# 26 April, from Ku-ring-gai command: Children in car involved in highspeed pursuit - Mooney Mooney

Monday, 26 April 2021 09:43:22 AM

Three children aged five and under have been found in a car being driven by an unlicensed driver involved in a pursuit with police in Sydney's north-west overnight. About 11.20pm on Sunday 25 April 2021, officers from Kuring Gai Highway Patrol were conducting speed enforcement on the M1 motorway, Mooney Mooney, when they detected a Holden Commodore allegedly speeding; a pursuit was initiated when the driver failed to stop when directed. Police will allege the car reached speeds of up to 200km/h during the pursuit in a signposted 110km/h zone along the M1 motorway. A short time later the car stopped after hitting a concrete barrier. Checks revealed the 35-year-old male driver – who held an expired learner permit – was disqualified. A 28-year-old woman, two boys aged seven months and five years, and a three-year-old girl, were passengers in the car. The children were taken to The Children's Hospital at Westmead to be checked as a precaution; the girl has been treated for bruising. The driver was arrested and taken to Hornsby Police Station where he was charged with police pursuit – not stop – drive dangerously, drive motor

vehicle while disqualified, drive with low-range PCA, and speeding. The Tregear man was refused bail to attend Hornsby Local Court today, (Monday 26 April 2021). A child at risk notification has been made by police.

# 26 April, from Ku-ring-gai command: Rider killed following motorcycle crash - Turramurra

Sunday, 25 April 2021 07:56:55 PM

A man has died following a motorcycle crash in Sydney's north today. About 9.10am (Sunday 25 April 2021), a motorcycle was travelling along The Comenarra Parkway at Turramurra, when the rider lost control and crashed into a tree. Emergency services were notified and arrived a short time later. The 30-year-old man was treated at the scene before being taken to Royal North Shore Hospital where he later died. Officers attached to Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command established a crime scene, which has been forensically examined. Police are appealing for anyone who may have witnessed or have dashcam footage of the incident to contact Crime Stoppers. A report will be prepared for the Coroner.

Information is treated in strict confidence. The public is reminded not to report information via NSW Police social media pages.

23 April, from Ku-ring-gai command: This last week there have been several thefts throughout the Command where computers and electrical equipment had been targeted by thieves.

Cabling from most of the equipment had been stolen. This has caused concern throughout the community generating public interest with the media requesting a briefing on the latest updates. Hornsby detectives have been investigating and when asked how the progress of the investigation was progressing, the

Police spokesperson replied, "Unfortunately, at this stage, we don't have any leads".

On a more serious note, please remain vigilant. While we have had some success recently in apprehending some who have broken into homes and stolen property, if you see anyone or anything that appears suspicious to you, please report it immediately or as close to the time of the incident as possible. Timely reporting gives police the best opportunity to find and engage the person and check their bonafides. We would rather attend a false alarm than not be told of an actual offence being carried out. Have a great weekend!

# 23 April, from Ku-ring-gai command: Did you know that shop lifting costs the Australian community over 3 billion dollars each year?


Shop lifting operations are arranged to catch thieves stealing from retail stores. Yesterday plain clothed officers from the Ku-ring-gai PAC conducted an Operation working closely with individual shops and Westfield security. By the end of the operation, four persons were arrested with seven charges preferred, one Criminal Infringement Notice issued and two Youths are to be Cautioned. Two additional persons were identified as being in possession of drugs. Some of the items stolen included containers of clothes washing liquid. Upon further investigation it was found that the offender had been charged for stealing similar items on two previous occasions this year. His 'clean getaway' didn't quite go to plan on this occasion either. During the operation police also

arrested a 20 year old male who was wanted for stealing cigarettes and multiple bottles of alcohol from a local hotel. He has a total of 15 charges for a variety of offences and will appear at Hornsby Local Court today.

### 20 April, from NSW Police: SCAM ALERT!



Did you know? Car owners should secure their vehicles (incl windows) and it is an offence not to.

[Similarly residents should secure their homes; however the consequence is to be uninsured, rather than it being an offence.]

New South Wales Legislation ROAD RULES 2014 - 213 Making a motor vehicle secure

- (1) This rule applies to the driver of a motor vehicle who stops and leaves the vehicle on a road, except so far as the driver is exempt from this rule by an exemption order under rule 213–1 or an exemption under rule 313A(2).
- (2) Before leaving the vehicle, the driver must apply the parking brake effectively or, if weather conditions (for example, snow) would prevent the effective operation of the parking brake, effectively restrain the motor vehicle's movement in another way.
- (3) If the driver will be over 3m from the closest part of the vehicle, the driver must switch off the engine before leaving the vehicle.
- (4) If the driver will be over 3m from the closest part of the vehicle, and—

- (a) there is no-one left in the vehicle, or
- (b) there is only a child or children under 16yrs left in the vehicle, the driver must remove the ignition key before leaving the vehicle.
- (5) If the driver will be over 3m from the closest part of the vehicle and there is no-one left in the vehicle, the driver must—
- (a) if the windows of the vehicle can be secured—secure the windows immediately before leaving the vehicle, and
- (b) if the doors of the vehicle can be locked—lock the doors immediately after leaving the vehicle.
- (6) For the purposes of subrule (5), a window is secure even if it is open by up to 2cm.


24 April, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Did you know that if you are involved in a Minor Traffic Crash where a car has been towed and/or where you


# 24 April, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Are you looking for a super fun and educational activity to do with your kids?

24 April, from North Shore Times: Scam alert: North Shore Police are encouraging residents to be wary of fraudsters after ongoing incidents on online and phone scams in the region.

Here are some of the latest reports:

An 81 year old Lindfield woman was deceived out of thousands of dollars by scammers. The lady received a call from a person posing as an employee of St George Bank who stated that her account had been compromised. The lady was asked to withdraw cash from her account and give it to a man who claimed to be a detective working to catch the computer hackers. A man came to her home address and collected the cash and claimed she would be reimbursed after the investigation.

 purporting to be a business that the victim owes money to, using an email address similar to the business's email. The scammers then provided bank account details for the payment to be transferred to.


22 April, from NSW Central Coast Dashcams: REQUEST FOR DASHCAM

# 22 April, from the Australian Federal Police: Crypto scam alert

Did you know that Australian businesses lose billions from cyber security incidents each year?

Cybercrime is a vastly changing threat to our community, and it is up to us all to stay a step ahead and become aware of the warning signs.

Scams are everywhere online, and cryptocurrency exchanges are no different.

Cryptocurrency or digital currency scamming is an emerging threat with cybercriminals around the world targeting those most vulnerable. The offenders are capturing bank details and other sensitive credentials and then using this information to gain unauthorised access to personal accounts and transfer the money out where it is then received by money mules.

With the ongoing COVID-19 environment, increased use of cryptocurrency has opened up new vulnerabilities for Australians. You can protect yourself from becoming a victim:

 Be sceptical of websites or services promising high returns or unrealistic investment opportunities.

- Only send cryptocurrency to trusted third parties. Search for publicly verifiable reviews or articles involving the website/service.
- Be aware of grammatical errors in communications or on websites.
   Scammers often make grammar or spelling mistakes.

Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it usually is.

## From 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Homes:

**Tip#14:** Consider an audio/video intercom to vet your visitors, or install a peephole, security door-chain or door-bar, and/or a security door. (Flyscreens are not security doors.)

**Tip#19:** Suggest an arrangement with neighbours for when any of you are on vacation, eg for regularly checking your home, clearing the local newspapers, putting out & retrieving garbage bins, clearing mailboxes, parking in driveways/spaces, mowing grass strips, etc. Consider placing old items on the washing line. NEVER advertise your travel plans on social media. Consider re-

directing/holding your mail.

**Tip#20:** Consider promoting a dog on site: a dog water dish, dog lead and warning signs. Consider connecting the sensor lighting to a socket unit that can 'bark' (or 'chirrup') as a warning/deterrent.
