02 March, from Police Transport command: Graffiti tunnel rats paint a picture of stupidity

TEEN graffiti vandals and "urban explorers― trespassing in Sydney's rail tunnels are costing taxpayers tens of millions of dollars a year while brazenly mocking authorities and boasting about their criminal exploits on social media. The youths are invading the City Circle underground and other tunnels on the network to deface trains and railway property and record their antics on video.

02 March: Police are reminding parents and caregivers that while summer is officially over, the swimming season is not, and extreme vigilance is still required around backyard swimming pools.

The warning from police follows the drowning deaths of two young children in the past week.

According to Royal Life Saving, 20 children between the ages of zero and four years drowned in Australia between July 1 2013 and 30 June 2014. Swimming pools accounted for 70 per cent of the drowning deaths in this age group – more than 4.5 times that of any other location.

28 February, from the Australian Federal Police - Media Release: Joint agency investigation shuts down fraudulent identity manufacturing operation



Fake IDs can be used to open bank accounts, secure loans from banks, and even apply for passports. This was an alleged fraudulent ID manufacturing operation in Sydney which had created thousands of fake ID cards, including licences, Medicare cards and credit cards.

28 February, from our neighbouring Brisbane Water command: Police on the states Central Coast have warned the public to be vigilant after they seized â€~party pills' found to contain illicit drugs available at a local store and later from a shop in Sydney.

During November of 2014 police from Brisbane Water Local Area Command commenced investigations into the alleged supply of prohibited drugs from a shop in Erina. Investigators executed a search warrant on Thursday 20 November 2014 and seized 162 tablets marketed as â€~party pills' with the brand names of â€~GO-E', â€~XS' and â€~Pure Bliss'.

A number of cars recently had property stolen from unlocked cars or cars that had valuables in plain sight. Laptops, mobiles, Ipods, cash in consoles or on seats have been taken after a cursary look by thieves. Temptation and an unlocked car makes this way to easy. Please take your valuables with you or hide them in the boot and lock the car.



25 February, from our neighbouring The Hills command: BUY SWAP SELL & PERSONAL SAFETY

Most of you may have heard of Buy, Swap and Sell type FB pages. These are becoming increasingly more common. There are many in and surrounding the Hills LAC. Remember to be safe especially with your personal information when buying and selling and using social media. While most people will be great to deal with and the transaction will be a happy one, remember you are giving out personal information about yourself to a stranger.

Some people are out to scam or defraud you, you need to be aware of these people while you might be glad to get rid of that old sofa or lamp, keep in mind these are strangers you are dealing with. If you are not comfortable giving out your home address then meet in a public place and try to always take someone with you or if you have a large item and the buyer is coming to your home, try and move the item to the garage or front yard to avoid them coming inside your home. Again try to have someone else with you and ask to see identification from the buyer upon arrival. If at any time you feel unsafe, call the meeting off and post pone it so you can make other arrangements. This applies to people buying items too. Going to someones home can be daunting.

Use common sense. If something sounds too good to be true - it probably is. Be on

25 February, from the Hornsby Advocate: Hornsby Police are investigating an act of cruelty against a brushtail possum which was found with a large nail protruding from its neck on Tuesday.

The dead possum was discovered by a National Parks & Wildlife officer about 9am lying on the side of Apple Tree Bay Rd in Ku-ring-gai Chase National Park. Police said it appears that it was shot with a nail gun.

25 February, from the Hornsby Advocate: Hornsby Police are appealing for information or witnesses to an indecent assault of a 16-year-old schoolgirl at Hornsby on Monday.

Police said the assault occurred on Peats Ferry Rd, near Bridge Rd, about 1:15pm. The offender is described as a male, 18-19 years old, Asian in appearance, 170-175cm tall with a medium build and short black spiky hair. He was wearing a light blue t shirt and black shorts, reading glasses with oval, clear frames, and he was carrying a black bag. He spoke with a slight Asian accent. Police believe the male

25 February, from Traffic & Highway Patrol command: There has been much discussion over social media lately in relation to the use of mobile telephones whilst driving.

A mobile phone may only be used while driving:

- If it is secured in a commercially manufactured and designed mounting which is fixed to the vehicle and does not obscure the driver's view of the road, or
- If it can be operated by the driver without touching any part of the phone, for example through the use of Bluetooth technology or voice activation. While driving, a mobile phone cannot:
- Rest on the driver's leg, between the shoulder and ear, or on any other part of the driver's body.
- Be used for text messaging, video messaging, emailing or similar, or
- Be held in the driver's hand other than to pass it to a passenger.

 Drivers can only use a hand-held mobile phone if their vehicle is parked in an authorised parking spot. They cannot use a hand-held mobile phone while stopped at traffic lights.

Drivers may use the navigational or GPS function and audio functions of a phone while driving, provided the phone is secured in a fixed mounting.

Learner and P1 drivers are not permitted to use any function of a phone while operating a vehicle.

24 February, from the NRMA: UPDATE: 'Bright Lights' number plates recalled After a successful campaign to halt the issuing of Bright Lights number plates, the NRMA is claiming a win in our fight to have them recalled.

Roads minister Duncan Gay confirmed all 9604 Bright Lights holders will be asked to mail in their plates in exchange for replacements, which are larger and printed in brighter tones with a coloured border.



- A driver must not use their headlights on high beam if travelling: less than 200m behind a vehicle travelling in the same direction, or less than 200m from an oncoming vehicle.
- It is an offence to flash the vehicle's headlights unless the vehicle is being used to respond to an emergency.
- A driver must not use any light fitted to their vehicle that may dazzle another road user.


From Hornsby Shire Council: ROAD RULES AWARENESS WEEK

Keeping a safe distance from the car in front of you is vital to avoid a crash, but many drivers in New South Wales still seem confused with the issue popping up as one of the Top 10 misunderstood road rules. Drivers must keep sufficient distance behind a vehicle travelling in front of them to safely avoid a collision.

Safe following distances may vary depending on the conditions, the type of vehicle and the speed at which the vehicle is travelling. As a general rule, when following a vehicle, the driver should travel three seconds behind the vehicle in front to provide sufficient time to avoid a crash.

To calculate a three second space when following another vehicle, drivers can use the basic time-lapse method technique:

- Drivers should select a mark or object on the left hand side of the road, for example a sign or a power pole
- As the rear of the vehicle ahead passes the chosen object, the driver counts â€~one thousand one, two thousand two, three thousand three'. This should take about three seconds.
- If the driver's car passes the chosen object before finishing the three second count, then they are travelling too close to the vehicle in front. There is not enough crash avoidance space so the driver should slow down and repeat the exercise to ensure the three second gap is achieved.
- In poor conditions such as rain, gravel roads or dim light, it may be necessary to increase the travelling distance to four seconds to increase the crash avoidance space.

The change was previously scheduled to begin on 29 April this year, but an additional twelve months has been provided to give property owners more time to ensure their swimming pools are compliant.

From Hornsby Shire Council: SAFER DRIVERS COURSE

Learner drivers under the age of 25 who have more than 50 on-road driving hours in their log book can improve their skills and score some extra hours with the Safer Drivers Course. The next Safer Drivers Course being held locally by the PCYC Hornsby will be on Thursday 5 March from 4.30pm to 7pm and costs \$140.

This initiative of Transport for NSW is designed to provide learner drivers with driving strategies such as speed management, gap selection, hazard awareness and safe following distances. The course involves two modules - module one is a facilitated group discussion on how to manage risks on the road. This involves a maximum of 12 participants and is delivered by a facilitator. Module two is a twohour in-vehicle coaching session to develop low-risk driving strategies, involving two participants and a coach.

HORNSBY KURINGGAI WOMEN'S SHELTER NOW OPEN

Two students approached by a stranger
