
15 March, from Kuring Gai Police Area Command



MOTORCYLIST AIRLIFTED AFTER FIERY CRASH

A 31-year-old man was airlifted to hospital in a stable condition after his motorcycle crashed off the road, through a guard rail and caught fire in Peats Ridge yesterday afternoon.

Bystanders were able to pull the man from the motorbike before fire engulfed the motorcycle and its surroundings.

CareFlight's rapid response rescue helicopter was tasked shortly before 5pm, landing at the scene.

Rural Fire Service attended and contained the fire. Police and Ambulance units were also on scene.

CareFlight's specialist doctor and critical care paramedic treated the man for a fractured arm and facial injuries. Thanks to the quick action of those attending, the man did not suffer burns in the accident.

The man was airlifted to hospital in stable condition.

Temporary Road Closures

Council has approved the following temporary road closures on [Sunday 25 March](#):

- Karuah Road (between Eastern Road and Turramurra Avenue) 5am to 3pm
- Turramurra Avenue (between Brentwood Avenue and Karuah Road) northbound lane only – 5am to 3pm
- Warrimoo Avenue (between Killeaton Street and Mungarra Avenue) northbound lane only – 6.45am to 1.30pm
- Woodbury Road (between Mona Vale Road and Hume Avenue) 8.30am to 1.30pm
- Bobbin Head Road – northbound right turn lane at Burns Road intersection – 8am to 1.45pm

The purpose of the closures is to allow the Rotary Clubs of Turramurra, Ku-ring-gai, St Ives and Wahroonga to conduct a community bicycle ride through local roads in Ku-ring-gai.

Access will be maintained for local residents and emergency vehicles.

ST IVES

1 A thief has stolen \$320 in property from a locked car in Lucia Ave, St Ives. Between 6pm last Saturday and 1pm on Sunday, a Toyota Hilux ute was broken into by bending open one of the door frames. Once inside the thief stole a dash-cam and \$20 from the dashboard of the ute, with the total value coming to \$320. Police have no leads as to the identity of the thief and are appealing to the public for help.

WAHROONGA

5 A youth has been charged and another two were being questioned in relation to drugs. At 10.40pm on Friday police were at Wahroonga Park in relation to other matters when they came across three 17-year-olds sitting in the playground. After noticing a smell of cannabis, they conducted a search of a backpack. The search

uncovered two plastic bags of cannabis and five tablets alleged to be MDMA. One of the youths was arrested and investigations are continuing.

Woman, 53, charged over fatality

A WOMAN has been charged after Berowra pedestrian Noel Rosten was fatally struck outside his home on February 26.

Last Thursday, the 53-year-old woman was charged with dangerous driving occasioning death and negligent driving occasion death after the incident at Berowra Waters Rd at 12.25pm.

Her driver's licence was suspended.

The SUV struck 85-yearold Mr Rosten, a passionate community advocate who was a Friends of Berowra Valley representative.

The driver was uninjured and taken to Hornsby Kuring-gai Hospital for mandatory blood and urine testing.

Police arrested her at her home.

She was granted conditional bail to appear at Hornsby Court on Wednesday, April 4.

Streetwatch (page 8):

WAITARA

1 Thieves stole two carpet cleaning machines from a storage area in an apartment block on Waitara Ave between 4pm Friday and 11pm Sunday after getting in through the ground floor of the block. The machines are worth a total of \$5000.

MT COLAH

2 When highway patrol officers stopped a Toyota Hiace van on Pacific Highway on Friday at 3.15pm they not only discovered the vehicle's registration had expired but they also discovered the driver had allegedly been drinking. The 40-year-old Mt Colah was breathalysed and he gave a positive result. The man was arrested and taken to Hornsby police station where he gave a mid-range reading of 0.126. His licence was suspended and he has been given a court attendance notice to appear at Hornsby Court this month.

MT COLAH

3 Police are on the trail of five stolen plants taken from the front garden of a house on the Pacific Highway. A Dragons Eye, agave, two magnolias and a young white gum tree a metre high, were taken from the property between 10pm Thursday and 8am Friday and were worth \$340. Police said they had little information to go on but would try to track the plants down. "This sort of crime happens sometimes, maybe once or twice a year," Senior Constable Paul Cleary said. "There have been occasions when they have even taken plants from churches."

HORNSBY

4 Police have caught a man who allegedly robbed Dan Murphy's liquor store in Westfield and who allegedly threatened a staff member, saying he would knife him. Police spoke to a 19-year-old Hornsby man at Hornsby train station because he did not have a valid Opal card. About 10 minutes later it is alleged the same man went into the liquor store and took a \$56 bottle of Grant's whisky and put it down the inside of his pants. The man was spotted by store staff and approached by a 34-year-old staffer. The man then allegedly took out a blue and chrome knife and threatened the worker. After the man left the store police were called and at 10.40am they tracked him down to the train station where officers could see he was heavily intoxicated. He dropped the whisky bottle when officers approached. Police are still investigating.

DURAL

5 A completely shredded tyre, serious panel damage, empty beer bottles in the front and rear seats and no driver was the scene greeting police at 2.30am on Old Northern Rd last Tuesday. As officers examined the crashed car, a woman stumbled out of the darkness and allegedly admitted she was the driver of the car. Police said the 23-year-old Baulkham Hills woman appeared to be heavily intoxicated so they breathalysed her and she gave a positive result. She was arrested and taken to Hornsby police station where she recorded a high-range reading of 0.173. Enquiries are continuing.

THORNLEIGH

6 Two 10-year-old boys were approached by a man aged in his 70s in a black 4WD who asked one of the boys if he wanted a lift at 3.15pm on Monday. The incident happened at Turramurra train and bus interchange when the two boys waited for a bus. The man said: "Are you Ben?" to one of the boys, who said no. The man asked if the boy wanted a lift and the boy refused. The man asked a second time before driving away. Police are checking CCTV and seeking witnesses to the incident.

THORNLEIGH

7 A cannabis caution was handed to a 21-year-old Dural driver on 12.50am at Pennant Hills Rd after police pulled his Mitsubishi Lancer over for a random breath test. The test proved negative but a saliva test was positive for drugs. Police found a small amount of cannabis in the car and the man admitted it was his. An oral sample has been sent for analysis.

GALSTON

8 PolAir had to be called out on Sunday after a bushwalker got into trouble on the Benowie walking track. The 57-year-old Berowra man told relatives he was going for a walk to Hornsby Heights and set off at 11am. By 8pm he was still out and police said he started to panic when night fell. The man called a relative on his mobile phone and the relative called police who launched the chopper. At 10pm the PolAir unit found him about 600m from police who had gone in on foot. The

man had suffered minor cuts and scratches. An ambulance took him to hospital for a check-up. "Plan for the worst and hope for the best, is a decent motto," Senior Constable Paul Cleary said. "It is very important to not overestimate your abilities, so think carefully before going out for a long bush walk."

THORNLEIGH

9 Police will be talking to a man in a Toyota Hilux who shouted "hi sexy" to a 17-year-old girl four times when he kept u-turning his vehicle to come back past her on Dartford Rd. The incident happened at 11.30am on Sunday after the girl left a basketball game. Police said she became distraught and concerned and called her father who immediately came to collect her. Police have a description of the man and his vehicle and a rego number. They will visit him to caution him on his behaviour.

Police are investigating an attempted abduction of a teenager in Chatswood.


Around 6.30am on Wednesday morning a man driving a white or silver SUV approached a 17 year old girl while she was walking east along Centennial Avenue.

16 March, from Crime Stopper NSW: SEXUAL HARASSMENT.



Depending on the circumstances, the following could be considered sexual harassment:

- Staring or leering in a sexual manner
- Unwelcome wolf whistling
- Comments about a person's physical appearance or sexual characteristics

- Sexual or physical contact, such as slapping, kissing, touching, hugging or massaging
- Displaying or circulating sexual material, for example on a noticeboard or by email
- Repeated sexual invitation when the person has refused similar invitations before
- Initiation ceremonies involving unwelcome sexually related behaviour
- Intrusive questions about sexual activity
- Sexual assault (also a crime under the Crimes Act)

The law against sexual harassment generally applies in 5 main areas of public life.

1. In employment
2. When you get, or try to get most types of goods and services
3. When you apply to get into or are studying in any State education institution.
4. When you rent accommodation
5. When you try to enter or join a registered club, or when you're inside one.

It also applies when you are buying or selling real estate, taking part in a sport, and in the administration of NSW State laws and programs.

If you are a victim of sexual discrimination you can make further enquiries to The Anti-Discrimination Board of NSW on 1800 670 812.

If you are a victim of sexual assault you should report this to police.

A manhunt is underway for a man accused of indecently assaulting a 12-year-old girl while she sat with her family on a busy Sydney train.

Police have for two months been searching for the man, believed to be in his 30s, following the alleged attack on a train to Granville, in the city's west, on New Year's Day.

"Sooner or later we will identify who he is and he would be in a much better position to come forward and talk to us about what occurred," Detective Chief Inspector Brad Monk said.

Ever heard of Phantom Secure? It used to be a Canadian-based communication platform that allowed criminals around the globe to use unrestricted, encrypted communications that law enforcement couldn't crack.

We're saying "used to be", because we've brought it down.

Five men including Phantom Secure's CEO have been indicted in the United States on charges that they knowingly participated in a criminal enterprise that

facilitated the transnational importation and distribution of narcotics through the sale and service of encrypted communications.

We're alleging that Phantom Secure was the largest single supplier to the Australian organised crime market, with more than 10,000 devices sold. Sorry to the crooks – their devices won't work anymore!

15 March, from Australian Federal Police

This is not a drill. One FIFO worker recently dug himself into a hole, becoming possibly the first ever FIDFO in history (Fly In, Don't Fly Out).

15 March, Be aware of your surroundings

Your safety comes first!

Always be aware of your surroundings. If you feel you are in danger, go to a place where there are plenty of people, like a shop or services station.

Things to remember:

- Always keep enough money for a taxi or telephone call
- Have your keys ready before you get to your home or car
- Carry a personal alarm or whistle if you have reason to feel unsafe
- Where possible, park your car in a busy, well lit area
- If someone in a car threatens you, run in the opposite direction the car is facing
- If attacked, shout as loudly as you can

If we stop one person from committing a crime, there is a good chance we will prevent them carrying out further crimes. We need you to provide us with any information you have on a crime even if you cannot identify the offender.

15 March, from NSW Police Force

Police are appealing for public assistance over a child approach in Hornsby.

About 7.15pm on Monday 13 March 2018, police have been told a 13-year-old boy was riding his bicycle on George Street.

He was grabbed on the arm by a man who asked him several questions.

The boy shook him off, suffering minor injuries, and crossed the intersection on his bicycle at Peats Ferry Road.

The man followed him for a short distance before he was last seen running north on George Street.

Officers from Kuring-Gai Police Area Command commenced an investigation and wish to speak with a man who may be able to assist with their inquiries.

He has been described as being of Caucasian appearance, with a tanned complexion, of a thin build, tall, aged in his 50s, with long blond hair and a slight droop on the right side of his mouth.

The man was last seen wearing a black t-shirt with the letters 'DKNY', tracksuit pants with a tear in the rear and sneakers with torn sides.

Anyone with information is urged to come forward.

13 March, Sophisticated RedDrop Malware Targets Android Phones

A sophisticated strain of mobile malware targeting Android devices can extract sensitive data and audio recordings, run up premium SMS charges and then tries to extort money from victims.

According to security firm Wandera the malware, dubbed RedDrop, is being distributed inside 53 Android applications promoted on third-party app stores. Apps range from image editors, calculators, language learning tools and adult themed apps. According to Wandera, the criminals had targeted victims working at several “Big Four” consultancy firms.

13 March, from NSW Police Force

Three men are in police custody and a classic sports car is missing, after three vehicles were stolen from a home in West Pennant Hills this morning.

It was about 3.40am today (Tuesday 13 March 2018), that police from The Hills Police Area Command were contacted by a 42-year-old man, who had disturbed intruders at a home in Doris Hurst Place.

The group allegedly left the scene in the man's 1971 Chevrolet coupe, a Jaguar sports sedan, and a Range Rover.

About 15 minutes later, the Range Rover hit a barrier near the M2 on-ramp on Pennant Hills Road at Carlingford.

Three men travelling in the Range Rover were arrested and have been taken to Ryde Police Station.

The 1971-model red Chevrolet Chevelle SS coupe (NSW registration YRMUM) and black 2015-model Jaguar XF sedan (NSW registration CXS 56J) have not been recovered.

Police are urging anyone who may have seen either vehicle to contact Castle Hill Police or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.
