
9 April, from The Daily Telegraph:

TOP 10 MISUNDERSTOOD ROAD RULES IN NSW

This applies to intersections with and without traffic lights. However, this rule does not apply

at roundabouts.

The latest click bait online around social media apps- this is really hysteria for ill-informed parents.

Most kids don't use any of these. Most kids are quite responsible and have parental rules in place. This is really designed to cause fear and outrage in the community rather than provide real information.

Instagram is used by most kids- Ask FM and KIK died off as popular apps years ago. Omegle and the other hook-up apps are mainly used by kids with absent parents. This generation of young people is becoming more responsible, it is the

parents who need to spend time with their kids and talk to them. Working with thousands of young people, I see and hear what they are doing. Regulation starts with parents- take some responsibility instead of sharing something that is designed to cause fear rather than useful advice.

Is there an unknown visitor at your door?

If someone is at the door and you are alone and feel a bit frightened, pretend there is someone else in the house.

If someone wants to use your telephone for an emergency, don't feel rude not to let them in. Offer to make the call for them – if they are genuine, they won't mind.

Be suspicious of people requesting entry to your home to check appliances or equipment. Ask to see their identify card and take time to look at it carefully before letting them in. If you are still unsure, ring their company to check. If in doubt, keep them out.

Make sure your home number can be clearly seen from the street. This not only helps in emergencies but helps visitors to find your home (and not accidentally going to the wrong address!)

Be discreet if you live alone. It is better not to indicate on house directories or name plates that you are a Ms, Miss, Mrs or Mr. Just use your surname.

If you live alone, make arrangements to have regular contact with someone your trust. Try setting up a code like three rings on a telephone each morning, or simply lifting your blind up at the start of each day so they know you're okay.

Dance party drug bust

POLICE have carried out a drug detection operation at a music event in North Sydney over the weekend. The operation took place at an electronic dance event held at a licensed premises on Sunday. During the operation, police used the specially-trained dogs, as well as various other detection methods. As a result of the operation, 14 people were found to be in possession of prohibited substances, ranging from low to high risk. Those people caught with the substances have been charged and are due to appear in court on drug-related charges at a later date.

HORNSBY

1 A pack of stolen Pringles chips saw officers in the PolAir helicopter track down a Central Coast man on Monday. The 22-year-old allegedly snatched the chips from a shop in Hornsby Westfield about 1.20pm on Monday and ran off. The alert went out and PolAir officers swooped, spotting him a short time later climbing over the train station fence into enclosed land. Officers on the ground were given the man's location and arrested him a short time later. "PolAir just happened to be in the area," Inspector Tim Winmill, of Hornsby Police, said. "So they gave us a hand." The man has been charged with stealing, trespass and resisting arrest. "You could say it wasn't this bloke's day," Inspector Winmill said.

2 Ku-ring-gai Police carried out 1100 breath tests over the Easter long weekend as well as 157 drug tests, six of which they said proved positive.

3 A house fire at Mt Colah last Thursday is not considered suspicious, Hornsby police say. The blaze broke out in a room near the garage about 10pm and when police arrived they saw a young occupant of the house trying to put it out with a

hose. The fire brigade arrived and put out the fire. Fire crews said a lit cigarette caused the fire.

4 A Killara man allegedly driving at 153km/h in an 80km/h zone on the M2 on Sunday will appear in court this month. Police said they saw the motorist near the Windsor Rd junction. He was given blood and urine tests and a drug test which allegedly proved positive. Police suspended the man's licence on the spot and are waiting for further results of the drug test.

The supplier of imported frozen pomegranate thought to be responsible for seven cases of hepatitis A in NSW is recalling a "relatively small batch" as a precaution.

NSW Health on Friday warned anyone who may have bought the product from Coles not to eat it, after it was established all seven people who contracted the infection across NSW had consumed the fruit.

Entyce Food Ingredients on Saturday issued a statement identifying the potential culprit as Creative Gourmet Frozen Pomegranate (180g) with a best before date up to and including March 21, 2020.



The latches were sold for more than four years in Bunnings stores across Australia.

04 April: Phone app helps witnesses record evidence

Memory experts hope a new smartphone app to help people record information after witnessing crimes will lead to more reliable testimony in future court cases.

iWitnessed, launched on Tuesday, uses guided questioning to prompt users to record facts about an event including its nature, location, whether there were injuries and the witness's emotions at the time.

The content, which can be taken as text, voice recordings or images, is also time and GPS stamped with the option to forward a copy to police or a secure email address.

The app has the backing of former NSW Director of Public Prosecutions Nicholas Cowdery QC, who says the content could be relied upon in court in the same way as contemporaneous notes or recordings to refresh a person's memory.

03 April, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Hunting.

Whether you are hunting on private or public land, you must have permission to hunt on that land.

If you wish to hunt on PRIVATE land, you must have permission from the land owner.

If you wish to hunt of PUBLIC land, once you are licenced with some type of restricted hunting licence, you are able to gain permission to hunt by logging in to the online licence holder services portal found through the Department of Primary Industries.
