School Zones have been back in force from Monday 29 January - 8 to 9:30am and 2:30 to 4pm. Slow down to 40kmph and be aware of your driving and parking behaviour around schools. Follow the rules and keep kids safe.

No Parking

You have 2 minutes to drop-off or pick-up and must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.



- Have you secured your vehicle rego plates with one-way locking screws? Your plates don't have to be special to be stolen. They are simply used on another vehicle to avoid easy recognition. For example; criminals fill their car with fuel and fail to pay, or drive on toll roads with no electronic tag. Contact us for your locking screws **FREE**. We can arrange for collection at your nearest police station.
- Are you impacted by drivers blocking your driveway? Paint white lines at each side of your driveway. These can be a deterrent. Contact us for **FREE** use of a stencil and all the rules & info you need.
- Have you marked your valuable items? Marking your items can help return your property to you. It can also tie a criminal to a crime scene, allowing for a better chance of conviction. Contact us for **FREE** use of an engraver and ultra-violet pen, along with advice on the best ways to mark your property.

04 February, from Careflight: GIRL SURVIVES RUNNING INTO BARBED WIRE FENCE ON MOTORBIKE

A 12-year-old girl has been airlifted to hospital in a stable condition after seriously injuring herself in a motorcycle incident in Maroota this afternoon. CareFlight's rapid response rescue helicopter was called to help shortly before 2pm, landing at the property in minutes. At the scene they found the girl had suffered severe lacerations to the neck when she collided with the barbed wire fence. CareFlight's specialist doctor and critical care paramedic treated her at the scene. Ambulance crews arrived by road and also helped provide treatment. The emergency services team, including police, together carried the girl to the helicopter. The girl was flown to hospital in a stable condition.





If you break down on the side of the road, in addition to putting on your warning lights, please put up your bonnet.

This is another alert to approaching drivers that may possibly be seen further away than the warning lights, which being lower down, may be hidden by other cars.

02 February, from Australian Federal Police: Parents, it's SO important that you know what your kids are doing with their mobile devices.

We've just arrested a 36 year old man for soliciting child sexual exploitation material through the everyday apps your kids use. We're alleging he used the chat functions within the apps to communicate indecently with children, solicit child exploitation material and to send indecent images.

Our Commander Lesa Gale, who leads the teams engaged with the investigation and prevention of adult and child exploitation, says that child sex offenders are contacting children through mobile phone applications, online games, and social media networks. "Many parents may not be aware that chat functions appear on several popular applications and games. This includes popular kids' apps including Animal Jam and Musical.ly, instant messaging such as Kik, console games and other social networking platforms," Commander Gale says. She also says there are proactive steps that parents and guardians can take. "We encourage parents and guardians to know the apps and games their children are using, supervise their children online and talk with their children about online safety."

Death toll rising on highway to hell, on page 3 [Edited]

MOTORCYCLISTS have blasted cowboy groups that encourage "deadly behaviour" on the Old Pacific Highway at Cowan. The plea comes as the Hornsby Advocate can reveal the two riders killed in the past six months were from the same group. Outraged riders revealed 19-year-old L-plater Ki Dwyer, who was killed on January 20, and 45-year-old Malcolm Jenkins, killed on September 27, were members of a secret group known as Real Road Racers (RRR). One motorcycle enthusiast, who wished to only be identified as Craig due to fears of retribution, said RRR was known for performing reckless stunts on the Old Pacific

Highway.

TURRAMURRA Kur-ing-gai police are reviewing CCTV footage to identify an act of indecency on a train on Tuesday about 6.45pm. A 52-year-old woman said a man exposed himself in front of her and committed an indecent act on a train from the city to Berowra. The woman told police a caucasian man, aged in his mid-20s, wearing a black T-shirt, brown shorts and carrying a backpack, sat next to her despite the carriage being almost empty. The woman said the man walked away when she challenged him after he performed the indecent act. She reported it to station staff.

TURRAMURRA Another act of indecency on a train has been reported to the Kur-inggai police on Monday when a 69-year-old woman had boarded a train at Hornsby and sat in the carriage with four other women. She later told the station staff a man — described as being fat, between 20 and 21-years-old, with short brown hair, wearing a black T-shirt and shorts — had sat opposite her before putting his hands inside his pants. She said when she got up to exit the train at Turramurra station, the man allegedly exposed himself to her. The woman made a complaint to station staff. Police are investigating the incident.

BOBBIN HEAD A nine-year-old boy became lost for a few hours before being found at Bobbin Head Reserve, on Sunday between 4.20pm and 6.30pm. The boy was with other families when he and other children decided to run in front of the group. Police said that when they came to a fork, the boy did not follow the other children but instead took the other turn. When the families reached the rock pool where the other children had gathered — about 2.5 km from the fork — they realised the nine-year-old was missing. They contacted police who dispatched six crews, Polair and requested ambulances. The search was called off when a man, not in the group, found the boy and brought him out where he was reunited with his relieved family.

TURRAMURRA A woman, described as a 30-35-year-old with strawberry blonde hair and wearing a light coloured blouse and brown dress, is wanted by police after she allegedly keyed someone's car from front to back at the Coles carpark at Turramurra on Tuesday. Police said a 28-year old local man lodged a complaint with them. He told police that he parked his Holden Rodeo next to the woman's Volkswagen Passat at the carkpark when she allegedly verbally abused him. The man told the police he just laughed and walked away. However, when he turned to look back, he noticed she was taking pictures of his car. He told police that he also decided to snap pictures of her car when the woman allegedly threatened him. The

man then entered the supermarket when he said harsh words were exchanged between them in front of shoppers before she walked out. The man said he followed her out and watched her use her keys to allegedly scratch his vehicle from the front to the back door. He then visited Hornsby police station where he made his complaint. Police are investigating the incident.

WAHROONGA A 74-year-old man will appear in court after recording a low range drink driving reading on Tuesday. Police said they stopped the man at 10.13pm when he was driving a Holden Colorado on the Pacific Highway at Wahroonga. They checked his licence and carried out a breath test. Police allege the man, who they say was driving from Jindabyne, blew 0.66 and was arrested and charged.

TURRAMURRA Money and luxury goods worth about \$5200 were stolen from a house at Bannockburn Rd, Turramurra, on Sunday between 1pm and 1.30am. Police said the thief entered through one of the rooms and allegedly stole Australian and American dollars, a Gucci handbag and two Louis Vuitton wallets. Police said investigations are continuing.

WAHROONGA The owner of a house being renovated in Jordan Rd, Wahroonga, told police about \$28,000 worth of antique furniture had been stolen between July 2017 and January 30 this year. The owner said he had been renovating the house for the past two years and had stored his property in different locations around the home. He told police several tradespeople and builders were going in and out of the house. A police spokesman said the owner was reviewing CCTV footage and was still to hand the footage over to them.

TURRAMURRA A 19-year-old man, described as a caucasian of medium build and height, started a bin fire at Karuah Park on Monday at 10.35pm. A resident told police he saw the bin on fire and said the man was next to it. The resident called police who extinguished the blaze. Residents said the man was wearing a black top and beige jeans. Police say the aerosol cans they found next to the bins could have been used as an accelerant and are speaking to staff at service stations if they had sold them.

WARRAWEE Two workers were injured when scaffolding collapsed at a work site at Cherry St on Monday at 7.30am. A man, 25, fell 3m and suffered leg, head and neck injuries. The scaffolding also struck a 24-year-old man's shoulder and back.

Far too often we see people running to catch the train as doors are closing. Trains doors are not like lift doors. They don't open again when you put your hand in the gap as this customer found out. Don't take the risk of injuring yourself or others by lunging at the doors. With more services on the network, you don't have to wait long until the next train comes along. Last year, 62 of these incidents resulted in more than 360 minutes of train delays.

1 February, from Parramatta LAC - NSW Police Force: BICYCLES TARGETED BY THIEVES

Whether you ride for work or leisure, the loss of your bicycle can be inconvenient and expensive. By following some simple tips you can better protect your bicycle from being damaged or stolen:

1. Always engrave or mark your bicycle with a UV pen, micro-dot or other permanent means (near the serial number),
2. Always record the serial number, brand and model of your bicycle and **TAKE PHOTOGRAPHS**,
3. Never leave your bicycle unattended and unsecure,
4. Always lock your bike with a good quality bike lock to a solid anchor / object (**LIKE THE PICTURE**)
5. Always park your bicycle in a well lit and populated area,
6. Always secure your bicycle in a locked shed or inside your home.



MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Within the last two weeks the Council has received final approval from the NSW Government for its bushfire planning in locations of high risk. Thirteen areas in parts of Wahroonga, North and South Turramurra, St Ives and Killara now have planning controls in place to ensure the safety of residents when future developments are built. The plan prohibits the construction of aged care homes and childcare centres in these high risk areas, because of the need to evacuate quickly in a bushfire. Extensive discussions over the last few years with residents and local emergency services such as the police and RFS have helped us plan for bushfire evacuations in these high risk areas. L I N D F I E L D Police have charged a 17-year-old from Lindfield over the alleged assault of a man on a train on January 21. About 1.45am, police said, a 20-year-old Killara man was assaulted by two men who held a knife to his throat before fleeing. This week, the teenager was charged with affray, being armed with intent to commit an indictable offence and assault occasioning actual bodily harm in

company.

R O S E V I L L E A HOUSE in Roseville was broken into in the early hours of Monday. About 1am two unknown male offenders gained entry to the property by forcing open a locked door at the rear of the house, police said. Once inside they searched the bedrooms, stealing jewellery and two laptops. The men are described as caucasian and of stocky build.

From Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for New Neighbours:

1. Identify your 6 IMMEDIATE NEIGHBOURS — 2 TO YOUR LEFT, 2 TO YOUR RIGHT, ACROSS FROM AND BEHIND YOU. Make an effort to get to know them and swap contact details.
2. SUGGEST AN ARRANGEMENT WITH NEIGHBOURS FOR WHEN ANY OF YOU ARE ON VACATION, eg for clearing the local newspapers, putting out & retrieving garbage bins, clearing mailboxes, parking in driveways/spaces, etc.
3. JOIN IN WITH NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH. They are your eyes and ears when you aren't at home. Contact your Crime Prevention Officer to find out about a group in your area. Maybe set up an 'eWatch' for your street or building?
4. INTRODUCE YOURSELF TO YOUR LOCAL POLICE STATION. Where should you park? What information is available there? When is it manned?
5. LOOK FOR YOUR LOCAL POLICE ON FACEBOOK FOR UP-TO-DATE WARNINGS & INFORMATION: facebook.com/KuringGaiLAC. At that moment, you hear someone crying for help, having been blown into an adjacent canal by the explosion. He cannot swim. Describe in detail what you would do."

The senior constable wrote: "Remove uniform and mingle with crowd."
