- NEVER give out your personal information online. This includes your name, address, what school you go to, your phone number, and never send a picture of yourself over the internet.
- NEVER write to someone who has made you feel uncomfortable or scared
- NEVER meet someone or have them visit you without permission from your parents.
- TELL your parents right away if you read anything on the internet that makes you feel uncomfortable.
- REMEMBER that people online may not be who they say they are.
 Someone who says that they are a 12 year old boy or girl who wants to be your friend, may in fact be someone much more dangerous.


04 January, from Daily Telegraph: Transport ban proposal looms for train perverts

From Crime Stoppers: UNSOLVED CASE...

It has been 35 years since **Lynette Joy Dawson**, a 33-year-old mother-of-two went missing on or around 9th January 1982. A \$200,000 reward remains in place for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for the disappearance and presumed murder of Lynette Dawson. While at home with her husband on the evening of Friday 8 January 1982, Lynette Dawson phoned her mother. After chatting for a while, mother and daughter agreed to meet for lunch at Northbridge Baths the following day (9 January 1982). However, Lynette never arrived.

From 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Personal Safety':

Tip#1. LIMIT WHAT YOU CARRY WITH YOU. If you carry a bag, keep it close to your body and keep a firm grip. Carry any wallet in your front pocket. If someone does attempt to take your property, do not resist. Throw it away from you. **Tip#2.** WHEN RETURNING TO YOUR CAR, HAVE KEYS IN HAND AND READY TO USE. Ask a friend to walk with you. Be aware of people in surrounding cars. **Tip#3.** WHEN OUT, STAY ALERT, KEEP YOUR MIND ON YOUR SURROUNDINGS, AND BE AWARE OF WHAT IS HAPPENING AROUND YOU AT ALL TIMES. Don't be distracted. If listening to music, remove one ear bud, or set volume to very low.

Tip#4. WHEN TRAVELING ON A TRAIN, SIT NEAR THE GUARD'S COMPARTMENT. Try not to fall asleep. When traveling on a bus, sit near the driver. When taking a taxi, before getting in, verify the authority card photo matches the taxi driver.

Tip#5. IF YOU FEEL UNCOMFORTABLE WITH A FELLOW PASSENGER ON A TRAIN, IMMEDIATELY LEAVE THE COMPARTMENT. Select a different compartment.

Tip#6. IMPROVE YOUR HOME'S SECURITY BY ARRANGING A 'SAFETY AUDIT' BY YOUR CRIME PREVENTION OFFICER. They can identify changes to make you feel safer.
