29th July, Hornsby Police news, 29/7/13 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command:

Incident: Middle range drink driving charge Time/Date: About 12.50am on Saturday the 27th

Place: William street, Hornsby

Vehicle 1: Holden Barina
Driver 1: 22 year old male

Details: Police stopped the driver of the Barina for a random breath test. This result was allegedly positive for alcohol. The driver was arrested and a further test gave a result of .099. The driver also had his licence suspended by police.

Court: The male is to appear at the Hornsby local Court on the 22nd of August charged with Driving with a Middle Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol

Incident: Driving under the influence (DUI) and speeding.

Time/Date: About 2.15am on Sunday the 28th Place: Pacific highway, Warrawee.

Vehicle 1: Holden

Driver 1: 46 year old male.

Details: Police saw the Holden and it appeared to be travelling over the 60km/h speed limit. When police activated the emergency lights and sirens the Holden is alleged not to have stopped. After turning onto the M1 Motorway and about 3km along the Motor way, the Holden has finally stopped, with the driver being spoken to. A roadside breath test gave an alleged positive result for alcohol. The driver was arrested and taken to Hornsby police station. The driver when requested has not been able to have the breath analysis done as he allegedly fell asleep. For his welfare an ambulance took him to Hornsby hospital where he was left in their care after his details were obtained.

Court: A Wanted Court Notice has been created and he's expected to attend Hornsby Local Court in the near future charged with Driving While under the Influence of Alcohol (DUI) and failing to provide a breath sample.

Incident: Rock through car windscreen.
Time/Date: About 4pm on Wednesday the 24th

Place: Mona Vale Road, St Ives.

Details: The car owner was driving along Mona Vale road, St Ives. As the car an Audi A8 was travelling along Mona Vale road a large rock has hit the steel windscreen surround at the front and windscreen which was smashed, the rock has then deflected away from the car. This caused major damage to the car. The driver was not hurt in the incident. There were no bridges or over passes, so it is unknown how the rock became airborne and hit the car. The rock was described to police as being about $10 \text{cm} \times 10 \text{cm} \times 10 \text{cm}$.

Incident: Stealing incident

Time/Date: Between 4.45pm and 4.55pm on Tuesday the 23rd

Place: Myer Hornsby Westfield

Details: Unknown person/s have stolen a Samsung Galaxy Tab 11 from a display shelf at the location. A Samsung Ultra book was also damaged in an attempt to remove it from the

shelf. They were valued with a retail price of \$1,199.

Incident: Break Enter & Steal

Time/Date: Between 6am and 4pm on Thursday the 25th

Place: The Glade, Wahroonga

Details: Unknown person/s have broken into the home via unknown means. Inside the home several rooms were ransacked with cash and electrical items being stolen. They were valued at an estimated \$12,400.

Incident: Break Enter & Steal

Time/Date: Between 1pm on Tuesday the 23rd and 9am on Wednesday the 24th

Place: Lisa Valley close, Wahroonga

Details: Unknown person/s have broken into the home via forcing the lock on a ground floor rear door. Inside several rooms were ransacked with jewellery and camera items being stolen. They were valued at an estimated \$4,000.

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above incidents to contact Hornsby police on 9476 9799, or phone Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 to report any information relating to the matter anonymously.

25th July: Reporting acts of cruelty and neglect upon animals. Please read the following, if you know of any acts of cruelty or neglect please call the Police or the RSPCA.

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (RSPCA), the Animal Welfare League (AWL) and the NSW Police Force are committed to ensuring animal welfare standards are protected and that all allegations of cruelty and neglect are thoroughly and professionally investigated. Officers with all three organisations have the authority to prosecute offences under the Prevention of Cruelty of Animals Act 1979 (POCTA) and have operational understandings and protocols in place between them. The decision whether to report to the NSW Police Force, the RSPCA or the AWL lies with the individual. Police will take all complaints made to them

seriously and will attend and assess a situation once it has been reported to them. They may also seek the assistance of the RSPCA when instituting proceedings particularly for any veterinary care needed.

Just further to the message of animal cruelty, there have been many studies that looked into the minds of violent criminals, criminals who include domestic violence offenders, serial abusers and serial killers. Most of these studies can link back to the early childhood of those offenders who had abused, tortured or killed animals. The studies further stated that had some type of intervention occurred (reporting and investigation of the abuser) that the behaviour of the offender may have resulted in stopping the cycle, therefore stopping the transition into abuse as an adult. So if you know of anybody, be a child or an adult who you know or suspect is abusing animals which include by neglect, please report it. You may just stop a future violent criminal. Do a bit of research yourselves, look at the studies and ask yourself what if it was my family that



became a future victim?

25th July, Do you have a **working smoke detector** in your home or office? A timely reminder from: **NINE Morning News | Bonnyrigg house fire 25/7/13**

At 7:22am this morning (25 July), Fire & Rescue NSW firefighters were called to a house fire at Brown Rd, Bonnyrigg. Crews from Bonnyrigg Heights, Busby and Cabramatta arrived a few minutes later to find the single level home well alight. Five adults and two children had safely self evacuated from the building. Crews extinguished the blaze after about an hour. Sixty per cent of the house was destroyed by fire with a major roof collapse. Great work by crews who stopped the fire from spreading to nearby properties and to the passer by who alerted the residents to the fire.

This is a timely reminder to ensure your home has a working smoke alarm.

24th July: With **National Missing Persons Week NMPW (Sun 28 July - Sat 3 Aug)** about to start this is a great result with a young girl being reunited with family.

MISSING teenager Bethany Neville, who disappeared while on her way to school over four

MISSING teenager Bethany Neville, who disappeared while on her way to school over four months ago, has been found alive and well. The 14-year-old, who was last seen by her family when she left her Kiama Downs in March, has been discovered living in Cessnock in the Hunter Valley. Neville, who was 13 when she disappeared, has been featuring on posters for Missing Persons Week, which is due to start on Sunday (July 28) and runs until Saturday (August 3). **Channel Ten's 'Wanted'** presenter Sandra Sully interviewed Bethany's parents John Neville and Tracy Mahoney, for the crime show, and said it was the programs first victory in solving a case. "We are thrilled for her family. I spent time with mum and dad and as any parent would, they were distraught, wondering how and where she was. "We are so grateful to the Channel Ten viewers they helped us to deliver." Full article

Around 35,000 people are reported missing each year in Australia one person every 15 minutes. In NSW last year, 12 409 people were reported missing, of those 84 remain missing. NMPW is a national annual campaign to raise awareness about the issues and impacts associated with missing person cases.

23rd July: Police are appealing for information after a girl was approached by a man near Turramurra on the weekend.

Between 10.30am and 12.45pm on Saturday 20 July 2013, a 12-year-old girl was playing soccer with her grandmother at Aluba Reserve, South Turramurra, when she went to use the public toilet. As the girl exited the toilet she was approached by the man and asked if she wanted some lollies. She became scared and ran off, alerting her grandmother to the incident. Police from @Kuring-Gai Local Area Command attended the park but a search of the area was unable to locate the man. Investigators are now looking for a man described as being of Caucasian appearance, bald and heavily tattooed, aged in his 40s or 50s.

Meanwhile, the incident has again prompted police to encourage parents to discuss the 'Safe People, Safe Places' messages with their children, including;

- Make sure your parents or another adult you know knows where you are at all times.
- Always walk straight home or to the place you are walking to. Walk near busier roads and streets, or use paths where there are lots of other people.
- Know where safe places are a shop, service station, police station, library or school. If you are ever frightened, you should go to one of these places and ask them to call the police.
- Learn about safe adults you can look for and talk to if you need help police officers, teachers at school, adults you know and trust.
- Don't talk to people you don't know and never get into a car with someone you don't know. If a car stops on the side of the road and you don't know the person inside, do not stop.
- If you are scared and can use a phone, call 000 and tell them you are scared.
- If someone tries to grab you, yell out, 'Go away, I don't know you'. This lets other people know you have been approached by someone you don't know.

23rd July: IDENTITY THEFT..... Why should I worry about it? It won't happen to me....

Take the time to look at the PROTECTING YOUR IDENTITY - What Everyone Needs to Know booklet from the link below. It goes into great detail about ID theft and the associated fraud offences. It shows what the crooks are after, why they are after it, and more importantly what they do with YOUR IDENTITY. I do apologise in advance for this being so long but this is the crime trend of this century. It is so easy for the crooks and you must take control of your ID and its security (if you don't they will).

So what key pieces of your ID are they after and how will they steal/get it? Your name and your address is pretty much public info by the nature of how we interact in the world. What the crooks want are as follows:

- 1. your date of birth
- 2. Tax file number
- 3. bank account details
- 4. credit card details (especially those 3 security numbers on the back of the card for online internet purchases).
- 5. Passport number
- 6. drivers licence number
- 7. mother's maiden name.
- 8. Superannuation details.
- 9. work details
- 10. car rego papers.

These are the most used details for proving an ID.

How do they get them? Numerous ways, these are crooks after all and they are very creative and resourceful.

They may call you by phone and they will quote back to you most of your details and then ask you to confirm you are the real person they want, one or all of the above. DO NOT under any

circumstances give out any details or confirm your name, or birth date; just hang up. If they have claimed they are from a bank, call that bank and report it.

Your may get an email or a pop-up on your screen while on the computer. The email may advise your details have been compromised and you need to 'reset' a password. NEVER respond and never follow a link to another website. Delete the email and keep track of your accounts. Someone may phone or that Internet pop-up shows up advising you have a virus and they can fix it for you. Chances are you have already been 'hacked' with a virus or some kind of spam. Hang up the phone and disconnect your computer, now contact a trusted friend or a local computer company (you look up) and have your system checked with up-to-date security added. Leaving documents in your car is a big no-no. All that stands between your documents and a thief, is a window or door lock. So never leave personal info in your car.

MAIL THEFT is on the rise. It is being committed across NSW with some parts of Sydney experiencing it more than others. In the Hornsby and Kuring gai areas mail theft is quite low, but it is still occurring. The crooks may target a whole street or suburb, but this is time-consuming for them. With the growing number of high-rise unit blocks popping up, it unfortunately becomes a 'shopping centre' for the crooks. All those mail boxes in such a small space... and remember crooks don't normally have day jobs. They sleep while we work and they 'work' while we sleep.

So to minimise your risk:

- 1. Place a good quality lock on the mailbox. If it is in a unit block, the generic lock is basic and easily breached, so look to upgrade.
- 2. Clear your mail daily.
- 3. Get rid of junk mail. (a postie will not remove your junk mail they will simply put your mail on top).
- 4. Know when important statements and documents are expected and chase this up if it doesn't show up.
- 5. Have your credit and bank cards delivered to the bank and pick them up there (they may not like this, but tough).
- 6. Know when your drivers licence and rego are due. Check if they don't show up.
- 7. If someone is loitering near the mail boxes, watch them to see if they are 'shopping for mail'.
- 8. If someone is seen going to more than one mail box (taking things out, not putting things in) make a note of what they look like and call 000 immediately keep an eye on them and keep updating police of what is going on.

Most importantly report anything suspicious to police or **Crime Stoppers (1800 333 000)** Report all thefts to the **Police Assistance Line 131444.**

Finally, I guess to humanise the issue a bit, here's an example. Your ID is stolen and the crooks change passwords and postal address, which can take 1 to 2 months for you to realise. In the meantime, the crooks have transferred your personal savings off shore (you're not getting that back). They have increased the limit on your credit card and run up a bill until it is 'maxxed' out. They have obtained a new Iphone and plan, bought 'high end' goods like a laptop. Then sold your ID to others, so they can target you next.

Again sorry for the long version but it is that serious and the problem is not going away; it is an emerging trend and it's growing.

A reminder: Hidden Dangers in your Car

"Your car may have the latest safety features, and hasn't missed a single scheduled servicing at the workshop, [but when you go out,] do you consider what is on the back-seat floor? Or in the cargo area? While everyone is buckled in, they're surrounded by a baby pram, water bottles, a mobile phone and bags of groceries, just to name a few items that might go along for the ride." Any of these objects could turn into a deadly projectile.

"There's no doubt that the divider saved my son's life," McCarthy says. "Before I went to that car-seat check, I'd never read a single thing about the dangers of projectiles," she added. From the Hornsby & Upper North Shore Advocate, 29th July: ROAD rage may have been behind a two car crash on the F3 at Mt Colah on Sunday night. Police have been told that objects were thrown by the occupants of at least one of the vehicles towards a second car before one of the drivers rammed the other. One of the vehicles flipped, landing on its roof and trapping a female passenger aged in her 20s. She was later taken to hospital with leg injuries. The other vehicle continued driving to Gordon Police Station. An investigation has been launched into the cause of the crash. Both drivers are expected to be interviewed.

From the Hornsby & Upper North Shore Advocate, 29th July: POLICE will hold a Community BBQ in Brooklyn following frustrations from locals that anti-social behaviour in the once-sleepy town is getting out of control.
