Hornsby Police news, 19/5/14 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command:

Incident: Middle range drink driving charge.

Time/Date: About 8.45pm Friday 16th

Place: Pacific highway, Gordon

Vehicle 1: Nissan

Driver 1: 39 year old female

Details: Police stopped the Nissan for a random breath test with the driver returning an alleged positive result, she was then arrested. A subsequent test gave a result of .131.The female driver had her licence suspended by police and she

was charged.

Court: The female is to appear at the North Sydney Local Court on the 12th of June charged with Driving with a Middle Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol

Incident: Motor bike crash

Time/Date: About 6.40am Sunday 18th

Place: M1 motorway Mt Colah.

Rider: 54 year old male

Cycle: Suzuki

Vehicle 2: Tow truck

Details: The tow truck was travelling on the M1 in lane 1 of 3, as the driver approached the dipper hehas slowed due to the hill. At this time the Suzuki was in lane 3 of 3 and has changed from lane 3 to 2 then into lane 1 to pass slower cars. The motor cycle has not seen the slower moving tow truck in lane 1, the Suzuki rider has braked but hit the rear of the tow truck, the rider has fallen from his bike. Several witnesses and the tow truck driver stopped to assist the rider. The rider was taken to RNSH with various injuries and may lose one of his little fingers. Inquiries are still being made and police will wait the results of blood tests on the rider prior to taking any action.

Incident: Truck takes down wires.

Time/Date: About 11.40am Friday 16th Place: Malsbury rd x Clarke rd, Hornsby

Vehicle 1: Low loader semi trailer.

Details: The semi trailer has been driven along Malsbury road turned to cross over the rail bridge, in crossing the bridge the truck has brought down Foxtel and Optus wires. The trick has stopped on the bridge in case power wires had also been brought down. The truck remained stuck for several hours finally being released at about 3pm. There were obviously major traffic disruptions to the area. The truck driver stated he went that way due to getting 2 flat tyres and needed to get off Pennant Hills road to change them, because of the size of the truck he could not turn around or go back to Pennant Hills road any other way. A number of inquiries are still being made into the incident.

19 May: Police are appealing for information after a boy was approached in Warrawee last week.

Just after 3pm (Friday 16 May 2014), a ten-year-old boy was walking west along **Fox Valley Road** when a white four-door sedan approached him. The male driver spoke to the boy briefly, and the boy ran to a nearby school to alert teachers. Officers from Kuring Gai Local Area Command were informed of the incident and commenced investigations. As they continue their inquiries, police would like to speak to a man who may be able to assist them with their inquiries.

He is described as being of African appearance, about 40-years-old, of medium build and with dark skin, short dark curly hair, and a clean-shaven face.

Information you provide will be treated in the strictest of confidence. We remind people they should not report crime information via our Facebook and Twitter pages.

Meanwhile, the incident has again prompted police to encourage parents to discuss the â€**Safe People, Safe Places**' messages with their children, including;

- Make sure your parents or another adult you know knows where you are at all times.
- Always walk straight home or to the place you are walking to. Walk near busier roads and streets, or use paths where there are lots of other people.
- Know where safe places are a shop, service station, police station, library or school. If you are ever frightened, you should go to one of these places and ask them to call the police.
- Learn about safe adults you can look for and talk to if you need help police officers, teachers at school, adults you know and trust.
- Don't talk to people you don't know and never get into a car with someone you don't know. If a car stops on the side of the road and you don't know the person inside, do not stop.
- If you are scared and can use a phone, call 000 and tell them you are scared.
- If someone tries to grab you, yell out, â€~Go away, I don't know you'. This lets other people know you have been approached by someone you don't know.

19 May: Police are investigating the circumstances surrounding a suspicious fire overnight at a school in Galston.

About 1am today (Monday 19 May 2014), emergency services were alerted by neighbours to a fire in the grounds of a school on Galston Road. Fire and Rescue NSW attended a short time later and found the multi-storey library block well alight. The roof of the building had already collapsed. Police from Kuring Gai Local Area Command also attended and have established a crime scene. Investigators are treating the fire as suspicious and a police guard remains at the school. Later today crime scene and fire investigators will examine the library when it is safe to enter the building. It is estimated that the repair bill for the building and to replace its contents will be in excess of \$2 million.

Police have urged anyone with information about suspicious or unusual activity near the school overnight to come forward.

18 May: Police have arrested a man following a stabbing at a hotel in Hornsby last night which has left a woman with serious injuries.

Shortly before 10pm (Saturday 17 May), the 48-year-old woman was stabbed during a domestic-related incident in the gaming room of the hotel on Hunter Street. The woman was treated at the scene and taken to Royal North Shore Hospital with a stab wound to her abdomen and shoulder. Her condition is described as serious. Police arrested the woman's 48-year-old male partner in the vicinity of the hotel a short time after the incident. He has been taken to Hornsby Police Station and is expected to be charged over the stabbing. Officers established a crime scene and have interviewed a number of witnesses.

16 May: Teen stabbed with syringe during attempted robbery â€" Hornsby

Police are appealing for information after a teenager was stabbed with a syringe during an attempted robbery at Hornsby this morning. About 12.30am (Friday 16 May 2014), a 19-year-old man and his friend were walking on Burdett Street when a female approached them, allegedly demanding money. When the 19-year-old refused, the female allegedly stabbed him in the back with a syringe before leaving the area. The syringe was not believed to have been used. The teenager attended Hornsby Hospital and officers from Kuring Gai LAC - NSW Police Force commenced an investigation.

Detectives would now like to speak to a female who they believe may be able to assist with inquiries. The female is described as being of **Caucasian appearance**, aged between 16 and 21 years old, approximately 168cm tall, with a slim to

medium build and dark hair in a ponytail. She was last seen wearing dark-coloured striped tracksuit pants and Nike sneakers.

13 May: Two men have been charged after allegedly being caught in the act of holding up a service station on Sydney's Upper North Shore.

Just before 11pm yesterday (Monday 12 May 2014), two men aged 23 and 20, allegedly entered the service station on Mona Vale Road, St Ives, armed with knives. It's alleged the men threatened the male console operator and demanded cash. As this was occurring, a Traffic and Highway Patrol officer pulled into the service station to fill up. The officer saw the robbery in progress and immediately called for backup. Further police arrived and surrounded the shop, while the two men locked themselves inside with the attendant.

The operator came out after a short while, however the two armed men stayed inside until just after midnight, when they were arrested without further incident. They were taken to Hornsby Police Station and charged with robbery

armed with an offensive weapon. The pair was refused bail to appear before Hornsby Local Court today (Tuesday 13 May 2014).

Yellow Edge Lines - What do they mean?

Some councils use unbroken yellow edge lines on the side of roads to denote **No Stopping zones**. These painted yellow lines are more durable, easier to maintain and have less impact on the visual appearance of an area than road signs.

A driver MUST NOT STOP at the side of a road marked with a continuous yellow edge line.

These areas need to be kept clear so that drivers and pedestrians have an unimpeded view of each other and road safety is maintained. Police and Council parking officers can enforce this road rule, without any other road signs or

indications required.

READER QUESTIONS/ANSWERS SHARED

1. What should I do at an intersection with a zebra crossing at the stop line? Entering blocked crossings

Drivers approaching an intersection without traffic lights can stop on a pedestrian crossing immediately before the intersection if the crossing is not blocked, but only after giving way to pedestrians using the crossing. This is to allow drivers to check for traffic at an intersection.

Penalty: 2 demerit points (3 in a school zone) and \$232 (\$298 in a school zone)

2. I heard you have to indicate when moving more than 1 metre within your side of the road - is that correct? Yes, you do have to indicate, but only when moving over more than the width of your car (average width is 1.8m).

Extract from the RMS Driving Testing Officer's Manual: "A signal is only required when buffering if a lane line or marked centre line needs to be crossed in the process, or the car diverges **more than one car width** (of the car you are in)."

Advice from our Crime Prevention Officer, Snr Con Paul Cleary, talking on Triple H Community Radio 100.1 FM last Wednesday afternoon:

What should we do if we witness an incident, such as a robbery?

Stand back. Call Triple Zero (000). Take note of details, such as car rego numbers, offender's physical appearance and clothing, etc. and relay this information to the operator. Be reassured the operator is trained to calm you and lead you through the details. Let the police do their work. Assist the citizen affected (if not putting yourself at risk).

What should we do if we witness a car accident?


It is up to the drivers to report the accident. However, an independent witness account may be useful. Note where, the date, time, description of cars, etc. Give your details and state that you are prepared to give a statement.

What should we do if we see a person climbing through someone's window?

It may, or may not be a crime. Anything suspicious ring the police. If you've seen someone walking down several driveways and knocking on doors, this may be legitimate. But if you see them walking down the side of a house, or into the back of a property, that would be suspicious and you should call 000. If they are knocking on doors and come to your door, asking for a glass of water, or to make a phone call, they could be casing the area. Ring the police.

DRINK SPIKING - MYTH #3

The drugs used to spike drinks are tasteless, colourless and odourless, making them almost impossible to detect by the drinker.

Most tablets are made up of largely insoluble materials that leave a noticeable

sediment in the glass. Some drugs have a strong smell and a strong taste, making them potentially easier to notice. Relatively tasteless alcohol, such as vodka or tequila, may not be easily detected by a drinker when added to another alcoholic or strongly-flavoured drink.

TURRAMURRA Boxes of wine were stolen from a storage cage at Turramurra Ave overnight on Saturday, May 10. Four boxes of Briar Ridge and three bottles of Yalumba The Menzies were taken.

ROSEVILLE An Audi A4 burst into flames on Clanville Rd on Sunday, May 11. A Lindfield man was driving his car to a service station when he noticed smoke emitting from the bonnet. The man parked and got out of the vehicle before it erupted in flames. Fire and Rescue NSW attended and extinguished the fire. Investigators believe the fire was not suspicious and the cause was a mechanical fault.

ST IVES A car was broken into while parked on Warrimoo Ave between 5pm Sunday, May 11, and 7.15am on Monday, May 12. The driver side car door was smashed in the Ford Territory and a wallet was stolen with its contents totalling \$150.

PYMBLE A St Ives man, 20, was charged with high-range drink driving on Livingstone Ave. The P2 driver was driving home in a Mitsubishi Nimbus after attending a party in the area when he failed to negotiate an S bend and a front wheel mounted the gutter, colliding with a palm tree and ending up on the opposite side of the road. Police happened to be driving by and spoke to the man who allegedly blew a positive alcohol reading. He was taken to Gordon station where he allegedly returned a 0.211 per cent reading. He will appear at North Sydney local court on May 26.

KILLARA At least four businesses were broken into on Koola Ave between 9pm on Sunday, May 11, and 3.30am Monday, May 12. The shops included the bakery, the butchery, the hair salon and the Chinese restaurant. The ground floor front window of the bakery was smashed and \$100 in cash and two cartons of cigarettes worth \$288 were stolen.

PYMBLE Tools worth \$3100 were stolen from the canopy of a Mazda ute parked on Jugiong St between 8.15pm on Tuesday, May 6, and 6.15pm on Wednesday, May 7. The stolen items included power tools, a jack hammer, an angle grinder, drills, batteries, chargers and ear muffs. Police would like to remind the community not to leave expensive tools in vehicles which are left unattended parked on the streets.

KILLARA A man accidentally left a wallet on a bench at the Killara train station between 11am-noon on Wednesday, May 7. He returned to find his wallet was missing. It had been handed into the station staff with the \$300 cash missing. Police are reviewing CCTV footage.

PYMBLE A Mazda sedan's rear tail light was smashed while parked on Merrivale Rd between 7pm on Friday, May 9, and 8am on Saturday, May 10. The damage was worth \$100.

WAHROONGA A woman was confronted with a burglar in her home on Hampden Ave about 8.30pm on Friday, May 9. The lady heard a noise outside and then saw a light on in a back room. She went to the room and pressed a panic alarm button when she saw the intruder who fled with a safe, \$330 cash, matching antique pendant and earrings and a cubic zirconia.

WEST PYMBLE Three pot plants (one blue and two green) worth \$240 were stolen from a property's backyard on Bolwarra Rd between 6pm on Saturday, May 10, and 9.30am on Sunday, May 11.

PYMBLE A Toyota Aurion sedan's front rear-vision window was smashed while parked in an underground carpark of a nursing home between 7pm on Friday, May 9, and 7.20am on Monday, May 12.

HORNSBY A 30-year-old man was allegedly found in Hornsby Mall on Tuesday with a variety of drugs, from a crystal substance to powder, as well as stolen credit cards. Police spoke to the man at 3.50pm and found what they allege to be drugs

including crystals, a white powder, tablets and green vegetable matter. They also discovered a Visa card and Mastercard, plus \$1000 cash. He was charged with goods in custody and possession of a prohibited substance.

TURRAMURRA An 18year-old pedestrian wearing headphones required surgery for a broken ankle after being hit by a car on Monday night. At 9.25pm, the woman had stepped onto Ray St, when she was struck by the car. It is alleged the car was driving through an orange light and the pedestrian light had not yet changed to green. The woman was taken to hospital by ambulance. Investigations into the incident are still continuing.

HORNSBY HEIGHTS More than \$13,000 in jewellery was taken from a home in Cootamundra Rd last week. A window was forced open between 7am and 4.30pm on Thursday, May 8. Items taken included a \$1000 gold locket, \$500 charm bracelet and \$3000 garnet ring, as well as opal and pearl items.

HORNSBY A 38year-old man who allegedly tried to steal several cameras from a shop in Hornsby has been charged with stealing and malicious damage. It is alleged the man cut security wires to the cameras in Paxtons Camera Shop on Thursday night. Later that evening, the man was questioned by police. He was charged in relation to offences in Hornsby, Penrith and Chatswood.

WAITARA KISS comic books and trading cards from 1976 were stolen from a garage in Waitara on Monday night. Between 6pm on Monday and 7am on Tuesday, the storage cage in the basement of a unit complex in Alexandria Pde was broken into. The items taken were estimated to be worth \$500.

COWAN A driver alleged to have been recorded by police doing 167km/h in a 110km/h zone has been charged with drink driving. Police pulled the man over on the M1, at Cowan, at 8.30am on Sunday. He returned a blood-alcohol reading of 0.085 per cent and said his last drink was at 3am. The 50-year-old was charged with speeding and mid-range drink driving.

TURRAMURRA Four storage cages in the basement of a Turramurra unit complex were broken into on the weekend, with items such as beer and wine taken. The incidents occurred between 8.30am on Saturday and 4pm on Sunday in the complex, on Turramurra Ave. In one case, a bolt was cut and four bottles of wine were taken.
