22 June: Hornsby Police news, 22/6/15 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: Middle range drink driving and crash

Time/Date: About 6.45pm Saturday 20th

Place: Margaret Avenue, Hornsby Heights.

Vehicle 1: Holden

Driver 1: 65 year old male.

Vehicle 2: Landcruiser

Details: Police were called to Margaret Avenue as a result of a car crash. At the scene police saw a Commodore and a Landcruiser with crash damage. The Commodore driver identified and was subjected to a roadside breath test, which was allegedly positive for alcohol. A follow up test gave a result of .120. The driver had his licence suspended by police and he was charged.

Court: The male driver is to appear at the Hornsby local Court at a date to be set charged with Driving with a Middle Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol

Incident: Car crash

Time/Date: About 1.20pm Saturday 20th

Place: Old Northern Road, Glenorie.

Vehicle 1: Lancer

Driver 1: 46 year old female.

Vehicle 2: Nissan Navara

Vehicle 3: Rigid table top truck.

Details: The driver of the lancer has commenced overtaking a car on Old Northern Road, part way through this a Nissan Navara appeared travelling in the opposite direction. The Nissan has commenced moving off the road to avoid a crash but was struck by the Lancer. The Lancer deflected off the Nissan and hit a truck parked in a driveway before veering off the truck and into the centre of the roadway. Police and ambulance officers attended, rescue was required to attend to cut the Lancer driver out of her wrecked car. The driver was taken to Westmead Hospital for minor injuries. Police will wait the results of blood tests prior to taking any action.

Incident: Speeding offence

Time/Date: About 4.05pm Sunday 21st

Place: Pacific Highway, Cowan.

Vehicle 1: Yamaha

Driver 1: 21 year old male

Details: Highway patrol officers have sighted the Yamaha near the 'pie in the sky' at Cowan. A radar check was carried out and it is alleged the Yamaha was travelling at 155km/h in the 80kn/h speed zone. The rider was stopped and spoken to. The rider received a ticket for exceeding the speed limit (over 45) and had his licence suspended for 6 months. The bikes rego was also cancelled for 3 months and the plates removed from the bike.

22 June, from the Hornsby Advocate: Cat burglar warning after jewellery stolen from unit at Wahroonga

POLICE warn there's a "cat burglar" targeting units in the area and to remember to lock all balcony doors. A unit in Munderah St, Wahroonga, was broken into on June 12 after the thief climbed an external wall of the building onto the roof of the foyer and then onto the unit's balcony. Police said the balcony sliding door was unlocked, making it an easy for the thief to enter the property and \$1000 in jewellery was stolen. "Lock all sliding balcony doors no matter what level your unit is on," said Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command crime prevention officer Paul Cleary. "Cat burglers or those individuals who are motivated or agile enough will climb to access these buildings."

20 June: Police have charged 11 people following a peak-hour blitz across the public transport network yesterday afternoon.

Officers attached to the Police Transport Command and Transport Officers from Sydney Trains conducted Operation Avoidance between 2.30pm and 6.30pm

yesterday (Thursday 18 June 2015) on the public transport network.

The operation targeted fare evasion, anti-social behaviour and criminal activity on trains and buses from Newcastle and the Central Coast, throughout the Sydney Metropolitan area and Wollongong. During the four-hour operation, 11 people were arrested and charged with 14 offences, including drug supply and possession, and possessing weapons. In addition, police and transport officers issued a total 414 rail infringement notices, conducted 48 person searches and patrolled more than 100 trains. Officers also issued move-on directions to 26 people during the operation.

17 June, from Crime Stoppers NSW: DO YOU KNOW THESE PEOPLE?

Police will today release CCTV as they renew their appeal for information relating to the abduction and suspected murder of South Windsor man Brendan Vollmost. Robbery and Serious Crime Squad detectives are investigating the abduction of Mr Vollmost, 23, who was last seen at his home on the evening of Tuesday 31 March 2015. Detectives will be joined today in their appeal for information by Mr Vollmost's mother, Ms Tammy Slade, as they release CCTV from outside Mr Vollmost's home. They believe the people in the images (apart from Mr Vollmost) could assist with the investigation. Police have also established links between the incident and a group of people called 'Blood Brothers'.

17 June: Police investigating card skimming incidents have released images of a number of people they believe can assist with their inquiries. [edited]

Strike Force Huntington is a Fraud and Cybercrime Squad investigation into

numerous card skimming incidents in NSW.

That includes the placement of a skimming device and camera on an ATM in Pitt Street, in Sydney's CBD, during the evening of Thursday 30 April 2015. Police believe the card details of numerous ATM users were stolen after that time.

Further, on the evening of Saturday 9 May at the same ATM, withdrawals were made using a number of credit and bank cards which had been cloned from details stolen from customers using an ATM in another state. Also under investigation is the use of an ATM in Newcastle in the early hours of Saturday 25 April 2015, to make withdrawals using two counterfeit credit cards. It is unknown if the incidents are linked, but Strike Force Huntington detectives are conducting inquiries into all of them and other similar incidents at ATMs across the state.

They have today released CCTV images of a number of people they believe could assist them with their inquiries. Detectives believe the four people depicted in the images may be able to assist with inquiries, and encourage anyone who may recognise them to contact **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.**





While investigations into the latest spate of ATM skimming continues, police are reminding members of the public of the steps they can take to reduce their risk of falling victim to ATM skimmers:

- When using an ATM, always use your hand to cover the key pad when entering your PIN. Without your PIN, criminals cannot access your funds from an ATM.
- Always maintain security of your card.

- Be alert at all times when using your cards to purchase goods or withdraw money from an ATM.
- Report any people acting suspiciously around ATM's to the police.
- Regularly check your credit card statements and promptly report any irregularities to your financial institution.
- Always maintain sight of your card and ensure the transaction is processed in your presence every time you make a purchase.

Trailwalker rescued

A WOMAN in training for this year's Oxfam Trailwalker was rescued on Sunday afternoon after injuring herself in bushland at Cowan Creek. Four firefighters from Berowra Fire & Rescue trekked about 4km to rescue the woman, who had phoned for help about 3.25pm. The woman, who was on her own, had been running through the bush before injuring her ankle. She was relieved to see the firefighters, who carried her on a stretcher for much of the long trek uphill. "It was quarter to five when we got her back to the top of the hill," Berowra firefighter Col Eldridge said. "It was very steep and rugged bushland." Ambulance officers took her to Hornsby Hospital.
