NSW Government COVID-19 Response

The following facilities are restricted from opening from midday today:

- Pubs, registered and licenced clubs (excluding bottle shops attached to these venues), and hotels (excluding accommodation)
- Gyms and indoor sporting venues
- Cinemas, entertainment venues, casinos, and night clubs
- Restaurants and cafes are restricted to takeaway and home delivery only
- Religious gatherings, places of worship and funerals (in enclosed spaces and other than very small groups and where the 1 person per 4 square metre rule applies).



23 March, from NSW Police Force: Police are urging the community to remain vigilant and ensure they comply with orders and directions aimed at reducing the spread of COVID-19.

Following the Commonwealth Government's announcement that it is a requirement for all entrants to Australia, including returning travellers, to self-isolate for 14 days, NSW Health and the NSW Police Force are working together to ensure risks to the community are minimised.

The community has been very responsive to public health information and the government's recent direction to self-isolate and the vast majority of people have done the right thing and complied with the Public Health Order.

The Public Health Act 2010 (NSW) provides NSW Police with the power to enforce public health orders. It is an offence for a person to fail to comply with an order.

As part of the NSW Police Force's commitment to the safety of the NSW community, Crime Stoppers now has a reporting option to take information from the public about anyone not complying with Public Health Orders.

A TROUBLING NEW SCAM TARGETING OUR COMMUNITY AND OUR ELDERLY!

THIS OCCURRED IN KU-RING-GAI COMMAND THIS MONTH - MARCH 2020.

THE CRIMINAL'S INTENTION IS: To play on the shock and emotion of the Victim!

METHODOLOGY:

1. The Victim receives a phone call from someone (Criminal), claiming to be from their bank stating that money from the Victim's account had been sent to South Africa and was this her who made the transaction? Victim replies that it is a fraudulent transaction.

VICTIM EMOTION: The victim thinks, oh, that's great service from my bank to contact me like this.

2. The Criminal then tells the Victim that they need to send a bank representative around to the victim's home to collect the compromised card/s and to issue new card/s to the victim and asks the victim for their home address.

VICTIM EMOTION: The victim thinks, how nice of them to do this for me. What professional and quick service.

3. Another criminal attends the home address of the victim, gives her new card/s and collects the compromised card/s along with the PINs.

VICTIM EMOTION: Relief - The Victim believes the matter is over.

In the case that has just been reported to police, over the following week of the incident, the elderly victim has had \$15,000 stolen from her account.

The bank will NEVER send someone around to your home to pick up credit cards and replace them with new ones.

And NEVER give out your address to any person you don't know or trust.

20 March, Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command's - Week in Review:

A 14 year old youth from Wahroonga came to notice this week at Westfield Hornsby where she was observed to shoplift confectionary from a supermarket. She was stopped after exiting the store and searched where an amount of Cannabis was located in her hand bag. She was charged with Shoplifting and Possess prohibited drug. She will appear at court early next month and remains on conditional bail.

A 16 year old male from St Ives has attended a pizza store at Turramurra this week where he has approached the cash register whilst unattended and stole money from the till. He has then run from the location, however, was located a short time later by police in a nearby street. The youth was charged with Larceny and remains on conditional bail until he appears at court next month.

A 19 year old male from Pennant Hills was observed to steal a bottle of bourbon from a liquor shop at Westfield Hornsby on two separate occasions by concealing the bottle down the front of his pants. Unfortunately for him during one of the offences he has dropped his identification on his way out of the store. This allowed police to identify the male and arrest him. He was charged with Shoplifting x 2.

A 37 year old male from Berowra Heights came to police attention after he was seen driving erratically around along the Pacific Hwy, Mount Kuring-gai where his vehicle made numerous contact with both moving and stationary parked vehicles. The male exited his vehicle at a premises in Berowra Heights where police attended to the male who appeared under the influence of alcohol. Further checks revealed he had been stopped by police earlier that day for a RBT where he returned a positive reading of 0.153. Due to the high range reading, his licence was suspended on the spot and a Notice of Suspension issued to him. Unbeknown

to police, the male continued to drive and as a consequence was caught and charged with 8 further offences including Negligent driving x3, Drive vehicle under the influence of alcohol and Drive motor vehicle whilst licence suspended. He was given conditional bail which prohibits him from driving or occupying the drivers seat of any vehicle and will face court in May.

A 45 year old female from Normanhurst has attended Thornleigh Marketplace shopping centre where she has entered a liquor shop and stolen a bottle of wine despite being banned from the location. The female was later located at Turramurra RWS in an intoxicated state where a search located three further bottles of wine suspected to have been stolen from a supermarket also at Thornleigh Marketplace. A Criminal Infringement Notice will be issued to the female with a second one pending the identification of the source of the three bottles of wine.

20 March, from Kuring Gai Police Area Command

It has come to our attention this morning that some of our elderly folk have misunderstood that the early bird shopping is designed for the elderly and vulnerable exclusively, to give them the best chance to purchase the basics that some of the community vultures have been ravishing of late.

With all the talk of self-isolation, limiting numbers of people gathered in one place at a time and banning people from attending many events, some have become confused and thought that the only time they could shop was between 7 and 8 in the mornings and that they were not permitted to shop at any other time.

As you know, this is not the case. Please, if you have an elderly neighbour, just check in on them and ensure they are doing ok. Make sure they are not missing out due to a simple misunderstanding.



BE VIGILANT – THERE ARE THOSE OUT THERE WHO WANT TO STEAL WHAT YOU HAVE WORKED HARD FOR!

We are continuing to experience a number of break and enters throughout the command so please be vigilant.

Some of the suburbs targeted recently have been Wahroonga, Warrawee, Pymble, Killara, St Ives, Turramurra, Westleigh.

The break and enters have occurred during both daylight and night time hours.

Some DO's and DON'Ts:

DO ensure your windows and door are securely locked and secured.

DO ensure you lock your vehicles even when parking in your own garage.

DO ensure your letterbox is cleared regularly

DO report any suspicious persons and or activity

Whilst there is no guarantee someone will not be able to get into your home, the harder you make it the more likely the criminal will move on to a more accessible property.

DON'T keep large amounts of cash at home.

DON'T leave your car unlocked at the shopping centre and at home

DON'T leave valuables in the open for all to see when they look through your windows.

DON'T WASTE TIME – REPORT THE CRIME. SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY – REPORT IT QUICKLY.

Street Watch [page 07]

HORNSBY

Two bushwalkers got lost in the Berowra Valley National Park at Hornsby near Benowie walking track on March 8. About 2pm a bushwalker and her friend entered the park and walked about 3km along the Benowie track until they reached the summit of a hill. When the track split around a boulder they chose the wrong direction and became lost. The bushwalkers had not taken any water and were becoming dehydrated. About 3.30pm they called for police assistance. Police accessed the walking track via the Quarry trail and the bushwalkers were located with the assistance of Polair.

HORNSBY

Between 4pm and 5pm on March 10 police attended a radio call that reported a brawl occurring between one male and up to 40 others at Hornsby Westfield. Police were waved down by a member of the public who indicated a group of youths had just run out of the centre and started walking towards Hornsby train station. A group of five teenage boys was located. After speaking with the youths, police attended Hornsby Westfield security office and viewed CCTV of the incident. Police observed up to 20 youths involved in the brawl and are investigating, with cautions set to be issued to those involved.

WAHROONGA

Police are reminding people to lock their vehicles after a number of items were stolen from a car on King Rd between 7pm on March 6 and 3am on March 7. The Ford station wagon was parked and left unlocked, with cash, keys, a phone charger and memory stick stolen. The items were worth a total of \$45.

WAHROONGA

An incident of malicious damage was reported to police on Cleveland St. It happened between 11am and 4.30pm on March 5. An offender caused damage to

a Mazda 3 by cutting holes in three tyres, costing the owner \$450.

NORMANHURST

An offender cut through a chain wire fence at a retirement village on Jasmine Rd and reversed a car on to the site to load two 230 single core copper cables. The incident took place at 1pm on March 3, with \$6000 of property stolen. Police are investigating.



The public may report breaches of the Public Health (COVID-19 Quarantine) Order to Crime Stoppers.

The Order directs that a person who arrives in NSW and who has been in another country within 14 days before arrival, must isolate themselves for a quarantine period of 14 days.

NSW is supporting the Commonwealth Government in implementing measures to contain the spread of COVID-19 in Australia. This includes requiring self-isolation by all entrants to NSW, including returning travellers, international visitors and confirmed COVID-19 cases and 'close contacts' of confirmed COVID-19 cases.

A man who allegedly sexually touched a 12-year-old girl on a train last month on Sydney's North Shore has been charged by police.

The girl boarded a city-bound train at Asquith Railway Station just after 2.30pm on February 25.

A 21-year-old man boarded the same train, sitting directly opposite the girl who then moved into another carriage.

19 March: Australian Federal Police

The importation of firearm parts and dangerous weapons is a serious offence, because these weapons pose a real threat to the community. The AFP is committed to keeping the community safe, and will continue to work closely with our law enforcement partners to disrupt the importation of illegal firearms or parts, and lay criminal charges where appropriate.

As a result of further forensic examination, 37 more charges have been brought against a 44-year-old Berowra man who faced court in August last year after allegedly importing firearm parts. These new charges mean the man will now face 40 charges related to his alleged actions.

19 March, from NSW Police Force



Detectives have charged four men allegedly involved in a drug supply syndicate on Sydney's North Shore.

In January 2020, Strike Force Tongaboo was established to investigate the supply of heroin in the area.

At 6:50am yesterday (Wednesday 18 March), officers from North Shore Police Area Command and South West Metropolitan Region executed search warrants at three units on Barton Road, Artarmon, and another on Helen Street, Lane Cove. About the same time, they arrested a 58-year-old man, who was walking along Hampton Road, Artarmon.

He was taken to Chatswood Police Station, where he was charged with four counts of supply prohibited drugs on an ongoing basis and deal with property proceeds of crime.

The man was refused bail and is due to appear in Hornsby Local Court today (Thursday 19 March 2020).

During the search of a unit on Barton Road, Artarmon, detectives arrested a 63-year-old man, before taking him to Chatswood Police Station, where he was charged with drug supply.

He was granted conditional bail and is due to appear in Hornsby Local Court on Wednesday 8 April 2020.

A 56-year-old man was also arrested, during the search on Helen Street, Lane Cove, and taken to Chatswood Police Station, where he was charged with supply prohibited drugs on an ongoing basis.

He was refused bail and is due to appear at Hornsby Local Court today (Thursday 19 March 2020).

The total number of people charged under Strike Force Tongaboo now stands at four, after a 50-year-old man was found in possession of heroin in Burwood earlier this month (Sunday 8 March 2020).

He was charged with supply prohibited drug and was refused bail, to appear in Burwood Local Court on Wednesday 1 April 2020.
