In NSW children between four and seven years old are prohibited from sitting in the front seat. UNLESS- there is no other available seating and NO OTHER

options. They still have to be in the appropriate and approved seat or restraint. If you are unsure about this rule, remember how dangerous this can be in a collision (airbags can seriously damage a child's neck, nose, skull etc)

6 Using headlights and fog lights

High beam

A driver must not use their headlights on high beam if travelling:

- less than 200m behind a vehicle travelling in the same direction
- less than 200m from an oncoming vehicle.



Must not dazzle

A driver must not use any light fitted to their vehicle that may dazzle another road user.

Spot lights

A driver may only use a spot or search light if:

- The vehicle is stationary and the light is being used for making adjustments or repairs to a vehicle. The light must not be projected more than six metres.
- The light is used temporarily to read a house number or notice board.

Lights

When driving at night, or in conditions where there is insufficient daylight to render a person dressed in dark clothing discernible at a distance of 100m, a driver's vehicle must have clearly visible:

- headlights
- tail lights
- number plate lights
- clearance lights and side marker lights if they are fitted to the vehicle.

It is recommended that in some daytime situations driving with the vehicle's headlights on can improve the likelihood of being seen by other road users.

Joyriders cause havoc

Police are investigating a car fire on Willoughby Rd, which occurred when a stolen car crashed into other parked cars. Shortly before 3am on Saturday April 7 police were notified that a car was on fire. Upon arriving at the scene police found the car well alight and no driver at the scene. Fire and Rescue crews were able to extinguish the blaze before it spread. It was evident that the vehicle had collided with a number of parked cars. Officers later attended the address of the vehicle's registered owner, who had believed his car was parked outside his house. An investigation is under way and police have spoken with a number of witnesses.

WILLOUGHBY

A BUSINESS providing baby goats to reduce stress in innovative yoga classes is facing animal cruelty charges.

The RSPCA allegedly found several animals in the care of Kindifarm Animals, at Dural, were severely malnourished and suffering from various lung and intestinal infections.

One kid goat was so starved and distressed RSPCA officers were forced to euthanise it, Parramatta Local Court has been told.

“The goat being in such a physical condition it was cruel to keep it alive,” court papers stated.

The RSPCA has laid 10 animal cruelty charges against the company, which supplies kid goats, lambs, piglets and ducklings for birthday parties and functions, including the yoga classes.

WAHROONGA

1 The body of a 65-year-old Wahroonga man was found floating face down in Sydney Harbour yesterday at 8.20am. Police believe he was fishing and fell into

the water where he drowned. Sailors on a commercial diving boat found the body about 150m south east of Middle Head. Marine Area Command officers who attended said the man was not wearing a lifejacket. He was identified and a brief will be prepared for the Coroner.

COWAN

2 Highway Highway patrol officers drew their weapons just off the Pacific Highway on Sunday at 3.20pm and shot dead a wallaby. The animal had been reported to police by passers-by who saw it near the helipad just off the road and believed it had a broken leg. Officers checked the animal and decided to put it out of its misery. The wallaby was euthanised and the body was placed in bushland. Police said the animal was likely been hit by a car.

3 A dance class at Normanhurst Public School for girls aged 13 to 17 was disrupted on Monday at 7.30pm by a man masturbating outside a window. Described as being in his 40s with grey hair and unshaven, the man had his trousers down round his ankles. One of the pupils told the teacher there was a man behind her and when the teacher turned and shouted at him he did not stop. He eventually ran off on Normanhurst Ave. Police believe it is not the first time the man has struck after a similar incident last October. He is of thin build, about 1.75m tall, wearing a red T-shirt, blue jeans and a blue cap.

MT COLAH

4 Three cannabis plants two pots in the back yard of a home at Parklands Rd has led to a Mt Colah man set to be charged with cultivating illegal plants after police visited the property at 5.15pm on Friday.

HORNSBY

5 A jumper stolen from Rebel Sports in Westfield was hidden in a pram being pushed by a woman aged in her 20s with a fair complexion, slim build, brown hair, a black top and blue jeans went into the store about 4.05pm on Tuesday.

HORNSBY

6 Always lock your tools away is the message after a man working at Hornsby Hospital had his work tools stolen from a shed on the hospital grounds between 3pm Saturday and 8am Monday. The tools are valued at \$800.

WAHROONGA

7 A resident on Wyanna St reported a low flying drone to Hornsby police after his property was buzzed for the second time on Sunday. The earlier incident was in March. The man told police he was concerned for his privacy. The matter has been reported to the Civil Aviation Safety Authority.

Police release CCTV footage and are appealing for witnesses to a fatal pedestrian crash at Eastwood at the weekend.

About 2.40pm on Saturday 7 April 2018, emergency services were called to the intersection of Rutledge Street and East Parade, Eastwood, after reports a woman had been hit by a car.

A 61-year-old woman was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital in a critical condition, where she later died.

The driver of the vehicle has been assisting police with their investigation. Officers from the Crash Investigation Unit have released CCTV of two youths who were walking past the intersection a short time before the crash occurred.

Police do not know the identity of the two boys, believed to be in their teens, depicted in the footage. They are not thought to be involved in any way; however, could assist police with the investigation.

Anyone who knows the two boys in the footage, is urged to come forward.



12 April, from IDCARE: New telephone phishing scam targeting Mandarin speakers



The scam starts with a message in Mandarin from the criminals stating they are from the Chinese Embassy or a courier company such as DHL. The scammer explains that the person is being investigated for illegal activity, usually relating to their passport and if they don't comply they will be arrested and deported. If you receive an unsolicited call, it's best to hang up, research the claims, look the organisation up, and call them back on the legitimate number found on a reliable website to verify. Please remember organisations shouldn't call you and then ask you to prove yourself. If you have received one of these calls please call IDCARE for assistance 1300 432 273.

He is described as being of African appearance, 170-175cm tall, with a muscular build, bald and clean shaven.


Detectives from the State Crime Command's Cybercrime Squad are seeking information from the community about Mr Nwachukwu's current whereabouts.

Are you a motorcycle rider carrying a passenger?

Any passenger carried on a motorcycle (not in a side car) must:

- motorcycle icon Sit astride the motorcycle pillion seat facing forward
- motorcycle icon Keep both feet on the footrests designed for use by the pillion passenger
- motorcycle icon Wear a correctly fitted and security fastened approved motorcycle helmet
- motorcycle icon Be eight years old or over
- motorcycle icon Not interfere with the riders control of the motorcycle

A motorcycle rider must not ride with more than one passenger (excluding sidecar passengers) on a motorcycle
