10 May, from Stay Smart Online: Bitly link shortening service compromised:

SSO Alert Priority high Bitly, a popular link shortening service regularly used in combination with other social media services, has released an urgent security notice about a compromise of its customers' accounts. For the full alert and instructions, <u>click here</u>.

07 May: A man has been charged after police allegedly located a submachine gun, ammunition and Outlaw Motorcycle Gang (OMCG) paraphernalia during investigations into a robbery at Denistone earlier in the year. About 2:30am on Saturday 5 April 2014, a 19-year-old man got off a bus at Denistone Railway Station when he was allegedly approached by a man and punched in the head. He was knocked unconscious during the assault before his attacker allegedly stole cash from him and fled the scene.

Police from Ryde Local Area Command commenced investigations into the robbery and today (Wednesday 7 May 2014) arrested a **21-year-old man outside a house in Hornsby**. During a search of the house, police allegedly located a submachine gun, ammunition, a leather OMCG vest, mobile phones and other items of clothing. The 21-year-old man was taken to Hornsby Police Station, where he was charged with aggravated robbery, possess prohibited firearm and possess ammunition.

He was refused bail to appear in Hornsby Local Court tomorrow (Thursday 8 May 2014). The firearm and ammunition will undergo further ballistic testing while investigations into the matter are continuing.

07 May: A man has been charged with the alleged cultivation of cannabis after police seized plants from an industrial unit in Mt Ku-ring-gai yesterday.

In February 2014, police from Gordon Region Enforcement Squad (RES) began investigations into the supply of cannabis in the Ku-ring-gai area. As a result of inquiries, yesterday (Tuesday 6 May 2014), Gordon RES officers were assisted by local police in executing a search warrant at an industrial unit on **Hamley Road, Mt Ku-ring-gai**. Officers seized hydroponic equipment and 50 mature cannabis plants with an estimated street value of \$150,000.

A 46-year-old man was later arrested at a **Pennant Hills** address, where a small amount of cannabis was also allegedly found. The man was taken to Hornsby Police Station where he was charged with commercial indoor enhanced cultivation of cannabis and possession of a prohibited drug. He was granted conditional bail to appear before Hornsby Local Court on Wednesday 28 May 2014.

Mobile Banking "Australia is one of the highest users of smart phones and tablets in the world, so it's no surprise consumers are embracing mobile banking to manage their finances."

Here are some tips to help you practice safe and secure mobile banking:

- Install security software from a verified provider on your device.
- Only download apps from reputable publishers or provided by your bank.
- Keep your device's software and apps up to date.
- Lock your device with a passcode, password or biometric when not in use.
- Clear your smart phone or tablet of any text messages from your bank and never disclose personal or financial information via text or email.
- Don't save PINs, logins or passwords as documents or phone numbers on your mobile device.
- Use different PINs or passwords for unlocking your mobile device and accessing your banking app.
- Do not use public Wi-Fi for online banking, shopping or other financial transactions.
- Contact your bank if you lose your smart phone or tablet and provide your

new mobile number if you receive bank updates via SMS message.

Reset factory settings before disposing of an old device.



From the Hornsby Advocate, 08 May: KEEP YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD

MOONEY MOONEY A 21year-old woman was charged with assaulting police after being pulled over for allegedly speeding on her motorbike. The woman was stopped on the Pacific Highway at Mooney Mooney at 5.10pm on Tuesday. Police alleged she was doing 80km/h on her Kawasaki in a 60km/h zone. She was also given a notice for defects on her bike. Police alleged the woman swore at them and as they tried to arrest her for offensive language, she hit one of the officers. She was additionally charged with resisting arrest and assaulting police.

BEROWRA The jaws of life had to be used to remove the passenger of a car involved in an accident at Berowra on Tuesday morning. The driver of a Nissan Pulsar had stopped to let someone reverse out of their driveway when a Holden Colorado hit them from behind. The 64year-old passenger in the Pulsar could not

get out and emergency services had to remove his door. He was taken to hospital in a stable condition and the Colorado driver was charged with negligent driving.

ASQUITH Police are assessing the case of a diabetic driver who has no memory of running off the road at Asquith on Monday night. Around 10pm the motorist was seen driving onto a grass verge on Jersey St before hitting a Give Way sign, heading onto the wrong side of the Pacific Highway and hitting a concrete divide. A tyre was ripped off the car. The 68year-old driver told ambulance officers he suffered from diabetes.

HORNSBY A teenager who was stopped by police in relation to stolen DVDs was charged with being in breach of his bail. Several movies were taken from JB Hifi at Hornsby Westfield at 9pm on Thursday. Soon after police spoken to a man at Waitara railway station and allegedly found several unopened movies on him. The 17-yearold was charged with having goods in custody as well as his bail breach. He will face Bidura Children's Court next week.

THORNLEIGH Copper pipes were removed from underneath a house in Thornleigh late last month. The owners are not sure of when the pipe was removed but they believe it was late April. Thieves also took the brass fittings from the home on The Esplanade.

THORNLEIGH More than \$4000 in power tools were taken from a container left on a building site in Thornleigh. Some time between 5pm on Wednesday and 7am on Thursday a lock was broken on the container on Pennant Hills Rd.

HORNSBY HEIGHTS A quad bike was stolen from a Hornsby Heights property over the weekend. Some time between 10am on Friday and 1pm on Saturday, the bike was taken from the shed of a home on Galston Rd. Witnesses should phone 9476 9799.

WAITARA A handbag was stolen from a car left parked on the street overnight in Waitara last week. The bag was left in the car, on Orara St, between 7pm on Thursday and 8am on Friday. The Mazda was left with smashed windows and the bag, containing a wallet and credit cards, was taken.

HORNSBY Police are reviewing CCTV footage after a woman fled Dan Murphy's Hornsby Westfield with a bottle of whiskey. At 10.25am on Saturday the woman, wearing a pink hoodie, took the \$87 bottle and left the store. She was

described as in her 20s, caucasian, wearing black tights and with long dark hair. Witnesses should phone Hornsby Police on 9476 9799.

TURRAMURRA A woman who left her handbag on a letter box while talking on her mobile phone had it stolen while she was distracted. She was standing on Kissing Point Rd around 11pm when her handbag, containing her wallet, was taken. Witnesses should phone Hornsby Police on 9476 9799.


WEST PYMBLE A man was charged with mid-range drink-driving after an accident on Wednesday, April 30. A grey Alfa Romeo was driving on Lady Game Drive and allegedly collided with a rock wall, flipping onto its roof at about 11.45pm. Kuring Gai police officers attended and spoke to the 31-year-old driver of the Alfa. He was

given a roadside breath test with an alleged positive result. He was arrested and taken to Hornsby Police Station and underwent a breath analysis and allegedly returned a reading of 0.097.

PYMBLE Numerous storage cages were broken into at a unit block on Pymble Ave overnight on Saturday. It was believed the offender/s tailgated another car to access the area as the building was well-secured. The lock was broken on a roller door and when officers attended it became evident that a number of other cages had been broken into but were yet to be reported.

LINDFIELD A number of cars were broken into at a unit block on Eaton Rd overnight on Friday, May 2. Police were called to the unit block by a number of residents who discovered the break-ins on Saturday morning. Investigations are continuing.

TURRAMURRA A woman's handbag was stolen about 11pm on Friday, May 2. The woman left her handbag near a letterbox of a property on Kissing Point Rd while she walked around the nearby area talking on her mobile phone. When she returned her bag had been taken which contained her credit cards, car keys and various other personal items.


Artist's impression of the interchange - 3 levels of parking will be provided below the interchange.

We received a request for this road rule - Giving way to pedestrians when turning



If a driver is turning left or right at an intersection, the driver must give way to any pedestrian crossing the road the driver is entering.

This applies to intersections with and without traffic lights. However, this rule does not apply at roundabouts.

For their own safety, pedestrians should always check their surroundings before crossing the road.
