23 June, from NSW Fair Trading: A dodgy tree lopper who received a deferred prison sentence for preying on elderly and vulnerable people in Sydney's northern suburbs (incl Roseville, S Turramurra and Killara) is behind bars, after failing to pay more than \$50,000 in fines, costs and compensation. Robert Douglas Pentecost was originally prosecuted for fraud and multiple breaches of the Australian Consumer Law and the Home Building Act in June 2013 and given one year to pay his penalties. 23 June, from the Advocate: Ku-ring-gai Police offer tips for keeping cars safe after thieves target four cars at Colah Rd, Mt Colah

HORNSBY Police say they can only do so much to protect car owners from opportunistic thieves after a string of car break-ins late last week. Four cars were targeted in the one street at Mt Colah on Thursday and Friday last week. All four vehicles were left unlocked on Colah Rd and thieves made off with a GPS, an iPod, three bank cards, cash and a phone charger.

Withdrawals were made from the bank accounts linked to the keycards. In one incident, the car door was opened and items from the glovebox were strewn all over the front seats but nothing was taken.

Ku-ring-gai crime prevention officer Senior Constable Paul Cleary said there were

a number of things vehicle owners could do to guard against thieves. He said people should always lock their windows and doors, use an alarm, and don't leave any property visible inside the car.

"Don't leave items under blankets or clothes â€" it looks like you may have goodies there,― he said. "Remove the mobile and GPS holders from the windscreen as thieves may believe things are inside the glove box and park in well lit areas at night and areas with high use (pedestrian and vehicular traffic).― He said some people even leave the glove box and centre console open to show nothing is inside.

Motorists are being urged to avoid the Pacific Highway at Gordon following the death of a motorcyclist today.

About 11.35am (Friday 20 June), a collision occurred between a motorcycle and car on the highway at the intersection of Park Avenue. The male rider was treated at the scene but died a short time ago. The male driver of the car has not been injured.

I've spoken to our Intelligence section and they are aware of this guy and have spoken to him. He is legitimately selling solar deals in the area so no issue with this guy. That's not to say others may not be so legit. It is a trend we at Hornsby police have seen recently where crooks wear fluro vests to 'blend in' so please continue to be vigilant but not alarmed. Report any sus people or vehicle to crime stoppers 1800 333 000 or 000 if they are actually committing a crime. As for the 1 cent (or English penny) on the mail box we are also aware of this and will monitor it. In saying this it is also advisable to clear your mail boxes daily regardless. Your mail box has a lot of personal info (bills, credit cards, bank statements) that in the wrong hands can be used to steal your ID or make your credit history a mess. Dogs a deterrent or not, in most cases yes. Beware of dog signs on gates and fences are a good idea as is the water bowl at the door. But nothing will deter a determined thief, everything you do crime prevention wise is a help to minimise your risk, it's about making your home less attractive to thieves (higher risk less reward). When Bad Things Happen to your Good Name - Identity Theft Advice

Security of personal and business information is critical. Criminals commonly rummage through the rubbish bins looking for personal identifying data that they can steal and use to commit fraud and other offences in your name.

Â" Take time to shred or destroy old bank statements, credit card bills, utility bills or other documents to prevent this material falling into the hands of criminals.

Â" Be careful to whom you give personal information. If you have to reveal personal information, ask some questions about the security of the information and be very cautious giving out any information over the phone of Internet unless you know who you are dealing with.

Â" Guard your mail from theft by securing your letterbox. Criminals value your mail and will use it to commit fraud with your accounts or open loans or credit in your name.

Â" Minimise your identification and the number of cards you carry in your wallet to what you actually need.

Â" Check your bank and credit card statements to make sure there are no unauthorised transactionsâ€"this may be the first sign someone has stolen your identity.

From the City of Sydney Personal Security Fact Sheet: Dealing with confrontation

Committing to your personal safety when you're threatened is essential.

1 Trust your instincts

Trust your instincts when deciding the best way to respond to a threat – whether it's to scream, run away, physically defend yourself or negotiate with your attacker. Try and assess the motives of the offender when determining your strategy.

2 Attract attention

Attract attention if possible - offenders don't want to be caught in the act. Scream for assistance, call "Helpâ€● .

3 Don't put up a fight for your belongings

Your safety is more important than your belongings. If an offender wants your bag, wallet or money, hand them over.

4 Remove yourself from the threat

If possible, run away or use reasonable force to remove yourself from danger.

5 Don't give up

If one strategy doesn't work, keep trying different ones. This sends the message to an offender that you are not vulnerable or an easy target.

6 Being followed

If you think you're being followed, go to the nearest police station or occupied place.

7 Call for help

If nobody else is around, try to call for help on your mobile or public telephone.

8 Ignore verbal harassment

In cases involving verbal harassment, ignore it and move on. If you're alone, head straight to the nearest police station or occupied area.
