

29 October, from CareFlight: MAN AIRLIFTED AFTER MOTORCYCLE AND TRUCK COLLISION

A 24-year-old male has been airlifted to hospital in a serious but stable condition after his motorcycle crashed in Brooklyn just before 12 noon today. It's understood the motorcycle was involved in a collision with the rear wheels of an earth-moving truck. CareFlight's rapid response rescue helicopter was tasked to the Old Pacific Highway at 11:54am, landing on an emergency helipad near the scene. Rural Fire Service and Police were on scene, with Ambulance paramedics providing initial treatment to the fallen rider. CareFlight's specialist doctor and critical care paramedic provided further treatment to the man's multiple injuries, providing a blood transfusion at the scene to stabilise him. The man was airlifted to Royal North Shore Hospital in a serious but stable condition.


25 October, from NSW Police: NSW Police is calling on licensed firearm owners to make sure their firearms are safely and securely stored as part of Rural Crime Week 2017.

The introduction of new firearms safe storage requirements on 1 September 2017 involves a new requirement that, generally speaking, firearms must be stored at the licensee's primary residential premises. Western Region Commander and NSW Police Corporate Spokesperson for Rural Crime, Assistant Commissioner Geoff McKechnie, said the regulations will assist police in addressing firearm theft from unattended rural residences.

There are safe ways to celebrate Halloween next week (or this weekend if you having a 'Halloween Party)'. Parents supervising and accompanying children when knocking on doors of those you know may be one safety strategy. Are houses that are decorated with cobwebs and spooky stuff luring your children? Follow these safety tips below for a start.....

Dressing up as a scary clown as an teen/adult whilst intimidating others could result in police action or even retaliation from victims. Take care!



Are you going 'Trick or Treating' for Halloween on Tuesday 31st October, 2017?

NSW Police recommend you do not participate in this activity. However, if you choose to participate, here are some things you should consider:

- Is it safe to take sweets or lollies from strangers?
- Do I know the person whose door I am knocking on?
- Will I get into trouble from police if I play a 'prank' or damage property?
- What if a stranger talks to me?



Remember your safety tips from the NSW Police 'Keeping Me Safe' initiative

- Safety in numbers! Walk in a group. Never walk alone. Ensure you have adult supervision.
- Hold hands and cross roads at safe locations such as marked crossings and/or traffic light intersections. Don't forget to 'Stop, Look, Listen and Think.'
- Do not take candy, lollies, chocolate from strangers.
 Do not talk to strangers other than the people nominated as 'Safe people' from 'Safe places'
- If you feel unsafe or unsure remember to tell a stranger 'No' 'Stop' and/or 'Go away

If you would still like to celebrate the occasion, perhaps you could consider celebrating at home.

Police will not tolerate poor behaviour, particularly in public so remember your manners just like every other day of the year.

From Stay Smart Online: 'Locky' ransomware campaign Priority

Level: Moderate 26 OCTOBER 2017

In light of recent publicity about the potential threat of Bad Rabbit ransomware, it's

important to be aware that some longstanding ransomware threats are periodically circulated to Australian internet users. Currently malicious emails are being sent from numerous fake email addresses containing an attachment entitled 'Invoice_file_26530.doc' or similar that could infect your computer with Locky. The email simply says: "Your Invoice is attached. If you feel you have received this email in error, please reply to this email to inform us of any necessary corrections."

October 26, from the North Shore Times: Cat's meow alerts homeowner to robbery in progress in Turramurra

TURRAMURRA A homeowner on Kissing Point Rd woke up to find three men in his kitchen around 2.10am on Saturday. The man was home with his two children and went to bed about 11pm before he woke to his cat meowing "rather loudly". As he entered the kitchen, he saw the men standing over a laptop on the kitchen bench. As the trio ran from the house one grabbed his wallet and keys, which were dropped on the driveway as they fled.

ST IVES A 25-year-old St Ives man was pulled over on Hunter St for a random breath test. As a result of the driver's mannerisms, police allegedly believed he was under the influence of drugs and searched the man's car. Nearly 8g of cocaine was found in three separate bags as well as a large amount of cash. Inquiries into the matter continue and the man is likely to face charges soon.

TURRAMURRA Two women who allegedly entered a Chemist Warehouse store on Saturday at 6pm, stealing about \$600 worth of perfumes, returned to the store the next day. The two women were confronted by the store owner who remembered them from CCTV footage, however as soon as they were approached the duo allegedly ran from the shop as the owner gave chase. The two women were not able to be followed and police were called. Investigations have begun but police have been unable to pick up a scent.



October 25, from the NRMA: TEST TIME: Is the motorcycle allowed to ride between the cars and stop at the traffic lights?

It's Motorcycle Awareness Month which continues the celebration of motorcycling and aims to raise awareness of riders on the road.




TEST ANSWER: The motorcycle is allowed to ride between the cars in this scenario.

To minimise safety risks, lane filtering is:

- Only allowed when safe to do so
- Not allowed at a speed greater than 30km/h
- Only allowed by fully licensed riders
- Not allowed next to the kerb or parked vehicles or in a school zone during school hours
- Riders are warned not to lane filter near heavy vehicles or buses. Motorcyclists should always look out for pedestrians and cyclists.

October 24, from Join the Drive: Quick quiz: if the driver of the yellow car wants to continue straight through the roundabout, do they need to indicate?



Answer: the driver does not need to indicate until they are ready to exit the roundabout. Before exiting, the driver should use their left indicator to signal they are leaving the roundabout. The driver must also remember to switch off their indicator after exiting. More information on using roundabouts here.

October 24, from the Hornsby Advocate: Exploding tyre in Dural shreds men's pants, inflicts serious leg injuries

NORMANHURST A rigid cement truck clipped a Toyota Yaris while merging on Pennant Hills Rd near the intersection of Campbell Ave on October 17. Police said the Toyota was turned to a 45- degree angle and was pushed along the road following the collision at about 1.40pm. Another truck in the third lane of Pennant Hills Rd believed the two vehicles would collide with it so the driver swerved to the right and travelled across the three lanes on the opposite side of the road but did not collide with any other vehicles. An 81-year-old woman, who was a passenger in the Toyota, was taken to hospital but was later released with no significant injuries.

HORNSBY A 40-year-old Waitara man's licence has been suspended after he allegedly recorded a breath analysis more than five times over the limit. Police said they were contacted by firefighters who saw a car near the intersection of Edgeworth David Ave and Pacific Highway about 11.30pm on Saturday and believed the driver was heavily intoxicated because of the manner of his driving. Police stopped the vehicle for a roadside breath test, which allegedly came back positive for alcohol. The driver was taken to Hornsby police station where the breath analysis was allegedly 0.286. The man was issued a field court attendance notice.

DURAL A passenger was taken to hospital after a Toyota Camry travelling about 80km/h hit the back of a Toyota Corolla. Police said a 55-year-old Galston woman in the Corolla was stationary and waiting to turn right from Old Northern Rd into Wyoming St about 7.30pm on Saturday when the Camry, driven by a 34-year-old Quakers Hill man, allegedly failed to stop after a long sweeping bend and ran into the back of her car. A passenger in the Corolla suffered whiplash injuries and was taken to hospital.

TURRAMURRA A car caught on fire after a collision on Burns Rd on Friday. Police said a 24-year-old man was driving south on Burns Rd about 2.30pm when he negotiated a sweeping right hand bend near Bedford Ave and allegedly lost control of the vehicle and veered to the wrong side of the road. His car allegedly narrowly missed another vehicle, spun 360 degrees and collided with a Hyundai being driven by a 60-year-old woman. Police said there was significant damage to both

cars and the Holden then caught on fire. Police, fire crews and paramedics arrived and the fire was extinguished. The 60-year-old and her passenger were taken to hospital.

WARRAWEE CarCar keys along with a wallet, purse and mobile phone worth \$660 were stolen from a property on Finlay Rd between 11pm on Friday and 5am on Saturday. The front door was left unlocked. Meanwhile, jewellery, a camera and keys were taken from a home at Brentwood Ave between 2.15pm and 6pm on Monday. Police said a ground floor rear window was forced open.

GALSTON A driver has been fined \$2270 and issued six points after officers from the Traffic and Highway Patrol Command noticed a truck travelling through the Galston Gorge about noon on Thursday. Police stopped the truck at Hornsby Heights and measured it. It was allegedly 8.5 metres. The length limit for Galston Gorge is 7.5 metres.

TURRAMURRA A house was broken into and car keys were stolen from a property on Finlay Rd between 11.30pm on Friday and 7am on Saturday. A 2015 BMW worth just under \$66,000 was stolen and later found in Willmot, near Mt Druitt. Police said the car has been seized for DNA and fingerprint evidence.

THE NSW Rural Fire Service is reminding Ku-ringgai residents that fire safety permits are required during the statutory Bush Fire Danger Period which began on October 1.

From 'OUR 20 FAVOURITE CRIME PREVENTION TIPS FOR BUSINESSES'

- 1. AT THE END OF THE DAY, REMOVE ALL MONEY FROM THE CASH REGISTER AND DISPLAY THE EMPTY DRAWER AS A MESSAGE TO POTENTIAL THIEVES.
- 2. DO NOT LEAVE YOUR HANDBAG, PHONE, KEYS, ETC BEHIND THE COUNTER. Thieves will distract you, reach over the counter and take your

property.

- 3. ENSURE YOUR STORE ROOM IS SECURE AT ALL TIMES. Again, thieves will distract you and gain entry.
- 4. ENSURE ALL PERIMETER FENCES, GATES AND DOORS ARE IN GOOD ORDER AND THAT GATES ARE KEPT CLOSED & LOCKED (use a padlock or similar) WHEN NOT IN USE, TO RESTRICT UNAUTHORISED ACCESS TO YOUR PROPERTY.
- 5. INSTALL GOOD QUALITY SECURITY LIGHTS AND/OR SENSOR LIGHTS AROUND THE PERIMETER TO PROVIDE MORE EFFECTIVE ILLUMINATION AT NIGHT.
- 16. BEWARE OF ROGUE TRADESMEN/PROFESSIONAL SERVICES eg the man checking fire extinguishers. BE VIGILANT. THIEVES DRESS TO FIT IN (smart businessman, young tradie) Less-experienced employees need reminding. 17. DO REGULAR STOCK TAKES, EVEN HOURLY, IN ORDER TO NARROW THE TIME FRAME OF A THEFT. This enables CCTV to be checked more effectively.
- 18. KNOW THE LAWS. WHO CAN YOU STOP, RESTRAIN, SEARCH, WHEN, HOW & WHY? Ensure all employees are aware of the risks involved with this strategy eg being spiked by a used syringe during a bag search?
