Call the police if you see or hear domestic violence – that's the clear message from the NSW Government, Crime Stoppers and the NSW Police as a new joint TV advertising campaign begins on commercial networks.

Attorney General and Minister for the Prevention of Domestic Violence Mark Speakman said the six-week campaign comes after five women were killed in domestic violence murders across NSW in the last eight weeks.

"The brutal killings of these innocent women are just another tragic reminder of this terrible scourge – the latest victim was only 18 years old," Mr Speakman said.

"I'm calling on the community to be a lifeline for these victims. When you know there's an emergency happening next door which requires an urgent police response, don't hesitate.

"Your phone call could be the difference between that woman living and that woman dying."

Minister for Police and Emergency Services David Elliott said the dedicated men and women in blue need the community to be their eyes and ears across our neighbourhoods.

"Police do an incredible job responding to emergencies 24/7, and domestic violence call-outs can be some of the most violent and volatile scenes they confront," Mr Elliott said.

"But they can't respond if they don't know what's happening. That's why we've joined Crime Stoppers and police to ensure domestic violence is reported so police can attend, arrest perpetrators and ultimately save lives."

Crime Stoppers CEO Peter Price AM said home should be the safest place on the planet, offering solace to families – but sadly for some, it can instead become a living nightmare.

"Our mandate is for a safer NSW, which is why we continue to deploy our resources in the best way possible to make it safer for all, irrespective of age, race, or religion," Mr Price said.

"Crime Stoppers promotes 'good neighbourly behaviour', so please look after your neighbour because you never know when they might be picking up the phone to help you one day."

NSW Police Domestic Violence Corporate Spokesperson, Assistant Commissioner Mark Jones, said police respond to thousands of domestic violence incidents each year.

"Officers are responding proactively to domestic violence more than ever, with Domestic Violence Liaison Officers in every command and High Risk Offender Teams in every region holding perpetrators to account and protecting victims," Assistant Commissioner Jones said.

"But we need the public's help. If you know that someone is in immediate danger, if their life is being threatened, then pick up the phone immediately and report to police.

For incidents occurring now, ALWAYS call Triple Zero (000).

If you have knowledge about a Domestic Violence situation call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 (24/7). You can remain confidential.

24 June, from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command - NSW Police Force





29 June, from Forbes.com: Warning—Apple Suddenly Catches TikTok Secretly Spying On Millions Of iPhone Users



As I reported on June 23, Apple has fixed a serious problem in iOS 14, due in the fall, where apps can secretly access the clipboard on users' devices. Once the new OS is released, users will be warned whenever an app reads the last thing copied to the clipboard. As I warned earlier this year, this is more than a theoretical risk for users, with countless apps already caught abusing their privacy in this way.

Worryingly, one of the apps caught snooping by security researchers Talal Haj Bakry and Tommy Mysk was China's TikTok. Given other security concerns raised about the app, as well as broader worries given its Chinese origins, this became a headline issue. At the time, TikTok owner Bytedance told me the problem related to the use of an outdated Google advertising SDK that was being replaced. Read more here.

29 June, from Hills to Hawkesbury Community News

A teenager remains in hospital and an investigation is underway following a stabbing in Castle Hill yesterday.

Emergency services were called to outside Castle Hill Metro Station on Old Northern Road, about 8.15pm (Sunday 28 June 2020), after reports of an assault.

A 16-year-old boy was treated at the scene by NSW Ambulance paramedics for a stab wound, before being taken to The Children's Hospital at Westmead in a stable condition.

Police have been told the teenager was in the vicinity of the station with a group of males, when a verbal altercation occurred between the teen and another unknown male, before the boy was stabbed, and the male fled the scene.

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command attended and commenced an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the incident.

No arrests have been made and inquiries continue.

The internet has opened a world of possibilities. It allows us to connect, work, play, shop and even manage our finances wherever and whenever we want. But as fun as it is to engage online, it also comes with risks.

In this day and age, cybercriminals are quite savvy in their attempts to lure you into clicking on a dodgy link or attachment. In fact, around one in three Australian's are affected by cybercrime.

To help decrease the staggering number of cyber-attacks the Australian Cyber Security Centre (ACSC) introduced ReportCyber on July 1 of last year. The network helps Australians and small to medium enterprises by enabling them to report cyber issues and cybercrime.


The Cybercrime in Australia report revealed within the first three months of ReportCyber operating they received 13,672 reports – that's an average of 148 cybercrime reports per day.

It seems falling victim to cybercrime is more common than we might think. It's best to stay vigilant online and be aware of the dangers – scams, spam, viruses, phishers, identity theft, fraud, cyberstalking, catfishing and hackers are just a few. So, how can you reduce your risk of falling victim to online crimes?

Navigate cyberspace securely by making simple actions to safeguard yourself from online threats – and know how to handle them if they do happen to you.

Winter is a time where home fires become even more of a risk. There are some

simple steps you can follow to reduce your risk of a fire in your home.

- Never leave cooking unattended
- ▶ If you have a fireplace make sure the chimney is clean and make sure there is a screen in front of it when it is in use
- Check electric blankets for damaged or frayed cords before placing it on the bed
- ▶ Take care keeping curtains, tablecloths and bedding away from portable heaters
- Keep wet clothing at least 1 metre away from heaters or fireplaces
- Clean the lint filter to your clothes dryer every time you use it
- Only use one appliance per power point and switch off power point when not in use
- ▶ Always extinguish candles or any other open flames before going to bed. Never leave open flames unattended and always handle candles or any other open flame with care
- Store matches and lighters in a secure place not accessible to young children.
- ▶ Remember that smoke from a fire will make you confused and that you cannot see in smoke
- ♦ When asleep you will not smell smoke and it will in fact put you into a deeper sleep.
- ▶ If you have escaped from a home fire, remember once you get out, stay out and call Triple Zero (000).
- ♦ Oil, gas or wood heating units may require a yearly maintenance check

♦ Only ever use fuses of recommended rating and install an electrical safety switch.

24 June, from abc.net.au: Sydney dentist Preethi Reddy was murdered in hotel room before being stuffed in suitcase, coroner finds Sydney dentist Preethi Reddy was murdered by her ex-boyfriend in the bathroom of a city hotel before he attempted to conceal the "heinous act", a NSW coroner has found.



The 32-year-old's family reported her missing after she failed to return from a dental conference in St Leonards in March last year.

Two days later, a suitcase containing her body was found inside a car in Sydney's east.

On Wednesday, deputy state coroner Carmel Forbes found Dr Reddy died from the combined effects of blunt force head injuries and stab wounds to the neck and back, inflicted by her ex-boyfriend Harsh Narde.

Narde, also a dentist, had spent time with Dr Reddy at the conference before later having dinner with her.

Magistrate Forbes said there was evidence Dr Reddy was trying to be "compassionate and understanding" in attempting to give him closure on their ended relationship.
