15 December, from the North Shore Times: TWO teenagers have been charged with graffiti offences after they were allegedly caught vandalising a train at Gordon Railway Station.

It's alleged that two boys and girl entered the rail corridor about 1am on Sunday and started to use spray cans to graffiti the train. A train driver and guard approached the teens before calling the police. The teens fled to Robert St, Gordon where police officers arrested and charged the girl, 18 and a boy, 15, with damage to property, enter running lines. Both were given conditional bail and will appear in court next month.

15 December, from Hornsby Advocate: Police have confirmed that a helicopter hovering over bushland near the Sydney Adventist Hospital last night was searching for a 28-year-old missing bushwalker. About 8pm a number of people heard someone calling for help from bushland near the Comenarra Parkway. Police, the dog squad and ambulance helicopter attended the scene. Police made further inquiries and found out the missing man had managed to find his way out of the bush and arrived home about 9.30pm.

15 December, from the Hornsby Advocate: THIEVES are using tradesmenstyle clothing as a cover to break in to properties on the upper north shore, police warn.

Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command crime prevention officer Paul Cleary said there had been several instances over the past few months. "Fluorescent shirts are the trend at the moment with break and enters,― he said. "They try to blend in with a tradie look.― The latest incident occurred last Tuesday when two people wearing fluorescent orange shirts were spotted at a property in Bristol Ave, Wahroonga. A short time later a cleaner arrived and discovered that some of the rooms at the home had been ransacked..

Snr Constable Cleary said a crowbar had been used to force open a window. "It's unknown what property has been taken at this stage,― he said. "Anybody sighted in fluorescent vests who don't appear to belong to a certain address, call police straight away.―

10 December: Police are appealing for information to locate a man wanted on an outstanding warrant following his arrest in the Wollongong area last year.

Dean Henry, 43, is wanted on a revocation of parole warrant after being convicted

of offences including assault police, take and drive conveyance, stalking and contravening an apprehended violence order. Police have conducted extensive inquires but have been unable to find him and are now appealing for assistance from the public.



Dean Henry is described as Caucasian appearance with a fair complexion, 175-180cm tall, of medium build, with blonde hair, blue eyes, a goatee beard and tattoos on his arms and legs. Members of the public who see Dean Henry are urged not to approach him but to contact Triple Zero (000) immediately.

09 December: Hornsby Police news, 9/12/14 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: Disqualified driver & drug charges

Time/Date: About 11.20am Friday 5th Place: Pennant Hills Road, Thornleigh

Driver 1: 35 year old male

Details: Police received certain information about a vehicle being driven on the M1, soon after the car in question was located as it stopped at a service station in Thornleigh. Police approached the car and have spoken to a male and a female. Various inquiries led police to search the vehicle where a number of drug related implements were allegedly located as well as some green vegetable matter, police will allege this to be Cannabis, some pills were also located. Certain admissions were made in relation to the items with inquiries continuing. Police have also established the male driver was driving the vehicle despite being an alleged disqualified driver until 2029.

Court: The male is to appear at the North Sydney local Court on a date yet to be fixed for the disqualified driving offence. Following a number of inquiries other charges may be laid.

Details: A Commodore was broken into while parked on street. A handbag containing credit cards, a license and other documents was stolen. It is believed about 5am the stolen credit cards were fraudulently used at a service station in the Chatswood area to purchase items. CCTV footage is being reviewed with a number of inquiries to follow.

Details: A Corolla was left unlocked at the location, this car was entered by an unknown person, in the same time frame a BMW X3 was locked but had a passenger window smashed open. An Apple Mac laptop was taken during the incident.

08 December, from Crime Stoppers: KEEPING YOUR HOME SAFE (Part 6 of 7)

A large number of home burglaries are easily preventable by introducing a number of simple and inexpensive changes to your home.

AVOID:

- Leaving doors and windows open when you leave the house despite how long you will be absent for.
- Leaving side gates and garden sheds unlocked.
- Hiding keys anywhere outside your home because thieves look in all these places to gain easy access.
- Placing personal details such as your name, address and telephone number on your keys.
- Leaving large amounts of cash inside your home.
- Leaving cars unlocked in the driveway.
- Leaving notes on the door stating that you are away... or when you will be returning.
- Giving personal information to a caller you don't know
- Letting callers know you are home alone.
- Posting to social media that you are on holidays or not at home.



12 December, from Hornsby Shire Council: HARMFUL ALGAE RECORDED AT BEROWRA WATERS

Hornsby Shire Council is giving precautionary advice regarding harmful algae at Berowra Waters for public awareness. Highly elevated levels of potentially harmful algae have been recorded at Calabash Bay and Berowra Waters. These algae come from the genus Alexandrium, Dinophysis, Karenia, Prorocentrum and some Cochlodinium and Chattonella.

These algae can be **harmful to human health** and it is advised not to eat wild stocks of shellfish, which includes oysters and mussels, in this local area. **Swimming and contact with water should be avoided** until further advice is received from the NSW State Government.

Algal bloom alerts are issued by the Regional Algal Coordinating Committee, who are responsible for local management of algal blooms. The committee is yet to advise formally on this situation. If an algal alert is issued, information will be available through the **NSW Algal Hotline on 1800 999 457** or by visiting www.water.nsw.gov.au.

It is anticipated that this bloom will dissipate as natural conditions change.

BE AWARE, BUT NOT ALARMED, ABOUT BAG THEFT

Kuring-gai LAC is issuing a warning to women who carry and use handbags. Please make sure you know exactly where your handbag is at all times. We advise to physically hold your bag at all times when in public, and never leave it in a shopping trolley or on the top of a pram. Make sure it is zipped up so the contents cannot be stolen. We have

taken reports where victims have had purses or wallets taken from a handbag that was unzipped or unattended. Thieves will wait for the opportune time to strike. After the purse is taken the credit and debit cards are used to commit frauds. Tell all your friends and relatives to be aware, but not alarmed.

black suede handbag worth \$200 was stolen from the display table of a shop at Westfield Hornsby between 9.40am 9.50am on Tuesday. Police want to speak to a woman described as being about 55 years old, of caucasian appearance, medium build, short red hair, and wearing a black and white polka dot top and black business pants.

Hornsby Shire Council and Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) are introducing 40km/h speed limits on some roads which have a high number of pedestrians. These will be clearly signposted.

RMS and Council are jointly funding this road safety initiative.

Why lower the speed limit?

Lower vehicle speeds result in fewer pedestrian injuries and deaths. If a vehicle travelling at 50km/h hits a pedestrian, it is twice as likely to kill the pedestrian that if it was travelling at 40km/h.

Driving at lower speeds improves a driver's ability to stop and avoid hitting a pedestrian, and if pedestrian crashes do occur they are less severe, especially for children and elderly pedestrians.

Where does the new speed limit apply?

The 40km/h speed limit will be signposted on the following roads in Hornsby Town Centre where there is high pedestrian activity and significant traffic volumes: Peats Ferry Road, Coronation Street, Dural Street, Dural Lane, William Street, Ashley Lane, High Street, Station Street and Jersey Lane.

The 40km/h speed limit is enforceable and normal enforcement procedures will apply.

So when you drive on these roads with high levels of pedestrian activity look out for the new 40km/h signs.

Please drive at 40km/h and help improve local road safety.

Selected HOME THEFT PREVENTION TIPS from neighbouring Eastwood Neighbourhood Watch groups:

Thieves are often watching for homes that look empty, particularly during school holidays, as they know this is a popular time to go away. Follow our advice to help prevent your household falling victim to burglars:

- Try not to take a taxi to the airport. If you do, use a taxi company you can rely on, don't discuss your holiday plans and make it sound like you have a house-sitter, whether you do or not.
- Do not put your home address on your luggage when you are traveling to your holiday destination. A phone number and postcode will suffice if you want to label your luggage.
- If you normally leave bicycles or similar items in your shed, lock it, or consider putting them in the house.
- Don't post public messages on social media that you're away from home.

From Neighbourhood Watch Australasia: Let's face it, dogs are not only "man's best friend", they can also be a burglar's worst enemy.

Simple tip #2 - A Loud Dog

In fact, it was the very loud barking of my neighbours dog that alerted me to the van and two men visiting their house, uninvited in the middle of the day. I don't know who got the bigger shock, me yelling out, the two men who scurried off, or the dogs. Police reports state that most burglars avoid houses with dogs. Burglars don't want to be seen or caught; they also want to avoid pain! Even small, noisy dogs - can be an effective deterrent. And while you might feel safer with a large dog that could do bodily harm, the most important aspect is having a dog that sounds an alarm with its bark.

A few years ago a friend of mine even bought a recoding of a barking dog, to use as a deterrent. Just saying!
