A man has now been charged after he allegedly kicked a police officer in the face at Hornsby this morning.

About 2.30am (Saturday 19 October 2019), officers from Kuring-Gai Police Area Command became suspicious of the behaviour of a man and woman near the train station and stopped them in Hornsby Mall.

Police will allege when the man was advised he was going to be searched, a scuffle broke out during which the senior constable was kicked in the face.

The 34-year-old officer was taken to Hornsby Hospital where he was treated for a broken nose and facial lacerations. He has since been released.

A 19-year-old Asquith man was arrested at the scene and taken to Hornsby Police Station where he has now been charged with assault police officer in execution of duty cause actual bodily harm and resist officer in execution of duty.

He was refused bail and will appear before Parramatta Local Court today (Saturday 19 October 2019).

Kuring Gai Week in Review

A 25yo female from Bidwill was charged with Larceny x2 this week for offences she committed last month after she was identified on CCTV. She has entered the David Jones store at Hornsby and stolen numerous items of women's and men's clothing before leaving the store failing to pay for any items. She has returned the following day and attempted to steal further clothing only to be disturbed by security.

A 35yo female from East Gosford was caught shoplifting from the Hot Dollar store at Hornsby Westfield this week after she was seen exiting the store with numerous items concealed under her clothing. A further search located items from Coles. She has been given bail with conditions including not to enter Hornsby Westfield and will appear at court next month.

A 29yo male from Merrylands was caught attempting to fill a fraudulent script at a pharmacy in Hornsby Westfield. Police intervened and he was charged with Utter

prescription which includes pro. Drug. He has been given bail which restricts him from going within 200m of Hornsby Westfield.

A 20yo male from Berowra Heights was stopped for an RBT in Berowra earlier in the week. A reading of 0.116 was returned. The males licence was immediately suspended and he was taken to Hornsby Police Station where he was charged with Drive with middle range PCA. He will appear at local court next month.

A 27yo male from Strathfield was charged with numerous traffic offences after he was arrested on another matter. These included driving whilst disqualified on four separate occasions. This was the second time he had been caught driving whilst disqualified. He has been given strict bail and will appear at court next month.


18 October, from youtube.com: Road Rules: Merging




Brush up on your road rule knowledge by viewing the top ten misunderstood road rules animations. The animations outline some of the rules the NSW community

SCAM ALERT! Watch out for a fake email pretending to be from Telstra advising you to claim your '\$500 Citibank Visa prepaid gift card reward' - it's a phishing scam! Check out <u>details here</u>



SCAM ALERT!! This fake Australia Post message will deliver your info to a scammer.

Australia Post is warning the community of widespread scam text messages telling customers there are problems delivering a package, or that a parcel won't be delivered "due to unverified shipping address."

The text messages use AusPost as the sender name (which means it appears in the same text thread as other legitimate AusPost communications) and asks you to click on a link.

The link leads to a fake website with the Australia Post logo, asking you to verify your address and provide a payment. By entering these details, the scammer can steal your personal and financial information.

Delete the message.

As children return to school this week remind them about road safety.

• STOP, LOOK, LISTEN!

Drive and park safely near schools

The beginning and end of the school day are busy times for pedestrians and drivers outside schools.

You can help keep children safe by remembering the following:

- drop off and pick up children on the school side of the road
- never call out to children from across the road it is very dangerous
- always take extra care when driving in 40km school zones
- follow all parking signs these help keep children as safe as possible
- park responsibly even if this means you have to walk further to the school gate
- never double park it is illegal and puts children at risk
- never do a U-turn or three-point turn outside the school as it puts children at risk of harm
- model safe and considerate pedestrian and driver behaviours to your children.

When travelling in a car ensure your children:

- use a booster seat if they are aged between 4 and 7 years old – it's the law
- · are correctly buckled up in their seatbelts
- always get in and out of the car through the 'safety door' – the rear door on the footpath side of the car
- · are never left alone in the car.

KEEPING OUR CHILDREN SAFE... Talk to your children about these simple but important safety tips below:

- ✓ Always walk straight home or to the place you are walking to. Walk near busier roads and streets, or use paths where there are lots of other people.
- ✓ Know where safe places are a shop, service station, police station, library or school. If you are ever frightened, you should go to one of these places and ask them to call the police.

- ✓ Learn about safe adults you can look for and talk to if you need help police
 officers, teachers at school, adults you know and trust.
- ✓ Don't talk to people you don't know and never get into a car with someone you
 don't know. If a car stops on the side of the road and you don't know the person
 inside, do not stop.
- ✓ If someone tries to grab you, yell out, 'Go away, I don't know you'. This lets

 other people know you have been approached by someone you don't know.

Police are appealing for public assistance to locate a man missing from Sydney's Inner West.



Werner Schumacher, aged 79, was last seen at his home on Glen Street, Marrickville, about 11.30am yesterday (Sunday 20 October 2019).

Officers from Inner West Police Area Command were notified and have commenced an investigation.

Family and police hold concern for his welfare due to a medical condition.

Werner is described as being of Caucasian appearance, about 175cm tall, of thin build with grey hair.

He was last seen wearing a blue jumper with a kangaroo emblem on the front, grey pants and black shoes. He is known to frequent the general Marrickville and Newtown areas.

A man is due in court today charged after allegedly kidnapping a woman at Macquarie Park and demanding cash.

Police have been told a 36-year-old woman was leaving a shopping centre carpark on Waterloo Road about 1.30pm yesterday (Friday 18 October 2019), when a man got into the back seat and allegedly threatened her with a knife.

He directed her to drive to Ermington where he allegedly bound her hands with cable ties, before removing the ties and directing her to withdraw cash from a bank.


The woman entered the bank at Ermington about 2.15pm and alerted a staff, who called police.

The man was arrested by officers attached to the Public Order and Riot Squad (PORS), as he tried to drive away in the woman's car.

He was taken to Granville Police Station by officers from Cumberland Police Area Command where he's been charged with take/detain person with intent to obtain advantage, aggravated take motor vehicle with person in it/armed with weapon, and robbery armed with offensive weapon.

The man, from Lindfield, has been bail refused and will appear before Parramatta Local Court today (Saturday 19 October 2019).

Officers from the Metropolitan Crash Investigation Unit are investigating the circumstances following a fatal crash on the Central Coast yesterday.

Shortly after 4pm (Wednesday 16 October 2019), emergency services were called to Woy Woy Road, Woy Woy Bay, after reports two cars collided head-on.

The 52-year-old driver of one vehicle, a Toyota Hiace van, suffered multiple fractures and was airlifted to Royal North Shore Hospital where he remains in a serious condition.

The 51-year-old male driver of the second vehicle, a Holden Barina, suffered fatal injuries.

Thanks to Hornsby Advocate, Thursday 17 October [online edition here] Waste plan to increase recycling [Page 04]

HORNSBY Council wants to increase the amount of waste diverted from landfill by 10 per cent over the next three years through its new Waste Matters Strategy.

Currently, 44 per cent of the 66,000 tonnes of waste produced by the Hornsby Shire each year is sent to recycling and resource recovery centres. The new waste management strategy aims to increase that number to 54 per cent by 2022.

Initiatives outlined by the strategy include banning ewaste (computers etc) from council clean-up services, seeking an expansion to the local Return and Earn network, seeking an annual chemical cleanout service and reducing the use of single-use plastics.

The strategy will be on public exhibition until Friday, November 8.

Street Watch [Page 09]

POLICE are appealing for witnesses to come forward after \$10,000 in smart watches was stolen from the Apple Store at Westfield Hornsby earlier this month.

Released CCTV footage shows three male suspects entering the store at about 1.30pm on Wednesday, October 2, before grabbing 17 watches from the counter and running away.

Despite appearing identical to the real thing, the stolen items were only display models and have limited functionality.

Police believe the incident is linked to the theft of 12 smart watches from a store at a Charlestown shopping centre, near Newcastle, in September.Members of the public are being asked to come forward with any information they have on the incident and have released CCTV images of three males who may be able to assist with their investigation. They are described as being of caucasian appearance and between 15-20 years old. TURRAMURRA

A 16-year-old male from Turramurra has been arrested and cautioned after he ran away from police on to the railway tracks near Turramurra Station. Police were patrolling railway stations along the North Shore line when they observed the teen walking along the rail platform. Upon seeing police, he ran on to the railway tracks and managed to evade them before later being spoken to and arrested and cautioned for entering running lines and breaching his bail conditions.

WAITARA

Police attending the residence of a 45-year-old male in Waitara have stumbled upon a number of growing cannabis plants. A further search of the property revealed more cannabis plants, cash and a large amount of prescription drugs. The man was charged with several offences including cultivate prohibited plant, possess/ supply prohibited drug and resist officer. He will appear at court later this month.

TURRAMURRA

A 15-year-old male from Cherrybrook has been charged with assault and shoplifting after he attempted to steal a phone charger from the IGA at Turramurra Plaza. He is due to face court next month.

16 October, from amca.com.au: How to avoid distractions while driving

We all think we're safe drivers but glancing at your mobile phone for even two seconds while driving at 60 km/h means you will travel for 33 metres blind.

Most people working in the commercial heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) industry have to drive a vehicle as part of the job and often face distractions on the road.

Driving distractions are a leading source of vehicle accidents, whether it's a mobile phone, food, a fellow passenger or billboard.

Inattention behind the wheel has become much more prevalent with the rise of mobile phones, with research showing that using a mobile phone while driving increases the risk of crashing four times.

Mobile phones aside, drivers face a range of dangerous diversions all the time and must keep their eyes on the road to ensure a safe journey.

Here are some key driver distractions and tips for avoiding them.
