06 January: Police are warning the community to be on the lookout for counterfeit money circulating in the St George Area.

Detectives from St George Local Area Command are conducting investigations after thousands of dollars of counterfeit notes were passed at businesses in the area, including a betting outlet in Bexley North, a hotel in Bexley, a club in Kogarah

and a hotel in Allawah.

Police are continuing their investigations to identify those responsible for passing and making the counterfeit \$50 and \$100 notes.

They are also warning business owners and the community to be on the lookout for fake \$100 notes using the serial numbers BK 08689143 and FA 96403514.

People should also be on the lookout for counterfeit \$50 notes using the serial number GG 08245068. Anyone who is handed one of these notes is asked to contact police immediately.

06 January 2014: Thornleigh family of king-hit victim Daniel Christie devastated by "coward punch"

THE family of Thornleigh bashing victim Daniel Christie has spoken of the New Year's Eve king-hit that "turned their lives upside down". Daniel, 18, remains in a critical condition at St Vincent's Hospital after being punched in the face on Victoria St at Kings Cross about 9pm on December 31. He has undergone emergency surgery to repair fractures to his skull, bleeding on the brain and pressure to the skull.

Police have charged Shaun McNeil, 25, of Pennant Hills, with one count of causing grievous bodily harm to Daniel, one count of assaulting Daniel's brother, Peter Christie, and two counts of common assault.

06 January: Hornsby Police news, 6/1/14 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command:

Incident: Pedestrian collision

Time/Date: About 6.20pm on Thursday the 2nd

Place: Pentecoste avenue, St Ives, x Mona Vale Road.

Vehicle 1: Ford Laser

Details: The Laser was waiting to turn left at the intersection, witness accounts advise a woman has walked in front of the turning car and was hit and landed on the ground. Her injuries are not known at this stage. Investigations are continuing.

Incident: Stealing incident

Time/Date: About 10pm on Saturday the 4th

Place: St Vincent De Paul store, Jersey street, Hornsby

Person 1: 38 year old male.

Details: A member of the public has seen a male person rummaging through the charity bins outside the store. Police have attended and sighted a 38 year old male as he was allegedly placing items in a back pack. Certain admissions were allegedly made. The male was arrested and charged. He is to face Hornsby Local Court at a date yet to be set.

The items which included electrical items and mobile phones were returned to â€~Vinnies'.

Incident: Shop stealing

Time/Date: About 12.45pm on Saturday the 4th

Place: Myer Westfield Hornsby Person 1: 38 year old female.

Details: A female has entered the store and has proceeded to the Cosmetics area, It is alleged she placed a number of items into a bag, she has then gone to another are and [purchased a number of Christmas decorations before walking out of the store allegedly without paying for items in her bag. The female was detained and police called. In total 21 items of cosmetics was allegedly found in her bag, with a retail value of just under \$650. The female received a criminal infringement notice.

Incident: Push bike crash

Time/Date: About 4.30pm on Thursday the 2nd Place: Pacific highway, Hornsby x Pretoria parade.

Details: The bike rider has rounded a bend in the road and stated his rear wheel slipped out from under him. The rider a 21 year old male has then hit the gutter and landed in a garden bed, he was wearing a helmet. At this stage he was soreness to 2 fingers and a possible broken shoulder.

Incident: Car fire

Time/Date: Between 12am and 2.30am on Wednesday the 1st

Place: Essex street, Killara

Vehicle: Ford Falcon

Details: A nearby resident has seen the Ford on fire and called 000. The resident has tried to put the fire out but was not successful. Fire brigade units have attended and put the fire out. The car was a total loss. It had appears an electrical short may have been the cause of the fire. The car had been leant to a friend.

Incident: Stolen push bike

Time/Date: During December, 2013.

Place: Fox Valley road, Wahroonga

Details: A garage was broken into at the home, a men's racing road bike was stolen it was valued at \$1,800. It is described as a Merida brand and was white in colour.

Incident: Break, Enter with intent to steal.

Time/Date: Between 10.30am on Thursday the 2nd and 8pm on Friday the 3rd

Place: Minnamurra avenue, Pymble

Details: Person/s unknown have broken into the home via a ground floor front door. The owner has come home and found the front door open. On entering the home the owner states they saw a figure in the main bedroom. Police were called but no sign of any person was found. Nothing appears to have been taken, it is possible the victim disturbed the offender before anything could be taken.

Incident: Attempted steal from motor vehicle

Time/Date: Between Friday evening the 3rd and 1pm on Sunday the 5th

Place: Brushwood place, Frederick street & Pinera close, Hornsby

Details: 2 cars were broken into with the ignition wires being ripped from under the dash area. A Hyundai was stolen during the same time frame. All streets are in the same area, it is possible the incidents were committed by the same offenders.

Incident: Letter boxes raided

Time/Date: Between 12pm on 12pm on Sunday the 5th and 6.30am on Monday

the 6th

Place: Hunter street, Hornsby

Details: A unit complex in Hunter street had all 30 letter boxes opened by persons unknown. It is not known if any mail had been taken. Usually the thieves are after personal information, including bills and statements as well as bank info. Please make sure good quality lock are used and clear your mail regularly, monitor you statements etc and report any strange activity on any accounts.

Incident: Stealing

Time/Date: About 5pm on Tuesday the 31st Place: St Ives shopping centre car park.

Details: A shopper has returned to her car and proceeded to place groceries into the boot of her car. Her handbag was in the trolley. The victim went to the back seat area and when she returned her hand bag was gone.

Incident: Break Enter & Steal. Time/Date: Saturday the 21st Place: Stanley street, St Ives.

Details: A number of storage cages in a unit complex were broken into. It appears the locks had been forced on some and wire cut on others. A large number of tools were taken and in one unit Children's Christmas presents were taken they were wrapped up ready for Christmas day. A number of inquiries led police to apply for a search warrant at a Seven Hills home. A 27 year old female was questioned. Police allege tools and the Christmas presents from the Break & Enter were at the home.

Court: The female is to appear at the Parramatta Local Court on the 6th of January, charged with 7 counts of Break Enter & Steal. She had been refused bail at an earlier court appearance.

Incident: Christmas lights damaged.

Time/Date: During Monday evening the 23rd.

Place: Various homes in Sydney road and The Outlook, Hornsby Heights.

Details: As you all know during Christmas every year homes across Australia place Christmas lights outside their homes for all to enjoy. In the streets †above†to someone has cut the wires to multiple displays in the 2 streets. CCTV from one house shows a youth about 14 or 15 years old allegedly cutting the wires at one home. The male youth was wearing a hoodie and had what appears to be a cast on his foot, presumably from a broken foot or ankle. Anyone you know?

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above

incident to contact Hornsby police on 9476 9799, or phone Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 to report any information relating to the matter anonymously.

06 January, from our neighbouring Northern Beaches command: DRUG DEALERS BUSTED.......

Police have charged a Scotland Island man with supplying heroin after arresting him at Mona Vale on Thursday. Northern Beaches Crime Manager Insp Brad Hughes said the 33-year-old man was driving on Vesper St at noon when he was signalled to pull over by police. A search of the man and his car allegedly uncovered 51 small balloons containing 66g of heroin worth at least \$13,000. The man was arrested and charged with supplying heroin and will appear in court on a future date.

Two men have been charged over a clandestine drug lab in a rented unit at Collaroy that exploded on November 24. The two men allegedly rented the unit in a block in Frazer St and set up a small clandestine lab in the kitchen of the unit to make the drug crystal methamphetamine, also called ice. Police investigating the clan lab have now charged a Brookvale man, 27, with dealing with property suspected to be the proceeds of crime, possessing instructions on the manufacture of a prohibited drug, handling an explosive substance without a licence and have goods in custody suspected of being stolen. A Dee Why man, 24, has been charged with dealing with identity information with intent to commit an indictable offence, knowingly making a false statement, possessing drug-making equipment, making a prohibited drug and possessing precursor chemicals with intent to manufacture a prohibited drug. Both men will appear in court on Tuesday.

- Have a different password for each social networking site â€" if one password is stolen, not all of your accounts will be at risk



Look for these other signs of drowning when people are in the water:

- Head low in the water, mouth at water level
- Head tilted back with mouth open
- Eyes glassy and empty, unable to focus
- Eyes closed
- Hair over forehead or eyes
- Not using legsâ€"vertical
- Hyperventilating or gasping
- Trying to swim in a particular direction but not making headway
- Trying to roll over on the back

· Appear to be climbing an invisible ladder

- Ensure you exchange name, address, licence number, vehicle registration and insurance details with all parties involved in the crash.
- Remember to take the details of any witnesses. You can use a camera or camera phone.

From the North Shore Times: An esky can be used for more than just keeping your food cold. A new campaign is calling on boaties to take one on board as they can help save lives.


