20 January, from the NRMA Blog: Have you ever needed to drive an unregistered vehicle? Here's what you should know.

When can you drive an unregistered vehicle legally?

It's important to have your <u>registration</u> renewal organised before it expires if you intend on driving a vehicle. If you're caught driving an unregistered vehicle, you may be fined, and police may remove the number plates on the spot. Police may also seize the vehicle. With this said there are some instances in NSW when you can drive an unregistered vehicle legally but only provided that the vehicle is safe for use on the road. 19 January: Police are investigating the circumstances surrounding a multivehicle crash in Cowan.

Shortly before 10pm (Wednesday 18 January 2017), police and emergency services were called to the northbound lane, south of the Hawkesbury River Bridge, M1 Motorway, following reports of a multiple-vehicle collision. It is believed seven vehicles have collided. Eight persons have been injured. One person is in a critical condition and a number of children have been taken to Hospital as a precaution. The cause of the crash is yet to be determined.

M1 northbound is currently closed and cars are being diverted to the Old Pacific Highway, Berowra. For the latest traffic information, visit www.live.traffic.com or call 132 701.

Officers from the Crash Investigation Unit attended and are currently investigating the circumstances surrounding the crash. Police are urging anyone with information in relation to the crash to contact police via **Crime Stoppers**.

18 January, from the Hornsby Advocate: It's everyone's worst nightmare and it all happened so quickly. This is how easily internet criminals used a mobile phone number, email address and Facebook to access Eryn Ford's bank account.

THE relative ease with which criminals were able to hack into his wife's phone and then steal her identity has turned Brad Ford into a campaigner to prevent this happening to others. The ID theft has since forced Mr Ford and his wife Eryn, of Stanhope Gardens, to apply for new passports, drivers licences, close their bank accounts and change virtually anything which could identify themselves. Upon impact passenger frontal airbags are deployed from inside the dashboard so if your feet are up at the height of the dash your legs will be pushed upward rather than keeping your legs and lower body secured in a seated position.

Saturday 21 January, NSW Police Media Release: Inquiries are continuing after four men forced their way into a home in Sydney's north overnight.

Just before 9.30pm (Friday 20 January 2017), emergency services were called to a home on Edwards Road, Wahroonga, following reports of a home invasion. On arrival, police were told a resident had been assaulted by four armed men. It is believed the men were armed with baseball bats and a metal bar. The men stole property before fleeing in a vehicle. Officers from Kuring Gai Local Area Command attended and established a crime scene. The occupant, a 19-year-old man was treated by NSW Ambulance Paramedics for a laceration to his head before being taken to Hornsby Hospital

From ASIC Connect, January 19: NEW SCAM ALERT: We're warning our customers about a new scam email that contains an unauthorised link to a renewal letter.

This scam is different to the one identified in December. The email is titled 'Renewal' and informs customers that they need to renew their registration. The renewal letter has not been issued by ASIC. If you receive this fraudulent email, please delete it. Do not click on the link to the renewal letter.

Here's how to tell the difference between an ASIC email and this scam email:

- 1. The scam email refers to a company
- 2. The scam email does not contain Dear XXXX
- 3. The URL displayed when you hover over the Renewal Link is also not an ASIC URL.

From NSW Fair Trading: Multiple pricing

Multiple pricing occurs when a supplier displays more than one price for the same item or service. If a supplier displays the same item with more than one price then they must sell it for the lowest displayed price or withdraw the item until the price is corrected.

A price published in a catalogue or advertisement is a displayed price. If mistakes in catalogues or advertisements have occurred, they can be fixed by publishing a retraction in a publication with a similar circulation to the original advertisement.

MORE THAN 100 WARNING SIGNS INSTALLED

ROADS and Maritime Services installed more than 100 curve and speed warning signs throughout Galston Gorge as well as a vehicle activated sign alerting drivers to their speed from September to December last year.

Following community concerns, Minister for Roads Duncan Gay said Galston Rd "between Calderwood Rd, Galston, and Somerville Rd, Hornsby Heights".

"A whicks activated size was also

"A vehicle-activated sign was also installed in December to provide an ever higher level of warning to motorists navigating the curve around 100m west of Montview Pde." Mr Gay said. This sign is activated by passing motorists advising them to slow down on approach to the bend.

"Additional signage was also installed notifying drivers of the length restrictions through Galson Gorge to reduce the number of over-

SAFETY measures including a red light and camera as well as a safety barrier were promised after a tragic year on Galston Rd, but nearly 12 months later, nothing has been done. Full story in the Advocate page 5.

GALSTON A 25-year-old man was arrested and will face drug charges after police cars and the police air unit converged on a house in Bevans Rd. Police received information that the occupants of a car may have had a weapon. Ground crews intercepted the Mazda CX5 about 10.40pm last Friday, and searched the car and its three male occupants. They allegedly found 3g of cannabis in the driver's shorts and a knife under the driver's seat. All three men declined to make statements. A 25-year-old West Pennant Hills man will appear in Hornsby Local Court on a date to be set.

TURRAMURRA Police and security officers responding to alarms arrived at Turramurra High School on Monday, about 10pm, to find a small bonfire alight and two doors open. At least six males were seen running off into the bush. Police used extinguishers to put out the fire in a concrete quadrangle. A police spokesman said nothing appeared to have been stolen. The police dog squad was called in but police were unable to locate the firebugs.

WAHROONGA The windscreen of a parked car was smashed on the Pacific Highway between 7pm on Saturday and 10am on Sunday. Police said nothing appeared to have been stolen from the blue Mazda sedan and are treating the incident as malicious damage estimated at \$1000.

HORNSBY Expensive designer sunglasses were stolen from a car in Summers

Ave on Saturday between 12.20pm and 2pm. Police said the Zegna prescription sunglasses, worth about \$1000, were stolen from a BMW coupe.

WAITARA A motorcycle was stolen from a block of units in Park Ave, despite being chained to a concrete pillar. Police said the greenand-black Kawasaki street bike was taken between 6am last Friday and 1pm on Saturday. They were unsure exactly how the theft was committed.

ASQUITH Copper piping, worth about \$900, was stolen from a building site on the Pacific Highway. Police said the copper had been cut from a ceiling in a basement carpark between 6pm on Monday and 7am on Tuesday. They said copper theft was more prevalent in times of high prices and this was the first theft of its kind for some time.

THORNLEIGH Clothing and a scooter, worth about \$570, were stolen from a business in Central Ave between 7-9am on Tuesday. Police said the stolen items had been stored under a stairwell at the premises.

HORNSBY A 23-year-old woman is expected to face charges of possessing stolen property after police responded to reports she was verbally abusing a man at Westfield about 9pm on Monday. Police said the woman and a 49-year-old man both appeared to be intoxicated or drug-affected. They searched the woman and allegedly seized a number of stolen items of clothing.

HORNSBY HEIGHTS A cyclist was injured when he ran into the door of a parked car being opened in Somerville Rd last Saturday, just after 8am. The 53-year-old man was thrown off his bike on to the road. Four other cyclists with the man avoided the Mazda 3, driven by a 60-yearold woman. The man was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital for precautionary checks. Police have reminded drivers to fully look back over their shoulders, as well as check their rear-view mirror, before opening doors. They have also asked cyclists to double-check if there were any occupants inside parked cars as they rode by.

THORNLEIGH Two men were taken to Royal North Shore Hospital for treatment after a fight at a property in Thornleigh St, with one man continuing to be aggressive towards police and hospital staff. Police said a 47-year-old man, who appeared to be severely intoxicated, uttered profanities to them, resisted arrest, acted aggressively and was handcuffed and eventually sedated at the hospital. He

suffered scrapes and abrasions. A 43-year-old man also suffered scrapes and abrasions to his arms and legs and a laceration to the back of his head in the incident, which happened about 12.25am yesterday. Police were waiting to formally interview both men and talk to any witnesses.

From the North Shore Times 19 January:

GORDON A shop on Pacific Highway was broken into some time between 10.30pm on Monday and 7am on Tuesday. The ground-floor front door was smashed and cash totalling \$200 was stolen. Malicious damage to the window was set to cost \$2000. Anyone with information is urged to call **Hornsby Police Station 9476 9799**.

ST IVES A 13-year-old boy was robbed of \$170 at St Ives Skate Park last week, as he waited for his friend to return to the park with McDonalds. While he waited alone just before 4pm on Thursday, the boy was approached by a man who allegedly asked to see the boy's wallet. In a report to police, the boy then said when he refused the alleged offender patted him down and grabbed his wallet, stealing the \$170 inside and throwing the wallet on the ground. The offender than allegedly ran in the direction of Collins Rd. When his friend returned, the 13-year-old called his parents who later took him to Gordon Police Station. The man is believed to be around 17 years old, 175cm tall and was wearing a cream jumper and tan pants.

From 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Personal Safety':

Tip#13. DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR TO STRANGERS! If they require your help in an emergency, offer to phone on their behalf.

Tip#14. WALK IN WELL-LIT REGULARLY TRAVELED WALKS AND PATHWAYS AREAS. [Report a street light fault—Ausgrid 1800 044 808.] If followed, cross the street, crossing back and forth if necessary. If pursued, DO ANYTHING to attract attention—scream, pull a fire alarm, flag down a passing motorist, etc. Carry a personal alarm. Stay calm and in control.

Tip#15. IF WALKING, USE, OR PRETEND TO USE, YOUR MOBILE PHONE. Consider using an App such as Companion, Follow Me, Circle of 6, SafeZone, MyWitness, Get Home Safe (GHS), etc. DOWNLOAD THE Emergency+ App NOW!

Tip#16. WHEN CROSSING THE ROAD & AT INTERSECTIONS, NEVER ASSUME AN APPROACHING DRIVER CAN SEE YOU. Get eye contact. Pedestrian crossings don't give you protection.

Tip#17. IN A LIFT, STAND NEXT TO THE LIFT CONTROLS/EMERGENCY ALARM OR HELP BUTTON AND FACE THOSE JOINING YOU. Be prepared to exit.

From Hornsby Shire Council: National child restraint laws

- Children up to the age of six months must be secured in an approved rearward facing restraint
- Children aged from six months old but under four years old must be secured in either a rear or forward facing approved child restraint with an inbuilt harness
- Children under four years old cannot travel in the front seat of a vehicle with two or more rows
- Children aged from four years old but under seven years old must be secured in a forward facing approved child restraint with an inbuilt harness or an approved booster seat
- Children aged from four years old but under seven years old cannot travel in the front seat of a vehicle with two or more rows, unless all other back seats are occupied by children younger than seven years in an approved child restraint or booster seat
- Children aged from seven years old but under 16 years old who are too small to be restrained by a seatbelt properly adjusted and fastened are strongly recommended to use an approved booster seat
- Children in booster seats must be restrained by a suitable lap and sash type approved seatbelt that is properly adjusted and fastened, or by a suitable approved child safety harness that is properly adjusted and fastened.
- If your child is too small for the child restraint specified for their age, they should be kept in their current child restraint until it is safe for them to move to the next level.
- If your child is too large for the child restraint specified for their age, they

may move to the next level of child restraint.

From Ku-ring-gai Council: New boat trailer parking laws set to be enforced in Ku-ring-gai

Trailers and boats could be impounded under laws seeking to discourage longterm street parking

New laws are set to come into effect from 1 February 2017 in an effort to reduce the number of boat trailers parked on local streets. The new rules were adopted by the Council in the wake of changes to boat parking legislation introduced by the NSW Government last year. The new rules will apply across the Ku-ring-gai local government area and aim to ensure that owners regularly move boats parked on trailers and the trailers are in a satisfactory state of roadworthiness.

From 1 February boats will need to be moved every 28 days at least as far as a different block section of the same street.
