01 July, via Parramatta command: TIPS!!!

Call '000' – Ask for Police. What do Police need to know?

The operator will ask a number of questions. Ensure you give concise details or answers to the best of your ability to the following:

- Location or address.
- Type of premises, eg house, unit and on which level.
- What is actually happening now?
- Your knowledge of any firearms in the premises or produced by any person.
- The whereabouts of the offender, ie. Are they still at the location?
- Number of children present and their whereabouts.
- Has alcohol or drugs been consumed?
- Does any person have a medical or psychiatric history?
- Is there an Enforceable AVO in place?
- Relationship of the persons, if known.

All information provided is extremely important to the safety of the victims and police, alike. Incidents of family and domestic violence represent the most dangerous of all incidents attended by police.

01 July, from ACT Policing: ** Would you know what to do if lights and sirens are approaching? ******

DON'T PANIC!

If an emergency vehicle is approaching and is sounding an alarm or showing flashing lights, you must move out of the path of the emergency vehicle as soon as you can do so safely.

Here's some tips:

- Again, do not panic.
- Slow down, but do not brake rapidly.
- Use your indicators.
- Be aware of other motorists.
- Do not move suddenly or move into the path of the emergency vehicle.
- Move as far to the left of the road as you can and come to a stop.
- If you cannot move left safely, stay where you are and let the emergency vehicle drive around you.

Your mobile will use any available network to connect to Triple Zero, even if you can't get coverage on your normal service.

**FACT #2**

If you're outside network coverage areas, you need a mobile satellite phone to call Triple Zero—your normal mobile can't connect to a satellite.

**FACT #3**

You don't need credit on your mobile to call Triple Zero—it's always free.

**FACT #4**

When you call Triple Zero on your mobile, it won't automatically give your exact location—smartphone users can get the Emergency+ app, which gives GPS coordinates.

While your phone may be smart, know the facts before you call.

READER'S QUESTIONS (Keep them coming!): Is it legal to leave your towbar

('ball mount') on your vehicle when not towing?

We had a look and found nothing that says you can't. The only rule that may require you to remove it is this one:

- Rear number plates and lights must not be obscured by the towbar when there is no trailer connected.

Medicine wholesaler Symbion recalls three types of children's medicine due to choking hazard

- Pharmacy Choice medicine with batch numbers IA45162, IA50044 and IA50026 have been recalled, with expiry dates of May and June 2017.
- Chemmart medicine has the same expiry period with batch numbers IA45163 and IA50030.
- The 200ml Chemmart concentrated children's paracetamol for children aged 6–12 should also be returned if it has an expiry date of October 2016.

The company said although there was nothing wrong with the medicine itself, bottle grooves could break off when people opened the bottles, creating a choking hazard for small children.

OUR 20 FAVOURITE TIPS FOR APARTMENT SECURITY

1. Only 'buzz in' those people you know, even if they seem trustworthy. Ensure the door shuts behind you.
2. Be aware of wi-fi security, and items such as baby monitors. Password protect your wi-fi, router, computer, laptops, mobiles, everything!
3. Secure your storage cage with a good padlock. Triple hinge the cage, with triple locking points. Have a qualified trades person inspect it and advise how best to improve the security.
4. Clear your mailbox daily. If you are away, ask a neighbour to assist. Or put a hold on your mail at the Post Office.
5. Know when important documents/statements are arriving in the post and report immediately if they don't arrive. Arrange for your next credit card to be collected at the branch.
6. Don't give out spare sets of keys. Never give out copies of your building or apartment keys to tradespeople or friends.
7. Consider re-locating expensive items from your storage cage to inside your apartment. eg high-end bikes, surfboards, expensive accessories, alcohol.
8. Ask your Body Corporate to request a Security Audit of all the building (including storage cages) from your Crime Prevention Officer.
9. Reduce the chances of 'tailgating' by waiting until the doors/gates to your carpark close completely after you, before moving further within.
10. Know your neighbours - who should be there, who should not? If in doubt, double-check with others in the building. Challenge those you are suspicious of, or contact **Hornsby Police Station: 9476 9799**.

OUR 20 FAVOURITE CRIME PREVENTION TIPS FOR APARTMENT SECURITY

11. Do try the audit tool that is available from the Police website http://www.police.nsw.gov.au/community_issues/crime_prevention/residential. Select <Home & Unit Security Assessment> for the publication: "**Residential House & Unit Complex Assessment - for Police, Homeowners, Renters, Body Corporates & Developers**".
12. Don't tell burglars you live alone. Leave an answering machine greeting that says "We can't come to the phone right now..." even if you live alone. When someone is at the door, call out loudly to your imaginary room-mate that you will answer it.
13. Don't be complacent because you don't live on the ground floor. Secure balcony doors & windows. Break & Enters happen at 1st & 2nd floor units.
14. Don't list your first name on the apartment directory, or name plate. Offenders may target residents they see as being more vulnerable, eg women living alone.
15. When moving in, consider installing new locks. You don't know if the unit has been burgled before. For extra security it's a good idea to get locks changed and re-keyed. This includes the mailbox.
16. Request your Body Corporate pursue Crime Prevention initiatives, eg: **Rapid Removal** graffiti policy, monitored CCTV, landscaping to reduce the opportunity for crime, secure fences & gates, security lighting.
17. Do not leave your car park remote control or any valuables on view in your vehicle, even if it is in the secure parking area.
18. Consider replacing the main door lock(s) with high-quality deadlocks.
19. Fire exits are a risk. Never leave fire exit doors propped open.
20. Natural ladders are a risk. Don't provide easy access to upper level balconies, eg wheelie bins, lattice, trees, nearby fences.

A REGULAR READER'S QUESTION: What can I do if a neighbour's alarm keeps sounding? Answer taken from the Environmental Protection Agency website, [click here](#).

Contact the police to find out if theft is the cause of the sounding alarm. Phone either 131 444 or the number of your local police station. Police officers are not

allowed to enter unoccupied premises to stop faulty alarms sounding or enter vehicles to disable car alarms, but they can accompany council officers who are authorised to fulfil this function. Council officers require a warrant to enter an unattended residential building to deal with a faulty alarm.

Police and council officers can issue penalty notices for alarms that sound longer than the period specified in the Regulation. Council officers may also issue notices that require a faulty alarm to be repaired or replaced.

You may wish to check with your local police and council about any established response procedure they have to address the prolonged sounding of alarms.

Penalties

The council or police may issue penalty notices for continuously or intermittently sounding vehicle or building alarms. Penalties for individuals are:

- \$200 if the alarm sounds for up to 4 hours
- \$400 if it sounds for between 4 and 8 hours
- \$600 if it sounds for longer than 8 hours.

These penalties are doubled for corporations.

The time periods before a penalty is incurred have been shortened considerably in the Regulation because of the impact this noise causes.

The council may issue a prevention notice for a faulty alarm, requiring the owner to repair or replace it. Where a prevention notice is breached, the council may issue a penalty notice of \$750 to an individual or \$1500 to a corporation.

Volunteers gather to give boot to graffiti

A RAFT of community groups will band together to fight graffiti in Hornsby. Volunteers from Rotary clubs, Rotary Down Under Scouts, Girl Guides, men's sheds, sporting clubs and the NSW Police will come together with the council and the State Government on **annual Graffiti Removal Day, October 18**.

But the community is being urged to do something about the vandalism now, by reporting any graffiti online. Once graffiti is reported, a Rotarian local government co-ordinator will assess the site to determine whether it can be removed or not. Hornsby co-ordinator Evan Burrell, who won a state award for outstanding achievement in coordinating and repainting Waitara Scout Hall, said Graffiti Removal Day was a huge success last year and he hoped this year would be the same. "Graffiti Removal Day provides a great opportunity to highlight the problem of graffiti vandalism and encourage people to get involved in the removal and prevention of graffiti," Mr Burrell said. Hornsby state Liberal MP Matt Kean said Mr Burrell's efforts won him plenty of praise from the community. "Evan has led the way in cleaning up unsightly graffiti around our shire," he said. "I applaud Evan and his Rotary team for their efforts in removing graffiti tags and markings, which costs the community about \$100 million per annum."

Last year's Graffiti Removal Day was a hit across the state with 1500 volunteers removing 23,000sq m of graffiti from more than 300 sites. People who would like to attend this year or to report a site online, [click here](#), phone **1300 665 310** or like **Graffiti Removal Day** on Facebook.

Sex offender law

Tough new laws will see child-sex offenders face life in jail. Ku-ring-gai state Liberal MP Alister Henskens said the government had kept its commitment to increase the maximum sentence for sexual intercourse with a child under 10 years old from 25 years to life. Mr Henskens said the laws would bring sentences into line with community expectations to help protect child victims and ensured offenders were brought to justice.
