


Nov 30, from the ABC news: Sovereign citizens: Terrorism assessment warns of rising threat from anti-government extremists

In the past 12 months NRMA patrols across NSW and the ACT have rescued almost 2,500 young children accidentally locked in cars, a 16 per cent increase over the last four years. But what is causing this increase?

"Human error is not always to blame. Over-zealous pets knocking internal door locks and auto lock car <u>technology</u> result in calls to the NRMA,― says Dimitra Vlahomitros, NRMA Senior Policy Adviser, Road Safety.

Thank you for all your kind feedback. This week we had a question about NOISE POLLUTION - whistle blowing in the middle of the night.

Here's the information that we shared:

Hornsby Shire Council has advice on this matter, <u>click here</u>. Here's their advice as steps:

What can you do about loud noise?

Step 1: Keep a <u>noise diary</u> to record when and how the noise is affecting you.

Step 2: Discuss your concerns with the person causing the noise. Often people do not realise they are being noisy and will work with you to solve the problem. You could also send them a letter outlining your concerns. You might find this <u>letter</u>

template useful.

Step 3: If the noise continues, seek mediation with your neighbour through the Community Justice Centre.

Step 4: If the noise continues you can report the matter to Council, along with your completed noise diary. Council officers will need to see documentation from the Community Justice Centre to prove mediation has been attempted.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 26 November: Penalties for not wearing a seat belt

It has been compulsory to wear seatbelts in NSW since 1971. Each year on average, more than 50 people are killed and 300 injured, who were not wearing seatbelts. There are seatbelt penalties and demerit points for drivers who do not wear a seatbelt or fail to ensure their passengers wear seatbelts. The penalty for a driver not wearing a seatbelt is \$319 and three demerit points. More severe penalties apply when driving with unrestrained passengers. Double demerit points apply during all holiday periods, such as long weekends, Christmas and New Year. For more information go to: rms.nsw.qov.au.
