03 November, from Police Transport command: Teen charged after train

surfing incident - Police Transport Command

A teenager will face court following an investigation into a train-surfing incident on the Sydney Harbour Bridge. Officers from Police Transport Command arrested a 15-year-old boy yesterday (Sunday 2 November 2014). They will allege the teen rode on the back of a train carriage, with another person, from Wynyard to Milsons Point on Monday 29 September 2014. The teen, from Lane Cove North, was issued a court attendance notice for travelling on a portion of train not for passengers and leave restricted area – not process ticket.

03 November, from neighbouring North Shore Command: A man has been charged over three separate alleged acts of wilful and obscene exposure on Sydney's North Shore.

A 63-year-old man was charged yesterday (Sunday 2 November 2014) for three separate incidents of wilful and obscene exposure in Hampden Road,

Artarmon. Police will allege the first incident took place about 2.50pm on Friday 31 October 2014; the second at 2.50pm on Saturday 1 November 2014 and the third at 2.30pm on Sunday 2 November 2014. It is alleged the man committed acts of wilful and obscene exposure while sitting in a car parked on Hampden Road adjacent to Artarmon Railway Station. Officers from North Shore Local Area Command attended and commenced inquiries. About 5.40pm on Sunday 2 November 2014, the man was arrested at the scene and taken to Chatswood Police Station where he was charged. The man was granted conditional bail to appear at North Sydney Local Court on Wednesday 26 November 2014.

Police are urging anyone who may have observed any similar incidents in the area to contact Chatswood Police.

03 November, from NSW Fair Trading:

All portable pools supplied in Australia must now display a safety warning label stating if fencing laws apply. 31 October: Received a fine notice by email? Proceed with caution - it could be a scam!

The NSW Office of State Revenue (OSR) is urging people to show caution when responding to emails regarding fine notices following several incidents of scam emails encouraging people to pay fake fines. If you receive one of these emails, do not click on any links or pay anything.

OSR or the State Debt Recovery Office never issue fines or penalty notices by email in the first instance, so people should treat any notification of this type as

suspicious. People can log on to www.sdro.nsw.gov.au, enter the penalty or infringement number and offence date to check the validity of their fine. They can also phone 1300 655 805 to ensure the fine is genuine.

30 October, advice from MoneySmartAu: If you've received a call or email from someone you don't know offering you a great investment opportunity or a loan, be very wary.

The caller may be a scammer, from overseas or Australia, trying to take your money.

Australians lose millions of dollars every year to scams and you do not want to be the next victim. Protect yourself by checking the list of companies and individuals that aren't licensed by ASIC (click the link below). If the company that called you is on the list, do NOT deal with them. 30 October, from Fraud & Cyber Crime Squad:

Detectives from the Fraud and Cybercrime Squad have arrested a 43-year-old North Sydney man who they expect to charge with fraud later this morning. In July 2003, a public affairs program broadcast a report concerning an elderly woman from Nambucca who was enduring some significant financial hardship. After the report went to air, a man, who claimed to be backed by community-minded investors, allegedly contacted the public affairs program and told them he wanted to pay the elderly woman's debts out of an 'act of generosity'.

29 October, from the Hornsby Advocate: Police warn residents to avoid walking alone late at night after naked man spotted three times in Hornsby POLICE are on the hunt for a naked man who has been spotted three times in Hornsby in the early hours of the morning over the past month.

The latest incident occurred about 1.45am today when the man, wearing a pair of underpants on his head, was spotted by a 62-year-old woman at the intersection of Burdett and George streets. He beckoned the woman to come over but she screamed. The man was last seen running towards Hornsby railway station.

Police believe the same man was involved in a confrontation in May St on September 29. About 12.15am a 26-year-old woman was walking home when she felt a pair of arms wrap around her shoulders from behind. She turned around, saw the naked man and started screaming. The male ran off and was last seen heading towards Muriel St.

The third incident occurred on October 1, about 12.55am, when a man was walking along Burdett St and noticed the naked man in some bushes at the front of a house. The man again ran off and was last seen heading towards Sherbrook Rd.

The man is described as a caucasian male, aged in his early to mid-20s, with a slim build, short light brown hair, about 180cm tall and wearing blue joggers. Click

29 October, from our Crime Prevention Officer, Snr Con Paul Cleary: Hornsby Police have taken reports of stealing from vehicle incidents recently.

Of concern is a large number of these reports involved cars that did NOT have the doors locked. On several occasions cars in the Berowra area were left overnight unlocked with one car having a handbag left on the passenger seat. To a thief this is way to tempting and gives the area a name (easy target for future thefts and possible house breaks). So please don't leave spare change, property or anything of value in sight inside your car and remember to lock the doors.

And a comment added by a resident: Just to alert everyone there have been attempted house break-in's in Rosamond & Silvia streets this week, so they seem to be active in the Mt Wilga hospital area and in the early hours too. Take extra precautions if you can and also leave some ground floor lights on.

29 October, from our Crime Prevention Officer, Snr Con Paul Cleary:

This morning I was contacted by a Berowra resident about a possible scam; yesterday afternoon a female was door knocking the local area collecting donations presumably for the special Olympics, (the special Olympics were held last week 20th to 25th October).

The female was door knocking in the **Aubrey close area of Berowra** stating she was collecting donations for 2 schools in the Hornsby area, the donations were to help those students get off the waiting list for the Special Olympics. Although fund raising events occur all the time what was strange about this one is that donations could only be made by credit card and had to be a minimum of \$100 and preferably \$1,000, a book of vouchers could also be bought again with the \$100 minimum. When the resident asked for another way of donating or a website to go to for further info, was told there isn't a website and that a credit card payment (\$100+) was the only way. After the resident said she wasn't sure and that she didn't have that much to donate, the female left the area (alone we believe). The female also did not have official ID to collect donations.

A check of she special Olympic website shows how and where to donate, booklets can be purchased through this website (\$10) and tax deductible donations \$2 or more), not the amounts claimed by that female. I contacted one of the schools mentioned by that female and they were unaware of her or her activities and were alarmed at their name being used in this fashion.

The female in question is described as being in her early to mid 20s, Caucasian in appearance but with a heavy European accent, medium build with brown hair in a pony tail (mid back length). She was wearing a black top, a black and white skirt and had a dark coloured back pack, no car was sighted nearby.

If you are approached by someone asking for donations please do a little research and don't always rely on what you are told by them, Scammers and con-artists are very well versed in what to say. Any information please call **Hornsby police 9476 9799 or Crime Stoppers 1800 333 000**.

Please note, a lot of organisations and charities rely on donations and I encourage anyone looking to donate, to do so through official websites, that way your money is getting to where you want it to go and to the people who need it.

I have an update on Berowra collections matter: I have just been in contact with the Special Olympics marketing rep. There are currently fundraising activities in various parts of Sydney which includes the Mt Colah, Mt Kuring gai and Berowra areas. The company contracted for collections subcontracts 'backpackers' to collect. Some have commented here that they have either donated or bought vouches & redeemed these. The original post related to a pushy type of female demanding minimum payments and mentioning local schools. This female is apparently legitimate but her tactics were outside of what the Special Olympics marketing advised. I now have that females name and number thanks to a local Berowra resident and will be passing this onto the Special Olympics to deal with. Again thanks for all the comments and please don't be put off donating to this or other charitable organisations. Just ask for ID and a receipt. Of note the Special Olympics run fundraising events throughout the year.

28 October: Hornsby Police news, 28/10/14 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: Middle range drink driving

Time/Date: About 8.50pm Saturday 25th

Place: Mona Vale road, St Ives. Vehicle 1: Mitsubishi Outlander

Driver 1: 56 year old female

Details: Police conducting RBT on Mona Vale road have stopped the Outlander. The driver returned an alleged positive result for alcohol and was arrested. A follow up breath analysis gave a result of .101, the driver had her licence suspended by police and she was charged.

Court: The driver is to appear at the North Sydney Local Court on the 20th of November charged with Driving with a Middle Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol

Incident: Boat collision

Time/Date: About 11.20am Monday 27th

Place: Hawkesbury River, Brooklyn

Details: A hire boat 'tinny' was drifting with the tide while presumably fishing near Milson island, at this time a large punt (local garbage punt) was travelling nearby and as it rounded a bend the operator has not seen the tinny, colliding with it. A man and his wife were on board the tinny as it was hit, both suffered minor injuries. The punt has stopped and returned to render assistance to the male and female, they were taken to nearby Brooklyn wharf by the punt operator with the tinny in tow. Police and ambulance officers were called and attended soon after. The female was taken to Hornsby Hospital with minor (unknown) injuries and shock her husband did not need treatment but went also. Police are yet to speak to the tinny operator and inquiries are to continue later.

Incident: Drug arrest.

Time/Date: About 8pm Thursday 23rd Place: Warrina Oval car park, Berowra

Details: Police attended the location and have seen a male in a car in the car park. Police have approached the car and have spoken to the male and made a number of observations. Soon after the male has passed police a small plastic bag containing green vegetable matter, the male is alleged to have made certain admissions in relation to this.

The male received a cannabis caution for possessing a prohibited drug.

Incident: Stealing incident

Time/Date: From 3pm Wednesday 22nd
Place: Kiosk near Kmart Westfield Hornsby

Details: The kiosk owner has placed her mobile phone under a counter while serving customers, a short time later the owner has reached for the mobile and found it was missing. CCTV footage is being viewed and it is hoped an offender

may be identified.

Incident: Mail box tampered with.

Time/Date: Between 12pm Saturday 25th and 12pm Monday 27th

Place: Pacific highway, Killara.

Details: A resident has seen their letter box left open after it had previously been locked. A number of mail items were located on the ground below the boxes. It also appears a number of other mail boxes had been opened.

Incident: Steal from motor vehicle

Time/Date: Between 7pm Saturday 25th and 8.30am Sunday 26th

Place: Wallalong crescent, West Pymble

Details: A Mazda was left parked but unlocked on the street, the owner had left her handbag on the passenger seat in full view. Someone has entered the car and taken a small amount of cash and her Blackberry mobile from the handbag.

Incident: Stolen motor bike.

Time/Date: Between 5pm Wednesday 22nd and 9.30am Sunday 26th

Place: Memorial Avenue, St Ives.

Details: A Suzuki 400 motor bike was parked in a unit complex, an unknown

person has stolen the bike, inquiries are continuing into the matter.

Incident: Shop stealing incidents

Time/Date: 12.45pm and 4.35pm Sunday 26th

Place: David Jones.

Details: About 12.45pm a male about 16 years old was seen to enter the store, while there he was seen to place a baseball cap on his head and is then alleged to have walked out of the store without paying for it. Also in David Jones about 4.35pm another male about 16 years old carrying a back pack was seen by staff to pick up a shirt and enter the change rooms. Soon after the same male was seen to leave the change room and leave the store, it is alleged he took the shirt with him. The male was chased by store staff, but lost him; police were then called and

attended. CCTV footage is being viewed in relation to both incidents, inquiries are continuing.

Incident: Break, enter & steal

Time/Date: Between 12pm Tuesday 21st and 9am Wednesday 22nd

Place: Albert Street, Hornsby

Details: The garage to a home in Albert Street was broken into, a number of CD's were taken in the break in. A suspect for the offence has been identified with inquiries continuing.

Incident: Break, enter & steal.

Time/Date: Between 3pm Sunday 19th and 2.30pm Thursday 23rd

Place: Bundarra Street, Wahroonga.

Details: The underground car park and storage area of a unit complex in Bundarra Street was broken into. A storage cage was forced open with a mountain bike being stolen. The bike was valued at an estimated \$4,000.

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above incidents to contact **Hornsby police on 9476 9799**, or phone **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000** to report any information relating to the matter anonymously.

28 October: Two people have been charged following an incident at a convenience store in west Pennant Hills at the weekend.

About 3am on Sunday 26 October, 2014, three males entered a store on Pennant Hills Road and approached the 23-year-old male attendant. It's alleged the three men harassed, intimidated and racially vilified the employee, who is of Indian background. The males left the store and the matter was then reported to police. Officers from Ryde Local Area Command attended the store and reviewed the incident on CCTV.

An investigation was commenced resulting in the arrest of two teenagers late yesterday. Officers attended a home on Tomah Place, Westleigh, about 5.50pm (Monday 27 October, 2014) where they arrested an 18-year-old man. He was taken to Hornsby Police Station where he was charged with affray, intimidation, and serious racial vilification. He was given bail, and will appear in North Sydney Local Court on 18 November, 2014.

A 17-year-old man was arrested shortly after 9pm (Monday 27 October, 2014) at his home on paling Street, Thornleigh. He was taken to Hornsby Police Station where he was charged with affray and serious racial vilification. He was given bail, and will appear in Bidura Local Court on November 18, 2014.

Investigations into the third man are continuing.

28 October, from NSW Fair Trading: Gas area heaters have been banned from sale in NSW, including second hand sales.

The ban affects area heaters, pyramid heaters, column heaters and decorative outdoor heaters of the type shown here. These heaters were certified and had been approved for sale in NSW however recently we became aware that they did not comply with the Australian Standard requiring a heater's flame to be at least 1.8m from the ground. This is not a recall, there is no mandatory requirement for area heaters to be returned. The ban doesn't apply to traditional 'mushroom' style patio heaters which have 1.8m between the ground and heating surface. If you have an outdoor area heater, there are safety precautions you need to take when using it. Reader's Question: Please would you tell us about the police on the trains?

The NSW Police Force took over policing of the state's public transport network on 1 May 2012. The **Police Transport Command** (PTC) was established with 610 police officers to be allocated by December 2014 to patrol trains, buses and ferries. The PTC is committed to reducing any and all types of crime on the NSW public transport network. PTC officers are trained in counter-terrorism, criminal detection and conflict resolution and will work hard to catch and arrest anyone who breaks the law on public transport. The primary role of the PTC is to provide high-visibility policing across the transport network. Uniformed police make patrols of:

- Rail: Trains, Rail stations, Bus and Rail interchanges, Rail lines and sidings, Mono/light rail.
- Bus: Interchanges, bus stops, bus patrols and routes.
- **Ferry**: Wharves, ferry patrols.
- Taxi: Taxi ranks, pick up points, taxi inspections.

In addition to uniform patrols, special teams operate in plain clothes targeting identified problem areas and graffiti vandalism. Working in collaboration with other

stakeholders, PTC officers detect and prosecute offenders for a variety of matters including malicious damage, graffiti and trespassing in the rail corridor. The PTC also provides an intelligence based response to transport crime during busy times and at hotspot locations. This includes a focus on special events such as New Year's Eve celebrations, Anzac Day and major sporting events.

Council reply: Hi guys, the parking at train stations is handled by the NSW Government. Council has consistently lobbied the Government for more parking there, with varying degrees of success.




Chalk artist Anton Pulvirenti has created four images that highlight the issue of discarded cigarette butts, chewing gum and litter on our streets.

MERGING WHEN THE NUMBER OF LANES IS REDUCED

When a driver is travelling on a road without lane markings and the number of lanes or lines of traffic is reduced, they must merge by giving way to any vehicle that is ahead of them. This is often called a zipper merge.

CHANGING LANES WHEN A MARKED LANE ENDS

When a driver is travelling in a marked lane which is ending and is required to cross a broken painted line to enter the adjacent lane, the driver must give way to

the traffic travelling in the lane being entered.

Extracted from Leo Notenboom: WHY ARE ELECTRONIC GREETING CARDS A BAD IDEA?

A quick point and click at a e-card service and you can send a cute virtual "card" via email. Quite often they're even animated, and with sounds or music in the background. However, you may be "giving" the recipient more than you think. By entering an email address into an electronic greeting card service, there is a possibility

- They will probably send the greeting card you requested to the recipient you specified in order to appear legitimate.
- They will start sending their own marketing materials to that recipient.
- They may then sell that known good email address to other marketing firms that will flood the recipient's inbox with even more spam.
- They may then add that email address to their list and begin sending email laden with attached viruses.
- In the worst case, the greeting card itself (which almost always involved clicking on a link) directs the recipient to a malicious web site where his or her computer is then infected with the latest virus, spyware or other form of malware.

DEAL WITH ONLY REPUTABLE SOURCES – if you've never heard of the service, then steer clear. On the other hand, a larger company with an established reputation, say the Hallmark greeting card company, is more likely to maintain their reputation and play honestly.

BEWARE ALSO - any service where you're asked to enter someone else's email address. e.g. "send this article to a friend", internet petitions.
