VICTIM OF MALICIOUS DAMAGE...

Malicious Damage is a senseless and often inconvenient and expensive crime for the victim. Below are steps you should take if you become a victim of malicious damage.

1/ PHOTOGRAPH the damage. Whether it is graffiti, an egging incident, or whether they have smashed a window or broken your letterbox. You can keep the photograph for your own records, if your insurance company wishes to see them, or if police contact you at a later stage to look at the damage themselves.

2/ CHECK if there is any CCTV Footage in the area where the damage occurred or if you have any witnesses to the incident such as a neighbour.

3/ CONSIDER if you have any suspects in mind. Has someone previously threatened to slash your tyres for example?

4/ CALL the Police Assistance Line on 131 444 (24/7) to make a report over the phone and obtain an EVENT NUMBER. You will need an event number to make an insurance claim.





The safety and wellbeing of our children is paramount. As parents and carers we can't always be with our children to advise and protect them.

When out and about, children can be confronted with situations where good decision-making is vital. With this in mind, advising our children to give appropriate responses to certain situations will help them avoid trouble and danger.

Here are some simple tips to give your children for when they are out and about.

Protect your child walking home

To ALWAYS identify safe places on the way home from school.

DO NOT stop and talk to people you don't know. Go straight home or to your intended destination.

ALWAYS find a safe place if you feel frightened. These include schools, shops, churches or police/fire/ambulance stations and tell them that you are frightened.

NEVER get into a car with someone you don't know.

Protect your child on public transport

NEVER travel in isolated areas. Find crowded carriages, guard's compartment (marked with a blue light) or at the front of the bus.

ALWAYS try to travel in groups of friends if possible.

Protect your child when in public spaces

ALWAYS carry a contact number for your parents. (On a card attached to your clothing, written on your arms or in your phone).

DO NOT walk away from family or friends without telling them where you are going, when you'll be back and who you are with.

ALWAYS walk away from fights or arguments, unpleasant or aggressive behaviour and take your friends with you.

► REMEMBER, always tell your parents, carer or teacher if something has happened

Six kittens were found mutilated in Baulkham Hills this morning.

Animal Welfare League NSW Inspectors are appealing for information from the public after six kittens were found dead and mutilated in a public park in Baulkham Hills.

The kittens, estimated to be 6-8 weeks old, were discovered in Crestwood Reserve on Peel Road, Baulkham Hills by a member of the public this morning (Tuesday 28 November, 2017) at around 7.30am.

Post mortems undertaken at the AWL NSW veterinary clinic showed all six kittens had been subjected to significant blunt force, many having severe head and spinal injuries.

In addition, the kittens appear to have been stabbed, and four of them had their tails removed.

From our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention tips for Businesses

Tip#1. AT THE END OF THE DAY, REMOVE ALL MONEY FROM THE CASH REGISTER AND DISPLAY THE EMPTY DRAWER AS A MESSAGE TO

POTENTIAL THIEVES.

Tip#2. DO NOT LEAVE YOUR HANDBAG, PHONE, KEYS, ETC BEHIND THE COUNTER. Thieves will distract you, reach over the counter and take your property.

Tip#3. ENSURE YOUR STORE ROOM IS SECURE AT ALL TIMES. Again, thieves will distract you and gain entry.

Tip#4. ENSURE ALL PERIMETER FENCES, GATES AND DOORS ARE IN GOOD ORDER AND THAT GATES ARE KEPT CLOSED & LOCKED (use a padlock or similar) WHEN NOT IN USE, TO RESTRICT UNAUTHORISED ACCESS TO YOUR PROPERTY.

Tip#5. INSTALL GOOD QUALITY SECURITY LIGHTS AND/OR SENSOR LIGHTS AROUND THE PERIMETER TO PROVIDE MORE EFFECTIVE ILLUMINATION AT NIGHT.

Tip#6. PHOTOGRAPH ALL GRAFFITI & VANDALISM. REPORT TO THE NSW GRAFFITI HOTLINE 1800 707 125. REMOVE GRAFFITI PROMPTLY.

Mental woes No.1 killer [Edited]

Health network using \$3.58m to bolster drug and alcohol rehabilitation services

INTENTIONAL self-harm is the biggest killer of 15- to 24-year-olds in northern Sydney, according to the region's annual health report.

Despite its overall affluence and healthiness, the Sydney North Primary Health Network (SNPHN) report said youth mental health remains a "significant issue" for the area.

Hospital emergency department visits relating to self-harm or suicidal behaviour are "particularly prominent" in young people aged 15 to 19, averaging over one a day, it said.

COWAN

1 Police are investigating after a car travelling up to 160km/h and flashing its headlights overtook several vehicles on the wrong side of double lines before hitting a rock wall and flipping on to its roof on the Pacific Highway on Friday. Police said the 19-year-old man driving the black Honda Civic was injured, along with one of two female passengers, and taken to Royal North Shore Hospital. The incident happened shortly after 9.30pm.

WAHROONGA

2 Thieves stole \$11,000 worth of jewellery after breaking into a Gilda Ave home through a first floor balcony door on Monday morning, police said. A similar incident was reported around the same time in Lucinda Ave.

HORNSBY

3 A naked man wearing nothing but a blue backpack assaulted a 50-year-old woman in Water St on Saturday about 10.45pm. Police said the Asian man, aged between 30 and 40, approached the woman near her home, grabbed her breasts and said "oh, oh, oh" before running off. Police are examining the woman's clothing for DNA evidence.

MT KU-RING-GAI

4 A Holden Commodore ute was stripped of \$21,000 in parts on the Pacific Highway. Thieves smashed the front window of the parked car between 6pm on Saturday and 8.30am on Sunday and removed the driver and passenger seat, dashboard, grill, front guard, two headlights, body panels and cup holders.

SOUTH TURRAMURRA

5 A 25-year-old man lost control of his car and slammed into a tree on the Comenarra Parkway on Tuesday about 10.30pm. Police said the man's Subaru suffered extensive damage when he lost control in the wet conditions on a sweeping downhill bend. The man allegedly returned a positive breath test and was taken to Hornsby Hospital with a suspected broken shoulder.

BEROWRA

6 A driver will face court after returning a midrange breath test on Berowra Waters Rd just before midnight on Saturday. Police said the 53-year-old Berowra man driving a Holden Commodore was pulled over and allegedly returned a reading of

.094. His licence was suspended on the spot.

HORNSBY

7 A bathroom extractor fan which overheated after being left on for days sparked a fire in a Frederick St unit on Tuesday about 2.30am. Police said the owner was woken by the smell of smoke and found the bathroom on fire. The flaming fan had fallen down and also set a plastic toilet on fire. The resident doused the blaze with a fire extinguisher, police said

North Shore Ploce commands to be merged [Edited]

THE Harbourside and North Shore police commands are to be merged as part of NSW Police Commissioner Mick Fuller's re-engineering plan of the city's police force.

The merger will take place by February next year and the residents are told to expect noticeable changes. Combined, the two commands have a force of more than 260 officers, which means greater police presence on the streets.

"It means an excellent opportunity for the community and the police, as it is all about putting more police on the front line and upskilling members of the force," Commander Allan Sicard, who will head up the new merged command structure told the North Shore Times.

"Police only exist because the community want us to exist, so we are here to serve the community to the best of our ability and we have the resources to do that now."

As well as a greater front line presence, the merger will also allow police to focus on a range of key areas, including domestic violence, and identity theft.

Nive times over limit

A Sydney woman was caught driving nine times over the limit in Willoughby. The 42-year-old was pulled over by police at noon on Friday at the intersection of Mowbray and Marlborough roads. She blew a blood alcohol reading of 0.445. Susan Lung (pictured) was arrested and charged with high-level drink driving. She also had her license suspended. Police chief inspector Phil Brooks stated it was

one of the highest readings police had seen in a long time. She is due to appear in Hornsby Local Court on December 14.
