
16 February: Hello all, Ku-ring-gai LAC has had a few community events called Coffee with a COP.

### 15 February, from Crime Stoppers: "SEXTING" – Implications for young people

#### What is 'sexting'?

- \* Taking naked or partly naked photos or videos of yourself (posing in a sexual way) and sharing the photos or videos with others online or through your mobile phones; and
- \* Receiving, forwarding or posting these photos or videos online or through mobile phones. Sexting can be a crime, depending on the age of the people sexting and whether the pictures would be considered 'offensive' or 'indecent' by a court. It is a crime if you make, send out, or have an 'offensive' picture of someone under the age of 18 (including yourself) who is:
- \* showing their private parts, which includes a person's genital area, anal area or female breasts;
- \* posing or acting in a sexual way; in the presence of another person involved in a sexual activity or pose; or \* involved in a sexual activity.

The law calls these images 'child abuse material', or more commonly, child pornography. Child abuse material can include films, photos, digital images and videos sent by SMS, email, in chat rooms or published on blogs. It can even include pictures that have been photo-shopped to make a young person look naked, or cartoons of young people having sex. The maximum penalty for making, sending or having child abuse material is 15 years in gaol. Anyone who sends, receives or even asks for a naked or sexual image of a person who is or appears to be under the age of 18 is at risk of committing a crime and of being charged. If you are found guilty of a sexting crime, you may be placed on the Australian National Child Offender Register. Some of the restrictions for people on the register include telling the police every time you move houses or change jobs. If registered, you will not be able work or volunteer in a job where you are likely to have contact with children and young people such as coaching a junior sporting team or becoming a surf lifesaver.

It is important to protect yourself by deleting any pictures you are unsure or uncomfortable about straightaway. It is really difficult to keep images private and once they are shared, you will never be able to delete those pictures forever. Never share it online or through SMS, and only show it to a trusted adult.

### 15 February: Here's a couple of reminders about the need to securely lock your doors, especially in the hot weather.

here is the owner informed attending police the family car was also unlocked in the driveway. So please regardless of how hot it gets unless you have a proper security rated screen door don't leave your normal timber door open to cool your house. Thieves are out and about even in hot weather. They seek out opportunities and have a good eye for the easy target, don't let that target be your family home.

Your home security CCTV system could hold the information, Police need to solve a crime. Registration is purely voluntary and your details will be secure.

#### From 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Apartment Security':

**Tip #1:** Only 'buzz in' those people you know., even if they seem trustworthy. Ensure the door shuts behind you.

**Tip #2:** Be aware of wi-fi security, and items such as baby monitors. Password protect your wi-fi, router, computer, laptops, mobiles, everything!

**Tip #3:** Secure your storage cage with a good padlock. Triple hinge the cage, with triple locking points. Have a qualified trades person inspect it and advise how best to improve the security.

**Tip #4:** Clear your mailbox daily. If you are away, ask a neighbour to assist. Or put a hold on your mail at the Post Office.

- \* Debt Bondage
- \* Forced marriage
- \* Organ harvesting

Australia is primarily a country for people trafficked from Asia, particularly Thailand, Korea, the Philippines and Malaysia. Human trafficking is the physical movement of people across and within borders through deceptive means, by force or coercion. It should not be confused with "people smuggling".




#### From NSW Fair Trading: WELCOME TO A NEW ERA IN STRATA

## Heavy-vehicle network map misleading drivers [page 11] Galston Rd 'approved' for trucks [edited]

TRUCK drivers who use the State Government's Oversize Overmass Load Carrying Vehicles Network map to navigate Sydney roads are being sent down the Galston Gorge. Roads and Maritime Services provides a detailed route-planning system for oversize-vehicle drivers for all NSW roads. However the system, which can be found on the RMS website, states that Galston Rd, Galston Gorge, is a "NSW Oversize Overmass Load Carrying Vehicles Network Approved Route".
