Road closures for ANZAC Dawn Services - Sunday 25th April🙈


Peats Ferry Road between Dural Street and George Street will be closed from 3.30am and re-open at 6.00am for the Dawn Service at the Cenotaph Park (Hornsby Cenotaph), Peats Ferry Road, Hornsby.

Road closures on Old Northern Road, Glenorie will commence at 5:30am and re-open at 7:30am for the Dawn Service at the Wal Buckingham Gardens (Glenorie Cenotaph), Old Northern Road.

Detours will be in place on Old Northern Road between Cairnes Road, and Timarua Street, Glenorie.

What would you do?

Scenario:

It's 11pm on Friday night. You're relaxing at home, listening to some Barry Manilow when you hear loud shouting and music coming from the adjoining park. You look outside and see about 12 youths shouting and consuming alcohol and smoking.

What would you do?

- 1. Would you leave your home, approach them and ask them to quieten down, as they are only young kids?
- 2. Would you shout from your balcony or front garden to tell them to be quiet and move away?
- 3. Would you turn Barry up louder?
- 4. Would you take photographs of them to give to police as evidence of antisocial behaviour in your local park?
- 5. Would you call the police?

Kuring Gai Police Area Command

Ok, some funny and interesting answers here but, although the scenario appears fairly basic, it is a real one often played out in the command. We often attend jobs just like this when we receive calls from frustrated residents who want a little peace and quiet or are sick and tired of the broken bottles, graffiti and bongs left in parks and children's playground areas.

1. Would you leave your home, approach them and ask them to quieten down, as they are only young kids?

ANSWER: Some people may do this. It may work but leaving your home to address them could end up badly for you. If there is the consumption of alcohol and or drugs, any type of response from the group is possible. It is best to call police.

2. Would you shout from your balcony or front garden to tell them to be quiet and move away?

ANSWER: You could shout out at them. They may disperse but, on many occasions, they have turned on the resident by harassing them and threatening them. Best to call police.

3. Would you turn Barry up louder?

ANSWER: This was simply a teaser for a bit of fun – Barry isn't that bad though, is he?

4. Would you take photographs of them to give to police as evidence of antisocial behaviour in your local park?

ANSWER: You could do this but how close are you going to get to obtain sufficient identification? If you were to take photographs of them and give them to attending police, please ensure it is from a distance and you don't use a flash. Best to call police.

5. Would you call the police?

ANSWER: This is what we would prefer. Unfortunately, it we never really know what people are consuming until we arrive at the scene. Their reaction as individuals or as a group could turn violent. You don't know what they are carrying or capable of doing.

Please call police at the time of the behaviour and let us deal with it. Please do not put yourself in harm's way.



15 April, from NSW Police Force

Police are appealing for public assistance following an armed robbery in Sydney's north this morning.

About 4.40am (Thursday 15 April 2021), police were called to a service station on Warringah Road, near Cook Street, Forestville, after reports a man – armed with a knife – entered the store and threatened the attendant.

Police have been told the armed man stole cash, before fleeing on foot. No one was injured during the incident.

Officers from Northern Beaches Police Area Command attended and established a crime scene.

As inquiries continue, police would like to speak to a man who may be able to assist with their inquiries.

He is described as being aged in his 20s or 30s and wearing a face covering. Protect yourself at home

- Never let anyone you don't know and trust inside your home.
- Always secure your homes doors and windows.
- Do not leave valuables, mobile devices or keys (home or vehicle) in clear view.
- Always report suspicious behaviour within your neighbourhood to police.

14 April, from dailytelegraph.com.au: 'Very sorry': Physio's apology on CCTV after alleged breast massage. A physio accused of putting a towel over a patient's eyes before massaging her breasts was captured on CCTV after apologising, a court heard.

A North shore physio who is accused of massaging the breasts of a patient told her he was "sorry" and "embarrassed" in CCTV footage just after the alleged incident but he told the court that the apology had nothing to do with the charges against him.

Ku-ring-gai Police have been working in conjunction with another command and have arrested a male who has now been charged with break and enter offences within our Command and others.

The hard work and diligence of both our teams have paid off with the arrested male being refused bail until at least a court hearing date in the near future. With timely reporting from our community of suspicious behaviour, our chances of catching others like this male increases.

From 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Car Owners:

Tip #6. PARK IN WELL-LIT, HIGH PEDESTRIAN AREAS, PREFERABLY WITH CCTV. AVOID CAR PARKS WITH A HISTORY OF BREAK-INS.

Tip #7. STAY ALERT WHILE APPROACHING YOUR CAR. GET YOUR KEYS OUT OF YOUR BAG READY. DON'T CLICK THE REMOTE CONTROL UNTIL YOU ARE CLOSE TO THE VEHICLE. LOOK AROUND & INSIDE THE CAR

BEFORE GETTING IN.

Tip #10. DON'T LEAVE PERSONAL PAPERS SUCH AS LICENCE OR REGISTRATION IN YOUR VEHICLE. They may be used to dispose of the vehicle. However, do keep with you a note of your vehicle registration & information no. (VIN).

Tip #17. CONSIDER NOT INCLUDING 'HOME' IN YOUR GPS, BUT A NON-EXISTENT ADDRESS NEARBY. If your car is stolen & you have a garage door opener, the thief won't have easy access to your house.

Tip 19. LOCK CAR DOORS WHEN TRAVELLING AT NIGHT. DON'T STOP TO ASSIST A STRANGER WHOSE CAR IS BROKEN DOWN. Instead, help by phoning the Police.

Tip #20. IF YOU LEAVE A KEY WITH A VALET ATTENDANT OR MECHANIC, LEAVE ONLY THE IGNITION KEY.
