20th December: The deaths of five people in breakdown accidents this year has prompted the NSW government to issue a safety guide for motorists, available from the R&MS from January. Announcing the introduction of a breakdown safety guide on Thursday, Roads Minister Duncan Gay said the rising number of such fatalities was a serious concern. "There are too many of these types of crashes occurring on our roads," he said in a statement. Motorists have also been using breakdown lanes for telephone calls, resting and attending to children, he said. "Not all breakdowns happen in a breakdown lane these are high speed environments which should be used only in the case of an emergency. Our aim is to show road users how they can improve their safety if they find themselves breaking down or passing someone who has broken down," Mr Gay said. The guide, which is the first of its kind in the state, recommends high visibility vests and triangles be carried in cars, and provides a range of scenarios in which drivers can learn what to do. Also located in the backpack was a bus pass and residential address belonging to the other young male involved in the offence. Police attended an address in Pymble and arrested the second young male involved in the incident. ## 18th December: Police are appealing for information after two children were approached by a man while walking home from Hamilton Park in Turramurra.

- Make sure your parents or another adult you know knows where you are at all times.
- Always walk straight home or to the place you are walking to. Walk near busier roads and streets, or use paths where there are lots of other people.
- Know where safe places are a shop, service station, police station, library or school. If you are ever frightened, you should go to one of these places and ask them to call the police.
- Learn about safe adults you can look for and talk to if you need help police officers, teachers at school, adults you know and trust.
- Don't talk to people you don't know and never get into a car with someone you don't know. If a car stops on the side of the road and you don't know the person inside, do not stop.
- If you are scared and can use a phone, call 000 and tell them you are scared.
- If someone tries to grab you, yell out, 'Go away, I don't know you'. This lets other people know you have been approached by someone you don't know.

And our Crime Prevention Officer, Snr Con Paul Cleary, advised that if you see any of these toys at the markets, take a photo and note the store or market location & business name, then call the Department of Fair Trading (phone 13 32 20) and report to them. They are the governing body and have the appropriate powers to prosecute and have the items removed from sale. If you are asked why you are taking a photo, advise so you can show your partner etc, but don't place yourself at risk.

From <u>news.com.au</u>: SMARTPHONE apps that read out and respond to text messages while you're driving are a dangerous distraction and should not be used, police warn.

Text Star, available for Australian Android phones in early 2013, automatically replies to all texts and emails with a preset message of your choice whenever it detects you travelling faster than 16km/h.

Another free android app that's already on the market, DriveSafe.ly, uses text-to-speech technology to automatically read out loud text messages and emails the instant they're received, so you can keep your hands on the wheel and avoid a hefty fine and demerit points.

Police and road authorities say while such apps would help drivers avoid fines for holding or operating a mobile phone, which is prohibited in all states, they could still result in fines for driving while distracted, or even cause accidents.

The **Smoke-free Environment Act 2000** has been amended to ban smoking in the following **outdoor places from 7 January 2013**:

- Within 10 metres of children's play equipment in outdoor public places;
- Public swimming pools;
- Spectator areas at... sports grounds or other recreational areas used for organised sporting events;
- Public transport stops and platforms; including ferry wharves and taxi ranks;
- Within 4 metres of a pedestrian access point to a public building; and
- From 2015, in commercial outdoor dining areas.
