01 February, from the Hornsby Advocate: Hornsby Police news for February 2017 includes drink driving and stealing cases [edited]

Hornsby police were called to an unusual break and enter case this week where the victim met the alleged offender wearing her clothes. In another case a high range drink driver allegedly said "drinking helps".

Westleigh: A police helicopter was called to Westleigh in pursuit of a driver and passengers who fled from a car that smashed into a powerpole at high speed on Sunday afternoon. A VW Golf was seen driving at high speed about 12.10pm outside a home in Yarrabung Ave before it hit a parked Honda CRV, forcing it on to the driveway of a nearby home. The VW Golf failed to stop and allegedly continued at speed before turning into Larool Cres where it lost control and hit a powerpole. The car then did a U-turn and was eventually dumped in the middle of a road in The Sanctuary at Westleigh where three occupants were seen to flee the car. Police found the car with the key still in the ignition and searched the area with help from the Pol. Air 2 helicopter. The car was seized for forensic examination and the car's registered owner will be interviewed.

Wahroonga: A 62-year-old man who allegedly told police "drinking helps" was charged with high range on Tuesday night. About 6.50pm Hornsby police were called by an off-duty firefighter who had allegedly seen the man drinking wine while

driving a Toyota Hilux that was mounting median strips on Millewa Ave. The firefighter allegedly followed the ute on to the Pacific Hwy at Wahroonga and managed to get the ute to stop and removed the keys from the driver. At 7pm police spoke to the driver who allegedly admitted to drinking wine while driving. He blew .221 at Hornsby police station and in relation to his drinking allegedly said: "I'm in a bad place and drinking helps me". His licence was suspended and he will face court at a future date.

Thornleigh: Cash was stolen from the register at a discount chemist by a criminal duo who distracted staff and broke into the till on Saturday about 12.40pm. A woman described as of Aboriginal appearance about 40-50 with dark hair wearing a black and white striped shirt asked staff about tablets while a man broke into the till. The man was described as caucasian, 25 — 30, solid build, wearing a black cap, cream shirt and cargo shorts. Inquiries continue.

Galston: A 36-year-old woman was charged with stealing from a car and break and enter offences after she allegedly spent Monday afternoon eating and drinking at a house that was not her own. Personal documents were stolen from a car on Crosslands Rd in Galston, which were allegedly found on the 36-year-old when she was arrested on Monday. The woman allegedly drove her car into the driveway of the Galston Rd home, entered via the backdoor and rummaged through several rooms in the house. She then allegedly showered, dressed herself in clothing belonging to the owner, ate, drank wine, and took a slice of birthday cake from the fridge. About 6pm the victim arrived home. Police allege they found the woman laying on the lounge using a pillow and a blanket listening to music through earphones.

01 February, from Cabramatta command: With the use of Drones becoming more popular, Cabramatta Police are reminding residents of their responsibilities should they wish to fly drones in the local area.

Most important is that a fair portion of the Cabramatta area is directly under the flight path for Bankstown airport which means extreme caution must be taken NOT to exceed 120 metres/400 feet above ground level. Some areas of Cabramatta and especially Lansvale fall within the 5.5km radius limit of Bankstown airport which makes privately flying any drones illegal within these areas. Drones must also not be flown within 30 metres of people such as beaches, parks or sporting ovals when there is a game in progress. People who don't comply with these rules face fines of up to \$9000

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

You must only fly during the day and keep your RPA within visual line-of-sight.

This means being able to see the aircraft with your own eyes (rather than through first-person-view [FPV]) at all times.





If you are in controlled airspace, which covers most Australian cities, you must not fly higher than 120 metres.

You must keep your RPA at least 30 metres away from other people.





You must **not fly over populous areas** where—if your drone was to fail—it could hit someone. This could include beaches, parks, or sport ovals where there is a game in progress.

You should not fly within 5.5km of an airfield





It is illegal to fly for money or economic reward unless you have an RPA operators certificate, or you are flying an excluded RPA in the sub-2kg or private landholder category.



Remember, you must not operate your RPA in a way that creates a hazard to another aircraft, person or property.

Respect personal privacy Don't record or photograph people without their consent —this may breach state laws.

affect either vehicle A or C.

From Crime Stoppers, February 02: Dating Abuse...

Teens and young adults can experience the same types of abuse as adults in relationships, including:

• Physical Abuse: Any intentional use of physical force with the intent to cause fear

or injury like hitting, shoving, biting, strangling, kicking or using a weapon.

- Verbal or Emotional Abuse: Non-physical behaviours such as threats, insults, constant monitoring, humiliation, intimidation, isolation or stalking.
- Sexual Abuse: Any action that impacts a person's ability to control their sexual activity or the circumstances in which sexual activity occurs including rape, coercion or restricting access to birth control.
- Digital Abuse: Use of technologies and/or social media networking to intimidate, harass or threaten a current or ex-dating partner such as demanding passwords, checking cell phones, cyberbullying, non-consensual sexting, excessive or threatening text or stalking on social media.

If you are a victim of dating abuse visit your local police station or call the **Police Assistance Line on 131444 (24/7)**. Always call **Triple Zero (000)** in an emergency. If you know about Domestic Violence happening to someone else stand up and speak out as the final piece of the puzzle in addressing this crime. There are no innocent bystanders. Shared by the AFP: Everyone's heard of Crime Stoppers (if you haven't, where have you been??) but do you know what it is and what it's for?

Crime Stoppers is your one-stop-shop for reporting information that may help stop, solve or prevent suspicious or criminal activity in the community. You will never be asked to identify yourself, and there is no equipment in Crime Stoppers that records voices or traces phone numbers. Anonymity is guaranteed. Also, when you call, you'll be given a code number that allows you to claim a reward, if there is one, once an arrest has been made. The number to call? – **1800 333 000**. Save it in your phone in case you need it one day.

But don't forget, if it's an emergency, call **Triple Zero (000)** instead.

From Penrith command: There appears to be confusion over the 'Keep left unless overtaking" rule.

You must not drive in the right lane on a multi-laned road where the speed limit is OVER 80km/h OR there are signs "Keep Left Unless Overtaking".

The two most often confused aspects:

1. It is permissible to drive in the middle lane of a three lane road while not

overtaking.

2. The rule does not apply to 80km/h areas (unless sign posted).

From Berowra Waters Rural Fire Brigade: Throwing lit cigarette butts from cars and trucks is dangerous.

Cigarettes can start bush and grass fires, and place lives at risk. It's also bad for the environment. If you see a vehicle where a lit cigarette butt has been improperly disposed, you can report the vehicle to the NSW RFS simply by filling out the details on their Report a cigarette butt tosser page. It answers all your questions, such as:

How can I report a cigarette butt 'tosser'?

If you see a vehicle where a lit cigarette butt has been improperly disposed, you can report the vehicle to the NSW RFS simply by filling out the details below. Some of the information we will need includes location, date & time, vehicle registration plate details and description of the vehicle. We will also need your contact details as anonymous reports are not accepted. Alternatively you can call **1800 679 737** and leave a message and an officer will make contact.

If the cigarette butt isn't lit, the person may still be subject to action for littering. You can make a littering complaint through the <u>Environment Protection Authority</u>.

New laws regarding boat trailers across Ku-ring-gai came into effect yesterday (Wednesday). The new rules will apply across the Ku-ring-gai local government area and aim to ensure that owners regularly move boats parked on trailers. From February 1 boats need to be moved every 28 days at least as far as a different block section of the same street. Top coach backs safety-latch alarm for pool gates

IT'S the simple device that could save young lives. Australian inventors have created a swimming pool latch fitted with an alarm for when a safety gate is opened. Swim coach Laurie Lawrence is backing the device and said while nothing replaced adult supervision, it added extra protection. "Whenever you open the gate it beeps," he said. "Straight away you know the gate has been propped open or the latch has had it." Lawrence said someone contacted him to suggest an alarm would be a good idea and he in turn contacted D&D Technologies, which created the **MagnaLatch**.
