's Stay Smart Online alert service: Multifaceted email ransomware campaign currently underway

A new campaign is using multiple methods to try and trick you into downloading ransomware onto your computer. The first method uses a fake email that claims to

be from eBay, with a common subject line 'Your invoice for eBay purchases (098871971234567#)'. The 'click' link leads to a web page designed to download ransomware onto your computer. The invoice number changes for each email. The fake email looks extremely convincing and is almost identical to a genuine eBay email.

7 September, from the NSW Centre for Road Safety: Drop-off and Pick-up initiative

Some schools and councils use No Parking areas, signed as Drop-off and Pick-up, Kiss and Ride, or Kiss and Drop zones, to provide parents and carers with a safe environment to drop off and collect their children from school by car.

These areas, always on the school side of the road, provide convenience for drivers and improve children's safety. Parents and carers are able to legally drop off or pick up their children within a two-minute timeframe.

The school Drop-off and Pick-up initiative includes a volunteer adult supervisor, who assists children in and out of the vehicle. The Drop-off and Pick-up initiative allows:

- Drivers to drop off or pick up students legally at busy times at the beginning and end of the school day
- A volunteer adult supervisor to marshal the students at the designated school gate
- The driver to pull into the Drop-off and Pick-up zone and remain in control of the vehicle while a volunteer adult supervisor assists the school student to exit or enter the vehicle

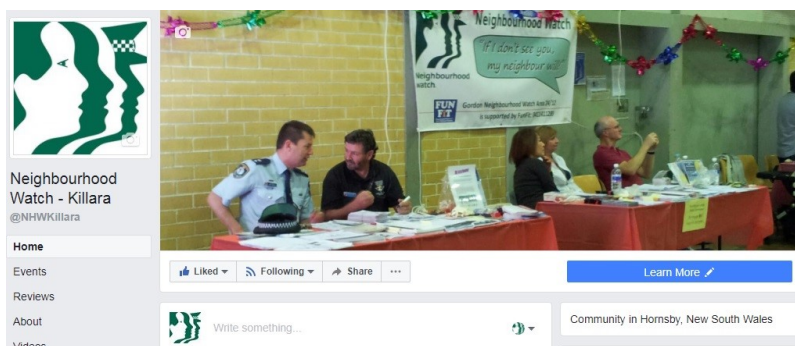
