21 May, from Eastern Suburbs Police Area Command: CHANGES TO DRINK DRIVING PENALTIES TAKE EFFECT TODAY


From today, penalty notices and immediate suspension can be issued for Novice, Special and Low Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol offences as well as Drive with Illicit Drug in Blood. Penalty notices for \$561 can be issued for first offences, with immediate suspension for all offences. These first time offences would carry a penalty of \$1100 if heard at court. There is no change to the ranges for drink driving (see photo).

This table shows the BAC limits for all licence classes. You must stay below these limits. Licence class BAC Learner (L) zero Provisional (P1, P2) zero Full licence (car or rider) under 0.05 Public passenger vehicle drivers - bus, taxi etc under 0.02 under 0.02 Coach or heavy vehicle (over 13.9 tonnes GVM or GCM) driver under 0.02 Dangerous goods vehicle driver Fully licensed drivers from interstate and overseas under 0.05

Don't let your journey be ruined. Always check the registration of the vehicle you are driving prior to leaving. This can be performed free of charge on the Services New South Wales app and will save you \$673 for unregistered vehicle and \$673 for uninsured. If your trip is on a weekend check it on the Friday so you can rectify the problem before you head off.

If you register your vehicle online make sure you check afterwards on the app to ensure it has processed and your vehicle is registered. Pensioners with zero registration fees need to make sure their vehicle is re registered prior to the expiry date or the process won't work and you have to attend the motor registry to have it processed.

20 May, from NSW Incident Alerts: From midnight tonight, Monday 20th May, anyone caught drink driving on NSW roads will immediately lose their licence.

16 May, from Kuring Gai Police Area Command: DON'T WASTE TIME – REPORT THE CRIME

A reminder to report CRIME at the time or as close to the incident as possible. This gives police the best opportunity to attend in a timely manner, giving police the best chance to catch those who are up to badness.

SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY - REPORT IT QUICKLY

A reminder to report SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY at the time or as close to the suspicious incident as possible, giving police the best chance to at least speak with the suspicious person/s and determine if their intentions are honest or not.

We receive phone calls from well-intentioned members of our community reporting suspicious behaviour, incidents, persons or vehicles in their area. We encourage this. We want this to happen, but we get frustrated when the caller indicates the incident occurred a few hours or even days prior to the call to us.

When asked why they didn't call sooner, the answer often is "I didn't know if it was worth reporting" or "I've spoken to some friends and they suggested I call and report it", or "I didn't want to waste your time".

Well it IS worth reporting and it IS a concern when suspicious behaviour is occurring in your street – WE NEED TO KNOW ABOUT IT, and in a timely manner if possible. If we don't know till well after the fact, our influence in the outcome drastically diminishes.

You are our eyes and ears out there – please tell us quickly or as soon as practicably possible.

PLEASE NEVER APPROACH OR ENGAGE THE SUSPICIOUS PERSON YOURSELF - THAT'S OUR JOB!

About 6:30 am we had one male and one female on our property. They didn't break in, but stole an old computer (that wasn't wanted) that was in an unlocked outside room. They stole a few things from next door. They both look in their late 30's/early 40's. My husband confronted them & they tried to get into a physical fight, however my husband just walked away when the man tried to punch him. They eventually left. I was on the phone to police the whole time but the couple walked away before I heard any sirens. The male was wearing a grey jumper with no hair and the female had died blonde/yellowish hair and was wearing a black jumper. He had one bag on him, she had multiple bags. The police will probably

call me later in the day. We live on Hyacinth Street, Asquith. Saw them walking down Gardenia street before they disappeared.

20 May, from NSW Police: A man has been charged over historic child sexual assaults on Sydney's Northern Beaches

In 2018, a report was made to officers from Northern Beaches Police Area Command alleging the historic sexual assaults. The assaults allegedly occurred at a high school in Brookvale between 1969 and 1976, where the man worked as a teacher. It will be alleged in court that the man assaulted a male student at the school, when the boy was aged between 11 and 17 years. Following investigations, about 10.40am today (Monday 20 May 2019), officers from Northern Beaches Police Area Command attended an aged care facility in Kiama and arrested an 83-year-old man. The man was taken to Lake Illawarra Police Station and charged with two counts of buggery, eight counts of assault male, two counts of act of indecency with male, and one count of commit act of indecency. He was granted strict conditional bail to appear at Downing Centre Local Court on Tuesday 30 July 2019.

18 May, from Australian Federal Police: **TRIGGER WARNING – Child exploitation**

"YOU ARE A CHILD'S WORST NIGHTMARE. YOU ARE EVERY PARENT'S HORROR. YOU ARE A MENACE TO THE COMMUNITY"

It was with these words today that a judge in Adelaide handed down the longest sentence ever imposed for child abuse in this country.

The 31-year-old Adelaide man was sentenced to a maximum of 40 years and three months years jail for sex offences against children in Australia and Thailand. This penalty officially makes him Australia's worst-ever child sex offender.

His victims ranged from babies to young boys, in Australia and overseas, and involve both physical acts, online offending and filming.

In total he was charged with more than 50 state and commonwealth child exploitation offences – including sexual abuse, producing and sharing online child exploitation material, and committing sex offences overseas.

This sentencing marks the close of an international investigation with <u>South Australia Police</u>, working with partners from <u>INTERPOL HQ</u> and Thai authorities, which dealt with some of the most heinous, shocking and depraved acts against children.

The sexual exploitation of children is an international issue, a domestic issue, and an issue in your neighbourhood. We work closely with domestic and international partners to protect children from this heinous sexual abuse. It also requires a collective community commitment to child safety.

There will never be an explanation for the murders of Maria Lutz and her two autistic children Martin and Elisa, who died from carbon monoxide poisoning on Sydney's Northern Beaches.

The deadly gas was released by the man who should have been their protector - 44-year-old husband and father Fernando Mangirue, who also died.

The Sydney father chillingly planned his family's murder - ordering two cylinders of carbon monoxide and having them delivered to a friend's home after his wife told him their marriage was over and he needed to find somewhere else to live. For details, click here.

17 May, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Every week NSW Police attend multiple incidents of children who have been locked in vehicles, both unintentional and intentional.

One of the main reasons a child is unintentionally locked in a vehicle is when parents give their child the car keys to play with. If babies and young children see a button, they will press it – often locking themselves and the keys inside the vehicle.

REMEMBER: Keys are NOT toys. Hang onto your keys yourself.

If a child is locked in a vehicle you should call Triple Zero (000) immediately. On a typical warm Australian day, the temperature inside a locked car can be more than 30 degrees HOTTER than it is outside! A child left in a locked car in those conditions for even a few minutes can very quickly become distressed, dehydrated and can die from organ failure. YOU MUST make a judgement call as to whether it is a life or death situation. You may need to smash a window to get the child out of the vehicle safely.

REMEMBER: a window can be replaced. Your child cannot be.

A TAMWORTH man died and another man was taken to hospital following a crash

between two trucks on the **M1 near Wahroonga** on Monday. Police said initial reports suggested one of the trucks, a B-double, hit the rear of a smaller pantech truck, causing it to flip on its side about 10.40pm. The B-double went through a barrier and crashed about 50m-75m down a ravine into bushland. The vehicles were found hundreds of metres apart. The crash happened about 2km north of the Hornsby exit in the southbound lanes. The driver of the B-double, understood to be a 46-year-old Tamworth man, died at the scene. The driver of the smaller truck, a 39-yearold Riverwood man, was trapped and had to be freed from his vehicle.

Ku-ring-gai police said the truck, which had crashed down the ravine had been recovered by Wednesday morning and traffic was back to normal. Ku-ring-gai police Chief Inspector Francis Gilroy said when emergency services arrived at the crash, they found a man trapped inside the pantech truck and worked to free him. He was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital by ambulance in a stable condition.



THORNLEIGH The teen driver of the car involved in the crash which killed 14-year-old Dylan Langhorne has been charged with negligent driving. The 17-year-old has been charged with dangerous and negligent driving. The crash on The Esplande in Thornleigh, happened during Sydney's wild storms about 9.10am on November 28. It will be alleged the car they were in collided with a Land Rover before hitting two parked cars. The driver, along with the 50-year-old driver of the Land Rover, spent time recovering from the crash in hospital. The teen has been charged with dangerous driving occasioning death and negligent driving occasioning death. He was granted bail and the matter is listed for court on Thursday, June 20.

BROOKLYN A 25-year-old Brooklyn man is due to front court after police allegedly found MDMA and cocaine in his possession near the Brooklyn Baths. Police responded to a call about a group of intoxicated people harassing the public about

9.30am on Saturday. One of the members of the group became aggressive with police and, after a search, the 25-year-old man was found in possession of a small resealable bag with white powder, believed to be cocaine, and a small resealable bag with a substance believed to be MDMA.

MT COLAH A 27-year-old Beecroft man has been charged with drink driving after he was stopped on Northumberland Ave for a random breath test on Sunday about 3.45am. He was taken to Hornsby police station where he allegedly returned a breath analysis of 0.175. He has was charged with high-range drink driving.

From the North Shore Times Thursday 16 May [online edition here]: Parking funds set aside but no space for trailers [edited, page 9]

BOAT trailers left in streets frustrate many Sydneysiders, yet two years after the state government set aside funding to help provide trailer parking, not one council in NSW has applied. In 2016, the roads minister of the time, Duncan Gay, announced measures to crackdown on trailers left in residential streets. Rangers were given the power to impound trailers parked for more than 28 days on the same block, as Sydneysiders complained of parking problems. The government also set aside about \$5 million to help deliver "solutions". Councils and other organisations were invited to apply for funding. However an RMS spokesman said no council had applied.

16 May, from dailytelegraph.com.au: Fast five: Police news across Hornsby [edited]

Hornsby A man in his 60s was allegedly assaulted at Westfield Hornsby after trying to break up a fight in a carpark at the mall. He was walking through the carpark about 5.40pm last Wednesday when he saw two young males being assaulted by a group of other youths. He tried to intervene but the group allegedly turned on him, punching, kicking and scratching him until he fell to the ground. He was also allegedly assaulted on the ground and punched in the side of the face when he returned to his feet. Security attended and contacted police. Police are investigating.

Waitara A man was spotted on CCTV footage jumping over a fence and onto a balcony outside a unit on Waitara Ave last Thursday before rummaging through

property. The incident happened about 3am and nothing was reported stolen. However, the man allegedly also jumped a fence to gain access to another unit nearby and was spotted carrying away multiple bags.

Waitara The rear window of a vehicle parked on Orara St was smashed, causing about \$200 in damage, between Wednesday, May 1 and Thursday, May 9.

15 May, from 9news.com.au: Missing woman's remains found in Blue Mountains dam



Human remains found at a water treatment facility in the Blue Mountains have been identified as missing woman Cecilia Devine. The 42-year-old Newcastle woman had been missing for almost eight months, with police saying they held grave concerns for her welfare at the time of her disappearance. Staff at a water treatment facility in Katoomba found remains in the Upper Cascade Creek dam at 12pm on March 18. After extensive testing, they were identified to be Ms Devine.

She had been reported missing from Waratah on September 5, 2018. Police are now treating the discovery of her remains as a homicide and have launched Strike Force Eking to investigate.
