11 Nov: Warning to international students

The NSW Government and the international education sector have issued a warning to international students in relation to the activities of the Overseas Students Association (OSA), a subsidiary of the National Liaison Committee (NLC).

The OSA claims to be the national peak body for international students in Australia. However, its practices raise serious concerns.

The NSW Government, education providers, industry peak bodies and international student organisations do not support the OSA and NLC and they are not recognised as bodies representing international students in NSW.

International students are advised of the following:

• The Council of International Students Australia (CISA) is recognised as the representative body for international students in NSW. CISA is in no way associated with the OSA and NLC.

• CISA has received numerous reports from students who allege they have been harassed and intimidated by OSA representatives.

• The NLC and OSA do not have the support of any NSW university or their

student associations. The use of NSW universities' logos on the OSA website is not approved and infringes trademark rights.

• The collection of student visa and passport information on NSW university campuses to obtain the OSA Safety Card is strongly discouraged, and in most cases prohibited.

• The OSA Safety Card is promoted on the OSA website as a program that supports international students who experience a threat to their safety. Holding an OSA Safety Card does not deliver any immediate additional benefits for international students when dealing with NSW Police. International students should ring Police directly to report crimes and if it is urgent, call 000.

• Students concerned about requests for visa or passport information should report their concerns immediately to their international student support centre.

• The OSA website carries the NSW Government logo without approval. This infringes the Government's trademark rights and implies that the OSA Safety Card is endorsed by the NSW Government. The NSW Government does not provide any support, either financial or in-kind, to the OSA.

• The OSA website carries false information about discounts for OSA Safety Card holders to NSW cultural institutions. The Art Gallery of New South Wales, the Powerhouse Museum, the Australian Museum and Sydney Living Museums expressly refused requests from the OSA for these discounts and therefore they are not available to Safety Card holders.

• NSW Fair Trading is carrying out a comprehensive investigation into this and other possible breaches of Australian consumer laws by the OSA.



11 Nov, from the Hornsby Advocate: Police have arrested a 33-year-old Waitara man after an eight year investigation into the theft of foreign currency.

POLICE have arrested a 33-year-old Waitara man after an eight year investigation into the theft of foreign currency. Detectives from Kings Cross Local Area

Command had been investigating an incident from Thursday, November 17, 2005, when a courier was threatened with a knife in Rushcutters Bay. Police allege he was threatened and told to hand over a bag containing a large amount of foreign currency and travellers cheques.

Investigators released a Comfit image of a man they hoped would be able to assist with their investigation in October this year. They arrested the 33-year-old on Friday at Romesey St, Waitara.

He was taken to Hornsby Police Station and charged with Robbery while Armed with Offensive Weapon. He was granted bail and will appear at Hornsby Local Court on 4 December 2013. Detective Inspector McDonald from Kings Cross Local Area Command said hard work had paid off. "This has been a long investigation with a very pleasing result so far. Police do not give up and this is a great example of that," he said.


11 Nov: The State Crime Command's Homicide Squad has today welcomed a \$100,000 reward by the NSW Government for information relating to the **shooting murder of Bjarne Carlsen** in the state's north-west 13 years ago.

About 11.30pm on Thursday 27 January 2000, the body of 53-year-old Mr Carlsen, who was known as  BJ' to friends and family, was found inside his flat on Young Street, Brewarrina. He had been fatally shot in the chest.

Mr Carlsen was a woodwork teacher at Brewarrina Central School at the time of his death. A father of two adult males, he lived alone in his flat within the allocated teacher's accommodation complex on Young Street.

Detective Chief Inspector John Lehmann from the Homicide Squad's Unsolved Homicide Team said the motive for Mr Carlsen's murder and the identity of his killer still remain unknown.

"Many aspects of this case remain unclear and we need assistance from the community to help bring Mr Carlsen's killer, or killers, to justice,― Detective Chief Inspector Lehmann said.

11 Nov: Hornsby Police news, 11/11/13 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command:

Incident: Bush Fire

Time/Date: About 10.30am on Friday the 8th Place: Lane Cove National Park (West Pymble).

Details: A large amount of black smoke was seen coming from the National Park in West Pymble. Between 8 and 10 NSW fire brigade units and 4 RFS crews attended and managed to put the fire out by 1.30pm. Investigations are continuing into the cause. No homes were under threat during the fire.

Incident: Stolen Excavator

Time/Date: Between 12pm on Tuesday the 5th and 12pm on Wednesday the 6th

Place: Arcadia road, Arcadia.

Details: A yellow †NANTE†brand excavator was stolen from a house in Arcadia. The Excavator would have needed a large truck and possibly a large trailer to take it.

It was valued at an estimated \$97,000.

Incident: Steal from motor vehicle

Time/Date: Between 11am on Friday the 8th and 10am on Sunday the 10th

Place: Boat ramp at Mooney Mooney

Details: A Ford Ranger ute was parked at the boat ramp, unknown person/s have forced the locks on the rear tray and stolen about \$20,000 worth of tools from the tray.

Incident: Break Enter & Steal

Time/Date: Sometime between the 19th of October and the 2nd of November.

Place: Clydesdale pl, Pymble.

Details: Unknown person/s have stolen 2 x Gold neck chains and a Gold Bracelet from a home. It is unknown how they were stolen but a number of tradesmen had been to the house in recent weeks.

Warning: If you have any person inside your home for work that is being carried out or even open houses, consider supervising the †sensitive†areas of your home like bedrooms etc. You may also consider locking away items or lock rooms with valuable items to restrict access.

Incident: Break Enter & Steal

Time/Date: Between 7am on Saturday the 9th and 3.30pm on Sunday the 10th

Place: Graham cl, Berowra Heights.

Details: Unknown person/s have broken into a home in Berowra by removing a

flyscreen and opening an unlocked window. Several rooms were ransacked with an Ipad and 3 x Ipad mini's being stolen. They were valued at an estimated \$2,000.

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above incidents to contact **Hornsby police on 9476 9799**, or **phone Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000** to report any information relating to the matter anonymously.

07 Nov: FAKE \$50 NOTES CIRCULATING

Next time you are handed a \$50 dollar check it to see that it is genuine, as in recent weeks there have been a number of incidents reported where unsuspecting persons have found the \$50 they intended to purchase an item with were not the real thing.

The Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) says if people detect fake money they should handle it as little as possible and store it in an envelope before reporting it to state or federal police.

The notes are softer and lighter than the genuine items, and the **southern cross** on the translucent window can be scratched with fingernails.

If you find yourself in this position, deliver it to the nearest Police station who will take a report and forward it to the Australian Federal Police.



06 Nov: Rural Crime - NSW Police Force Investigators turn up heat on bushfire arsonists

A new technology designed to combat bushfire arson will be a focus of the annual NSW Police Rural Crime Investigators Conference, which starts in Mudgee today (Tuesday 5 November 2013).

The two-day conference provides a rare opportunity for NSW Police's 33 specially-trained Rural Crime Investigators to (RCIs) to meet in one place and discuss crime specific to rural and regional NSW, such as stock theft and illegal hunting. At this afternoon's session, delegates will learn about the latest tool in fighting another crime that impacts heavily on rural communities: deliberately-lit bushfires.

More than 35 per cent of bushfires each year are believed to be caused by arson. Bushfires can exact a tragic toll, with last month's blazes resulting in the destruction of 208 homes and 40 outbuildings. To help prevent such tragedies, NSW Police now have access to the **Arson Trends Analysis System (ATAS)**, a computer program that allows investigators to determine if a firebug might be at work in their communities.

For the first time ever, ATAS collects in one place fire-incident information from NSW Police, the Rural Fire Service, and Fire & Rescue NSW. ATAS users can see where and when fires are occurring, the types of fires (building, vehicle or bushfire), attending agencies, and details of who reported each incident. Most importantly for fire investigators, ATAS can analyse this information to determine where arsonists might be operating.

The bush fires may have eased off a little but summer is not even here yet. Have you got your fire plan ready? Look at the flyer and make your plan NOW. The long range weather forecast for Sydney is no significant rain until May. So we are a Loooooooooong way from being out of the danger period.

Residents can now complete a **Bush Fire Survival Plan** using a smartphone or tablet. The NSW Rural Fire Service has released the **MyFirePlan app** for Apple and Android devices. Download it for free today!



06 Nov: Be wary of scam online shopping sites. A number of fake .com.au websites have been shut down. Here's what to look out for, from the government website, StaySmartOnline.

One of the tell-tale signs of the recent scam sites taken down was the use of direct money transfers, rather than credit cards, to pay for goods. While direct money transfers are used on other websites such as eBay, it is less common for legitimate businesses to use this form of payment. It should not be the only method available. A direct money transfer makes it easier for scammers to move money quickly, while also removing some of the protections that other forms of payment, such as credit cards, give consumers.

One of the main differences between .com.au domains and others, like .com domains, is that the owner of a .com.au domain must be a registered Australian business. This helps to make it more difficult for scammers to obtain .com.au domain names, because the registration process requires a valid ABN. Some scammers have been able to circumvent this by stealing other companies' ABNs.


