19 January: Hornsby Police news, 19/1/15 The following relate to local issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: Crash and drink driving charge pending.

Time/Date: About 4.45am Sunday 18th Place: Cambourne Avenue, St Ives.

Vehicle 1: Commodore Ute. Driver 1: 23 year old male

Details: The 23 year old ute driver was allegedly travelling with 2 female passengers in the car, one was on the lap of the other with no seat belt on. The ute has â€~lost control' and slid into the gutter and a tree. A female passenger suffered some injuries and was taken to hospital. A number of inquiries are still being made into the matter and police are expected to lay charges soon.

Incident: Middle range drink driving charge. Time/Date: About 2.20am Saturday 17th

Place: Mt William Street, Gordon.

Vehicle 1: Mazda

Driver 1: 21 year old female

Details: The female driver who was a P2 licence holder was stopped for a random breath test which was allegedly positive for alcohol. A further test gave a result of .108. The female had her licence suspended by police.

Court: The female is to appear at the North Sydney local Court charged with Driving with a Middle Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol

Incident: Middle range drink driving charge. Time/Date: About 12.10am Saturday 17th

Place: Dural Street, Hornsby Vehicle 1: Kawasaki motor cycle.

Driver 1: 18 year old male learner licence holder.

Details: Police observed the motor cycle on the Pacific highway with a pillion passenger. Police have activated lights and sirens to speak to the rider. The bike has turned into Dural Street, when police have turned into the street the bike was found on its side on the ground with the rider and pillion next to it. A roadside breath test gave an alleged positive result for alcohol, a number of inquiries were made into the riders licence status where it was found he held a learners licence. A follow up breath analysis gave a result of .126. The male had his licence suspended by police. About 1.50am police were in the area due to the bike being in an isolated area and have found the same male next to the bike, fearing he would try to ride home police have confiscated the bikes keys.

Court: The male is to appear at the North Sydney local Court charged with Driving with a Middle Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol and not display L plates.

Incident: Car crash

Time/Date: About 4am Monday 19th Place: Pennant Hills Road, Normanhurst.

Vehicle 1: Suzuki

Driver 1: 35 year old male.

Vehicle 2: Prime mover and trailer

Details: The truck was stationary at traffic lights, as the lights turned green the truck has started to move off, the truck driver has felt a bump from behind and smoke or steam coming from the behind. The Suzuki for unknown reasons has hit the truck. The 35 year old Suzuki driver was taken to Hospital with minor injuries, the Suzuki had extensive damage. Police will wait the results of blood tests prior to taking any action.

Incident: Car crash

Time/Date: About 10.20am Friday 16th

Place: M1 Motorway, near Kuring-gai Chase Road.

Vehicle 1: Commodore

Driver 1: 41 year old female

Details: The female Commodore driver was travelling southbound on the M1 in lane 3 of 3. After she passed a truck she merged into lane 2 and for an unknown reason has started swerving and skidded back into lane 3. At some point the Commodore has allegedly clipped another car also in lane 3; this car was pushed into the Armco railing and crashed. At some point the truck was also hit in the incident, all 3 vehicles have stopped with police and ambulance staff attending. The female driver suffered minor bruising; the driver of the other car involved suffered bruising to most parts of his body, both drivers were taken to the RNSH. Police will be waiting the results of blood tests before taking action.

Incident: Steal from motor vehicle.

Time/Date: Between 10am and 3.40pm Wednesday 14th

Place: Banool Avenue, St Ives.

Details: The Hilux owner has left an Ipad in the car with the doors unlocked. When he returned a few hours later the car had been entered and the Ipad was missing.

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above



19 January, from CareFlight: CAREFLIGHT RESCUE SERVICE MEETING GROWING DEMAND

The number of seriously injured patients flown to hospital by CareFlight's unique rapid response helicopter jumped almost 50% in 2014, according to a review of the year's activity. The rapid response service, based centrally in Sydney adjacent to Westmead Hospital, is the only service in Australia dedicated specifically to flying a specialist emergency doctor and paramedic directly to the scene of major trauma events. It also the only helicopter rescue service that relies mainly on community fundraising to keep flying, with no ongoing government funding and no large corporate sponsor standing behind the service.

16 January: Police have arrested a man in Lithgow after he was allegedly in possession of counterfeit notes today.

About 9.30pm (Thursday 15 January 2015), police from Chifley Traffic and Highway Patrol attended a service station on Lithgow Street, Lithgow, to fill the car. On speaking to staff the officers were handed counterfeit notes that had been used in a previous transaction. Police commenced an investigation and attended other local businesses, including a fast food restaurant in Lithgow, where a number of counterfeit \$50 notes were seized. Early this morning (Friday 16 January 2015), following inquiries, officers attended a hotel on Main Street, Lithgow, and spoke to a 21-year-old Blue Haven man. The man allegedly handed over a number of counterfeit notes. He was arrested and taken to Lithgow Police Station where he assisted with inquiries. The man was released as investigations continue.

Police appeal for anyone that believes they may have received counterfeit notes, especially in the Lithgow and Blue Mountains area, to report the incidents to **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000**, or local police. Police are urging anyone with information in relation to this incident to call Crime Stoppers.

13 January, from the government's Stay Smart Online: Fake email uses ISIS threat to distribute malicious attachment: Alert Priority High

You are advised to be cautious about opening any emails you receive that refer to an ISIS threat. New emails referring to ISIS terrorism activities carry a malicious attachment that can be used to infect your computer. The Australian Communications and Media Authority is experiencing a surge in reports of emails with the subject â€~ISIS attacks in sydney?' (sic). These emails encourage people to open an attached Word or RAR file by claiming the attachment includes

an article naming the Sydney locations ISIS plans to attack in 2015.

Clicking on the attachment could result in malicious code being installed that allows an attacker to take control of your computer. The email includes the contact details of the prominent news.com.au website in an attempt to represent itself as a legitimate email. It is highly likely similar malicious emails are in circulation using references to high profile, terror-related events.




READER's QUESTIONS

Now that we must give way to pedestrians at junctions, does that include at roundabouts?

Answer: No, roundabouts are meant to help the flow of traffic. You do NOT have to give way to pedestrians crossing at a roundabout - this would hinder the flow of traffic.

2 Giving way to pedestrians when turning



If a driver is turning left or right at an intersection, the driver must give way to any pedestrian crossing the road the driver is entering.

This applies to intersections with and without traffic lights. However, this rule does not apply at roundabouts.

For their own safety, pedestrians should always check their surroundings before crossing the road.

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design

Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) is a crime prevention strategy that focuses on the planning, design and structure of cities and neighbourhoods. It reduces opportunities for crime by using design and place management principles that reduce the likelihood of essential crime ingredients (law, offender, victim or target, opportunity) from intersecting in time and space.

Safer By Design Evaluation

The Safer by Design program commenced in NSW in the early 1990's. The program is a co-operative initiative involving the NSW Police, local councils, government departments and key private sector organisations. The aim of the program is to ensure that development application proposals are routinely

assessed for crime risk, and that preventable risk is reduced before the development is approved.

Territorial Re-enforcement

Community ownership of public space sends positive signals to the community. Places that feel owned and cared for are likely to be used, enjoyed and revisited.

Surveillance

People feel safe in public areas when they can see and interact with others, particularly people connected with that space, such as shopkeepers or adjoining residents. Criminals are often deterred from committing crime in places that are well supervised.

Natural surveillance is achieved when normal space users can see and be seen by others. This highlights the importance of building layout, orientation and location; the strategic use of design; landscaping and lighting – it is a by-product of well-planned, well-designed and well-used space.

Technical/mechanical surveillance is achieved through mechanical/electronic measures such as CCTV, help points and mirrored building panels. It is commonly used as a †patch†to supervise isolated, high risk locations.

Formal (or Organised) surveillance is achieved through the tactical positioning of guardians. An example would be the use of on-site supervisors, e.g. security guards at higher risk locations.

Tips for Transport Security: Tip#10 Report anti-social behaviour. Always report any anti-social behaviour or harassment to your driver, guard, conductor or to the police. Program emergency numbers into your phone.

TAXI TRAVEL

• Consider phoning for a taxi from a safe place, such as your place of work, rather than hailing one from the street.

• Specify the route you would like to take to your driver. If your driver takes an alternative route, be assertive and ask him/her to take your specified route.

• Sit in the back of the taxi and consider travelling with friends.

• Take note of the taxi company, driver's name and car number. Let the driver know that you've noted their taxi number.

• At night consider asking your driver to wait for you until you are safely inside your destination.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 15 January: YOU CAN PREVENT OPPORTUNIST CRIME

Crime prevention can be an involved process using intelligence, strategic policing and attention to environmental factors. It can also be very simple – just lock up! Your police continue to investigate thefts that occur on unlocked targets. These include unlocked windows and doors in houses, unlocked garages at houses and units and unlocked cars. Criminals are often opportunists. They know they want to steal something, and they know if they look hard enough they will find unlocked premises or cars, which makes it easy to steal from and also does not attract the attention that breaking a window or door will do.

GALSTON A woman was taken to Hornsby Hospital for assessment after her car went off Galston Rd, near Galston Gorge, and landed 10m down the embankment on Friday. The westbound lane was closed and traffic was diverted.

ST IVES A woman, 45, was treated at Royal Northshore Hospital for cuts and bruises after she lost control of her car and hit a tree while driving east on Eastern Arterial Rd on Sunday night. Serious injury was averted when the car's airbags were deployed. Police are waiting for blood test results to make a final assessment.

THORNLEIGH A 43-yearold woman was handed two infringement notices after allegedly driving on the wrong side of the road with a passenger not wearing a seatbelt, along Oakleigh Avenue, on Monday afternoon.

NORTH TURRAMURRA Jewellery was stolen from an Apps Avenue house some time between December 20 and January 8. Thieves entered via an unlocked ground floor rear window. If you have any information, contact Hornsby police on 9476 9799.

HORNSBY Several rooms of a Lodge St house were ransacked with an amount of cash stolen between 9am and 6pm on Thursday. The offenders entered through a front window.

GALSTON A shop on Galston Rd had its front glass doors damaged on Friday night. An attempt to cut through the doors was made but was unsuccessful.

WAHROONGA A male offender is at large after breaking into an Isis St house on Sunday at 2am. Described as aged 16-17 and wearing a black cap, the offender gained access through a laundry window and went searching through two handbags. EVER suspected that litterbugs in Hornsby get off scot free? Well if the paltry number of people issued fines for littering in the Hornsby local government area is anything to go by, you may be right. The latest figures reveal that Hornsby Council issued just 45 fines for dumping rubbish or cigarette butts in 2013-14. The light touch that councils are taking on litter enforcement right across the state is brought into sharp relief when compared with parking fines. Councils issued 7.5 million parking fines in NSW in the five years to 2012-13 slugging motorists a total approaching \$1 billion.


