[From our Crime Prevention Officer, S/C Paul Cleary] Hornsby Police news, 14/10/13 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: High range drink driving

Time/Date: About 4pm on Wednesday the 9th

Place: Unwin rd, Waitara Vehicle 1: Holden Jackaroo

Driver 1: 50 year old male from Warrawee

Details: The Jackaroo was driven along Unwin road, the driver a 50 year old male is alleged to have clipped a parked car which was pushed into another car. The driver is alleged to have walked away. Witnesses have pointed the male out to police who have then spoken to the male. A breath test gave an alleged positive result for alcohol. A subsequent test gave a result of .193. The driver had his license suspended by police and he was charged.

Court: The driver is to appear at Hornsby Local Court on the 21st of November charged with Driving with a High Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol.

Incident: DUI plus other offences.

Time/Date: About 10.20pm on Saturday the 12th

Place: Pacific Highway, Wahroonga.

Vehicle 1: Toyota Corolla.

Driver 1: 51 year old male from Warrawee.

Details: Highway patrol officers have seen the Corolla on the Pacific highway and it appeared to be wandering in the lanes. The car was stopped and the driver spoken to. A smell of Cannabis was detected coming from the car. The driver was spoken to about this and his car was searched. A small amount of Green vegetable matter police allege is cannabis was found in the car. A flick knife was also allegedly found in the car. Inquiries also revealed the male was on a good behaviour bond. The male was taken to hospital for a blood and urine test.

Court: The male is to appear at Hornsby Local Court on the 25th of October, Charged with Breach Bail, possess a prohibited drug and possess a prohibited weapon.

Inquiries are continuing into the drive whilst under the influence offence and police will wait the results of test prior to taking any action.

Incident: Car hit by tree

Time/Date: About 6pm on Saturday the 12th

Place: Roach Avenue, Thornleigh.

Details: The owner of a Ford was travelling along Roach avenue when she has heard and felt a thud on the roof of her car. It appears a large branch off a gum tree has fallen and hit the roof of the car. The branch was too large to be removed by hand so council were called to remove the tree.

Incident: Steal from motor vehicle.

Time/Date: Between 5pm on Wednesday the 9th and 7am on Thursday the 10th

Place: Romsey st, Waitara.

Details: A car parked in an underground car park had its window smashed. A handbag containing a wallet, mobile phone and cash was taken as was an overnight bag. The total value is estimated to be \$1,650.

Incident: Steal from dwelling.

Time/Date: Between 5pm on Wednesday the 9th and 7am on Thursday the 10th

Place: Clarke road, Hornsby.

Details: A hand bag containing a wallet and set of keys were taken from a dining table in a home in Clarke road. The home owners were in the rear yard at the time and it appears the offenders may have simply walked in and taken the handbag.

Incident: Steal from motor vehicle.

Time/Date: Between 1.30pm and 10.30pm on Saturday the 12th

Place: Cap park at Kangaroo point wharf.

Details: The car owner had parked their car in the car park. Unknown person/s have smashed a rear window and stolen a GPS unit, a mobile phone and an Ipod and cables. The total value is estimated to be \$860.

Incident: Break Enter & Steal

Time/Date: Between 12.50pm and 4.25pm on Wednesday the 9th

Place: Springdale road, Killara


Details: Unknown person/s have jemmied a ground floor rear window and entered

the home. Jewellery was stolen, the type and value of the jewellery is yet to be established.



A number have been either left behind on benches or seats and subsequently stolen or have been stolen while the owners attention has been away from the phone/bag. Keep a physical hold of your possessions and on't let them out of your sight. Thieves WILL look for an easy target, don't let it be you.

starts, it will be very difficult for fire agencies to contain. We will pass on further information tonight & tomorrow, but as always, DO NOT RELY on this Facebook page for information relating to any active fire.

Let's hope we get through tommorrow fire free!



10 October: Extreme fire danger today.

From the Bureau of Meteorology here's a snap shop of Fire danger ratings for NSW and QLD.



Also stay hydrated if outside. Avoid if possible being outside in the hottest part of the day or in direct sunlight. Keep water up to your animals and make sure they have a shaded area as they suffer more than you think (they're wearing a woolly blanket remember). Remember there is a total fire ban - report any fires or smoke you see.

9 October, from Hornsby & Upper North Shore Advocate: A reminder to keep a close eye on the kids.

A reminder to keep a close eye on the kids, particularly on high fire danger days, after a 10-year-old boy started a bushfire in South Turramurra last night. Around 5.10pm residents of Robin St noticed smoke and used their rubbish bins full of water to douse the flames. A mother found her son with matches and paper. Both police and parents had a strong word to the boy.



Coroner Sharon Freund has handed down her findings into the 2010 Australia Day accident near Orange, in the state's central west, which killed 19-year-olds Eliza Wannan and Will Dalton-Brown.

She found 17-year-old Rhys Colefax had been under the influence of alcohol and was behind the wheel as an unattended L-plater driver when he accidentally reversed over the teenagers, who were sleeping in a swag.

From North Shore LAC, 14 October: Following an ongoing investigation by Chatswood Detectives, officers attended a home in Merrylands and arrested a 28-year-old man over a string of fraud offences and an intimidation offence of an elderly Roseville resident.

Police will allege that the 28-year-old attended the home of the 94-year-old woman in late May this year and had a conversation with her regarding a tree in her front yard. At this time he purported to be a friend of her son's, where in fact he is not known to her family. The male requested the woman pay him cash before he commenced work, at this time the victim gave him \$400 cash.

The Merrylands man then returned to the Roseville home again in mid June and it is alleged that he told the elderly woman that a tree needed to be removed from her front yard. Although the victim told him that there was no tree to be removed, the man requested the woman pay more money. Another payment was made by the resident and the 28-year-old left. Due to the fact that the elderly woman has limited vision, relatives became concerned about this man's visits and the matter was reported to police where an investigation commenced.

Family members actually installed cctv cameras at the home which captured the same Merrylands man on the 2nd August return to the Roseville home and knock on the door. It is alleged on this occasion he claimed he was from the electrical company and that there were problems with wires and he required a \$250 call out fee. This was paid by the resident and no receipt was given.

However again on the 14th of August the male returned to the home but after he

rang the front doorbell the victim ensured her back door was closed and locked, but the male then appeared at the back door to her home. It is alleged that on this occasion the male insisted on speaking with the victim and despite her requests for him to leave he continued to request to speak with her. This made the 94-year-old fearful.

The Merrylands man was charged on Tuesday with three counts of Dishonestly obtain financial advantage by deception and one count of stalk/intimidate intend fear. He was given bail conditions and will face Hornsby Local Court on the 23 October.

From North Shore LAC, 9 October: LOCAL YOUTHS WILL FACE COURT OVER GRAFFITI RELATED OFFENCES

Police advise parents and young people that graffiti matters are criminal offences,

if you are caught in possession of Spray cans or any other item that may be used to cause damage you will be charged put before the courts. Around 3:35pm on 24th September 2013 police received a number of calls from the public after allegedly observing a group of young persons entering the rail corridor. Police attended Lindfield Railway Station and located a number of young persons in a nearby alley way. Officers from North Shore Police stopped and spoke to the group and will allege that some of them were seen to have paint on their hands and clothes. A search of the young people revealed two of the young males were in possession of spray cans and marker pens. The youths parents were contacted and the spray cans and pens were seized. Following an interview, two 14-year-olds were charged with possess graffiti implement with intent to damage.
