

POLICE caught more than 40 parents breaking the law outside five schools on Thursday, putting schoolchildren's lives at risk.

Police caught 33 parents in No Parking zones, six in No Stopping zones and several doing U-turns across double lines and using mobile phones while driving.

Officers made no apologies for their crackdown, with 72 schools on the northern

beaches saying the safety of children is paramount.

NSW Police Force has joined the National Firearms Amnesty aimed at reducing the number of unregistered and unwanted firearms in Australia.

Anyone with an unregistered firearm or firearm-related item in their possession will have the chance to legally dispose, or register it without penalty between 1 July and 30 September 2017.

Deputy Commissioner Regional NSW Field Operations Gary Worboys said gun theft is a major concern for NSW Police, particularly in regional areas.

"NSW Police is committed to stopping firearms falling into the hands of criminals," Deputy Commissioner Worboys said.

"Too many firearms are not stored securely, making them an easy target for thieves to steal multiple firearms during break-and-enters, particularly at rural properties."

Police are also reminding firearm licence holders of their legal responsibility and encouraging owners to keep firearms at their primary residence, opposed to locations infrequently habited.

Firearms and firearm-related items can be surrendered under amnesty arrangements at approved drop-off points, which include licensed firearm dealers, mobile stations, and police stations.

Under no circumstances should loaded firearms be taken into public places – including police stations.

Anyone with concerns about handling firearms or safely transporting them, can contact the NSW Police Force Firearms Registry for assistance.

Large majority of people charged for burglary live out of area [Edited]. for details click here.

LESS than four per cent of people charged with breaking into homes in Hornsby and Ku-ring-gai since 2011 live in the area, new data reveals.

Analysis by the Advocate found thieves struck 3714 times between 2011 and March 2017, with some suburbs hit more often than others.

The top suburbs for home invasions are Hornsby (572 break-ins), Wahroonga (508), West Pennant Hills (404), Turramurra (386) and Cherrybrook (343).

HORNSBY / KU-RING-GAI

'Don't be complacent'

DESPITE Ku-ring-gai having the lowest crime rate in Sydney adjusted for population, and Hornsby recording the fourth-lowest ratio of crime in the state, the latest crime figures are no reason to become complacent, police say.

Ku-ring-gai had about a third of the average number of crime reports during the year to March 2017 and Hornsby had the fourth-lowest ratio of crime reports in Sydney across the 14 major crime categories.

But assault and break-ins are on the rise in Hornsby.

Crimes most commonly recorded in the area are fraud and malicious damage, including graffiti.

Fraud is a category where a handbag or wallet taken during a break-in or stolen from a car may be used at Tap and Go outlets and the thief may not be from our area, Hornsby Senior Constable Paul Cleary said.

"We do get the occasional online fraud that goes to the state crime command and it is logged from their head office but the victim in Wahroonga might have been hit by a scam originating from England or Europe ... it is recorded for us as the victims are here," he said.

"Also we encompass the train yards and we get the numbers for the graffiti tags on train carriages.

"If crime is up, people need to do a security audit and harden their security but if the figures are down, I'd say don't get complacent as crooks have no boundaries.

"If they are not here today they will travel if they find an area is a soft target."

\$2M SIGNS OF THINGS TO COME

MORE than \$2 million worth of electronic message signs are set to light up the roads around Hornsby to inform drivers about traffic conditions.

Signs are going up on the Pacific
Highway at Waltara, on the corner of
Carden Ave; near 700 Pennant Hills Rd;
Castle Hill Rd, West Pennant Hills;
Beecroft Rd at Albert Ave and
Carlingford Rd at Epping.

Carlingford Rd at Epping.
The signs are expected to be switched on between August and September.

Some lane closures around the sites are expected during installations.

A Roads and Maritime Services spokesman said the signs were "installed before key journey decision points" to inform people about "journey times and conditions as they travel, expected heavy traffic during planned roadwork or major events such as sports and music

performances and approved road

safety messaging".

"This allows motorists to make more informed decisions about their route and can improve travel times by giving them the most up-to-date information at the right point on the network so they can avoid delays," he said.

"They are programmed by the
Transport Management Centre, which
manages and monitors the road network
24 hours a day, 365 days a year.
"The installation of an electronic
message on a main road, which has three

"The installation of an electronic message on a main road, which has three lines, typically costs around \$500,000, dependent on site conditions such as the type of soil, geometry of the road location and availability of nearby power and telecommunications connections."

There are about 800 permanent electronic message signs in NSW, with 21 signs brought online this financial year.

MT COLAH

A 40-year-old Mt Colah resident reported losing \$48,000 to an online money transfer scam this month. In September 2016, the victim was tricked into helping shift money from one account to another by a man who claimed to live in Los Angeles, in the US. The alleged scammer asked for money to complete a work project and the victim sent it in three transactions. The report is being investigated and police urge anyone who has been tricked or suspects a fraud scheme to visit scamwatch.gov.au.

HORNSBY

A woman had her bag, containing a Toshiba laptop, \$100 cash and credit cards, snatched on Albert St on Friday, June 23, at 10.45pm. A man described as caucasian, about 165cm tall, with a thin build, and wearing a blue hoodie and jeans, grabbed her bag as he ran past and she chased him and screamed for help. He was last seen turning left into Linda St, about 10.50pm. Police will review CCTV systems in the area.

HORNSBY

A robber in Aldi Westfield allegedly hit a store attendant with a bottle of bourbon that was hidden in his pants between 5.45pm and 6pm on Sunday, June 25. Hornsby police allege a 20-year-old man allegedly put a Jim Beam bottle down his pants and as he walked to the cash register, he was approached by a shop assistant who asked him to remove the bottle. As he did so he allegedly swung the bottle at the assistant, hitting her left arm. The man then allegedly fled the complex. Police were called and reviewed CCTV footage. They said the footage identified a man known to police.

HORNSBY

Tools worth \$4200, including generators, were stolen from a ute parked on Bridge Rd between 5pm on Saturday, June 24, and 6am on Sunday, June 25. The Hilux ute's rear window was smashed.

TURRAMURRA

An unattended pot that started smoking on a stove gave residents of Pentecost Ave home a reason to call the fire brigade about 3.30pm on Thursday, June 15. It appears the resident started cooking with a pot of bones and left home. Smoke was coming out of the house about 3.50pm, and the fire brigade arrived.

WESTLEIGH

A car, wallet, handbag and car keys were stolen from a home in Duneba Drive between 10pm on Friday, June 23, and 11am on Saturday, June 24. The thieves took a Mitsubishi 380 sedan, worth about \$7000, during the night, after robbing the home on Friday. The residents may have left the front door unlocked and after going for a walk, returned to find a wallet, handbag and keys missing. The handbag was found at the side of the house and the wallet was also found intact. The car was still there about midnight, but taken later after the initial break-in.

WAHROONGA



A TRUCK driver remains in a critical condition after being crushed by

a semi-trailer about 5am on Tuesday at Wahroonga.

Police confirmed the man in his 60s was inspecting the brakes of the rig at the entrance to the M1 Pacific Motorway when it rolled on to him, crushing his legs.

The driver was treated at the scene by emergency services and was transported to Royal North Shore Hospital in a critical condition. NSW Police are urging witnesses of the incident to contact Hornsby Police on 9476 9799 or Crimestoppers, 1800 333 000. Investigations continue.

Police were called several times on June 17 about a party at a vacant house due for demolition on Kooloona Cres. About 80-110 people were at the party, according to police, who were called about 8pm and attended about 10.20pm. Partygoers were allegedly spoken to and asked to "reduce the noise" and complied.

Serial conwoman Samantha Azzopardi facing 10 years in jail for fraud after latest sex trafficking lie

SERIAL NSW conwoman who has duped authorities in three countries with a child sex trafficking lie is facing up to 10 years in jail for fraud, after posing as a teenage foster child.

Samantha Azzopardi, 28, faced a Sydney court on Wednesday charged over a scam in which she posed as a 13-year-old schoolgirl named Harper Hart.

She received nearly \$20,000 worth of services from the NSW government and charities after telling authorities she was a sex trafficking victim when she turned up at a Hornsby school, north of Sydney.


