

Every week NSW Police attend multiple incidents of children who have been locked in vehicles, both unintentional and intentional.

One of the main reasons a child is unintentionally locked in a vehicle is when parents give their child the car keys to play with. If babies and young children see a button, they will press it – often locking themselves and the keys inside the vehicle.

REMEMBER: Keys are NOT toys. Hang onto your keys yourself.

If a child is locked in a vehicle you should call Triple Zero (000) immediately.

Please Note:

Even though we are getting into the cooler months, on a typical warm Australian day, the temperature inside a locked car can be more than 30 degrees HOTTER than it is outside!

A child left in a locked car in those conditions for even a few minutes can very quickly become distressed, dehydrated and can die from organ failure.

YOU MUST make a judgement call as to whether it is a life or death situation. You may need to smash a window to get the child out of the vehicle safely.

REMEMBER: a window can be replaced. Your child cannot be.

2 June, Kuring Gai LAC - NSW Police Force

Police have released <u>CCTV footage</u> of a near miss between a bus carrying school children and a truck on the M5 at Hammondville yesterday, and are appealing for witnesses to come forward.

About 7.50am yesterday (Thursday 1 June 2017), a bus carrying approximately 20 school children, allegedly pulled out in front of a semi trailer on the M5 causing the driver of the truck to brake heavily and jack-knife in order to avoid a collision.

Following the incident, passing motorists flagged down the bus driver and alerted

police.

Officers from Liverpool Local Area Command spoke with the bus driver, a 59-yearold man, and commenced investigations.

The truck driver has also since been identified by police.

As investigations continue, officers have released CCTV footage of the incident and are appealing for any witnesses who have not yet spoken to police to come forward.

The email purports to be from the Australian Cybercrime Online Reporting Network (ACORN) and apologises to the recipient about losing funds to a scammer before providing a case file number and advising a representative would be in contact shortly to gather further information.

The sender's email address is: consumerfraudsaustralia@gmail.com. It is not an ACORN email address.

Fraud and Cybercrime Squad Commander, Detective Superintendent Arthur Katsogiannis, said the community should always be wary of unsolicited emails and phone calls.

1 June, from Hornsby Advocate

ASQUITH

A 24-year-old man from Hornsby is alleged to have led police on a 19km pursuit in an unregistered, defective car following two sets of burnouts in Asquith. Police were in Baldwin Ave attending an unrelated matter about 7.50pm on Saturday, May 27 when they allegedly saw and heard an orange Holden Commodore performing several doughnuts in nearby Sherbrook Rd. Police followed the car and allegedly saw it in the middle of Sherbrook Rd doing a "line locker" to smoke up the wheels. It is alleged the car sped off down the road and a pursuit was called on police radio. The car was allegedly pursued in backstreets around Hornsby, Asquith and Waitara going through a number of red lights and reaching speeds of up to 100km/h in 50km/h zones. It eventually stopped in Ku-ring-gai National Park. The passenger and driver were removed from the windows of the car due to its doors being defective. The car's owner, a 24-year-old man from Hornsby will face court at a future date.

BROOKLYN

A 26-year-old man suffered a broken arm after crashing a 1000cc Honda motorbike about 1pm on Sunday, May 28. The rider was headed north on the Pacific Hwy when he lost control on a left hand bend and slid across to the wrong side of the road. He was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital with a broken arm. Witnesses told police they saw the bike get the 'wobbles' and skid with smoke coming from the back tyre. It is unknown if acceleration or braking were the cause of the smoke.

BEROWRA

A 19-year old P-plate driver in a white Holden Commodore was charged with mid-range drink driving after hitting a power pole on Waratah Rd about 11.40pm on Saturday May 27. The teenage driver was on Anembo Rd and turned right when he lost control and hit a wooden power pole. The driver and passenger were both uninjured. The teen allegedly told police he had seven or eight schooners of beer. He blew .114 at Hornsby police station, had his licence suspended, was charged with mid-range drink driving and will face Hornby court at a future date.

WAITARA

A bicycle worth \$1100 was stolen from a storage cage area in the underground carpark of a unit block in Romsey St, during early May.

DURAL

A 17-year-old P-plater stopped at 1.20am on Sunday on Old Northern Rd, near New Line Rd, failed a road side breath test. The teenager recorded a reading of 0.062. He is due in Parramatta Court on June 28.




WAHROONGA

A 42-year-old man riding a registered Honda 50cc minibike suffered a suspected broken foot when his bike slid out from under him as he attempted to cross the intersection of Fox Valley Rd and Lucinda Ave at 9.10am on Monday. The rider was heading south and tried to turn left on Fox Valley Rd but as he began to turn, the motorbike slid out from under him causing him to fall and the bike came to rest on the median strip. He managed to get off the road and told police the ground was damp. He was taken to the Sydney Adventist Hospital with a suspected broken foot, Hornsby police believe there was no negligence involved.

GORDON

A 19-year-old Warrawee man was issued a criminal infringement notice for offensive behaviour and was escorted home, after an incident at McDonald's in the early hours of Saturday morning. Police received several calls about the man who was allegedly trying to smash windows and pushing people around about 1.15am.
