Dozens arrested as police target anti-social behaviour on transport network – Operation Merge

A joint-operation between police, Railcorp and the State Transit Authority targeting crime and anti-social behaviour on the state's public transport system has resulted in the arrest of 37 people.

Operation Merge, a high-visibility joint-agency operation, was conducted between 7am yesterday (Friday 30 March 2012) and 3am today (Saturday 31 March 2012).

The operation involved officers from the 12 Commuter Crime Units and the Dog Squad and targeted robbery offences, assaults and anti-social behaviour.

In addition, Railcorp Transit officers and State Transit Authority officers were deployed throughout the transport network.

The areas covered during the operation included Central, Lidcombe, Strathfield, Parramatta, Blacktown, Granville, Liverpool, Campbelltown, Miranda and Civic (Newcastle) Railway Stations, and bus stops throughout Dee Why, Narrabeen and Central.

Police and drug detection dogs conducted 201 person searches and identified 31 people allegedly in possession of illicit drugs

Police and transit officers also confiscated 40 open bottles and cans of alcohol from commuters.

Officers arrested six people wanted for outstanding warrants and 198 people were issued infringement notices.

A 17-year-old from Glen Alpine charged with 'Assault with act of indecency' regarding an incident on board a train near Campbelltown. He has been granted conditional bail to appear at Campbelltown Children's Court on Monday 2 April.

A 31 year-old male from Carabost arrested for an assault which occurred at Central Railway Station. The victim was taken to hospital for significant injuries to his mouth.

Operation Merge Commander, Inspector Robert Danks said the operation was successful and others were planned for the future.

"We really hope this type of operation will act as a deterrent to anyone thinking of misbehaving or conducting criminal activities on public transport," he said.

"Everyone who uses public transport has a right to travel safely and without fear of becoming a victim of crime or anti-social behaviour."

P-Plater Crash, West Pymble

Two young men have been seriously injured in a car crash which snapped a power pole on Sydney's north shore last night.

About 11.50pm (Friday 30 March), a Toyota Corolla travelling east on Ryde Road lost control and clipped another car heading in the same direction before crashing into a power pole.

The impact broke the pole in two, while the Toyota then smashed into the front fence of a house.

The p-plate driver and his male passenger, both thought to be aged about 20, were taken to Royal North Shore Hospital with serious injuries.

The exact nature of their injuries is unknown but they are believed to include possible spinal damage.

Police from Kuring-Gai Local Area Command examined the crash site and speed is believed to be a major contributing factor.

Two lanes remain closed while electricity contractors work to replace the power pole.

Anyone who witnessed the crash is urged to contact Hornsby Police Station or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

Drink Spiking: Drink spiking is where alcohol or other drugs are added to a person's drink without their knowledge or consent.

Alcohol is the most likely.

Alcohol is most often associated with sexual assault.

Other drugs are; tranquillisers, 'special k', amphetamine and GHB.

Drink spiking is not a joke or a game. It can make people sick or even be life-threatening.

Playing a prank on someone by adding alcohol or other drugs to their drink, with the intention of getting them drunk, is drink spiking and is illegal.

What if a friend is drunk, feeling sick, stumbling, confused or faints? Stay with them. Take them to a safe place. tell another friend, the host of the party, the bar, or security staff. If they collapse, ring an ambulance on 000 immediately.

Feel drowsy or suddenly 'out of it'? Don't wait and hope it will pass. Have someone you trust take you to a safe place. If you suspect your drink has been spiked or you have been assaulted, go to a doctor or hospital emergency department immediately.

You may become dizzy, feel unwell, let your guard down and do things you would not usually do. You may become unconscius, not able to defend yourself or not remember what happened. You may be robbed or sexually assaulted.

MEDIA RELEASE: New recruits for Kuring Gai Local Area Command

Editor's Note: The numbers given in this media release regarding Local Area Command allocations are accurate as at 26 March 2012 but are subject to change as numbers of those attesting change.

Two new police officers are expected to be allocated to Kuring gai Local Area Command at the Goulburn NSW Police Academy in May.

NSW Police Commissioner Andrew Scipione is expected to welcome around 315 recruits at the attestation ceremony, which is to take place on Friday 4 May, 2012.

After graduation the probationary constables will complete 12 months' on-the-job training at their respective Local Area Commands. They will also study by distance education with Charles Sturt University before they officially graduate with a Diploma in Policing Practice.

Once they graduate, the officers will then be confirmed in the rank of Constable.

"I am proud and pleased to be welcoming these new police officers to our ranks," Kuring Gai Local Area Commander, Superintendent PHILIPPI, said. "They are about to embark on a career that will be as rewarding as it is challenging."

Superintendent PHILIPPI said the probationary constables will play an important role within the communities they will serve.

"From day one, they will assist their fellow officers in reducing criminal activity and providing grass-roots solutions to local issues," he said.

North West Metropolitan Region Commander, Assistant Commissioner CLIFFORD, joined with Superintendent PHILIPPI in welcoming the new police officers.

"They have already proven their worth through their commitment and hard work during their studies at the NSW Police Academy," he said. "Over the next 12 months and beyond, I am sure they will also prove to be valuable assets to the communities within their Command."

Assistant Commissioner CLIFFORD said a total of Seventy Five new officers have been assigned to the Region to assist in driving down crime and helping to provide local solutions to local problems.

Multi-agency marina fire exercise

Crews from the NSW Rural Fire Service and Fire & Rescue NSW were joined by Marine Rescue, NSW Police and marina staff to participate in this important exercise. The scenario involved two yachts being alight with people needing rescuing from on board. NSWRFS crews responded via the Scotland Island and Warringah/Pittwater fire boats, whilst FRNSW arrived via land. The 'rescues' were conducted by Marine Rescue whilst the two fire agencies successfully tackled the blazes.

Hornsby Police news, 2/4/12

The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: High range drink driving

Time/Date: About 12.40 am on Sunday the 1st

Place: Hillmont Ave, THORNLEIGH

Vehicle 1: Silver Kia

Driver 1: 35 year old male

Details: The Kia was stopped and the driver breath tested which was allegedly positive for alcohol. A subsequent test gave a result of .180. The driver was charged and had his

license suspended by police.

Court: The driver is to appear at Hornsby Local Court at a date yet to be set charged with Driving with a High Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol

Incident: Drugs arrest

Time/Date: About 12am on Sunday the 1st

Place: Berowra Railway station

Person 1: 20 year old male

Details: Police were called to the location due to an assault. A 20 year old male was identified as the alleged offender. While questioning the male a small amount of green vegetable matter police allege is Cannabis fell out of the males pocket. The male was arrested and subsequently charged.

Court: The male is to face Hornsby Local Court at a date yet to be set Charged with assault and possess a prohibited drug and not having a valid ticket..

Incident: Fire at construction site

Time/Date: Between 2.50 am and 3.40 am on Friday the 30th

Place: Pennant Hills road, Thornleigh

Details: A passing motorist has seen a site shed at the location on fire and called the fire brigade. A unit from Beecroft has attended and put the fire out. It was established a drink vending machine which was inside the site shed had been forced open and the cash till taken. The site shed was totally destroyed in the fire.

Incident: Robbery

Person 1: Male, 165 - 170cm tall, slim to medium build, medium length brown hair, caucasean appearance, white and blue/black ski type jacket, shorts made of a silky material, TN or Nike airmax shoes.

Details: The victim a 16 year old male was walking in Albert street and was assault by 2 other males. The victim has his Black Iphone 4s stolen. The victim was taken to Hornsby hospital for bruising and abrasions.

Incident: Break Enter & Steal

Details: Between the above times unknown person/s have broken into the home. A Diamond engagement ring was stolen, it was valued at an estimated \$3,500.
