18 August: Hornsby Police news, 18/8/14 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command:

Incident: Car and bike crash

Time/Date: About 8am Friday 15th

Place: Mona Vale road, St Ives.

Vehicle 1: Jeep.

Driver 1: 65 year old female

Vehicle 2: Push bike

Driver 2: male rider

Details: The Jeep driver had entered the right turn lane at Douglas street heading south. The female driver has commenced to turn right across 3 lanes of traffic and hasn't seen the bicycle rider heading north. The cycle has clipped the rear door of the Jeep which has in turn thrown the rider off his bike. The rider was not seriously injured and did not need to go to hospital. The driver was deemed at fault and received a ticket. The bike was totalled.

Incident: Car crash and fire

Time/Date: About 6.30pm Sunday 17th

Place: M1 near Brooklyn Vehicle 1: Great Wall

Driver 1: 39 year old male

Details: The 39 year old male was driving north on the M1 about 2km south of the Hawkesbury bridge. The driver has changed into lane 3, the driver claims another driver changed lanes as well directly in front of his car clipping his front bumper. The driver claims this caused him to spin and lose control. His car then careered back across all 3 lanes into the break down lane, then flying over the guard rail and down an embankment. A witness stopped to help the driver out, at this point a small fire started in the foot well of the car as the male got out. RFS were called and put the fire out. The male was taken to Gosford hospital with minor injuries. His car was a total loss. A heavy crane was used to retrieve the car from down the embankment. Some delays were caused as the car was being removed. Inquiries are continuing into the matter.

Incident: Tree falls onto road.

Time/Date: About 5pm Friday 15th

Place: Coonanbarra road, Wahroonga

Details: A large tree has fallen onto the roadway near the intersection of

Coonanbarra road and Bareena Street. The tree brought down power lines which

caused a localised blackout. Council officers removed the tree while Ausgrid

restored power. There were no reports of injuries or car crashes.

Incident: Stolen trailer

Time/Date: Between Monday the 4th and Thursday the 14th

Place: Hamley road, Mt Kuring gai

Details: A dual axle tipping trailer was stolen from a residential street during the above time frame. It is unknown if the trailer was secured by any locking devices.

Incident: Steal from motor vehicle

Time/Date: Between 7pm Thursday 14th and 7am Friday 15th

Place: Kitchener Street, St Ives.

Details: A small pantech style truck was parked on the street, the cabin was broken

into and a backpack was taken, the backpack contained clothing and some

toiletries (probably not what the thief was after).

Incident: Break, enter & steal

Time/Date: Between 3.45pm and 7.40pm Sunday 17th

Place: Koola avenue, Killara.

Details: The home in Koola avenue was broken into via a ground floor rear door.

Several rooms were searched by the offender; a safe containing jewellery was

stolen.

Incident: Break, enter & steal

Time/Date: Between 10am and 8pm Saturday 16th

Place: Livingstone Avenue, Pymble

Details: The home in Livingstone Avenue was broken into via a ground floor rear

door. An amount of jewellery was taken.

Incident: Break, enter & steal

Time/Date: Between 10pm Wednesday 13th and 10am Friday 15th

Place: Albert Street, Hornsby

Details: A detached garage at a home in Albert Street had its door closed but unlocked. At some point an unknown person has placed a mattress which was already in the garage on the floor and appears to have slept on it for some time. A strong smell of urine could be smelt from inside the garage; I think we can guess how that occurred.

Incident: Break, enter & steal

Time/Date: Between 8am and 5pm Friday 15th

Place: Junction road, Wahroonga

Details: A home in Junction road was broken into via a ground floor side window which was found smashed. Several rooms were ransacked, with a laptop and some jewellery being taken.

Incident: Break, enter & steal

Time/Date: Between 10.30pm Friday 15th and 9am Saturday 16th

Place: Pacific highway, Waitara.

Details: A business at the above location was broken into sometime Friday night. The business owner had a key hidden for emergency use; this key was found inside the lock of the front door. About \$2,000 cash was taken.

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above incident to contact Hornsby police on 9476 9799, or phone Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 to report any information relating to the matter anonymously.

Note: A number of burglaries have occurred recently where a home was entered via a first floor window, sometimes an ensuite window, which has been left open for ventilation. To a motivated thief this is a challenge but not an impossible task.

Thieves will use Otto bins, trees, ladders, pergolas etc to climb. So please use keyed window locks on all windows, even first floor windows.

Also a number of safes have been stolen recently; these were not bolted down and simply carried out of the house. The contents is irrelevant to a thief - it is the potential that drives them.

The security of your property is your responsibility and is not that difficult, or expensive to make it harder to be broken into: it is called 'target hardening'.

A property, by having its security levels increased, raises the risk and effort of an offender, thus reducing the opportunity for reward.

Things to consider are: keyed window locks, double keyed door locks, alarms, sensor lights, closely-trimmed trees and shrubs, house alarms, fences (see through). Most importantly get to know your neighbours and look after each other's homes.


15 August: NSW Minister for Roads and Freight Duncan Gay, Minister for Police and Emergency Services Stuart Ayres and Acting Assistant Commissioner of the NSW Police Force Bob Ryan today announced the launch of Operation Saturation 2.

"This campaign is about improving road safety by targeting specific behaviours that are amongst some of the biggest killers on our roads," Mr Gay said. "They include speeding, drink driving, illegal mobile phone use and seatbelt offences. "Starting this Sunday until the end of September, motorists will notice an increase in high-

visibility police at locations where serious crashes are occurring.

"This crackdown is funded by the Community Road Safety Fund, which is where all speed camera revenue is directed and goes towards road safety initiatives including school zone flashing lights. "Based on the Centre for Road Safety's crash data, police presence will be boosted in areas that have been identified as leading locations for fatal crashes this year. "This includes areas around Richmond in northern NSW, Tweed, Coffs Harbour, Brisbane Waters, the mid north coast, Hunter Valley, Shoalhaven, Goulburn, **Kur-ring-gai** and Orana," Mr Gay said.

- Slow down in wet weather and don't speed;
- Accelerate and brake smoothly to avoid losing control;
- Turn on lights and demister to avoid windows fogging up; and,
- Most importantly, be patient.

15 August: Two men will face court over numerous alleged armed robberies and impersonating police officer offences in Sydney's north west this year.

Strike Force Buster was established in July 2014 by officers attached to the State Crime Command Property Crime Squad and **North West Metropolitan Region** to investigate a number of aggravated break, enter and steal offences upon commercial premises in Sydney's north west earlier this year.

It's alleged between 3 July 2014 and 11 August 2014, two men were involved in a number of break, enter and steal offences at supermarkets, bottle shops and newsagents, where cigarettes, alcohol, cash and electronic items were stolen.

Police will also allege the offences were linked to carjacking incidents where two men impersonated NSW police officers and stole vehicles and personal property, and on one occasion were allegedly armed with a glock-style pistol.

Following investigations, about 7.35pm yesterday (Thursday 14 August 2014), officers attached to the SCC Property Crime Squad, Penrith and **Gordon Region Enforcement Squads** and Blacktown Proactive Team, stopped a blue Mazda hatchback driving along Glenn Street, Dean Park, after they detected the number plates allegedly stolen earlier that day in Doonside.

The driver, an 18-year-old man, and his passenger, a 23-year-old man, attempted to flee; however both men were arrested at the scene. Police searched the vehicle and seized electrical items and clothing for forensic examination. They were taken to Blacktown Police Station where the teenager was charged with robbery while armed, aggravated impersonate police officer, dishonestly obtain financial advantage, drive motor vehicle without consent, learner unaccompanied, goods in custody and a number of outstanding warrants.

The 23-year-old was charged with robbery while armed, aggravated impersonate police officer, dishonestly obtain financial advantage, be carried in stolen conveyance and breach of bail. Both men were refused bail, to appear at Penrith Local Court on 24 October 2014.

13 August, from NSW Fire & Rescue: Urgent warning after busy night for firefighters (edited).

Fire & Rescue NSW (FRNSW) Commissioner Greg Mullins has warned NSW residents not to be complacent about home fire safety following a spate of residential and building fires across NSW overnight. Firefighters were called to several major building and home fires in less than 12 hours since 6pm yesterday <Tuesday, 12 August>.

"Every day firefighters attend home fires that could have been prevented with a few simple steps and precautions. "People assume it will never happen to them. But I assure you it can. The most important thing you can do in your home is to have a working photoelectric smoke alarm and a practised home escape plan."

People can greatly reduce their risk from fire by identifying and changing risky behaviours and habits, including:

- Keeping clothing and other flammable materials at least 1m from heaters and open fires
- Turning off heaters and electrical blankets before going to sleep
- Not overloading power points and power boards
- Not leaving cooking, and other open-flame materials such as cigarettes and candles, unattended.

12 August, from the Hornsby Advocate, with a comment from our Crime Prevention Officer, S/C Paul Cleary:

What can be done to stop trucks and buses going into Galston Gorge? Despite signs advising no buses or trucks with a length limit of 7.5m for a rigid vehicle and 11.5m for a vehicle trailer combination, they still go in there. It seems flashing lights don't work for some, the flashing sign board at the Hornsby end is NOT big enough, is a dull orange colour and is to far left to be seen by drivers. Drivers looking at the GPS that directs them that way won't see the sign either. Maybe a smaller roundabout at each end would do the trick or a tight chicane. Thoughts!... All I know is hundreds of cars and other 'legal' vehicles were inconvenienced today.

Advice from Ausgrid: Reducing the Risk of Bushfires

Residents with private power poles should:

- Maintain those poles and the wires they carry to ensure they do not become a potential cause of fire;
- Arrange an annual inspection before the start of the bushfire season; and
- Ensure trees and other vegetation are kept well clear of powerlines.

Reducing the Risk of Bushfires

Before each bushfire season Ausgrid inspects the electricity network and conducts maintenance to reduce the risk of fires caused by clashing or fallen power lines or interference by vegetation.

Some residents in bushfire zones in Sydney's north may have private power poles on their property which also need to be inspected and maintained.

To help keep the community safe, Ausgrid needs to check these private powerlines for hazards in the lead up to bushfire season. Our staff may visit your property to carry out some of these checks.

Residents with private poles should:

- Maintain those poles and the wires they carry to ensure they do not become a
 potential cause of fire;
- · Arrange an annual inspection before the start of the bushfire season; and
- . Ensure trees and other vegetation are kept well clear of powerlines.

For your safety, this inspection and maintenance work must be completed by a suitably qualified and licensed electrical contractor.

In cases where no action has been taken to address an identified bushfire risk, Ausgrid may need to disconnect supply for safety reasons.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 14 August: Fight plans spark alert from police

HORNSBY Police issued a warning to youths not to get involved in a planned fight at Hornsby on Tuesday afternoon.

Extra police were tasked to monitor a "known location" where they believed an organised fight was planned to take place, but never eventuated. It followed reports a group of youths gathered at **Berowra Skate Park** over the weekend with knives, planning to fight.

Kuring-gai Police crime prevention officer Senior Constable Paul Cleary said police were concerned "there may be a follow-up or retaliatory fight. Police will be tasked to attend several locations and will, if needed, arrest those found acting in an antisocial manner or found in possession of any weapons," Senior Constable Cleary said on Tuesday. He said it was important for parents to know where their children were going after school. "Talk to your children and ... make sure they don't get involved," he said.

Senior Constable Cleary said it was not common for police to issue such a warning. Anyone with information should contact **Hornsby Police on 9476 9799.**

From the Hornsby Advocate, 14 August: MAKING SURE WOMEN ARE SAFE


Culture is no barrier to reporting domestic violence. Your police were told of a perception that culture or faith may be a barrier to reporting crime against any

From the ACCC's Scamwatch website: Consumers with a disability – be on guard against scammers trying to take advantage of you

August 2014: SCAMwatch is warning consumers with a disability to be on guard against scams – unfortunately, scammers target people whom they think may be vulnerable to try and take advantage of them.

Some common scams reported by consumers with a disability include fraudsters claiming:

- to represent a government authority or well-known business
- that they are looking for a relationship
- that the target has won a lottery or competition.

Scammers employ a range of delivery methods to contact you such as a phone call, text message, email, through an online forum, or even face-to-face by knocking on your door. Their ultimate goal is to obtain your personal information or steal your money.

Consumers with a disability, beware – if you receive an approach out of the blue

from someone asking for personal information or money, don't engage – press 'delete', shut the door or just hang up.

Delays are expected on the Hills M2 Motorway as work is carried out to disable and remove a tower crane next to the citybound carriageway at Vimiera Road, Marsfield. The tower crane was needed for important maintenance work to the motorway's northern embankment. This work requires some on-ramp and lane closures.

From 8pm Friday 22 August to 2am Monday 25 August 2014, a contraflow will be in place between the Norfolk Tunnel, North Epping and Culloden Road Bridge, Marsfield. Citybound traffic will be diverted onto the westbound carriageway of the motorway. One lane will be open to citybound traffic and two lanes open westbound at all times.
