

06 November, from NSW Police: SCAM ALERT: Beware of Australia Post scams claiming your package requires a payment to complete delivery.

The messages contain a link phishing for your personal and financial info. Australia Post will never email or text asking for payment or personal and



06 November, from Hornsby Shire Council: ROAD WORKS THORNLEIGH ₩ We are upgrading the intersection of Duffy Avenue,
Chilvers Road and The Esplanade.

The southern side of the intersection is being realigned, traffic signals will be upgraded, and the footpath will be turned into a shared path, to make things run a bit more smoothly around that area. 03 November, from NSW Police: The Emergency+ app re-launched today!

The app works across Australia, using GPS functionality built into smartphones to help a Triple Zero (000) caller provide critical location details require to mobilise emergency services. Improvements include:

- A redesigned Emergency+ application logo and new colour scheme
- The inclusion of 'what3words', a software enhancement allowing Triple
 Zero (000) callers to provide their exact location quickly and accurately
 with just three words describing the address to assist responding
 emergency services
- Inclusion of a 'pin drop' function to locate and report an emergency more accurately
- Inclusion of CPR videos to equip people with lifesaving skills
- An update to the end user licence agreement allowing international students and international travelers in Australia to access the Emergency+ application.


10 November, from NSW Police: Police are again appealing for public assistance to locate a man missing from the state's Central Coast.

Mr Dusan Dimich, aged 81, was last seen leaving a shopping complex on Railway Street, Woy Woy, about 9.30am on Monday 2 November 2020. Family members contacted police later that day and officers from Brisbane Water Police District commenced inquiries into his whereabouts.

Police are investigating reports that Mr Dimich was sighted at Woy Woy train station and the Sydney CBD later that morning, and tracked to **Hornsby Train Station** that afternoon, coming from Central Station. He has not been seen since. Police and family members hold grave concerns for his welfare due to his age and medical conditions.

Mr Dimich is described as being of Caucasion appearance with a medium build, between 180cm and 190cm tall with a hunch, short grey hair and brown eyes. Mr Dimich also wears hearing aids in both ears, has a mole on his right cheek and wears dark glasses. He was last seen wearing a red and white flannelette long-sleeved shirt, a light blue undershirt with white horizontal stripes, blue jeans and grey joggers.

09 November, from Gladys Berejiklian: Congratulations to former NSW Rural Fire Service Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons AFSM who has just been announced as the NSW Australian of the Year.

All of NSW will forever be deeply grateful for your leadership during such a difficult time for NSW.



10 November, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Young people and particularly those under the age of 18 are vulnerable to the damaging effects of alcohol.

- In Australia alcohol is a key factor in the three leading causes of death among adolescents; unintentional injury, homicide and suicide.
- In 2012, young people aged 16-24 years of age were around twice as likely as the general population to drink at very high levels on a single occasion.
- For young people aged 18-24 years of age, the rate of emergency department presentations for acute alcohol problems was 54% higher in 2012 than in 2003.

 The rate of interpersonal violence hospitalisations in 15-24 year old males were around four times that of females in the same age group.

As well as the serious and obvious health consequences of excessive drinking, alcohol places the drinker and those around them at considerable risk of harm. Alcohol use, particularly excessive use can increase young people's risk of becoming a victim and / or an offender of alcohol related crime, often violent crime such as sexual assault, physical assault, robbery, driving accidents, violence and antisocial behaviour offences.

In NSW, laws regulate the sale, consumption and provision of alcohol to people under the age of 18 years (minors). These laws are covered in the Liquor Act 2007 click <u>here</u> and the Summary Offences Act 1988 click <u>here</u>.



10 November, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Bushfire Arson is one of the most devastating crimes to property, animal life and tragically even human life.

 If you see something that looks out of place, this may be what police are looking for.

- If you can, record the details of suspicious vehicles such as the make, model and registration – also the appearance of any person acting suspiciously. This information goes a long way in helping police solve these heinous crimes.

09 November, from NSW Police: Know what to do when you hear a siren or see the flashing blue or red lights of an approaching emergency vehicle?

When you hear a siren or see the flashing blue or red lights of an approaching emergency vehicle:

- Give way to the emergency vehicle if you are stopped do not move until it is safe to proceed, even if the traffic light is green. If you are moving, you must slow down and stop if necessary to avoid a collision with the emergency vehicle.
- Move out of the way as soon as you can safely do so

- Move over as much as you can to the left-hand side of the road or, if possible, move onto the road shoulder or breakdown lane. On multi-lane roads, try to move into the left lane to let the emergency vehicle pass
- Drivers on both sides of the road should be prepared to move out of the path of emergency vehicles
- Emergency vehicles with sirens sounding or lights flashing responding to urgent situations are not required to follow the rules, as long as it is safe for them to do so. Drivers should always be extra cautious when they see flashing lights or hear sirens.



The Australian Cyber Security Centre will never contact you by phone to request access to your computer. Nor will they ask you to install software, transfer money or ask for banking details. If the scammer calls, hang up!

06 November, from Crime Stoppers NSW: THE IMPORTANCE OF SECURITY LIGHTING

- Priminals don't like to be seen. Security lighting can be installed around the perimeter of your property, including over entry ways, along your driveway and the back of the house, revealing any possible hiding places for thieves.
- The lighting should be checked regularly and maintained.
- Consider using light timers to turn these lights on/off when not at home.

04 November, Shared with permission from the Berowra Community group: Be careful when having parcels delivered.

Today we had a content of the delivery package stolen from our front porch. The Australia post texted saying the parcel will be delivered today and if no one is home, it will be taken to the post office. Instead they left it on our front porch. When I noticed an hour later that the parcel is on our front porch, I realised that was cut open and the box was empty. I reported it to the police but they said they can't do much as we don't have security cameras. We will be following up with Australia post and really hope that we can get our money back as what was meant to be inside of the package wasn't cheap Edit: I have also lodged a complaint with Australia post.

04 November, from Bush Tele Weekly: Berowra's Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator Ralph Stein speaks at the Crime Prevention meeting held last night at the Berowra Community Centre.

Statistics indicate that Berowra is still 'a beautiful place to live with a relatively low crime rate'. However local residents representing Berowra Public School, Brooklyn Residents' Association and local shopping Centre Berowra Marketplace beg to differ. It appears that much of the graffiti, vandalism, break and enters and antisocial behavior is not being adequately reported, therefore not appearing on Police statistics. The resurgence of Neighbourhood Watch is

Taken from 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Personal Safety':

1. LIMIT WHAT YOU CARRY WITH YOU. If you carry a bag, keep it close to your body and keep a firm grip. Carry any wallet in your front pocket. If someone

does attempt to take your property, do not resist. Throw it away from you.

- 3. WHEN OUT, STAY ALERT, KEEP YOUR MIND ON YOUR SURROUNDINGS, AND BE AWARE OF WHAT IS HAPPENING AROUND YOU AT ALL TIMES. Don't be distracted. If listening to music, remove one ear bud, or set volume to low.
- 4. WHEN TRAVELING ON A TRAIN, SIT NEAR THE GUARD'S

COMPARTMENT. Try not to fall asleep. When traveling on a bus, sit near the driver. When taking a taxi, before getting in, verify the authority card photo matches the driver.


- 10. NEVER LEAVE KEYS IN A HIDING SPOT OUTSIDE THE HOME. Instead leave spare keys with a trusted friend. Consider Fingerprint, Key Pad or Bio Locks.
- 12. DON'T TELL BURGLARS YOU LIVE ALONE. Leave an answering machine greeting that says "We can't come to the phone right now... " even if you live alone. If someone is at the door, call out loudly to your imaginary roommate that you will answer it, "Don't worry—I'll get it!" Don't list your first name on the apartment directory, or name plate.
- 16. WHEN CROSSING THE ROAD & AT INTERSECTIONS, NEVER ASSUME AN APPROACHING DRIVER CAN SEE YOU. Get eye contact. Pedestrian crossings don't give you protection.
