April 10: Hornsby Police news, 10/4/2017 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: Middle range drink driving

Time/Date: About 1.45am Saturday 18th

Place: Burns Road, Wahroonga

Vehicle 1: Nissan

Person: 23 year old male

Details: A marked police vehicle travelling along Eastern Road has seen a Nissan stopped in the break down lane. The driver has looked at the police vehicle driving

past before driving off. Police have turned around and were now following the Nissan which again stopped in the break down lane of Burns Road. Police have stopped and spoken to the driver, who was now talking on his mobile (engine running). Police gave the driver a roadside breath test which was allegedly positive for alcohol; a subsequent breath analysis returned a reading of .147. The driver had his licence suspended by police and was charged.

Court: The male is to appear at Hornsby Local Court at a date yet to be set.

Incident: Stealing, arrest.

Time/Date: About 10.25am Friday 8th

Place: Hornsby Mall

Person 1: 18 year old male

Details: A lady (victim) and her husband were at the Java Lava Cafe about 10.15am. The victim has placed her handbag on the ground beside her while she talked. A male has then stood next to her, snatching the handbag, before running off along the mall. A number of males have seen this unfold and gave chase heading down Hunter lane towards the library. The posy of good Samaritans has tackled the alleged thief placing him under 'citizen's arrest'. The victim has now caught up and retrieved her handbag allegedly still being held by the male. Police have attended and arrested the male. The male refused to be interviewed and was charged.

Court: The male was charged and refused bail; he is to appear at the Hornsby local Court in late May.

This shows great intervention by members of the public who jumped the aid of someone else, good community spirit here.

Incident: Break, enter & steal

Time/Date: Between 9am and 1.30pm Friday 7th

Place: Rosedale Road, St Ives.

Details: A home in Rosedale Road was broken into via a ground floor side window; a number of rooms were ransacked by the intruders. A small amount of jewellery was taken.

Incident: Stolen lolly machine.

Time/Date: Between 3pm Saturday 8th and 8am Sunday 9th

Place: Shop in Westleigh Shopping village.

Details: A lolly vending machine was stolen from the front of a business in Westleigh. The machine had an unknown amount of lollies and coins inside. A sweet tooth perhaps!

Incident: Stealing incident

Time/Date: About 2am Sunday 9th Place: Myra Street, Wahroonga

Person 1: Described as Caucasian, male, 20s, medium height, baseball cap and

no shirt.

Details: A resident heard some noises out the front of their house and opened the front door to investigate. At this point the resident saw the male (above) running off up the street. A quick check showed 4 pairs of shoes had been stolen from the front porch. It seems the thief made good their escape doing a 'runner'.

Incident: Fire

Time/Date: Between 6pm Saturday 1st and 4pm Sunday 2nd

Place: Canoon Road Netball courts, Turramurra.

Details: An 'OTTO' bin was moved onto the netball courts and filled with rubbish. The bin was then set on fire causing an estimated \$5,000 damage to the playing

surface.

Incident: Backpack stolen

Time/Date: Between 6.30pm and 8.30pm Thursday 6th

Place: Headon Park, Thornleigh.

Details: A male training for sports at the park has placed his backpack on the sideline. At some point it was stolen, the backpack contained a mobile phone, wallet and numerous credit and debit cards. It appears a credit card had been used 3 times soon after the theft.

Lastly in the past few weeks a number of unit blocks have had letter boxes opened either by a master key or by not being locked. Letters including credit card details have been taken. Mail theft from letter boxes is increasing in frequency all over Sydney. Mail theft and the associated fraud from stolen ID or cards have wide ranging implication for victims and all bank users. The victims have to re-establish their credit rating. The banks may reimburse the victims but these costs are passed onto other users.

Warning, **CLEAR YOUR MAIL BOX DAILY**.

Also consider upgrading your letter box lock to a more secure type.

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above

incidents to contact Hornsby police on 9476 9799, or phone Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 to report any information relating to the matter anonymously. END







From the Hornsby Advocate April 05: Hornsby police called to a cliff fall, car crashes, break-ins, thefts and other crime in the area this week

Hornsby: police helped a man who fell more than 10 metres from a cliff, charged a man with mid-range drink driving after another motorist pulled the keys from the ignition of his car after he allegedly drove erratically and are investigating a crash that put two elderly people in hospital. Here's a few of the crimes investigated in the area this:

Thornleigh: A man, 31, was charged with mid-range drink driving after a motorist took the keys out the ignition in his car at a set of traffic lights on The Esplanade about 2.25am on Friday, March 31. The Hornsby man's Ford sedan was allegedly swerving across lanes in an erratic fashion and other drivers who noticed this called police. When the Ford stopped at traffic lights a driver ran up and pulled the keys out of the ignition. Police arrested the man after he returned a positive breath test and at Hornsby station he blew .149. His licence was suspended and he will face Hornsby Court at a future date. Hornsby police commended the person who intervened to potentially prevent an accident.

Westleigh: A 55-year-old man survived a cliff fall of between 10 and 15 metres about 2.15pm on Friday, March 31. A resident in Barkala PI heard cries for help at an embankment in the rear of their yard. When they investigated, they saw a man who had clawed his way up from a cliff. He had a yellow complexion with cuts all over his body and was very faint. Emergency services were called and he was taken to hospital with cuts and non-life-threatening injuries. Police questioned him but he had no recollection as to how he ended up at the cliff face.

Pennant Hills: Police are calling for witnesses to a car crash that put two 70 year olds in hospital on Sunday, April 2. About 10.30pm emergency services were called to Pennant Hills Rd and Railway St where a car and a four-wheel drive collided. The female driver and male passenger in the car, both in their 70s, were trapped for a while before being taken to Royal North Shore Hospital where the woman was stable and the man was in a critical condition. The driver of the 4WD, a man in his 50s, was not injured. Witnesses to the crash are urged to call Crime

Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

Waitara: At least nine mailboxes have been broken into at a unit complex on Orara St during March and April with various items stolen from them.

Hornsby Heights: A 41-year-old female driving a Toyota Camry failed an RBT about 8.30pm at Galston Rd on Friday, March 31. She allegedly blew 0.106 at Hornsby Police station. Her licence was confiscated, she was charged with midrange drink driving. She will face court at a later date.

Turramurra: Two tyres worth about \$500 were slashed on a Volvo parked on Timaru St between 7.30pm on Wednesday, March 29 and 8.30am on Thursday, March 30.

Asquith: A Hyundai sedan was broken into and a dash cam stolen on Jersey St north between 5pm on Sunday, April 2 and 8am on Monday, April 3.

Hornsby: \$500 worth of food was stolen from a stand-alone kiosk in Hornsby Westfield about 7.40pm on Saturday, April 1. CCTV footage shows two females in the kiosk forcing open a fridge.

Hornsby: A box trailer and an unregistered quad bike worth about \$2500 in total was stolen from the front of a home in Bellbrook Ave between 10pm on Saturday, April 1 and 11am on Sunday, April 2.

Hornsby: A shop in Westfield had a 3kg crystal stolen between 10.15pm and 10.40pm last Thursday.

From Service NSW: If you get an email about RMS and E-Toll, be extra careful it's not a scam.

The team at Roads and Maritime Services <u>NSW Roads</u> have warned of malicious scam emails which incorrectly state that they are from Roads and Maritime Services E-Toll. These emails look real but ask you to download a zip file. **Don't!** Other clues include in the sender email ends in dot ru or dot ca addresses.

April 04: SCAM ALERT! Beware of unsolicited phone calls from suspects who claim to be calling from legitimate IT companies.

The scammer will allege that your computer is infected and in need of urgent repair. The victim will be guided to allow remote access to their computer for the fake technician to assess the issue. DO NOT GIVE THEM ACCESS! They could potentially infect your PC with a Cryptolocker virus which renders your device unusable and requires payment to be removed. They also have the ability to steal your personal information. If you believe you have been the target of this scam or similar, you can report to your local Police Station or online via the <u>Australian Cybercrime Online Reporting Network (ACORN)</u>.

Ice use doubles in two years while major crime rates fall332 fewer offences for break-and enter, fraud, property damage and stealing from cars and shops

CRIME rates in Hornsby are falling but the number of people in possession of or using amphetamines is rising. Charges for amphetamine possession and use in northern Sydney almost doubled between 2014 and 2016 with 221 charges last year – up from 123 in 2014. Methamphetamine-related hospitalisations are also up

in northern Sydney, from 45 in 2009 to 249 in 2014-15, the latest NSW health data shows. The rate of hospitalisations for ice use in the region increased from six people per 100,000 to almost 25 people per 100,000 in the same period.

Senior Constable Paul Cleary said there had been more people detected using these drugs. "We have noticed some incidents recently and there is an increase in incidents of amphetamines in the area," Constable Cleary said.

Across 17 major crime categories there were 332 fewer offences reported in Hornsby in 2016 compared to 2015. Major declines were: break-and-enters, down 68; malicious damage to property down 86; frauds down 79; stealing from cars down 53; stealing from store reports down 74.

Constable Cleary said break-and-enter records included storage cages and letterboxes as they were classified the same as dwellings. "A number of crews operating across several local area commands in Sydney (were stealing from cages and letterboxes)," he said. "People were identified and arrested in relation to those offences. "Since those arrests, stealing from storage cages has reduced but not stopped. We did have a couple over the weekend so we do want to remind residents to remain vigilant."

There were 42 more reported assaults in Hornsby in 2016. In Ku-ring-gai there were 64 more reports of stealing from cars. In 2016 there were 17 more sexual assaults reported in Ku-ring-gai, which also recording the fourth-least number of assaults in Sydney.

Spate of burglaries: Break-and-enters at twice historic rate

A SPATE of home invasions across the north shore has prompted police to warn homeowners to be extra vigilant. KILLARA, St Leonards and Chatswood are among suburbs being hit hard as a disturbing crime wave washes over the north shore. Police are concerned after a spate of break and enters in the area, with some victims reportedly waking up with home invaders in their bedrooms.

North Shore Local Area Command has had 74 break and enters in homes in the past six weeks, more than double the usual number.

Crime prevention officer Constable Michael Alexander described it as a "dramatic spike", and said neighbouring LACs were facing the same issue. "Adjoining LACs such as Harbourside, Ryde and Kuring Gai are also being affected," Constable Alexander said. "We believe the offenders travel in groups of four or five often using stolen cars for transport to and from the locations they are breaking in to." He said break-ins were occurring between 9pm and 3am, and said when allegedly caught in the act the assailants were known to flee. "Fortunately there's been no confrontations," he said. "Our proactive, plainclothes police are working extra shifts. "We've also got support from the Operation Countdown which is targeting property crime and they're in the area and they are specifically targeting property crime offences."

Constable Alexander urged residents to ensure homes were secured at night, including windows. He said many residents considered CCTV, and he said it was "not a bad idea" because police then had access to pictures of the people they were after. "It's been around for a little while now for businesses, but a lot of people are moving towards getting cameras in their homes and that always helps us," he said. Full article on Page 1.
