29 September: Hornsby Police news, 29/9/14 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: Motor bike and car crash

Time/Date: About 5pm Sunday 28th Place: Moores road, Glenorie

Vehicle 1: Commodore

Driver 1: 18 year old male

Vehicle 2: Yamaha R1

Driver 2: 37 year old male

Details: The Commodore was travelling south on Moores road and was in the process of turning into a driveway, at this time a Yamaha R1 was travelling northbound and collided with the Commodore, which was still partially out onto the roadway. The bike rider came off the bike and was thrown to the roadway. Ambulance officers attended and took the rider to Westmead hospital with deep lacerations and a suspected fractured spine.

Police will wait the results of blood tests prior to proceeding further with this matter.

Incident: Motor bike crash

Time/Date: About 11.15pm Saturday 27th

Place: Pacific Highway, Cowan

Vehicle 1: Hyosung

Driver 1: 21 year old male

Details: The bike rider was travelling south on the Pacific highway and while negotiating a left hand bend has for unknown reasons hit the Armco railing, the rider was thrown from his bike into bushland about 10m. The rider was eventually found and was taken to hospital with a suspected broken leg. Police will wait the results of blood tests prior to proceeding further with this matter.

Incident: Car crashes into house Time/Date: About 5pm Sunday 28th

Place: Bralas avenue, St Ives Chase

Vehicle 1: BMW

Details: The BMW driver had just parked the car at the top of her driveway. The driveway had a downward slope of about 30 degrees and was about 15m long. Soon after, the owner heard a crash and the sound of glass breaking. The owner went outside to see her car had crashed into a balcony at the family home, it was at this point the owner realised she may have not put the handbrake on. No one was in the car and no one was injured. It seems the car took out a decorative pole to the balcony before crashing into a garage. The fire brigade were called and was on standby during the removal process as fuel could be smelt.

Incident: School vandalised

Place: Gordon East public school

Details: Over the last weekend an unknown number of persons decided the local school was a good place to have a good time. A log was set on fire on the grass oval and glass was smashed in the schools sand pit.

If you see or hear anyone in schools particularly during the school holidays please call police. Damage to schools costs money to fix or clean up not to mention the safety issues with smashed glass.

Incident: Several Break, enter & steal offences.

Time/Date: Since Wednesday 24th and Sunday 29th

Place: Dumaresq st, Gordon x 2, Lachlan avenue, West Pymble, The Esplanade, Thornleigh, Brushwood place, Hornsby, Galston road, Hornsby Heights.

Details: Over the past week several have been broken into, one in particular had a flyscreen removed and the thieves just entered through the open glass window. Property including computers, tools, jewellery and an Ipad was taken.

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above incidents to contact **Hornsby police on 9476 9799**, or phone **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000** to report any information relating to the matter anonymously.

Please remember School returns after the long weekend, this means school zones will be in force and Kuring gai police will be actively targeting drivers for offences in those areas. Pedestrians will also be targeted for not using crossings.

29 September: School holidays are in full swing. The weather is great and it's a perfect opportunity to take a well deserved holiday with the family. Sadly, thieves also use this opportunity to target unsuspecting home owners. Follow these simple tips to help safeguard your property from theft:

- Display street number at the front of the house to assist emergency services to locate your home;
- Ensure all perimeter fences are in good order and that gates are kept closed and locked to restrict unauthorised access to your property;
- Trim trees and shrubs from around doors and windows so as not to provide concealment to intruders and increase visibility to and from the street;
- Consider having a monitored intruder alarm system installed. Obtain at least three quotes from licensed security companies;
- Garden tools, equipment and ladders should be locked away when not in use to prevent them being used to gain access to your home.

29 September, from the SMH: Police pop pen-gun syndicate

Police have smashed a Sydney pen-gun syndicate accused of supplying miniature weapons to bikies and organised criminals. The James Bond-inspired weapons are made to look like pens, key rings and mobile phones.

29 September, from NSW Police: National Police Remembrance Day services will be held throughout the country today (Monday 29 September 2014) to honour police officers who have lost their lives. Since 1862, two hundred and fifty two NSW Police officers have died in the line of duty.

28 September: Police are appealing for public assistance after a unique pink diamond ring worth more than half a million dollars was stolen from an auction centre at Alexandria yesterday.

Between 12:30pm and 1:25pm (Saturday 27 September 2014), a pink argyle and white diamond ring valued at \$577,000 was stolen from a display counter at an auction centre on Ralph Street. An attendant discovered the ring missing and contacted police.

Officers from Redfern Local Area Command commenced an investigation into the theft and are appealing for any witnesses to come forward. It's estimated about 100 people walked through the auction centre during the time it was stolen.

Each of the diamonds in the ring is laser inscribed with a serial number.

28 September: Police are investigating after a woman was struck by a bottle at a party in East Killara last night.

About 9.30pm (Saturday 27 September 2014), a 20-year-old woman was at a house party on Springdale Road when a glass bottle struck the side of her head. Emergency services were called when the woman lost consciousness a short time later. She was taken by Ambulance Paramedics to Royal North Shore Hospital, where she is undergoing tests to ascertain the seriousness of her injuries. Police from Kuring Gai LAC - NSW Police Force were called to the house and established a crime scene. A 23-year-old man was interviewed at the scene, but released pending further inquiries. At this stage, officers do not believe the bottle was thrown intentionally.

THE truck involved in the latest Galston Gorge drama could well have its registration suspended. The driver is also facing a heavy penalty following the incident on Wednesday, according to a Roads and Maritime Services spokeswoman. "Police intend to penalise the driver for disobeying signs which warn that overlength vehicles are prohibited from entering the gorge,― the spokeswoman said. "This includes penalties in excess of \$2000 and loss of six demerit points.



Scam disruption project | An ACCC initiative



The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) is warning people of the risks associated with online dating and sending money across the sea through its new National Scam Disruption Project. They are working with the Australasian Consumer Fraud Taskforce, including state and territory police and consumer affairs agencies, to alert at-risk individuals to the possibility of becoming a victim of fraud.

A wide range of resources have been developed to help people identify and protect themselves from these romance scammers. The resources include: •scam case studies,

•information about how to spot a fake dating profile, and

•a scam warning video.



From Hornsby Shire Council: GENEROUS GIFT FROM A LOCAL BUSINESS

Hornsby Shire Council and Maroota Sandstone Quarry have joined forces to **fix a notorious dumping ground for illegal rubbish on Old Northern Road.** The quarry generously offered to place 12 large sandstone blocks across the entrance to the site that prevent vehicles entering, free of charge. "We decided to do it after I was chatting to Council's ranger one day about the problem,― says Gary, the quarry's manager. "It was pretty unsightly when you came past here every day and saw the piles of garbage.―

The need for action was made particularly clear this week when a new pile of rubbish was dumped less than half an hour after Council had finished cleaning out the site. "We're very grateful to Maroota Sandstone Quarry for their

generous assistance,― Hornsby Shire's Acting Mayor Gurdeep Singh says. "This is a great example of Council and the local business community working together for the benefit of the entire community.― Each of the sandstone blocks weighs around seven tonnes.



From the Hornsby Advocate 25 September: Police increase patrols

TERROR THREAT LEVEL CHANGE PUTS OFFICERS ON STREETS

KU-RING-GAI Police will be more visible in response to the Federal

Government's raising of the national terror alert. Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command Crime Prevention Officer, Senior Constable Paul Cleary, said police had stepped up patrols in the area. "We do critical infrastructure patrols, we have always done these patrols, but once the terror alert went up we now do extra patrols,― he said. Critical infrastructure refers to government assets like railway stations and hospitals. Snr Constable Cleary said residents should remain alert to any suspicious activity. "Go about your day-today business but just be extra mindful of cars loitering in the area ... people walking the streets who don't appear to have purpose. If you see any unattended bags (or notice) strange smells, things like that should be reported. But most importantly don't panic, go about your day-to-day business, just report it and let us deal with it.―

On September 12, Australia's terror threat level was raised from medium to high, meaning a terror attack on home soil is now officially considered "likely― . Residents who suspect a threat should call **000** or if they see anything suspicious contact **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000**.

HORNSBY A woman and her boyfriend are facing assault charges following an incident at the Railway Hotel, Hornsby, on Tuesday night. The woman, 25, from Thornleigh, is facing two counts of assault police, two counts of resist arrest, failure to quit licensed premises and offensive language. The man, 34, from Tamworth, is facing an assault charge. The couple are due at North Sydney Local Court on October 8.

ASQUITH An angry motorist received a double penalty after he was stopped by Highway Patrol police on the Pacific Highway at Asquith on Monday afternoon. Police said the motorist, a 43-year-old Gosford man, received a ticket for a traffic offence, which he subsequent ly ripped up and threw on the ground. Police then

gave him a ticket for littering.

MT COLAH Jewellery and a watch valued at \$750 were stolen from a home in Parklands Rd, Mt Colah, some time between 10.30am and 5pm on Tuesday. Police said a ground floor front window had its flyscreen removed and the window was forced open.

GALSTON A sports facility in Bayfield Rd, Galston, had its canteen broken into some time between 7.30pm on Monday and 10.45am on Tuesday. Police said the canteen's lock had been cut and \$300 worth of soft drinks stolen from the fridges.

BEROWRA A motorist has been charged with high-range drink-driving after his vehicle was stopped by police in Berowra Waters Rd, Berowra, on Monday night. Police said the motorist recorded a 0.192 blood alcohol reading. His licence was suspended on the spot. He is due to appear in North Sydney Local Court on October 16.

Hot off the press from the Turramurra (Gordon Area 3/4) Neighbourhood Watch meeting tonight....

The guest speaker was our Crime Prevention Officer, Snr Con Paul Cleary, with a Question & Answer session. Here is a brief selection:

Q. What is the main worry in our area at the moment?

- A. 1. People leaving their windows ajar. We have 2 cases a month where homes are accessed in this manner.
- 2. Storage cages under unit blocks are built for price, not necessarily for security. Beware weak hinges, frames, wire, padlock attachments, gaps at the top/bottom.
- 3. Thieves entering the home during the day, whilst people are at home. This happened in W. Pymble and Thornleigh during the week. Don't get complacent about home security.

Q. How safe is it for Seniors in Hornsby Mall after dark?

A. Safe. There is CCTV. There are some youngsters causing a few problems, but seniors aren't their target. If you have a choice, go with others and keep to public places.

Paul recommended that if you are confronted by a robber, let them have your bag. Your safety is secondary to them; their focus is on your bag. Don't struggle. Instead keep your focus on them - memorising descriptions and possibly car regos, etc. If you have the opportunity, suggest that they take the cash and cards and leave the rest. They may be fool enough to leave items with fingerprints on! Get immediate help and call the Police asap.

FACT FILE - House Number/Street Number

The street number must be prominently displayed at the front of your home to comply with Local Government Act 1973, Section 124, Order 8. The number should be a minimum height of 120mm and be visible at night. The number could also be painted on the street kerb outside your home to assist emergency services and visitors to locate your home.
