29 December, Australian Federal Police

We hope you received a ton of presents from Santa this year.

While most of Australia was celebrating Christmas with their loved ones, we were working together with our partners from NSW Police Force and Australian Border Force to ensure more than a tonne of cocaine didn't make it to our streets.

Along with our domestic and international partners, we seized 500kgs of cocaine from a fishing vessel in NSW, and a further 600 kilograms of cocaine, destined for Australia, in Tahiti.

Fifteen men were charged this week in relation to their alleged involvement in the Australian criminal syndicate responsible for the attempted importations.

This investigation was two-and-a-half years in the making, and culminated over this holiday period. A massive thanks to all the investigators involved for sacrificing precious time with their families this Christmas to keep Australia safe.

It is a SIT file (Special Information Tones) with a tone that suggests the call has failed. The idea is to trick the spammer robot into thinking your phone number is no good.



31 December: NSW Police force



Police have renewed their appeal to the public to identify a man who may be able to assist with inquiries into a child assault at Wolli Creek last month, with a maximum reward of up to \$1000 for anyone who can assist with the incident.

About 9.20pm on Friday 4 November 2016, a woman and her 12-year-old daughter were preparing to alight from a city-bound train as it approached Wolli Creek Railway Station.

Police have been told that a man, described as being in his mid to late 30's and with a dark complexion, reached under the skirt of the child and grabbed her on the buttocks.

The woman got off the train and immediately alerted police who were nearby; however, they were unable to locate the man.

Investigators from St George Local Area Command have continued with their investigation and have released an image of a man they believe may be able to

assist.

The man was seen to leave the train at Granville Railway Station shortly after the incident.

He is described as having a dark complexion, black, short hair and a large build.

At the time of the incident he was wearing a red polo shirt.

Police have urged anyone with information about the man to come forward immediately and contact police. A reward of up to \$1000 is payable for information which leads to an arrest.

28 December, From Sydney Morning Herald: Gun owners' addresses revealed in simple privacy blunder

Dozens of home addresses of gun owners have been easily obtained in a simple privacy blunder that a veteran police officer fears may be utilised by thieves.

The treasure trove of addresses has been discovered by simple online searches of publicly available information. .

It has prompted a warning from NSW Police's Firearms Squad to "use common sense when providing personal details in conjunction with information about firearms".

A gun owner and veteran police officer, who did not want to be identified, alerted researchers to his findings and a list of about 30 home addresses was passed on to law enforcement to show how much information gun owners were unwittingly revealing.

VEHICLE SAFETY

Redfern Local Area Command are asking everyone to be vigilant about removing property, particularly valuables(GPS, phones, handbags, cash, Ipads, keys, cameras etc), from their vehicle at all times. Please ensure your vehicle is always locked when unattended. This is crucial in preventing crime (theft) and potential damage to your vehicle.

PLEASE also ensure that children are not left unattended in a vehicle at any time. Remember that the temperature in vehicles can be far higher than external temperatures, a warm reminder to keep highdrated.
