SIMPLE TIPS TO HELP KEEP YOUR CHILDREN SAFE OVER HALLOWEEN

1. Children should always be supervised by a responsible adult during 'trick or treating'.
2. If unsupervised, ensure children stay in groups.
3. Set clear street boundaries and time limits for your children to 'trick or treat'.
4. Tell your children not to run, stay on the footpath and take care crossing any roads.
5. If riding or on a skateboard, ensure your child wears a helmet.
6. Don't allow your child to eat or drink anything not sealed.
7. Under no circumstances should you allow your children to enter a stranger's house.
8. Although the words 'trick or treat' are said, ensure you children know not to damage anyone's property.
9. Not everybody wants to participate in Halloween. Ensure your children understand that and are polite and respectful when approaching a house.
10. Your children should understand if asked to leave, they should leave immediately.
11. If you wish to participate in Halloween, put up a sign or decorations on your property to alert local children.

24 October, from Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command: Police are investigating a fatal collision involving two vehicles at Wahroonga.

About 3.50pm (Sunday 21 October 2018), police were called to Pacific Highway, Wahroonga (near Neringah Avenue), following a head on collision with a white Mazda 3 and a silver VW Golf.

Investigations into the incident are continuing and officers would like to speak to any person who witnessed the incident and has not yet spoken to police. Also, if any person has DASH Cam footage of the incident to contact police.

Be aware that a branch has been reported in powerlines and sparking in this vicinity. Officers from Kuring Gai Police Area Command are in attendance.

REMEMBER: If travelling past a stopped emergency vehicle operating its red & blue beacons, you must slow to 40KPH. This is to ensure the safety of our emergency workers, as well as other road users.

29 October, from Crime Stoppers: Schoolies is soon! Follow these 10 tips to keeping safe and having a good time! ☺

- Don't mix drugs and alcohol
- Drink plenty of water
- Don't drink or take anything offered by a stranger
- If you mix alcohol and energy drinks, you could feel alert yet be intoxicated, so don't drive or go swimming
- Know your limits: check the label as many premixed drinks are more than a standard drink

- Slow down and alternate alcohol with non-alcoholic drinks
-  Stay close to people you know and trust and look out for each other
-  Call an ambulance if someone needs help. The police won't be called.
Just the ambulance service
-  Practice safe sex, take condoms with you! Don't put yourself at risk later
-  Be on guard for older people who don't belong at schoolies and leave any place if you sense aggression.

Schoolies month runs from 17 November through to 9 December.

29 October, from NSW Police: HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

'Trick or treating' is quickly becoming an annual shared celebration for children, so we're urging people to follow some simple guidelines to keep safe. It's important to remember that not everyone marks Halloween each year – so it's best to stick to houses with decorations on their properties. While we acknowledge the meaning of 'trick or treating,' ensure you respect people's decision not to participate in the festivities, as damage to properties will not be tolerated.

- It's safest for kids to go 'trick or treating' in daylight and in groups. Young children should be supervised at all times.
- If you're participating, make sure your house is locked and secure before heading out.
- Inspect candy thoroughly before eating.
- Remain in familiar well-lit areas.
- Carry a mobile phone at all times.
- Under no circumstances should you get into a vehicle with someone you don't know.
- Don't ever enter a stranger's home, even if they invite you inside.




HALLOWEEN: An alternative to orange balloons

Berowra Blood was found inside a building at Berowra Public School following a break and enter over the weekend. A flyscreen was removed and a ground-floor window smashed to gain entry to the school office building between last Friday night and Monday morning. Blood was found on some of the desks, draws and floor. A first aid kit had also been opened and used. Six small offices were rummaged through and \$100 stolen from the property. Police are investigating and forensics have visited the site.

Berowra A 20-year-old Berowra Heights woman failed a roadside drug test on

Sunday about 11.40pm on the Pacific Highway. A further oral test returned a positive result for cannabis. The sample has been sent away for further testing and could see the woman face court on a criminal charge for driving under the influence of a prohibited drug.

Berowra A mountain bike worth \$3000 was stolen from outside Berowra train station on Monday. The bike was chained to a bike rack at the station and stolen between 6.30am and 5pm.

Berowra Heights Wideview Public School was vandalised with graffiti on Sunday, which was Graffiti Removal Day. Three boys, aged under 16, were seen on the premises twice at the weekend. On Saturday about 4pm, three boys entered one of the buildings through an unlocked door. A security guard chased them off the property after they moved through a number of classrooms. On Sunday about 11am, a witness contacted the school principal after spotting three boys damaging four external walls with graffiti.

Hornsby Heights A MAN getting ready to go to work has foiled two would-be thieves who tried to steal his work vehicle in Hornsby Heights. Police said the man was preparing his tradie vehicle in his driveway on Saturday morning in Galston Rd about 5.30am, before briefly going inside. A boy that looked to be about 16 or 17 jumped into the cabin and rolled the vehicle down the driveway but could not figure out how to start the truck. An accomplice was waiting at the end of the driveway. The owner of the truck has seen what was happening and has run after his vehicle. The two would-be thieves have then run off, leaving the truck behind. Both of the boys were described as being about 16 or 17 and 180cm tall. One of them had blond hair with a man bun and was wearing a blue hoodie. The other boy was wearing a grey hoodie.

Hornsby An unregistered firearm, understood to be dumped, was found outside Hornsby Rifle Range on Sunday morning. Police are reminding people to contact their local police station if they want to surrender an unregistered firearm. The firearm was a Stirling bolt-action rifle. The club handed in the firearm to police.

Wahroonga Five people, including a four-year-old child, were taken to hospital in a stable condition after a head-on crash along the Pacific Highway on Sunday afternoon. The crash happened about 3.50pm between a Mazda3 and VW Golf. Three people inside the Mazda3 were taken to hospital, including the young child, and two people inside the VW Golf were also taken to hospital. Officers would like to speak to anyone who witnessed the incident. Also, if anyone has

dashcam footage of the incident please contact police.

Wahroonga A property on Young St was broken into on Monday. An alarm was set off inside the property about 2.25pm. Four watches, a pair of gold cufflinks and a luggage scale were stolen from the property. A witness saw a white Audi leaving the property.

ROSEVILLE Multiple items of alcohol were stolen from a liquor shop in Hills St. Around 8.20pm on October 20, police said three males, aged in their late teens to early 20s, entered the shop. The owner recognised two of them as being responsible for thefts from the store a few weeks earlier. The owner approached one of the men, who became violent and punched the owner multiple times. The men fled, taking several bottles of spirits. Police are investigating the incident.

Page 11 [shortened]: Missing artwork anger | Council, police trying to locate restaurateur *Daniel Stringer*



TWO St Ives artist are fighting to recover their missing artwork. Three years ago Debbie Angus and Jane Rich took up the opportunity to display their work in a new local restaurant. The pair entered into an agreement with manager Vincent Lam, to display and sell their artwork at the council-owned Rosedale Cottage eatery. As Ms

Angus describes, the partnership started smoothly but red flags soon started to appear.

"He was slowly selling our work, but when he did sell our paintings he would always say they had gone on approval and he would get me the money later," Ms Angus claimed. "He wouldn't get the money for around six months and then eventually I would get my money back." In July however, things took a turn for the worst, as when walking past the restaurant Ms Angus discovered Mr Lam was gone and so was her artwork.

Ms Angus is now missing 37 artworks, which are valued at approximately \$15,000, while Ms Rich is also trying to locate eight of her missing paintings.

24 October, from SBS News: NSW Premier Gladys Berejiklian has announced new measures aimed to combat drug related deaths. None of them include pill testing.

Drug dealers will be held responsible for the deaths of any people they have supplied pills to at music festivals under laws being proposed by the NSW government. Premier Gladys Berejiklian on Tuesday said dealers could be jailed for up to 25 years if people who buy drugs off them subsequently die.

23 October, from the government's Stay Smart Online: #TipTuesday: Change the default password on your modem.

Your modem and router connect you to the internet. Your modem and router will probably have a default password, and these default passwords are often publicly available online. That's like all the doors to the homes in your street using the same key, and the key is publicly available. If you don't change the default password, cybercriminals can easily hack into your internet connection and home network.

Hi, I just want to let everyone know that on Sunday 21st October we had a break and enter at our property in Amaroo Avenue, Mt Colah and the person stole my mobile phone which also contained a credit card and Opal card. I have reported it to the police so I hope they catch this person. We were all home at the time of the theft but unfortunately our security door was unlocked. So please keep your front and back security doors locked at all times even if you are home. If you see any suspicious people in the area let the police know. If you have a security camera have it on at all times as you may be able to provide police with valuable identification footage. I hate to imagine what would have happened if one of us had confronted this person in our home. If you live in Amaroo Avenue and have a security camera that was on and recording last Sunday please message me as I'd love the police to catch the b*****d!

And from the comments:

* We did not see the intruder. We were home but I was downstairs, my husband was in the backyard and my son was in his bedroom. You don't think it will happen to you, but the demographics is changing in Mt Colah. It's not the same as it was before all the home units were built.

This happened in Amaroo Avenue, between Bimbil and Northview. They somehow unlatched a locked backyard window and ripped open a flyscreen, climbed through and ransacked the house at 2am, I just want the photos back! Just shook for 2 days straight. When we went to JB HI FI to replace our things, the girl behind the counter said there were a few robberies reported lately.

* My partner had his motorbike stolen on Sunday!! Parklands RD Mount Colah!! If you have any leads, please let me know! It might be the same person

* I'm so sorry this has happened to you. We had it happen to us, the exact same on Sunday the 14th. We were home, they entered the house. They stole laptops, wallets, purses while we were asleep in bed! We're in Amor St in Asquith, but the Old Berowra Road end.
