Approaching vessels head on

Overtaking

Give-way (powered vessels)

Give-way (non-powered vessels)

Speed

Lookout

Safe distance

Obey the signs

12 November, from our neighbouring Ryde command:



10 November, from Queensland Police Service: Not only are drugs illegal, but each could affect your body differently.

Mixing alcohol and drugs can be very dangerous



09 November, from our neighbouring The Hills command: Did you know that It is an offence for people to cross a road within 20m of a crossing?

For those crossing at pedestrian or traffic lights, they can only start walking when the light is green for them to walk. If the light is orange, flashing red, or red, they must not stay on the road for longer than necessary.

More than 10,000 pedestrians were fined for jaywalking across three years during a crackdown between 2013 and 2015. Those who don't obey these rules can be fined \$72 or up to \$2200 if you challenge the offence in court and are unsuccessful. "So far this year over 55 pedestrians have been killed on NSW roads. That's more than 19 per cent of the total road toll in 2016― .



08 November, from Crime Stoppers: INFORMATION FOR SCHOOLIES

Schoolies month runs from 19 November through to 3 December.

This is a time where school leavers will go to certain well known †schoolies†spots to celebrate. With the celebration comes certain risks, and arming yourself with information can be the difference between the experience of a lifetime, and an experience you wish had never happened.

10 Tips to keeping safe and having a good time:

- 1. Don't mix drugs and alcohol
- 2. Drink plenty of water
- 3. Don't drink or take anything offered by a stranger
- 4. If you mix alcohol and energy drinks, you could feel alert yet be intoxicated, so don't drive or go swimming
- 5. Know your limits: check the label as many premixed drinks are more than a standard drink
- 6. Slow down and alternate alcohol with non-alcoholic drinks
- 7. Stay close to people you know and trust and look out for each other
- 8. Call an ambulance if someone needs help. The police won't be called. Just the ambulance service
- 9. Practice safe sex, take condoms with you! Don't put yourself at risk later
- 10. Be on guard for older people who don't belong at schoolies and leave any

place if you sense aggression.

The police can get an interpreter in any language other than English.

This includes Austan.

An interpreter can be used at any time.



You may speak some English. You can still use an interpreter if you want to.



An interpreter will not cost you any money.

You must tell the police officer

- · what language you want to speak
- · all of the different languages you speak
- the dialect you speak
- when you would like to have a female interpreter
- · other special things you need.

08 November, from the Department of Justice NSW: MALE VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE WILL RECEIVE DEDICATED SUPPORT

For the first time in NSW, male victims of domestic and family violence will receive dedicated support.

As part of a NSW Government record investment in domestic and family violence prevention, victims no longer have to shop around to get the services they need, nor will they have to re-tell their story to a multitude of government agencies. From this month, the Men's Referral Service (MRS) pilot will provide a centralised service for all male victims of family violence to connect them with specialist, local support.

The Men's Referral Service has been established as a Local Coordination Point to assess male victims and refer them onto local support services set up in 48 locations throughout the State. In 2015-16, NSW Police identified 3,700 male victims as being at serious threat and referred them to Victims Services for support, as part of the Safer Pathway program.

From Crime Stoppers, November 14: HELP KEEP YOUR FAMILY AND HOME

SAFE (Part 6 of 7)

There are some important things to remember to help keep your family and home safe. Share these posts with your friends and family and discuss these points at home.

AVOID:

• Leaving doors and windows open when you leave the house despite how long you will be absent for.

• Leaving side gates and garden sheds unlocked.

• Hiding keys anywhere outside your home because thieves look in all these places to gain easy access.

• Placing personal details such as your name, address and telephone number on your keys.

• Leaving large amounts of cash inside your home.

• Leaving cars unlocked in the driveway.

• Leaving notes on the door stating that you are away… or when you will be returning.

• Giving personal information to a caller you don't know

• Letting callers know you are home alone.

• Posting to social media that you are on holidays or not at home.

• Check your locks are working properly especially if you live near to the coast as rust may have corroded the inside and make sure you know who has a spare key.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 10 November:

WAHROONGA

A man, 32, was arrested after allegedly breaking into a home at John Hughes Place about 12pm on Wednesday, November 2. The home's owner heard a knock on the door but was in the bath and did not respond. He then heard loud bangs. About an hour later the victim saw a man on a bike in the driveway. The owner had a conversation with the man before he saw a window of his home was smashed. Police reviewed CCTV footage from the home and on Friday November 4 at 10am arrested the man.

HORNSBY

Four shirts worth \$70 were stolen between 3.20pm and 3.30pm on Tuesday from JJ's at Hornsby Westfield. CCTV footage shows two girls aged about 15 in school uniforms taking the clothes. On the same day about the same time three boys aged about 14 were also seen on CCTV stealing three T-shirts from the City Beach store in Westfield.

WARRAWEE / WAITARA

Storage cages and letterboxes were broken into at a unit complex on the Pacific Highway between 2am and 3am on Monday, CCTV footage shows two men in a Toyota Rav 4 breaking into letterboxes at the complex before finding a remote for the garage at the complex in one of the boxes. Once in the garage the duo used bolt cutters to get into a number of cages and steal items. Letterboxes and storage cages in the Waitara area continue to be broken into recently. A unit complex in Cherry St and apartment blocks around Romsey St and the Pacific Highway have been hit. Hornsby police have urged residents to clear their mail daily and recommended using a three point lock on the top, bottom and middle of any storage cage or letterbox.

WAHROONGA

A man, 40, was charged with mid-range drink driving about 1.20am on Saturday after he was stopped for a Random breath test on the Pacific Highway. He allegedly blew .105 and had his licence suspended on the spot.

HORNSBY HEIGHTS

A 12-year-old boy was approached by a man in a van about 5.10pm on Saturday at Galston Rd near Evans Rd. The boy had left the Hornsby Relay for Life in Rofe Park with another boy but was on his own when a silver van with tinted windows and three rainbow stickers on the back window stopped. A man, described as aged 30 to 40, bald, of Middle Eastern appearance, wearing a bandana told him to 'get in the car'. The boy ran and told his mother who called police. The area was patrolled but the van was not found. Hornsby Police said informing them promptly is important so they can catch any suspects.

GALSTON Gorge will close for maintenance of the bridge over Berowra Creek on Monday, November 21 and Monday, November 28 from 9pm to 5am, weather permitting.

There will also be eight day shifts of work, where it will remain open, between Monday, November 21 and Thursday December 22, weather permitting.

If RMS is unable to carry out the road closure on the Monday nights they will close the road on Tuesdays.

Temporary Road Closure

Council has approved the temporary closure of Henry Street, Gordon between Cecil Street and Ravenswood Avenue from 4pm on Friday 18 November to 9pm on Saturday 19 November. LINDFIELD


From Hornsby Shire Council: Emergency Works on Berowra Waters Road

CRASH card spreading throughout the state [edited]

The roll-out of the motorcycle CRASH Card has been highly successful, with the first 10,000 already being distributed. The CRASH Card is available to anyone, not just residents of Hornsby Council. **Another 39,000 cards have now been printed**, with significant improvements based on feedback from riders and medical professionals. The updated card is now smaller in size, with a plastic sleeve to protect it from moisture, while riders are asked if they are a registered organ donor.
