February 07, from Crime Stoppers: How does Cannabis (Marijuana, weed, hash, pot) affect your driving?

Cannabis slows down your reactions and reduces your ability to respond to situations. The drug changes your perception of distance and time, lowers your concentration, reduces coordination and makes your drowsy. Cannabis users often don't realise their driving is affected until they are faced with an unexpected situation. It is only after they are in danger that they realise they are incapable of

making a quick or correct decision. Cannabis is just one of the drugs that Mobile Drug Testing detects.

February 06, from NSW Road Safety: Road Safety Quiz

True or false, on a multi-lane road with a speed limit of 80km/h, you mustn't stay in the far right-hand lane.



ANSWER: False, on multi-lane roads with a speed limit of 'more than 80km/h',

motorists mustn't drive in the right-hand lane unless they're:

- overtaking
- turning right or making a U-turn
- avoiding an obstacle
- driving in congested traffic
- driving in a special purpose lane or if there's a Left Lane Must Turn Left sign or a left traffic arrow and the driver is not turning left.

If a Keep Left Unless Overtaking sign is displayed, the requirement applies regardless of the speed limit.

11 February, from NSW Police: Scamwatch is warning members of the public about a spate of text messages asking for emergency assistance.

These messages are coming from phone numbers not in your mobile contacts. For example, the text message might read, 'Please call me back right away. It is an Emergency I need your help!' People who have called the number back report being verbally abused by a recording on the other end. This is a new and emerging issue. While people have not yet reported losing money as a result of these calls, you may find the content of the recording distressing. Scamwatch therefore advises that you exercise caution or do not respond to these text messages.

From 'OUR 20 FAVOURITE CRIME PREVENTION TIPS FOR: APARTMENT SECURITY':

- **Tip #1.** Only 'buzz in' those people you know, even if they seem trustworthy. Ensure the door shuts behind you.
- **Tip #2**. Be aware of wi-fi security, and items such as baby monitors. Password protect your wi-fi, router, computer, laptops, mobiles, everything!
- **Tip #3**. Secure your storage cage with a good padlock. Triple hinge the cage, with triple locking points. Have a qualified trades person inspect it and advise how best to improve the security.
- **Tip #4**. Clear your mailbox daily. If you are away, ask a neighbour to assist. Or put a hold on your mail at the Post Office.
- **Tip #5**. Know when important documents/statements are arriving in the post and report immediately if they don't arrive. Arrange for your next credit card to be collected at the branch.

09 February, from the Australian Federal Police: TRIGGER WARNING - Child exploitation [edited]

We need your attention. If your children regularly use popular social media platforms then you cannot afford to miss this. A 25 year-old Melbourne man was today sentenced to a maximum of 12 years in jail for his lead role in encouraging and coercing children and teenagers into committing horrific sexual abuse – against other children.

Let that sink in for one moment. Children sexually abusing other children after being encouraged, and some cases threatened, to do so by this man from the privacy of his bedroom. He convinced minors and some adults to abuse and record these acts and share them with him – for his entertainment. This self-produced child abuse has wrecked the lives of multiple families here and overseas. He required nothing more than a computer and internet access to have free reign to our children.

[Page 3] Missing boy found safe and sound A YOUNG boy who was reported missing from a primary school in Pennant Hills, sparking a police land and air search, has been "accounted for". The boy, aged between five and seven, was reported missing after he was seen leaving the school on Tuesday morning on his own. The dog squad and a police helicopter were called in. A resident of Weemala

Rd said the police helicopter circled several times during the morning and announced a message over a loudspeaker. The boy was later accounted for following "a detailed check" by the school, the Education Department said. "The school will be reminding all students of the rules around leaving the school premises," a spokesman said.

THORNLEIGH A man stole six bottles of red wine worth \$1125 from a Dan Murphy's store last Friday night. The man stole the expensive wine about 7pm from the liquor store on The Comenarra Parkway. It is not known how he stole the wine but police said he is of Caucasian appearance, about 35 years old, skinny, 1.8m tall and was wearing baggy clothing and a cap.

HORNSBY A backpack containing thousands of dollars worth of items was stolen from a vehicle parked at a Westfield Hornsby carpark last Thursday between 7.20pm and 8.30pm. The bag contained a laptop, two pairs of headphones and a watch worth \$2200. A window was left down on the vehicle before the bag was stolen.

BEROWRA Four teenage boys were given a move-on direction by police patrolling Berowra Skate Park, on Berowra Waters Rd, after they found containers with cannabis residue in the youths' possession. Police said the boys were dressed in school uniform about 2pm on Tuesday at the skate park. They asked why they were not in school and the boys produced a timetable showing they had a free period. A plastic bong was seen near the boys.

WAHROONGA A 31-year-old man was given a court notice after driving on a suspended licence. The man was driving a Holden Commodore with Queensland numberplates on the Pacific Highway on Friday about 1.40pm. Police stopped him for a random breath test and, upon running checks, found his licence had been suspended for speeding. His matter will be heard at Hornsby Court on Thursday, February 28.

WAHROONGA A 37-year-old Warrawee man has been charged with midrange drink driving after being stopped on Fox Valley Rd on Saturday about 12.40am. The man, driving a Subaru, was stopped for a random breath test. He was taken to Gordon police station and returned a breath analysis of 0.115. He is due to appear at Hornsby Court on February 28.

WAITARA A man snatched a mobile phone from another passenger's hand

before exiting a train at Waitara station last Wednesday about 10.15am. He stole the phone as the train was pulling into the station. Police described the man as Pacific Islander in appearance, with a beard, aged 20 to 30, large build and about 1.8m tall. He was wearing a New York Yankees cap, maroon singlet and black thongs.

KILLARA About 6.25pm last Friday a man was travelling along Fiddens Wharf Rd in a silver Holden Commodore when he mounted the gutter and hit a sandstone brick fence. Both the car and fence were damaged extensively, police said. The man told police he had consumed one bottle of white wine between 1-5pm at his own residence in Killara. He returned a mid-range reading of 0.127. A 58-year-old man will now face court.

GORDON A 13-year-old boy was threatened with a burning cigarette during an attempted robbery last Friday around 5pm on the Pacific Highway near McDonald's. Police said an older teenager threatened to burn him with a cigarette unless he emptied his pockets and his backpack. The boy ran off and his attacker grabbed the strap of the backpack before letting go. Police are examining CCTV footage.

Search on for hospital thief POLICE received four reports of thefts at Royal North Shore Hospital on Australia Day. A number of handbags and wallets were stolen from staff areas and patient's rooms with some containing credit cards that were later used. One victim's Opal card was also used. One theft was recorded on security camera with the offender described as male with fair hair, thongs and a backpack. A wallet was later recovered.
