New drone rules start today, allowing you to fly your sub 2kg drone commercially without the need to be certified, saving you both time and money.

Before you take-off, you must complete an online notification form and agree to fly within the standard operating conditions to keep everyone safe. Your drone is your responsibility. Know the rules—fly safe.

Drink driver's big mistake was tailgating NSW Police Assistant Commissioner

JASON Sonter picked the wrong car to tailgate on a Friday afternoon earlier this month.

The 43 year old got close to the rear bumper of the car in front of him while on the M1 Motorway at Cooranbong between Sydney and Newcastle — the driver of the other car was NSW Police Assistant Commissioner Jeff Loy.

Assistant Commissioner Loy, the Northern Region Commander, who was returning to Newcastle decided to pull the man over.

"I thought I should keep an eye on this driver because of the manner of his driving and a bit later decided to pull him over," he told The Daily Telegraph earlier this month.

"While I was talking to him I could smell the alcohol on his breath. I got the highway patrol to send someone."

Sonter was breath-tested at the scene and returned a reading of 0.110, more than twice the legal limit.

At Toronto Local Court yesterday Sonter pleaded guilty to mid range drink driving.

Magistrate Alan Railton ordered Sonter off the road for six months and imposed a 12 month good behaviour bond.

As he left court, Sonter told Channel 9 "how was I to know it was the Assistant Commissioner, it's not like he has got a sign on his car."

Assistant Commissioner Loy estimated he drives 40,000km a year "and if I see someone doing something wrong, I will pull them over."

With school holidays underway, the NSW SES is urging people to be aware of

flood affected areas in their travels and not to drive through floodwater.

Several inland regions in New South Wales have been affected by flooding and there are several roads closed right across the state. With more rain forecast this week, motorists are advised to reconsider travelling to flood affected areas, plan their trip, and stay up to date with www.livetraffic.com or check with their local council on road closure information.

People are being encouraged to avoid holidaying near flood-affected rivers and creeks because these waterways could rise rapidly and put lives at risk.

To prepare for potential flooding, people are also encouraged to move livestock and equipment to higher ground, stock up on sandbags, and stock up on essential supplies such as medications, drinking water and food in case they become isolated.

27 September: Crime Stoppers NSW: DO YOU KNOW THE SIGNS?

There are seven (7) telltale signs that are indicators of drug manufacturing. These are:

- 1. Strange odours emanating from the property
- 2. Diverted electricity
- 3. Chemical containers and waste
- 4. Blacked out windows
- 5. Hoses and pipes in strange places
- 6. Blinds down, with extremely bright indoor lighting radiating through gaps
- 7. Vehicles arriving at odd hours





WATCH EVENT TO BE TOP NOTCH

CRIME-PROOF the family at a Neighbourhood Watch event on Wednesday

October 5, at Ku-ring-gai Town Hall. Neighbourhood Watch has been in the local police command since 1986-87.

There will be \$600 worth of free goodies, lucky door prizes, police car rides, colouring-in, sniffer dog puppies, police dress-ups, numberplate locking screws, engraving, graffiti advice, detectives' tips and fingerprinting.

At morning and afternoon sessions, police will present "punchy" 10-minute talks about crime prevention topics such

as the rise in identity theft and fraud, what to do if your home is broken into, how to report domestic violence and how anyone can assist with regional issues such as graffiti removal

A range of the latest security products

will be shown, with a focus on radio frequency identification technology that is used in credit cards for PayPass.

The morning session will be held between 9.30am and 11.30am, and the afternoon session will be held between 1.30pm and 3.30pm.

THORNLEIGH

A 32-year-old driver heading west on the Comenara Parkway swerved to avoid a cat on the road while negotiating a left bend and ended up hitting a rock wall about 9.55am on Monday. The Holden Commodore's tyres came off the road and its bumper ended up 1.2m up the wall. Police and an ambulance were called and the victim was taken to Roval North Shore Hospital after he returned a negative breath test.

GALSTON

Six cans of Jim Beam were stolen out of a display stand at Liquorland in Galston about 2.45pm on Friday and at 4.40pm the same day, the same pair returned to the store and took four more cans. CCTV footage shows a man aged about 18-22, caucasian with blond hair, about 165cm, wearing a blue hoodie and a NSW CCC cap with a female aged about 18-20, also caucasian, about 160cm, wearing a black coat, white jumper and jeans.

BEROWRA

A 37-year-old man had to be rescued from bushland after he aggravated an old ankle injury and could not continue on the Waratah walking track after he started in Berowra on Saturday. A police helicopter was used to locate the man and he was found by ground crews and taken to Apple Tree Bay, about 5.50pm.

NORMANHURST

Copper was taken from the roof of Normanhurst Boys' High School between 4pm on Friday and 6.30am on Monday, Police are asking witnesses who saw or heard anything suspicious near the school to call Hornsby police on 9476 9799.

TURRAMURRA

A home in May St was burgled between 11pm on Friday and 6.15am Saturday with thieves possibly gaining entry via a faulty garage door. A handbag and keys were stolen. On Sunday about 3.25pm, a glasses case, a single key and a work ID were found in a shopping trolley at a North Rocks shopping centre.

HORNSBY

A shop in Florence St had several cheques and \$2000 cash stolen between 7pm on Friday and 3.30pm on Sunday. An alarm was activated and police are appealing to witnesses to contact Hornsby police on 9476 9799, or Crime Stoppers.

GLENORIE

A neighbour in Dobbie Place frightened off a would-be burglar at 2.30am on Saturday. He woke up and noticed a man with a torch in a neighbouring yard. He put on all the lights and called police. The man fled.

HORNSBY

A 43-year-old woman in David Jones was seen by security lingering near a display stand about 1.30pm on Sunday. It is alleged the female put several wallets and perfumes into a bag and left the store without paying. Security stopped the woman and called police, who arrested her but she refused to be interviewed. The items were returned to David Jones and the woman will face Hornsby Local Court.

BROOKLYN

A 56-year-old woman from Mooney Mooney became irate when trying to pick up a parcel from the Brooklyn post office only to find it was not open. The woman arrived after the 9am opening time. At 9.04am the post office owner started opening the store and the female berated him for being late. He told her to wait outside but she followed him in to the store several times. When the woman requested her parcel she was asked for identification but refused to hand over her driver's licence. Police were called and made a record of the

Yesterday we received a call from a gentleman in Gordon who'd had dealings with a dodgy window-cleaner. After discussions with the local Police Crime Prevention Officer, Snr Cst Paul Cleary, this is the advice given:

Please share your experience with the Fair Trading Traveling Conman Hotline: "If you are approached by conmen call the national hotline on 1300 133 408 (8.30am to 5pm, Mon - Fri)." By doing this, the correct government department is informed and can do the proper investigation. We are protecting the wider community.

Kuring Gai command are also warning about tree-loppers and roofers, or any other tradie who knocks the door, or leaves a flyer:

- Do your own research. Check their licence, insurance, etc. Double-check any phone number. Double-check any other business card details. It's easy at the website here
- Best to take referrals from friends and family, rather than cold-callers.
- Try not to pay cash upfront.
- Beware. Traveling conmen can be very charming and believable.

Once again - watch out for a window-cleaner currently in our Gordon area.
