30 December, from the Eastern Beaches command: BEACH THIEVES AT WORK ON THE EASTERN BEACHES.....

Are you heading to the beach today??? If so don't be a victim of beach theft. The weather is getting hotter now and the beaches are starting to get busy for both beach goers and thieves. A few tips to take note of:

- *Do not take valuables to the beach
- *If in a group always have a friend stay and mind your property
- *Do not leave car keys under the wheel arch of your car
- *Purchase a waterproof swimming bag that you can take in the water
- *If lockers are available for hire, use them
- *Always know where you have left your property
- *Leave any belongings that you don't need locked away in your vehicle.

29 December, from neighbouring Harbourside command: Teenager clocked at 205km/h â€" Warringah Freeway Issued at 6pm, Sunday 29 December 2013

Police have charged a teenager after he was allegedly clocked at more than 200km/h in Sydney's north this morning. About 6.50am (Sunday 29 December), police from Harbourside Highway Patrol were conducting speed enforcement on the Warringah Freeway at North Sydney for Operation Safe Arrival. They spotted a black Lexus sedan travelling north, well in excess of the 80km/h speed limit. Officers clocked the car's speed at 205km/h.

Police followed the Lexus, which took the Willoughby Road off-ramp. Officers will allege the car then travelled along Willoughby Road at between 130km/h and 140km/h in a 60km/h zone. The Lexus slowed to around 40km/h when officers activated their lights and sirens but did not stop. A slow speed pursuit continued along several local roads before the Lexus stopped on Penshurst Street.

When police were handcuffing the 18-year-old driver, his girlfriend got out of the car and started assaulting the officers. She was eventually placed under arrest. Police searched the car and found a 45cm long machete and 30cm long metal blade under the driver's seat.

The pair was taken to Chatswood Police Station where the driver returned a breath analysis of 0.137. The Chinese national has been charged with exceed speed limit by more than 45km/h; drive in a speed dangerous to the public; police pursuit (Skye's Law); and mid-range PCA. The man hold's a Chinese driver's licence and as such has been issued with a notice suspending his authority to driver in NSW. His 18-year-old girlfriend has been charged with assaulting and hindering police. The pair will appear at Downing Centre Local Court on 30 January 2014.

29 December, from CareFlight: QUICK POLICE ACTION HELPS SAVE MAN FROM BACKYARD POOL (Beecroft)

Quick action by police helped save a man from drowning in a backyard pool at Beecroft, in Sydney's north-west, this morning. Acting on a call from the man's brother, police raced to the Hannah Street home to find the man in difficulty in the pool. Police rescued the man and immediately started first aid.

Ambulance paramedics called the CareFlight rapid-response trauma team shortly bewfore 11 am to assist treating the man, with police transporting the medical team from where the helicopter landed nearby in front of the club house at Pennant Hills Golf Club.

The CareFlight doctor said the 50-year-old man apparantly suffered a recurrence of a cardiac condition. The doctor and paramedics stabilised the man then continued treatment as they took him, in a road ambulance, to Westmead Hospital where he remained in a serious but stable condition on arrival.

28 December, advice from Ryde command: So, now that Santa has been and the children have unwrapped all of their gifts, please do not leave the boxes of gifts out on your lawns to be collected. This will give possible offender's an insight as to what you and your children received for Christmas and provides an opportunity for them to scope your neighbourhood and possibly break in to your house and steal those wonderful gifts. It may take several weeks to destroy and place the boxes in recycle bins for collection, but it's worth it.

If you see a suspicious person or a person that appears to be rummaging through bins or loitering in your neighbourhood that you are not familiar with, please do not hesitate and contact your local police station.



27 December, from North Shore command: MALE CAUTIONED OVER DRUGS - KILLARA

About 9:20pm on Saturday 21st December Proactive Crime Team officers were patrolling the Killara area when they attended Queen Elizabeth Reserve and observed a vehicle parked at the reserve. Police will allege that as the plain clothes officers approached the vehicle they observed 3 males inside the car and noticed a strong smell was emanating from the vehicle. Officers announced their office a spoke to a 28-year-old man who was sitting in the front seat of the car smoking. Police spoke to the man about the cigarette he was smoking as they believed it contained prohibited drugs. The suspected drugs were confiscated from the Killara man and weighed. He was issued a cannabis caution.

27 December: Walking? Boating? 4WD-ing? A 406Mhz beacon is your best chance of being rescued.

26 December: Crash Investigators are hoping to speak with three men who survived a crash on the M1 near **Mooney Mooney** today, which claimed the lives of two friends.

The crash happened shortly before 5am today (Thursday 26 December 2013), when a southbound hatchback hit an embankment north of Jolls Bridge. One man was thrown from the vehicle and died at the scene. A second man, who was a back-seat passenger, also died. Three other men – including the driver – were taken by NSW Ambulance Paramedics to Royal North Shore Hospital for treatment of non-life threatening injuries.

The driver, a 29-year-old man, and two passengers, aged 22 and 27, are believed to live in the Auburn area. They remain in hospital where they are reported to be in a stable condition. The two men who died are yet to be formally identified; however, police have been told the man thrown from the vehicle was aged 31, while the second man was aged 22. They, too, are believed to have lived in the Auburn area. Police from Brisbane Water Local Area Command, Fire & Rescue NSW, and NSW Ambulance Paramedics attended the scene; the investigation is being conducted by the Crash Investigation Unit (CIU). Traffic was disrupted for five hours after the crash while investigations and retrieval operations occurred.

December 2013 at **Ashley Avenue**, **West Pennant Hills** two offenders have confronted the 46 year old female occupant whilst she was in the bedroom of the house. After breaking into the house through the kitchen window the offenders woke her by shining a torch in her eyes. The offenders made demands for keys to the vehicle below and after obtaining the keys took the vehicle and left the scene. The vehicle is a modified Nissan SX silver in colour with black bonnet and front guard. Registration number CHD 63A. At least two other persons were asleep in the premises at the time. The vehicle is still stolen.





Dec 27, from neighbouring North Shore command: WOMAN FINED AFTER LEAVING PUPPY IN CAR - CHATSWOOD

North Shore Police were called to a vehicle that was parked in **Victoria Avenue Chatswood** on Saturday (21st December) afternoon after a member of the public observed a 6 week old Samoyed dog in the rear of a parked vehicle which had all the windows up. Officers made enquiries as to the identity of the owner of the car, a 34- year-old woman from Penshurst returned to her vehicle. Police will allege the dog had been left in the vehicle unattended for over 30 minutes with outside temperatures over 30 degrees. It is believed the owner had gone to have Yum Cha leaving the puppy in the car. The 34-year-old was issued with an infringement for **Commit Act of Cruelty on an animal**.

When you go on holiday:

- It's a good idea to leave your house looking 'lived in'.
- If possible get a trusted friend or relative to house-sit for you while you are away.
- Make sure all windows and doors are locked in your home/ garage/ shed.
- Have your mail collected by a friend or neighbour, or have it held or re-directed by the post office.
- Don't leave a message on your answering machine, or a note on the door that

tells callers you are away.

- Turn down the volume on your phone so it can't be heard ringing unanswered.
- Ask a neighbour/ friend to put your rubbish bins out as usual.
- Consider using automatic timers to turn on a light, tv or radio at different times.
- Leave a key with a trusted neighbour or friend and ask them to rearrange the blinds etc to make your house look 'lived in'.
- Lock away tools, ladders and anything that could be used to get into your house, garage or shed.
- Ask a neighbour to park their car in your driveway occasionally to give the impression that someone is coming and going.
- Disconnect the electrical supply on radio-controlled or electronic garage doors and use good quality locks.
- Make sure all your valuables are stored securely.
- Close blinds and curtains.
- Have your lawn mowed while you are away.

Being prepared is just as important as knowing what to do in a crisis. Public Alerts provide a warning before disasters cause damage, and information on how to stay safe.

Get local updates on Google Maps

You'II also see Public Alerts in Google Maps. If you're searching Maps on desktop or mobile you'II get alerts for that area, and if you're using the Google Maps for Mobile app you'II see a warning notification if there is an alert nearby.

Notifications on Google Now

Google Now on Android is also integrated with Public Alerts, so that if there's an alert active for your local area you'll receive a notification letting you know what's going on, and showing you the affected area.
