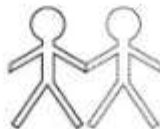

Of note was a spate of activity in St Ives last Friday night on Stanley St and Newhaven Place, targeting theft from storage cages and cars.

Paul had brought along one of the six engravers that had been delivered today, kindly donated to the command by Gordon NHW group. The engravers will be available to borrow by anyone wishing to mark their valuables with their Drivers Licence number. This not only identifies your property for possible return, but can also tie an offender to a break & enter address for any subsequent criminal case.

A Turramurra NHW group spokesperson said they were very appreciative of Paul's useful information and advice.

31 March, from our neighbouring North Shore command: Police have seized \$1.4 million worth of cannabis during a search warrant at Artarmon.

About 11.30am yesterday (Sunday 30 March 2014), police from North Shore Local Area Command executed a search warrant at a warehouse at Whiting Street, Artarmon. During the search police located 386 cannabis plants with an estimated potential street value of \$1.4 million. At this stage no-one has been arrested; however, investigations are continuing.

29 March: The driver of an over sized truck in Galston Gorge was issued with a \$2092 infringement notice today.

About 4pm (Friday 28 March 2014), police from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command and Road and Maritime Service Officers detected an over-size truck. The truck was stopped on the Hornsby Heights side of the gorge, where the driver, a 41-year-old man was spoken too. He allegedly stated that he had not driven through the gorge before. The truck was measured at 9.8 metres long the

maximum length for trucks or car and trailer combinations is 7.5 metres. The man was issued an infringement notice for \$2092, which carries six demerit points.

Acting Assistant Commissioner Stuart Smith from the state's Traffic and Highway Patrol Command, said, "Despite significant signage warning truck drivers, measuring bays either at side of the gorge and camera systems, there are still those drivers that take the risk. Such selfish behaviour by drivers can cause significant delays to other road users who rely on the Galston Gorge on a daily basis to get to and from work, or school. It is not uncommon for some trucks and trailers that get stuck to have to be removed by a crane, which can shut down both sides of the Gorge for many hours. Highway Patrol and Roads and Maritime Service Inspectors patrol the Gorge on a daily basis to prevent this sort of activity occurring. Whilst a GPS may suggest truck drivers use the Gorge as a short cut, it can cost them a significant penalty and demerit points," Mr Smith said.



27 March: Fatal crash - Arcadia Thursday, 27 March 2014 07:03:22 PM

Police remain on the scene of a serious crash at Arcadia, where a woman has died and a man has been airlifted to hospital. About 5.15pm (Thursday 27 March 2014), a silver Holden utility and a white hatchback collided head-on on Wylids Road, Arcadia. A man believed to be aged 50-60, who was the sole occupant of the ute, has been airlifted to Westmead Hospital in a stable condition. A 65-year-old woman, who was the sole occupant of the hatchback, died at the scene. Police from Northern Metropolitan Crash Investigation Unit will investigate the circumstances surrounding the incident and prepare a report for the information of the Coroner.

27 March: Hornsby police are investigating a shop stealing incident that

occurred at the IGA supermarket in Turramurra. About 3.10pm on Friday the 21st a male has entered the store and placed a large number of vitamins into a bag and then allegedly left the store without paying for them. There were about \$100 worth of vitamins taken. Hornsby police are seeking information about the incident and believe the male depicted may be able to assist with inquiries. If you have any information or can identify the male please call police on the following numbers.

25 March: Stolen Yamaha WR450 and Suzuki DRZ400 North Turramurra

The 2 motor bikes were stolen from North Turramurra between 12 midnight and 12.45am Tuesday 18th March. A garage was broken into via an internal door and the the 2 bikes a Yamaha WR450 (2009 model) and a Suzuki DRZ400 were taken as were (dirt wheels) for the Yamaha. They were last seen heading south along Pennant Hills road and maybe headed towards the Mt Druitt area or the Wollongong area. Note the photo's The Yamaha had been extensively 'personalised' but now may have the dirt wheels on it. Here is a list of the mods.

The Yamaha had numerous modifications, White/Black/red GYTR plastic/Graphics Kit, Black seat cover, Red renthal handle bars, White grips, black ASV levers, Blue headlight globe, LED Indicators, Clear indicator relay, Red braided front brake line, RHK 320mm front disc brake, Black Excel rims with Black spokes, red hubs and red nipples, Hammerhead Gear lever RED/BLACK, RHK brake lever RED/BLACK, Black radiator guards, B&B polished bash plate, Red engine plugs, Boysen Factory racing clutch cover, Red RHK pegs, Red RHK petrol cap, Red Chain, Gold talon Sprocket, RHK black chain Guide, RED master cylinder caps, Power bomb header pipe with dent in the front of it, Lexx Muffler Black, Red Centre bearing bolt under handle bars, RHK polished bar risers, Red chain Tensioners, Red silicone radiator hoses, white bark busters, RED number plate (RDG37), Blue coloured coolant, Black vapour Digital Gauge, RHK YELLOW AND ORANGE AIR FILTER, ESJOT 15T front sprocket. Note street tyres. The Suzuki had the following FMF exhaust pipe, and a lowering link (Black in colour). It also had two very small dents on the petrol tank on the right hand side. Blue rims and street tyres.

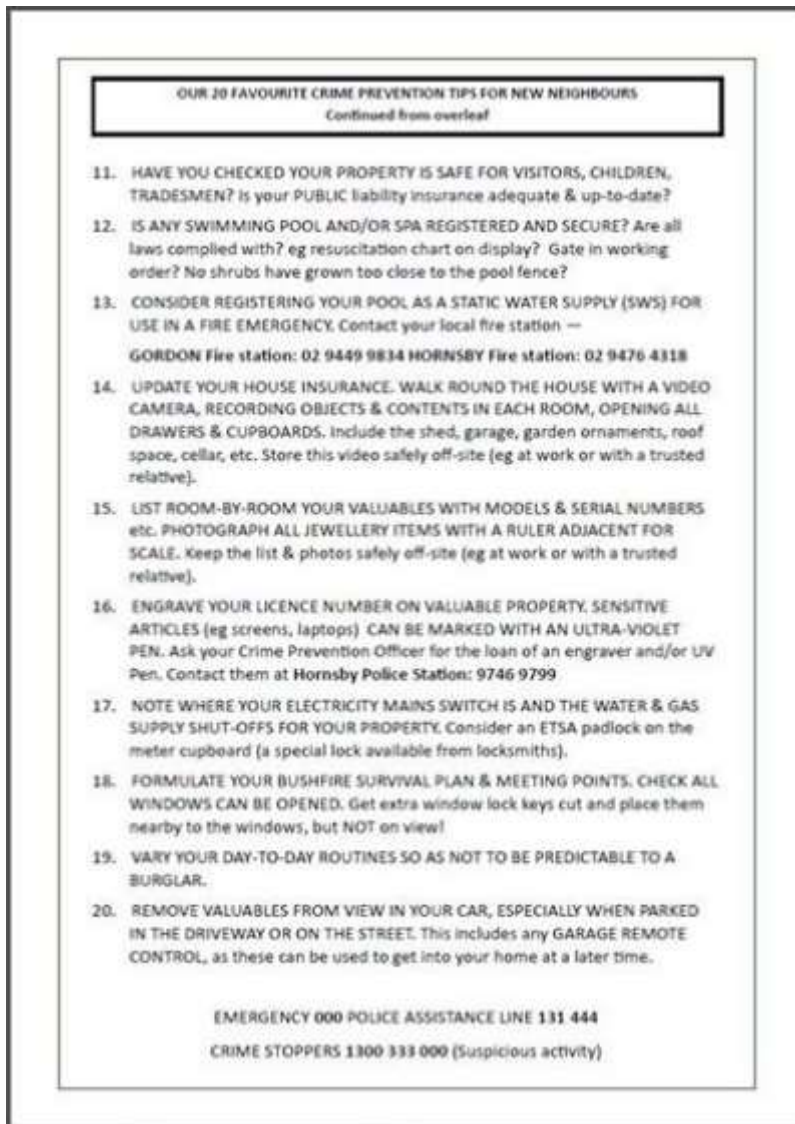

OUR 20 FAVOURITE CRIME PREVENTION TIPS FOR NEW NEIGHBOURS

1. IDENTIFY YOUR 6 IMMEDIATE NEIGHBOURS — 2 TO YOUR LEFT, 2 TO YOUR RIGHT, ACROSS FROM AND BEHIND YOU. Make an effort to get to know them and swap contact details.
2. SUGGEST AN ARRANGEMENT WITH NEIGHBOURS FOR WHEN ANY OF YOU ARE ON VACATION, eg for clearing the local newspapers, putting out & retrieving garbage bins, clearing mailboxes, parking in driveways/spaces, etc.
3. JOIN IN WITH NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH. They are your eyes and ears when you aren't at home. Contact your Crime Prevention Officer to find out about a group in your area.
4. INTRODUCE YOURSELF TO YOUR LOCAL POLICE STATION. Where should you park? What information is available there? When is it manned?
5. LOOK FOR YOUR LOCAL POLICE ON FACEBOOK FOR UP-TO-DATE WARNINGS & INFORMATION. <like> them at facebook.com/KuringGaiLAC. Consider joining local social groups to meet new people, eg facebook.com/NorthShoreMumsGroup or Neighbourhood Watch in your area.
6. STORE YOUR NEW EMERGENCY PHONE NUMBERS IN YOUR LANDLINE AND MOBILE PHONES. Include Hornsby Police Station: 9476 9799, Gordon Police Station: 9418 5399.
7. LOOK AT YOUR HOME, GARDEN, SHED, & IMMEDIATE NEIGHBOURHOOD AS IF YOU WERE A BURGLAR. What gives you cover from being seen? Where is the quick get-away? Have you sensor lighting? Are your windows & doors secure?
8. INVITE A TEENAGE RELATIVE TO TRY AND GET INTO YOUR HOME. Can they climb up to balconies? Can they fit through gaps?
9. CONSIDER HAVING THE LOCKS CHANGED/UPDATED/RE-KEYED. RE-PROGRAMME NEW ALARM CODES FOR THE BURGLAR ALARM.
10. HAVE THE BURGLAR ALARM SYSTEM CHECKED. CLEAN THE SENSORS. CHECK BATTERIES. CONSIDER NEW ATTACHMENTS—there are some amazing new technologies available! Eg balcony sensors, broken window sensors. Spray around sensors for spiders.

24 March: Police have located the body of a woman reported missing from her home in Asquith on the weekend.

About 12pm on Sunday 23 March 2014, a 52-year-old woman went missing from her family home in Asquith. She was reported missing to police who conducted a search of the surrounding area. The search continued today (Monday 24 March 2014) and involved police from Kuring-Gai Local Area Command, Public Order & Riot Squad, Dog Unit, Polair and local SES volunteers. About 11:30am, police located the woman deceased in bushland off Old Berowra Road at Asquith. A crime scene was established and will be examined by specialist forensic officers

and local detectives, however, the woman's death is not believed to be suspicious.

Stay Smart Online Warning: Microsoft releases emergency advisory for vulnerability in Word: SSO Alert Priority High

Microsoft has issued an out of schedule [security advisory](#) warning about a critical vulnerability affecting Word 2003, 2007, 2013, Word Viewer and Office for Mac 2011.

The vulnerability can be exploited if users open certain (RTF) files **or possibly via previewing a malicious message in Outlook**. The vulnerability is known to be targeted by cyber criminals.

Microsoft is currently working on a patch for the issue, but has offered a

temporary “Fix It” solution that disables RTF from being opened by Word.

Where are people allowed to put advertising material?

Advertising material can now only be deposited in three ways - directly into people's letterboxes, into newspaper receptacles or under doors to premises.

People cannot place advertising material under a vehicle's windscreen wipers (or wedged into a car door), on top of property gates or fences, in a public place, in open private places and in other inappropriate areas where it has the potential to become litter. The main exception to these restrictions is where the owner of the land or vehicle has given their express consent for the advertising material to be left.

If material is too big to go into a letterbox, newspaper receptacle or under a door, where should the deliverer put it?

Delivery of bulky advertising material should be put in a sensible place, for example, where indicated by the householder, or in such a way that it won't become litter if the wind blows. (Note - the littering and distribution of advertising laws do not regulate how advertising material is deposited within buildings).

What if the letterbox is already full? Where should the material be put?

If the letterbox is full, people may leave advertising materials under doors or in a newspaper receptacle.

What are some examples of unlawful delivery of advertising material?

Examples include:

- Leaving a number of price lists for a take-away restaurant on top of the letterboxes outside of a group of flats. (However no offence is committed if the price lists are placed inside each letterbox.)

- Placing promotional material on top of a boundary wall or fence to residential premises
- Placing advertising material under the windscreens of vehicles parked in a parking station or in a private driveway (or wedging brochures in the door of a vehicle)
- Leaving a pile of unsecured brochures on the access footpath to a number of town houses

What if people don't want to receive advertising material and have a "no junk mail" sign on their letterbox?

Putting mail into these people's letterboxes is not against the law but it is against the distribution industry's Code of Practice. Distributors should respect people's wishes not to receive this material.

What should people do if they find advertising material under their car windscreen wipers, on top of their letterboxes or in other inappropriate places?

They should advise the local council of the details so that the council can follow up with appropriate actions. These actions could include advice, warnings, fines or a combination of these approaches.

What can be done about the inappropriate delivery of local newspapers (left so that they blow away etc)?

Inappropriate newspaper delivery may constitute littering, in which case the local council should raise the issue with the publisher and/or distributor of the newspaper.

It is a mapping system that enables police to search a date base and locate CCTV cameras for a particular area. It then provides police with owner's/operator's contact details.
