16 July, from Crime Stoppers: Parental Abduction...

Parental abduction is a term which refers to when one parent takes, detains or conceals a child from the other parent. If your child has been taken by another parent or family member you should consult a legal practitioner for advice. In some cases, children who are the subject of custody orders by the Family Court of Australia or the Federal Circuit Court of Australia are taken by a single parent in contravention to the custody ruling. In these circumstances the children may become subject to a recovery order to return the children to the parent or guardian who holds legal custody.

A recovery order is an order of the Court that can require a child be returned to a:

- parent of the child
- person who has a parenting order that states the child lives with, spends time with or communicates with that person, or
- person who has parental responsibility for the child.

A recovery order can authorise or direct a person or persons, such as police officers, to take appropriate action to find, recover and deliver a child to one of the people listed above. If a child is parentally abducted out of Australia, recovery of the child becomes subject to International Laws surrounding child abduction.

15 July: Police investigating the discovery of a woman's body in Hornsby over the weekend, have identified the woman and deemed her death to be non-suspicious.


About 2.30pm on Saturday (11 July 2015), emergency services were called to bushland off Rosemead Road after a member of the public found the body on a fire trail. The body was located approximately 800metres from the road. Officers from Kuring-Gai Local Area Command established a crime scene which was examined by specialist forensic officers. Following investigations, which included a line search of the area where the body was found, police believe that the circumstances surrounding the woman's death are not suspicious. The woman has been identified as a 50-year-old woman from the Liverpool area. Investigations are continuing and a report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

The correct answer is A. If you have stopped at a children's crossing displaying orange flags, you must remain stopped until all pedestrians and cyclists have left the crossing and no one is about to enter the crossing.

15 July, from NSW Maritime [edited]: With another cold snap due to come through tomorrow, it is a timely reminder to always tell someone where you are going and when you are likely to be back before you head off on a boating trip, and to ensure you are prepared for the possibility of ending up in the water...

- All boaters should prepare for the possibility of suffering hypothermia while out on the water, which can result from immersion or from being in damp or wet clothes and being exposed to wind chill.
- Clothing needs to maintain body heat when wet, such as woollen or thermal fabrics and add a lifejacket for an extra layer and further warmth and added insurance in case of capsize.
- All people on open or alpine waters must wear a lifejacket in boats smaller than 4.8 metres.
- If you become hypothermic and are not wearing a lifejacket, there is a high risk you may lose consciousness and drown.
- Obvious signs of hyperthermia are intense shivering, slurred speech, confusion, slowing pulse and dilated eye pupils.
- All boaters should tell a friend or family member where they are intending to go boating and when they expect to be back, or log their trip with Marine Rescue NSW.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 16 July:

PROTECT AGAINST OPPORTUNISTIC CRIMS

Crime prevention can be an involved process using intelligence, strategic policing and attention to environmental factors. It can also be very simple — just lock up. Your police continue to investigate thefts that occur on unlocked targets. These include unlocked windows and doors in houses, unlocked garages at houses and units and unlocked cars. Criminals are often opportunists. They know they want to steal something, and they know if they look hard enough they will find unlocked premises or cars, which makes it easy to steal from and also does not attract the attention that breaking a window or door will do. - Detective Inspector Jon Gross Kuring-gai Local Area Command

HORNSBY A briefcase was stolen from a standalone kiosk at Hornsby Westfield Shopping Centre about 5pm on Friday, July 10. A man put a briefcase down on the

ground while he was closing down his business. When he returned to where he put down the briefcase, which contained cheques, it was gone. Police will check CCTV cameras in the centre.

HORNSBY A 29-year-old man has been captured on CCTV cameras reaching over the counter at a cafe in Hornsby Westfield, about 5.45pm on Friday, July 10. The man reached over the counter and stole a white bag which contained the day's takings, of around \$2,500.

HORNSBY Police issued a 29-year-old male cyclist with an infringement notice, after he collided with a car at about 11pm on Friday, July 10. The cyclist was about to turn from Burdett St into Palmerston Rd on his bike when a female driving a Toyota Camry knocked him to the ground. The rider was taken to Hornsby Hospital with cuts and bruises. 5 BEROWRA HEIGHTS Police are waiting on results of a blood test to see if alcohol was a factor after an accident on Monday, July 13. At about 4pm, a 41-year-old male driver of a Toyota Hilux was travelling past a slight bend on Woodcourt Rd when he collided with a telegraph pole. The pole snapped in half and caused powerlines to land across the road. The driver was unable to free himself from his vehicle and was cut free by emergency services. He had no feeling in his legs and was flown by helicopter to Royal North Shore Hospital.

BEROWRA Two female bushwalkers, aged 27 and 34, were rescued on Friday, July 10. The students started their walk on the Benowie Track at about 11am. One of the females sprained her ankle and had difficulty walking. The two women saw some houses in the distance and started heading towards them. Police say the women deviated away from the walking track and became unfamiliar with the area. At 4pm, due to fading light and being in difficult terrain, the women dialled triple-0. Police entered the area from a nearby track, while an ambulance rescue crew attended as well as the police chopper. The police chopper guided the ambulance crews to the location of the bushwalkers, who had lit a fire for warmth. They left the bush at 10.50pm and were taken to Hornsby Hospital after suffering exposure and exhaustion, while the woman's sprained ankle was also treated.

MOUNT KURING-GAI A four-tonne excavator valued at around \$30,000 was

stolen from outside a property on Beaumont St on Tuesday, July 7. The excavator was last seen on Monday, July 6, at 6am on Beaumont Rd. Police believe the excavator was stolen between 7-10.30am. A satellite tracking device on the vehicle shows it was moved a short distance at about 8.30am but no further information was available after that time. Police believe the tracking device was disabled, and likely the excavator was moved on to a flat bed truck or trailer.

HORNSBY A female attended Hornsby Police Station at 8am, Thursday, July 9, and handed in a small plastic bag of drugs. Police say the woman believed there was drug dealing going on in some nearby units in Linda St, Hornsby. The woman found the zip-lock bag, containing about 1.3 grams of cannabis, in a rubbish bin. Police say there are no suspects at this stage and the drugs will be destroyed.

Get to know the cops protecting you over coffee A MEET-and-greet has been set up between the community and Ku-ringgai police. The event, called Coffee with a Cop, will give people a chance to come together in an informal space to discuss community issues and build relationships. Coffee with a Cop provides a unique opportunity for the community to ask questions and learn more about the police work in the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai area. "We hope that community members will feel comfortable to ask questions, bring concerns, or simply get to know our officers," Police Superintendant David Jones said. "These interactions are the foundation of community partnerships," he said. Coffee with a Cop originated in the US and is supported by NSW Police.

The event will be on July 22, at Berowra's Darcie's Cafe in the Turner Rd Shopping complex, from noon.
