16 November: Hornsby Police news, 16/11/15 The following relate to local

issues in the Kuring gai Local Area Command.

Incident: Middle range drink driving charge Time/Date: About 4.40am Sunday 15th Place: Galston Road, Hornsby Heights

Vehicle 1: Ford

Driver 1: 18 year old male.

Details: The ford was being driven south on Somerville Road, Hornsby Heights. The driver an 18 year old male has as he approached the intersection of Galston Road allegedly lost control and slid though the intersection and crashed into a fence on the opposite side of Galston Road. Police have attended to investigate the crash and while speaking to the driver gave him a roadside breath test which he failed, he was then arrested. A further test gave a result of .087, the driver was charged and had his license suspended by police.

Court: The male is to appear at the Hornsby local Court on the 10th December charged with Driving with a Middle Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol

Incident: Break, enter & steal

Time/Date: Believed to be about 11.59pm Sunday 15th.

Place: Redgum Avenue, Killara

Details: It appears a garbage bin was used to reach an external alarm siren at a home in Redgum Avenue. The alarm †screamer†was ripped from the wall and the home broken into which activated a back to base alarm. Several rooms were ransacked with a watch being stolen.

Warning, thieves will use ladders, bins and pergolas to reach higher windows or alarm sirens. Please secure these by locking them well away from the home.

Incident: Stolen motor vehicle.

Time/Date: Between 6pm Sunday 15th and 7.15am Monday 16th

Place: Orinoca Street, Pymble.

Vehicle 1: BMW M3.

Details: A BMW M3 sedan was stolen from a home in Pymble. The M3 was valued

at an estimated \$60,000.

Incident: 3 x fires Hornsby

Time/Date: About 12.30am Sunday 15th

Details: Hornsby Fire brigade units were called to 3 fires that were lit in quick succession in Hornsby. A fire was lit a James Park, May Street and Sherbrook Road, within minutes of each other. At James Park an Otto garbage bin was set on fire, while in May Street and Sherbrook Road rubbish was set on fire on the roadway.

Incident: Steal from motor vehicle

Time/Date: Over night Sunday to Monday.

Place: Kallang Parade, Wahroonga

Details: During Sunday night 4 cars were broken into while parked on the street. The cars a Toyota Yaris, Toyota Corolla and Audi Q5 and a Volvo all had windows forced open and property stolen including GPS units, IPods and charger cables.

Police are appealing to witnesses who may have information relating to the above incidents to contact Hornsby police on 9476 9799, or phone Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 to report any information relating to the matter anonymously.

10 November, from the North Shore command's crime report: High Range Drink Driving – Lane Cove

Shortly before 10:30am on Saturday 7th November North Shore Police stopped the driver of a silver Commodore on Epping Road Lane Cove near the intersection of Mowbray Road. The 25-year-old male driver from **Turramurra** was subjected to a road side breath test which returned a positive result. He was arrested and taken to Chatswood Police Station for a breath analysis which returned a result of 0.159. Enquiries revealed he was the holder of a P2 drivers licence. The 25-year-old was charged with High Range drink driving and his drivers licence was suspended. He will appear in Hornsby Court next month.

You missed a great one!

Our Youth Liaison Officer (YLO), Senior Constable Stef Murray, NSW Police - Kuring-gai Local Area Command (LAC), spoke about her role as YLO. She illustrated with anecdotes from her personal experiences and what she shared was very interesting, thank you Stef. For instance, did you know?

- There is now a 'shoot to kill' policy in place.
- The Young Offenders Act has been so successful that less than 5% reoffend.
- If you are dealt with under the Young Offenders Act, there is a Police Record, but not a Criminal Record.
- Graffiti is no longer dealt with under the Young Offenders Act.
- Thus graffiti offences mean a Criminal Record!
- In Kuring-gai LAC young offenders are from all socio-economic and ethnic backgrounds.

Dr Cedric Spencer (Lawyer and Lecturer), spoke about children, the laws and legal issues - What can you do? What can't you do? Very informative, thank you, Cedric. Cedric was asked about the age for leaving a child at home alone, and has provided us with a soft copy response. <u>Click here</u> if you are interested. Other items of interest:

- Attendance at school is required.
- Suspension can be from all schools in NSW.
- Under 18yrs you cannot have a contract unless it is beneficiary or

necessary, eg a train ticket.

- Higher Purchase contracts with an under-18yrs are void.
- Children as young as 8yrs can testify as a witness in some instances.
- Medical treatment without consent is assault unless it is an emergency.
 Parents can give consent.
- A strip search cannot be performed on an under-10yrs.
- You must answer questions from the Police in a lock-down or road-block situation.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 12 November:

DRIVE SAFELY DURING STORM SEASON

It's the storm season and we have been battered by some serious weather lately, with more to come. Rain is a major factor in car crashes and these increase dramatically during bad weather. This is because drivers don't allow sufficient time to stop, causing slides on wet surfaces. This is particularly dangerous in pedestrian areas and around schools. Crashes on our busy roads have farreaching impacts on traffic and cause further crashes and serious delays for other drivers. Reduce your speed by 10 per cent and this will improve your stopping ability and reduce your chances of a crash. Detective Inspector Jon Gross Kuring-gai Local Area Command

ASQUITH An elderly pedestrian was hit by a car while crossing Sherbrook Rd on Saturday afternoon. About 4.15pm, the 84-year-old male was walking across a pedestrian crossing when he was hit by a Ford Territory, driven by a 21-year-old Mt Colah man. The pedestrian was taken to hospital with leg injuries. Inquiries are continuing.

TURRAMURRA More than \$8000 worth of cash, property and jewellery, including two watches, a sapphire ring, medallions, coins and five small statues, were stolen from a home in Brentwood Ave between 1.45pm and 3pm Friday. Police said a lock on the ground floor rear door had been forced.

TURRAMURRA An elderly motorist was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital with minor injuries after an accident in the Turramurra Plaza shopping centre car park on Saturday afternoon. Police said the 91year-old motorist was attempting to park about 3.30pm when he put his foot on the accelerator instead of the brake, causing his Toyota Camry to hit another car. There was extensive damage to both vehicles.

NORMANHURST A Honda CRF 450 off-road bike was stolen from a garage at a home in Eaton Ave between 11pm Saturday and 10.30am Sunday. About 11am on Monday a resident in Hammond Ave discovered the bike in his front yard with tree branches covering it. It is believed the thief placed the bike there and planned to come back later for it.

THORNLEIGH An attempted break-in occurred at a business on Dartford Rd between 1.30pm and 6.45pm Sunday. Police said someone tried to enter the

business through a window but was unsuccessful.

HORNSBY The bonnet of a Hyundai parked in Edgeworth David Ave was sprayed with paint between October 30 and November 6. The vandal drew a phallic symbol in the paint with their finger. The car's mirror was broken and there were dents in the bonnet and near side door.

TURRAMURRA Blue paint was sprayed on three sides of a sports pavilion at Turramurra Memorial Park, in Karuah Rd, about 9.30pm on Saturday. When police arrived they observed five youths in the area. They searched the youths but found no evidence that they were involved. They also searched a number of youths at Turramurra railway station but located nothing. Inquiries are continuing.

BROOKLYN Ku-ring-gai area police were out in force in Brooklyn over the weekend as part of the Bridge to Bridge Water Ski Classic. The police launch assisted a boat that had broken down and made sure spectator craft were kept clear of the race area. Police also conducted licence and compliance checks.

GLENORIE Thieves have stolen 30 horse jumps worth \$7800 from the Glenorie Pony Club. The items were kept in a horsebox in the grounds at Dilkera Rd.

GLENORIE Jewellery, a jewellery stand and wallet were stolen from a property in Cairnes Rd between 2.25pm and 3pm Friday. Police said the thief removed a flyscreen and entered through a window. A number of rooms were ransacked.

DURAL Vandals caused \$400 damage to two light poles outside a restaurant in Old Northern Rd about 11pm Friday.

PROTECTING your privacy has become increasingly hard due to the rapid growth of social media, technological improvements and increasingly affordable surveillance equipment. From revenge porn — where jilted lovers post sexually explicit images on social media or internet forums — to hacking scandals, an increasing number of people are suffering emotional and financial distress as a result of breaches of their privacy. Technologies such as surveillance drones, which can fly overhead and film people in their backyards and on private property, have become more affordable. In NSW, the failure of the legal system to keep up with these rapid advances has sparked a parliamentary inquiry into the protections available to help people keep their private information safe, as well as remedies for
