24 December, from Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command: To help make this Christmas and holiday season as safe as possible for you, your family and property please be mindful that while you are enjoying that quality time together, there are those out there who would like nothing more than to break into your home and take what isn't theirs.

This is a timely reminder to prepare your home before you go away. Some important tips include:

- * Don't advertise on social media when and where you are on holidays – (Thieves will thank you for sending them your itinerary).
- * Make your home looked lived in.
- * Park your car in your driveway if you are away on holidays or ask a neighbour who isn't away to park their car in your driveway.
- * Have someone clear your mailbox while you are away or put your mail on hold with your local post office.
- * Have the grass mowed and hedges trimmed.
- * Arrange for a neighbour or friend to put your bins out on the correct night.
- * Don't leave tools, toys and other property outside – lock them away safely in your shed.
- * Consider timers on lamps in your home.
- * Have sensor lights installed outside.
- * Remember to activate your alarm if you have one.
- * Lock your doors and windows every time you leave – even if only for a short while and have secure locks installed on them.
- * Lock your front door when you are at the back of the house or in the garden.


The above is not an exhaustive list by any means, but it may just prevent a thief from breaking into your home. Happy holidays - stay safe and enjoy your time away!

22 December, from the NSW Police: This Christmas, it won't be a question of which rural road in NSW police will be on, but when they will be on it.

Operation Safe Arrival, the Christmas/New Year road safety-enforcement operation, starts at 12.01am on Friday 21 December 2018 and concludes at

11.59pm on Tuesday 1 January 2019. Double demerits will be in force throughout the period for speeding, seatbelt, mobile phone and motorcycle helmet offences.

21 December, from NSW Police: The NSW Police Force is warning members of the community about an elaborate scam targeting retirees and other Australians looking to purchase recreational vehicles and vessels, and machinery.

Police from across NSW have received numerous reports in recent weeks relating to the resurfacing of a scam involving illegitimate sellers of motor homes, machinery, and boats. Investigators have been told the scam begins with what appears to be a genuine seller of an item advertising through the classifieds. In many cases, the advertised sale price is below market value. The advertisement will feature a mobile number, which will not be answered, instead responding via text message that they are unable to talk on the phone.

After asking if the buyer is interested in the item, the scammer may direct the conversation to email to conduct price negotiations. Once a price is agreed, the scammer requests a considerable payment (up to 50%) upfront by electronic transfer, then provide instructions to contact a freight company to arrange delivery and make final payment. It is understood that the freight company contact details provided by the scammer defer to another scammer, who takes a final payment before providing a fraudulent tracking number. The goods are never delivered, and the money is not able to be recovered.

Inquiries have revealed the scam also involves identity takeovers, phishing, and mobile phone porting, which further attempt to disguise the identities of those involved. Detectives from the Financial Crimes Squad have commenced an investigation and are urging the public to be vigilant when purchasing items through online or newspaper classifieds.

damage in the Berowra Heights area. We are aware of issues calling **132 500** and Telstra are currently investigating - please keep trying if you need to get through. If water is leaking into your home near electrics we ask that you consider turning off power if it is safe to do so and you are able. If you have sustained roof damage, we ask that you collect together any spare tiles you may have so SES teams are able to use them to make temporary repairs to your roof.

21 December, from NSW Police: Police are appealing for public assistance to locate a woman missing from Newcastle.

Cecilia Devine, who turns 42 today (Friday 21 December 2018), was last seen in Waratah on Wednesday 5 September 2018. Police from Newcastle City Police District were alerted when her family and friends could not locate or contact her. Concerns are held for her welfare.

Cecilia is described as being of Caucasian appearance, about 160cm tall, with a

large build, long blonde hair with undercut sides, and blue eyes. It's believed she may have travelled to Sydney and there was reported sightings of her in the Hornsby and Blue Mountains area shortly after she was last seen.

Anyone who sees Cecilia, or believes they know her whereabouts, is urged to contact police immediately.

It has no affiliation with JB Hi-Fi. We recommend not clicking the link or providing any details or information to the website it may lead you to. Please stay safe and smart especially during the festive season. If in doubt about anything you receive from JB Hi-Fi or "JB Hi-Fi", please ask, we'll certainly help you out.

20 December, from Ku-ring-gai command: Ku-ring-gai Police conducted a “Park Smarter” operation with the view of educating our community to the dangers of having valuables inside your vehicle, clearly visible from outside your vehicle.

In one and a half hours, 91 vehicles parked in the Hornsby Westfield north car park were identified as having valuables clearly visible from outside the vehicle. If one of these flyers was placed under your windscreen wiper, then police identified property of value in your vehicle that was clearly visible from outside your vehicle. Some of the property identified through your windows were: lap tops, dash cams, navigation devices, mobile phones, a number of ladies' hand bags, purses and a wallet, coins in consoles, a briefcase, bags of Christmas shopping, a Hornsby Shire Council Rate notice which clearly showed the name and address of the rate payer, car park entry tickets (easy for a thief to drive your car from the car park). Two vehicles had windows down allowing full access to their vehicles.

Thieves are at work! If they're not after your vehicle, then you can bet they're after any valuables you've left inside. In this local area, thieves are stealing laptops, cash from consoles, mobile phones, sunglasses, CDs, wallets and handbags left in vehicles.

You can reduce the likelihood of becoming a victim of theft by parking smarter. You should always:

- Remove the ignition keys and lock your doors and windows
- Take everything of value from your vehicle each time you leave it
- Avoid parking in dimly lit or isolated areas
- Remove any documents in your vehicle which identify where you live – your home might be the thieves' next target
- Don't hide any spare keys inside or under your vehicle – thieves know just where to look
- Engrave or mark your vehicle's accessories with your licence number.

19 December, from Ku-ring-gai command: Police are urging people to LOCK their vehicles and remove valuables (including GPS and DASH Cam) from out of sight, especially over this Christmas and New Year period.

Over the past week, there has been an increase in theft from motor vehicles within the Ku-ring-gai PAC. Please remove all loose change, wallets, handbags, mobile phones, GPS devices, laptops and anything else of value. Ensure that you lock all windows and doors, even if you are in your driveway. Avoid parking in secluded areas with little or no street lighting at night.



19 December, from Cop Humour Australia: To the 18 year old kid I stopped on the highway,

You're welcome. I'd like to believe that you were minutes away from creating an unspeakable Christmas tragedy when I stopped you. If not only killing yourself, you were well on your way to killing some innocent person who was minding their own business doing nothing else wrong but being in front of you.

You said you didn't realise how fast you were going. That's a lie. You may not realise when you're doing 60 in a 50 but you are fully aware of every kilometre per hour at 160. You realise it with every bump you hit. You realise it as you pass cars so fast the wind moves your car. You realise it every time you drift over the line

and when you move the wheel the car reacts a lot quicker than you're used to. You absolutely realised it.

You were scared when I stopped you. You were visibly shaking and breathing hard. Unfortunately, you were scared one minute too late and for the wrong reason. You should have been scared that you were trying to kill yourself. I know you're invincible. I know that you can't even fathom your own death.

I can tell you dozens of stories of dead and broken 18 year old bodies that I've pulled from cars. Broken bodies that I've found in front yards after crashes. Unrecognisable bodies. They thought they were invincible too. They weren't. They were gone so they missed the part where I had to tell their parents that they were dead. Part of your soul disappears every time you have to tell parents that their kid is dead.

I don't KNOW your parents, but I know them. I know that when you leave every day they say "Be careful. Drive safe." Those aren't just words. That is the very last act of them pleading with you to come home safe. When they get a knock on the door, it's not "Good afternoon ma'am. Your 18 year old son just had a massive heart attack." It's "Can we sit down? Your son has been involved in a very serious crash. I'm so sorry. He's died." When you leave the house they know that, far and away, the best chance you have of dying that day is in that car. Sometimes you're the innocent person hit by someone with no regard for anyone else and sometimes you're the one with no regard for anyone else. Today you were the latter.

You seemed like a really nice kid who made a bad decision. I don't feel bad about this ticket at all. In fact, I'm proud of it. I hope you're paying it off for months and with every payment you think about how it wasn't worth it. I hope you slow down. I hope that when your mum tells you to "drive safe" you make a promise to her, and yourself, that you will. I hope you can envision me sitting in your kitchen telling your screaming mother that you have been killed.

Slow down. Please. You are not invincible. I promise.

HORNSBY Eleven people have been fined or given juvenile warnings following a shoplifting operation at Westfield Hornsby. The police operation was held last Thursday. Most people police spoke to had allegedly stolen items from Coles. The youngest offender was a 15-year-old girl and the oldest a 68-year-old woman. The value of the allegedly stolen goods varied from \$40 to \$138.

NORMANHURST A 25-year-old man has escaped serious injury after having an epileptic seizure while driving on Pennant Hills Rd about 7am on Friday. Police said the driver blacked out and crossed the centre divider before narrowly missing oncoming traffic and crashing his car, about 100m from Osborn Rd. He was taken to hospital by ambulance. Police said he did not suffer any serious injury and no other vehicles were involved in the crash. A police investigation is ongoing into the incident.

TURRAMURRA Thousands of dollars worth of cigarettes have been stolen from Coles Turramurra, marking the second break-in at the supermarket in two weeks.

Police are appealing for witnesses after two unknown offenders drove up to the supermarket about 3am on Monday and smashed a glass door. Police said the duo then stole an unknown amount of cigarettes, thought to be worth thousands of dollars, from a cigarettes kiosk. The supermarket was also hit early on Friday, December 7, by an unknown duo. Police are reviewing CCTV footage and have spoken to a witness. Investigations continue.

COWAN A truck crashed on the M1 about 4km south of the Hawkesbury River in the early hours of Friday morning, causing delays to traffic. Police said the truck veered across two lanes and crashed into a rock wall about 1.15am while heading northbound. The crash scene was not cleared until about 8am.

AN Arcadia teenager was flown to Royal North Shore Hospital in a stable condition after being burnt while setting fire to his HSC notes. The 18-year-old sustained multiple burns to his upper and lower body after torching piles of study notes at a property on Thursday, about 9am. Fire and Rescue confirmed the teen had tried to burn his notes in a metal bin, using a liquid accelerant. NSW Ambulance said his burns were “partial thickness” which is second degree burns, which could have been worse. “He was given advice by 000 to cool his burns in the shower immediately,” a NSW Ambulance spokeswoman said. “It was not the celebration he had intended.” The boy was home alone during the book burning and his mother arrived home to find a CareFlight helicopter and emergency services in her yard. The fire was extinguished by the time a Castle Hill fire crew arrived. While the teen was being treated other emergency services secured the scene.

LINDFIELD A Treatts Rd resident had his wallet stolen from his unit last Thursday. An unknown male knocked on the man's door about 5pm asking him where the communal laundry was. The resident walked the man to the laundry and later discovered his wallet was missing. About 40 minutes later the man received a call from his bank saying that someone had tried to use his credit card in a Gordon shop.

LINDFIELD Between 9.30am and 3.30pm last Thursday offenders smashed a ground-floor window of a home in Chelmsford Ave before entering at least three rooms. Items stolen included cash, a credit card, foreign currency and two empty Orono purses. Several other homes in the area were broken into, with similar items stolen.

[Page 11] A WOMAN who was sexually assaulted when she was 10 by a family friend said she was forced to continue to see the "sick" man after he lied to her parents. Roseville man David Carl Ewen, 51, pleaded guilty last week to aggravated indecent assault of a person under the age of 16 in 2008. He was sentenced to a term of imprisonment of 12 months, with a non-parole period of eight months. In her victim impact statement read out at Ewen's sentencing hearing in the District Court, the woman said: "I was forced to be in his company. I had to be kind and treat him like nothing happened." She said the day after Ewen had touched her genitals at his home she told her mother. When her mother confronted him he denied it. Four days later a counselling session was arranged for the victim, her parents and Ewen. "He persuaded my parents that I made it up, but I always knew his act was purposeful and calculated," she said. The woman said she and her family continued to see him after the assault. "He was a sick man revisiting his victim. How he continued the charade I don't know." The woman has been plagued by nightmares. She fears the assault will continue to affect her.

25 December, from Fire & Rescue NSW BA Hazmat: Beware, there are fake firefighters about.....

FRNSW is aware of some instances where individuals have passed themselves off as 'firefighters' for the purpose of collecting money in return for provision of services, charity or sale of commercial fire safety equipment.

FRNSW firefighters and employees do not collect money while on duty for sale of commercial fire safety items, fire safety services, nor do they sell items such as firefighter calendars on behalf of the agency.

To safeguard the community against fraud, FRNSW remind people to beware of anyone identifying themselves as 'firefighters' while seeking money for commercial fire services, fire related charities or fire safety products.

FRNSW does not produce a calendar for charity, nor does it directly sell – or participate in the making of – charity firefighter calendars for sale to the public.

FRNSW officers do not door-knock with the intent of selling commercial items or services; nor do FRNSW firefighters visit private/commercial properties seeking money for fire service levies, automatic fire alarm charges or any other FRNSW fee-based service.

FRNSW is a committed supporter of the Burns Unit at Westmead Children's Hospital and other notable charities and does collect money through authorised activities.

Firefighters from FRNSW collecting or raising money on behalf of the agency for an approved charity will be uniformed, will state what they are raising money for and, will have name badges clearly visible.

23 December, from NSW SES: Fair Trading warns consumers about storm damage

Commissioner for Fair Trading Rose Webb has today issued a warning that storms which cause significant damage are often followed by scammers who try to take advantage of vulnerable consumers. Ms Webb said there are ways consumers can protect themselves when looking to hire tradespeople or contractors to fix damages caused by severe weather.

"Following the recent destructive storms across NSW, consumers are reminded that anyone who undertakes specialised work to fix damages such as smashed windows, battered roofs or cars is required to have a valid licence or tradesperson certificate," Ms Webb said.

Fair Trading offers an online tool on its website where consumers can verify licence details and check whether a contractor or tradesperson is qualified to do the job. Consumers are urged to do these checks before approving traders to commence work.

From Ku-ring-gai Council: Have you picked up your FREE 2019 Road Safety Calendar from council chambers?

The calendar combines punchy graphics and humour to convey some serious road safety messages. It also aims to remind all road users to take responsibility for their actions on the road. It lifts the lid on impact speed/braking times for wet and dry conditions that will make you sit up and take notice. 
